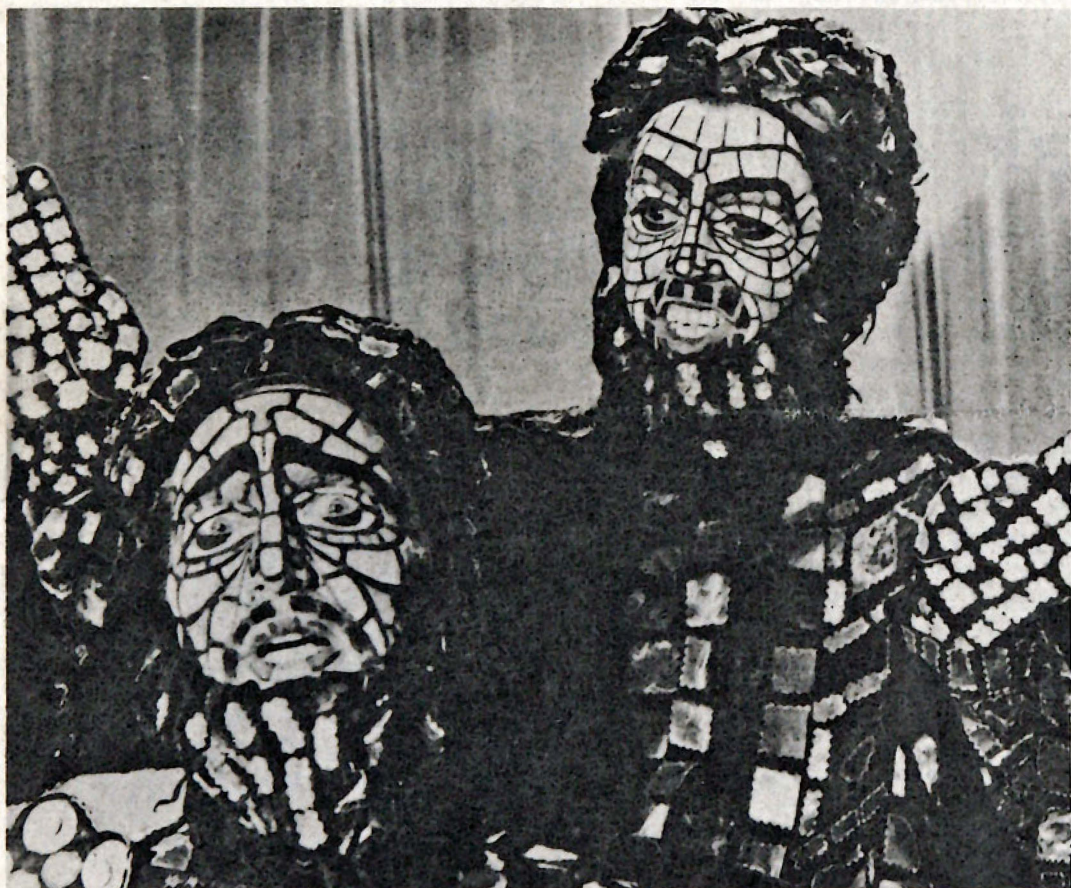

'Book of Job' at Falk Saturday night

In the play the actors appear as living mosaic figures, gleaming in brilliant costumes of red and gold, blue and purple. Mosaic make-up masks the faces, and the magnificent Elizabethan English of the Authorized Version, is the language spoken in a triumph of this choral drama.

"The Book of Job," performed by Corey's group The Everyman Players, is presented each July and August at Pine Mountain State Park Amphitheatre, in Pineville, Kentucky. Next summer will be the eleventh season in the park.

The Book of Job designed and directed by

Orlin and Irene Corey, will be presented at Falk Memorial Theatre, Saturday, December 13 at 8:30 p.m. The production is the second in the Theatre Artists Series of the university and admission is free of charge for Tampa students.

Corey was commissioned by the British Religious Drama Society in 1956 to create a play for a summer tour of English churches. The production was "The Book of Job" which first appeared at Georgetown College in Kentucky and since has appeared in every part of the western world, including two runs in New York, three international tours, and is now on its third national tour.

The President's reception, honoring graduates, their families and friends, will be held at 5 p.m. in the Student Center.

Debaters for University of Tampa were: Ted Chikowski, Dallas Clem, Arnold Finkelstein, Kenny Leach, Joel Medgebow, and Bill Smith. Host and hostesses for the event were Delo Forensic Society's Peter Burch, Dottie Branch and Janice Burda, who placed in the top four of the poetry readers.

Black athletes sue school

LARAMIE, Wyoming — (CPS)—The 14 black athletes who were ousted from the University of Wyoming football team for wearing black armbands have taken their case to court. They are asking for \$1 million in damages from the University and for the court to issue an order forcing the coach to reinstate them on the team.

The athletes, six of whom were first-stringers, were dropped from the team for mixing politics with sports. About three weeks ago, they made public a letter criticizing the racial policies of the Mormon Church, which operates Brigham Young University - a member, like Wyoming, of the Western Athletic Conference.

The night before the game with Brigham Young, they went to see the football coach, Lloyd Eaton, wearing the armbands. Eaton promptly dismissed them from the squad. He later cited two team rules as the reason: players do not participate in demonstrations, and they are not to form factions within the team.

The student senate then passed a resolution opposing the suspensions, the faculty senate voted 37-1 requesting the administration to make the suspensions temporary

rather than permanent, and after a series of meetings with the school's president, the city's mayor and the state's governor, coach Eaton softened his position.

He said he would review the athletic scholarships with the athletes on an individual basis when the scholarships expire in January. But Eaton refused to take back the permanent suspension of the athletes, and he was apparently supported in this stand by the president, William Carlson, who charged the 14 "openly, defiantly and pre-

meditatedly violated the rules."

Since then, several black members of the track team have left the school and a bi-racial group of about 150 picketed outside the university's Memorial Stadium at the homecoming game against San Jose State.

The University of Wyoming has about 150 blacks in a student population of 8,500. The action of the 14 students represented the eighth incident between black athletes and the Mormon Church.

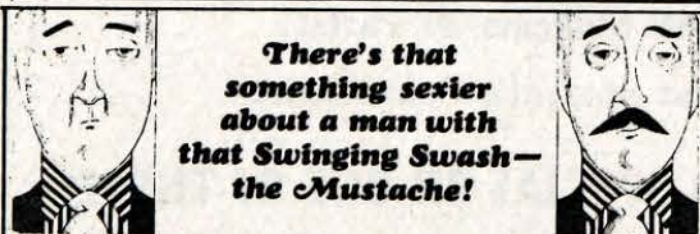
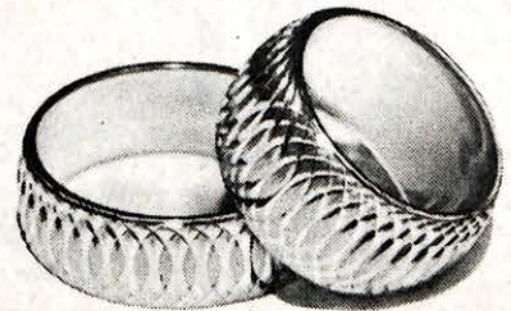

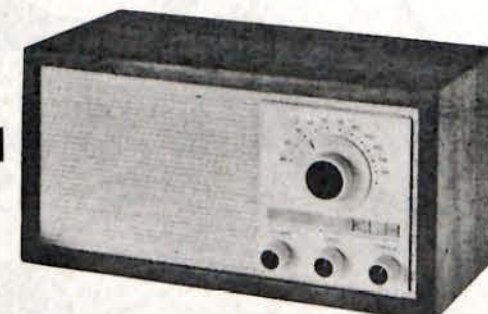

SOMEWHERE IN ARIZONA (CPS) — Talk of a gigantic free pop music festival supposedly scheduled for next summer in Arizona Indian land and sponsored by the U.S. government and industry is still just talk.

Although the festival has been written up in Billboard Magazine and several college papers, San Francisco Chronicle Col-

umnist Ralph Gleason, who investigated the story, reports it is "simply an attractive idea of a New York press agent."

The agent has talked to a lot of people about it, and reaction has been favorable, but no comments have yet been made, Gleason says.

Billboard called the festival the "1970 United States Peace Festival," and reported the government expects from one to three million people to attend.

Presidential assistants Bud Wilkinson and Daniel Patrick Moynihan have been contacted about staging the event. Major corporations also thinking of helping to pay for such a festival are, according to Billboard, American Telephone and Telegraph, General Motors, Anaconda, Coca-Cola, Mobil Oil, Borden, U.S. Steel, and Union Carbide.

Anaconda, an international copper firm owned,

in large part, by the Rockefeller family; Mobile Oil, part of the world Standard Oil Corporation, and Union Carbide, a firm which does much work in Latin America, have been the targets of large student demonstrations against American industrial imperialism in such countries as Brazil, Chile, and Venezuela.

Billboard states the theme and meaning of the festival would be to bring youth and the federal government together. "The emblem for the festival, has a red rising sun pushing back a wall of darkness pictured in blue, symbolizing the freedom and openness of the future, pushing back disease, ignorance, greed and misunderstanding."

"The festival's board of advisors include," Billboard reported "Tommy James (Tommy James and the Shondells), Arlo Guth-

Linkletter raps rock music bands in T.U. speech

Art Linkletter, in a speech in the Student Center last Thursday, cautioned students against the suggestiveness of the "rock" record industry. He accused rock singers of musically advocating drug use and sexual promiscuity. "If I had the power I would arrest every one of them," said the self-styled moralist.

Linkletter is on a speaking tour of American colleges, sponsored by Royal Crown Cola Company. His lecture topic was campus dissent, but he centered his remarks on the social rather than political manifestations of college life.

He sponsored a personal campaign against the record companies who produce these "suggestive" records. He said he has approached some of his personal friends who are corporate officers in the largest recording companies, in an attempt to effect a "censor" of such lyrics. But he has had only limited success, probably due to the fantastic profit such records bring in.

"I've talked with the hard rock groups and told them I'm not against rock music but when their music insists that you use heroin or cocaine or engage in sexual perversions, I am against that," he said.

"I've also told them that if they don't stop that kind of music, I'll do anything I can to ruin them . . . anything," he said. His remarks Thursday reflect the embitterment Linkletter has toward drugs since the recent death of his daughter, Diane. She killed herself by jumping from a window, while supposedly tak-

ing a bad L.S.D. trip.

Linkletter also denounced rock festivals as attractive nuisances, sort of like "leaving your keys in the car and inviting some one to steal it." These festivals put all the various hallucinogenic drugs at the disposal of everyone who attends. The youth culture is thus "surrounded by drugs," and their easily availability leads people who normally wouldn't use drugs to use them because it's the thing to do. These infrequent drug users are very susceptible to overdoses and bad drugs.

To counteract this rising drug abuse Linkletter advocates some type of "drug education," aimed at informing young people of the dangers of narcotics. This training "should be a part of the health education of kids. It should begin in the fourth grade."

Tony Negron's set was not awe inspiring but considering the handicaps of Falk Theatre it was more than adequate. It is next to impossible to change sets in Falk and the one used was built to be turned around to fit the inside and the outside of the arena.

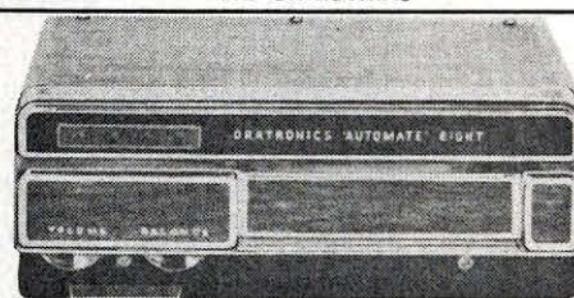
rie, John Lennon, Peter Fonda, New York Mayor John Lindsay and Patrick West, director of the Intercollegiate Broadcasting System, Inc."

Although the festival would be free, it has already earned the animosity of the underground and hip music press. Several college papers, prior to the government's plan, had charged big promoters of festivals with being "rock imperialists."

The government's intent already has been called a method of "bringing youth around," and not together with the government.

If the government does decide to go ahead with the idea, it will find moves afoot to boycott the festival — a boycott which would encourage youth to stay away and rock groups not to perform.

Tampa U. quarterback named all-american by associated press

The University of Tampa's senior quarterback Jim DelGaizo was selected last week by the Associated Press to its third team Little All-American squad.

DelGaizo, 6-2, 200-pounder from Revere, Mass. led the nationally ranked Spartans through a 8-2 season while setting new individual and career pass-

ing records at the university. In only two years DelGaizo has passed 638 times, completed 322 for 4,269 yards and 35 touchdowns, and he has also compiled the greatest number of yards rushing and passing by any previous player at U. of T. at 3,945.

DelGaizo becomes the second straight Little All-

American under Head Coach Fran Curci. Last year Ron Brown made the first team defense at middle guard.

The University of Tampa Basketball Spartans won their first game of the year by defeating Biscayne College 88-87 in overtime contest.

The 1,100 people who turned out for the Spartans home opener saw the Tampa cagers lose a 9-point first half lead but hung on in overtime to capture the victory.

John Napier, a Little All-American selection from last year, led the Spartans with 31 points. Frank Robinson, 6-8 junior from Franklin, N. Y. pumped in 17 points; four big ones came in overtime.

Rich Royle had the hot hand for the Bobcats as the 5-10 junior led all scorers with 35 points. Jim McCloud, 6-1 guard and a freshman hit for 21 points including 13 of 14 foul shots.

Biscayne hit for seven straight points early in the second half and the Spartans couldn't move out ahead as the Bobcats kept up the pressure. With five seconds left in the game, UT took a time out, John Napier got the ball but missed on a deep shot just as the buzzer sounded. Regulation time ended with the score 77-77.

The Spartans jumped to a seven point overtime lead with Jack Quealey tapping in the 87th point and hung on for the victory.

Tampa made 30 of 58 shots and was 28 for 41 from the foul line. Biscayne, fortunately for the Spartans, hit on only 33 of 91 floor shots, but hit 21 of 29 from the line.

The Spartans had trouble controlling the boards as the Bobcats pulled in 47 while UT managed only 44.

The Spartans now take a break and do not return to the court until December 26 in the Christmas Sunshine Classic.
