







Another sign of progress here at our young and growing University!






PHILLIPS FIELD . . . home of the University of Tampa Spartan gridders.


Yes, all of Dr. Nance's dreams for our growing University are coming true.











Coach Sam Bailey's cagers ran into some tough opposition this winter but with the entire squad returning next year, the basketball team should vastly improve on this year's record.




