HOMECOMING COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN TELLS HOW WE ACQUIRED THORNHILL

Yes, it's really true! For the first time in its history, the University of Tampa is going to have a big name band for Homecoming—Claude Thornhill.

Last Spring, the Student Senate at the request of the Inter - Fraternity - Sorority Council, gave IFSC full responsibility for the Homecoming Dance including securing a band. The President of IFSC, Ernest Segundo, appointed a Homecoming Committee composed of Bryan Webb, Jim Turner, Carmen Wright and Mary Lou Roos, with Tommy King as chairman. With King's capable way and the guidance of Dean Burnside, approximately eight top musical booking agencies were contacted.

The committee encountered many unforeseen difficulties. One of the first was an attempt to work a package deal with the officer's Club at MacDill Field or the Coliseum in St. Petersburg.

The biggest problem was money. After due consideration, a budget of \$1250 was set, but almost all of the big bands were too expensive. Then due to having to make many trips out of the city, plus the fact that Tommy King was transferring, Mary Lou Roos was appointed to fill the vacancy.

Finally, after a whole summer of meeting, letter writing, telephone calls, telegrams, and disappointments the choices were narrowed down and the committee chose Claude Thornhill.

The contract was properly sent and signed but this was not the end of the problems. \$625 has to be paid in advance along with the contract.

Naturally the treasury of the IFSC could not even imagine such an amount of money, so a meeting of IFSC had to be called.

A pledge to support the Homecoming Dance and guaranteeing the sale of enough tickets to cover the \$625 initial down payment had to be signed by a representative of each group in order to borrow the money from the school.

Pres. of Illinois Tech Says, "Roll of Student Government Important"

States That Student Gov't Must be More Effective and Strong

Chicago, Ill. (I.P.) — In a statement released to student leaders at Illinois Institute of Technology, President J. T. Rettaliata declared that "I have always considered the role of student government a very important one, and a valuable educational experience for those who participate. In order to strengthen student government, and make its operation more effective, it would appear desirable to clarify its relationship with the administration.

"Accordingly, I would appreciate your transmitting to . . . appropriate student governing bodies, the following statement of principles on which our student government is based:

1. Illinois Institute of Technology establishes certain regulations which are considered necessary for the best interests of all concerned. Individuals and organizations are liable for

Then the hulking oaks spread wide their branches to touch the time worn bricks, and straighten bending trunks once more in the pale gleam of the moon.

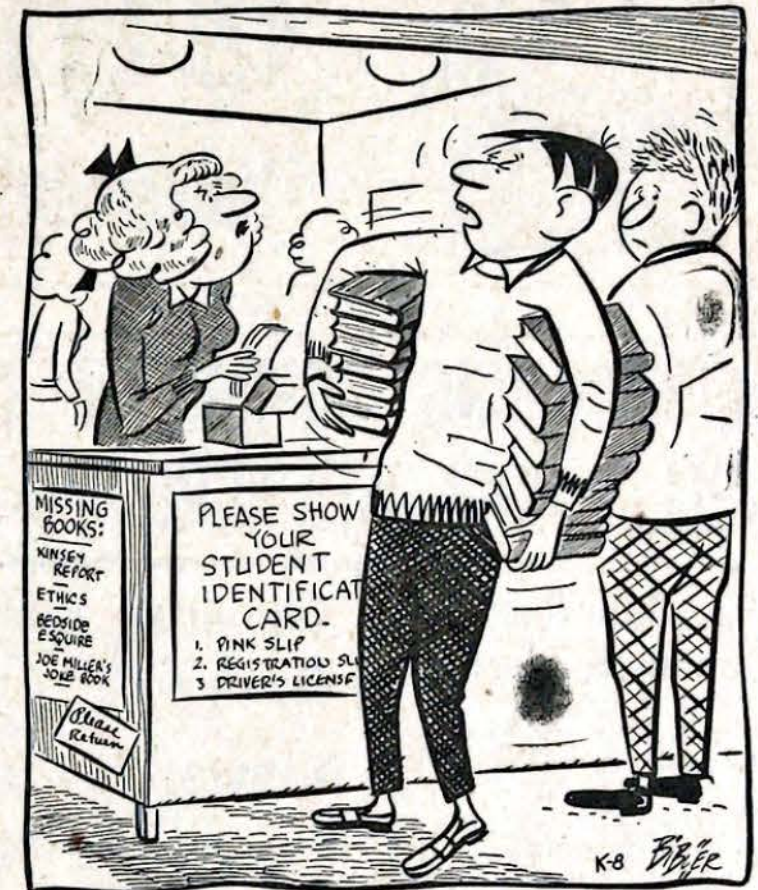
Then the winds voice rules the empty halls and moans it's empty dreams into the silence of their darkness, and shatters with it's very quietness the solace of your dream.

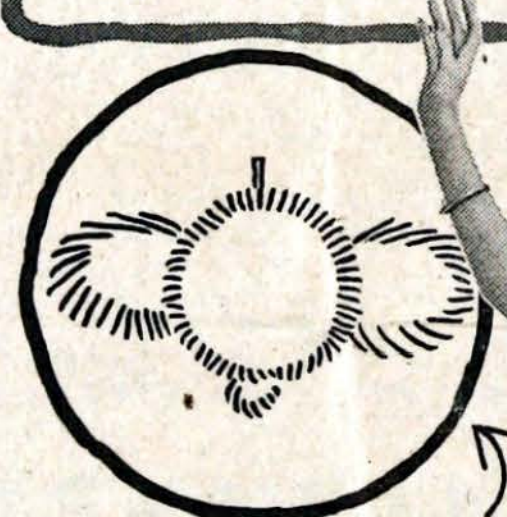
Arrangements have just been completed for the new Maid to fly via British Overseas Airways Corporation's Bahamian flight to the world-famous resort city of Nassau next January 31.

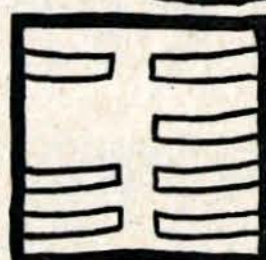

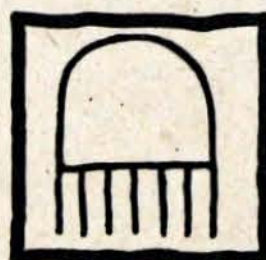

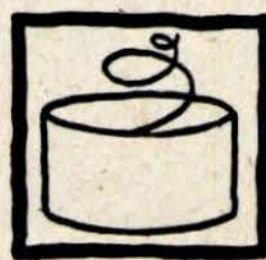

"Ready down" ... "Hut Two" ... "Hut Two." And the Spartans are off on their 1955 home stand. Coach Marcelino Huerta, fielding one of the best teams this reporter has seen since the Vince Chico-Luke Aplin era, didn't disappoint the home folks as his boys "bulled" their way over hapless Troy State 38-0. The win, coupled with a victory over Morris-Harvey in the first game of the season, put the Spartans two up in the win column. They have yet to taste defeat.

It only took the Tampa eleven one minute and 30 seconds of the first quarter to ram across their first score. On the opening kickoff, Bryan fumbled after being hit on the 23, and Bob Lovely pounced on the loose ball. From there Herndon went to the 12. After a series of downs, which saw freshman fullback Charles Coleman pick up 43 yards, Troy punted. The Spartans, now completely revamped with reservists, started to move toward another score. PRESIDENT URGES STRONG STUDENT GOVERNMENT

the observance of all applicable Institute regulations.

2. The Institute reserves the right to terminate a student's enrollment or to withdraw privileges when it is judged to be in the best interests of the Institute.

3. The authority and responsibility of administering the affairs related to student behavior, welfare, and activities is delegated to the Dean of Students by the President of the Institute.

4. The Dean of Students may delegate certain authority and responsibility dealing with the operation of student activities to the Illinois Tech Student Association. The Dean of Students may use the right of veto on actions taken by these organizations or rescind this authority whenever the reputation, integrity, or welfare of the Institute is placed in jeopardy. It is expected that responsibly student government will not require such action.

5. The administration will consult with the student government in the establishment, revision, and implementation of Institute regulations pertaining to student activities.

6. Student organizations may develop rules and regulations to govern their own affairs so long as they do not conflict with the rules and regulations pertaining to student activities of the Institute.

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Law School Admission Tests to be Given Soon

Princeton, N. J. — Special — The Law School Admission Test required of applicants for admission to a number of leading American law schools, will be given at more than 100 centers throughout the United States on the mornings of November 12, 1955, February 18, April 21, and August 11, 1956. During 1954-55 nearly 10,000 applicants took this test, and their scores were sent to over 100 law schools.

A candidate must make separate application for admission to each law school of his choice and should inquire of each whether it wishes him to take the Law School Admission Test and when. Since many law schools select their freshman classes in the spring pre-

ceding their entrance, candidates for admission to next year's classes are advised ordinarily to take either the November or the February test, if possible.

The Law School Admission Test, prepared and administered by Educational Testing Service, features objective questions measuring verbal aptitudes and reasoning ability rather than acquired information. It cannot be "crammed" for. Sample questions and information regarding registration for and administration of the test are given in a Bulletin of Information.

Bulletins and applications for the test should be obtained four to six weeks in advance of the desired testing date from
