## Spartan Cagers

 Lose Third Game With Ga. Southern

The University of Tampa Spar tans just didn't have enough re bounding strength and accuracy as they dropped their third straight game to Georgia Southern by the score of 94-79. The game, which was played in Statesboro on DC cember 7, was the third game Tam pa had lost since opening their scheduled season.
Again, it was the "big man" that beat Tampa. With Tampa's tallest man, Don Boyt, on the injured list, they just couldn't compete against the height of Georgia Southern. Coach Bob Lavoy, the Spar simply don't have the big men to compete with some of these teams and at times our shooting percentage is ridiculous." The "ridiculous shooting percentage" he was refer ring to was a low 26 per cent in the last two quarters of the game. In the first two quarters the Spartan percentage was better with a near 50 per cent average.
The Spartans were outrebound ed 61 to 38 by the Southern team but the Tampa five was able to hold Georgia to a mere 2 point lead at the half. It was then in the last two periods that Southern expanded this gap to 15 points.
Harvey Mallis led the Spartans in points with 26 and thus boosted his three game average to 17.3. Marlin Clark chipped in with 15 points, to run second. Behind Clark came Pellegrino and Shary with 12 and 10 points respectively.
