Head Cheerleader Lois Hamann, 21-year-old senior from Jericho, N.Y., was crowned 1971 Homecoming Queen by University of Tampa President B. D. Owens last Friday night following the annual Spartan Spoofs at Falk Theatre.

Lois, third maid in the 1970 Homecoming Court, reigned during UT's Homecoming football triumph over East Carolina at Tampa Stadium and the Homecoming Dance that followed at Curtis Hixon Hall. A member of Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority, she was sponsored by Pen and Sword Society. She also is a Sigma Phi Epsilon little sister and a member of the Civinettes.

On the court with Lois were Lyne Carr of Chula Vista, Calif., a junior, selected Ladyin-Waiting; Lenni Waggoner, Short Hills, N.J., senior, first runnerup; Sandy O'Shea, East Northport, N.Y. senior, second runnerup, and tying for third runnerup were seniors; Laura Wood, Springfield, Va. and Maureen Startt, Huachuca, Ariz.

Skit winners were: first—Zeta Tau Alpha Sorority; second—Theta Chi Fraternity; third—Pen and Sword, and fourth—Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity.

Lawn display winners were: first—Pi Kappa Phi Fraternity; second—Pen and Sword; third—Panhellenic.

Admissions and Registrar to become one office

Consolidation of the offices of admissions and registrar at the University of Tampa was announced by UT President B. D. Owens.

Heading the combined office will be Eugene Cropsey, appointed director of admissions and records, effective immediately. Cropsey has been UT registrar since June, 1967.

The change is intended as an efficiency move that will improve coordination between the two offices and decrease duplication of efforts.

President Owens said combining the offices will:

(1) Facilitate better coordination of admissions, enrollment and attrition studies;

(2) Eliminate duplication in maintenance and record keeping, in the preparation of input for data processing and on follow-up procedures and controls in high school transcripts; (3) Provide more efficient correlation of effort between the two offices, eliminating clerical duplication and resulting in the decrease of one clerical position, and

(4) Mean more responsibilities for key personnel within the two positions and reallocation and savings of space by combining file cabinets, offices and other facilities.

Cropsey, well qualified for his additional responsibilities, has been active in modernizing registration and record-keeping procedures since becoming registrar.

One of his major accomplishments was a computer program for evaluation of transfer credits. Future plans call for programming the computer to determine eligibility for graduation and online terminals to facilitate computer registration. Cropsey also hopes to put all student records on computer.

He joined the University of Tampa in 1964 as administrative assistant to the vice president for academic affairs, following six years in this area as special agent for Aetna Insurance Co. From 1966-67 he was director of the MacDill Campus.

While registrar, Cropsey taught six hours of business statistics and served on the academic policies and admissions committees at the University.

Cropsey, 40, is married and he and his wife, Jane, have two sons, William, 10, and John, 13, who is ballboy for the UT Spartans. A combat veteran of the Korean War, he received a B.S. degree in business administration in 1957 from Trinity University, San Antonio, Tex., and an M.A. in vocational education in 1970 from the University of South Florida.

Dr. Walter Lane Alumnus of year

As a highlight of the 36th University of Tampa Homecoming, Dr. Walter Lane, Temple Terrace physician, was named "alumnus of the year" by the UT Alumni Association.

The honor was bestowed Saturday during the annual Alumni Association buffet at 3 p.m. in the Aloha Room of Hawaiian Village Motel.

In addition to honoring Dr. Lane, the Alumni Association also awarded plaques to Dr. J. Duane Locke, associate professor of English, and Dr. Stanton G. Truxillo, assistant professor and acting chairman of the physics department, as outstanding members of the UT faculty.

Five years after his graduation from UT with the class of '61, Dr. Lane was named one of the "10 Outstanding Young Men in America" by the U.S. Junior Chamber of Commerce and was later appointed to the Presidential Advisory Council for the Office of Economic Opportunity.

A general practitioner, he holds one of the 50 coveted Gold Medals awarded by the American Academy of General Practice over the past century. While still a student at the University of Florida medical school, he developed a method for detecting bacterial infection and testing their sensitivity to drugs.

By naming Dr. Locke for outstanding achievement over a term exceeding five years, UT paid tribute to one of its own.

A native of Georgia, Locke was brought to Tampa at the age of four. Educated in Tampa schools, he was graduated from UT in 1949 with a bachelor of arts degree. His master of arts degree came from the University of Florida in 1955 and three years later he received his doctorate there in English Renaissance. The same year he joined the UT faculty.

Locke is married to another UT graduate, the former Frances Crombee. Once a widely known wildlife photographer, he is now internationally recognized as one of the most published poets on the contemporary scene. He is founder and editor of the University of Tampa Poetry Review, circulated around the world.

Dr. Truxillo was honored as the outstanding faculty member with less than five years service. He received the bachelor of science degree in 1963 from Loyola University of the South, New Orleans. His graduate course work stressed quantum mechanics, solid state theory and low temperature physics.

Concluding graduate studies at Louisiana State University in Baton Rouge, he received his doctorate in physics in 1969. His doctoral research was in experimental fluid cynamics.

Before joining the UT faculty in 1970 he was a research geophysicist with the Coastal Studies Institute of Louisiana State University where he participated in development and field testing of multispeed photographic techniques for remote sensing of coastal environment along with other projects.

And now I'm getting a little hot,


As I sit here watching them smoke their pot!!





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

Tampa beats East Carolina --- losing streak is over

Buddy Carter flipped two TD passes to All-American candidate tight end Alex Edlin and Jesse "Super" Soper booted a stadium record 50 yard field goal as the Tampa Spartans crushed a not so bad East Carolina Pirate team 43-7. A pitiful Homecoming crowd of 17,092 fans received the game.

Tampa started their scoring on account of a Carolina mistake. Wilburn Grooms recovered a Billy Wallace fumble and from the 16 it took just 3 plays to score the payoff coming on an option from Carter to Ken Moorhead for 11 yards behind a crushing block by Paul Orndorff. Soper kicked his first of 5 PAT's.

East Carolina drove right back, but a 37 yard field goal attempt hit an upright and failed.

The ball exchanged hands on punts and Tampa was bagged at the 33 of Carolina when Jesse Soper stepped up and booted his record setting field goal.

East Carolina later made another mistake which Tampa leaped on. Joey Clark intercepted a Casazza pass and on the following set Buddy Carter spotted Alex Edlin who dodged two tacklers to complete a 23 yard touchdown. Soper kicked Tampa into a 17-0 lead.

East Carolina was unable to

move and punted to its 47. On the succeeding play the Carter-Edlin aerial machine produced again. Edlin was all alone at the 15 and loped in to score. Soper's kick made it 24-0 at intermission.

Jesse Soper started the second half fireworks as he had ended the first. This time Super booted a 33 yard field goal to up Tampa's lead to 27-0.

The defense again turned the ball over to the offense. This time Tom Witmer intercepted a Casazza pass at the Tampa 48. From there Freddie Solomon handed to Orndorff for nine and Ernie Dubose for 4.

Solomon carried the rest with the score coming on a 12 yard scamper around left end.

Tampa again gained possession on a punt and drove to the 6 inch line where Frank Pitts fumbled on the ensuing play for Carolina, Casazza sprinted out and was tackled in the end zone by Clarence Pickney for a safety and a 36-0 lead.

East Carolina refused to fold and drove down the field to score, against Spartan reserves, the TD coming on a Summerell to Stan Eure pass. With Kilbourne's kick the final score stood at 43-7 in favor of the now 5-4 Spartans.
