SPARTANS SCALP SEMINOLES 14 TQ 6

The major upset of football history, in Florida took place on Nov. 17 at Phillips Field before 12,000 fans on a cold and soggy night. That night the Tampa Spartans decisively defeated the strongest small grid team known in the state.

In the opening period the Seminols rolled advance on advance against the Tampa team. They had a powerhouse on the field. And as suddenly as the yardage advance had begun, it stopped. On a fourth down the team from Tallahassee was forced to kick out of danger. The kick went far down field into the arms of Gene King. King handed the ball off to Chicko. Chicko, behind perfect interference, galloped 75 yards for a score. 'Magic Shoed' Aplin added the extra point. Tampa 7-opponent 0.

In the third period, Italiano made FSU's only score and the try for their extra point went wide. Tampa 7-opponent 6.

Tampa was in danger, for a touchdown by the Seminoles would rob them of their lead.

In the first play of the final quarter cheering Tampa fans jumped to their feet in a demonstration unparalleled this year as Jim Mathis scored on an 18 yard run and the "Magic" shoe of Aplin added the extra point. Tampa 14-opponent 6.

It wasn't King, Chicko, Aplin, Lohasky, Sequella or any other one man that made football history that night. No, the team made football history but every man figured in that history making night.



He was a tall ,blonde haired kid about twenty years old. Maybe it was a little hard to tell his age from the chusical being of his face It's the physical being of his face. It's hard to tell any man's age from IN BASKETBALL a face created with mud, a thirty day beard, and distorted with pain. Nevertheless he was a kid - an American kid.

The date was September 23rd, 1950. The place was a small ditch on the outskirts of Yongdong-po, a suburb of Seoul. And the country he was fighting in was Korea.

His hands were tied behind his back with a piece of wire that cut brutally into his wrists. There was a bluish-black hole where the bullet penetrated the back of his neck at short range.

There were three more men in the ditch with him, all dead, and all with their hands tied behind their backs


FLORIDA AFRAID

Twenty-five years ago a group of students at Lafayette College, Easton, Pa., met to form a new student club. They had, at one time or another, been affiliated with the Boy Scouts of America. 
French Club Won Homecoming Prize

The three cheers were supported by Martha Nash, Scotty Bailey and Rosemary Fox. James Perry, a former Marine sergeant and holder of many citations, also rode on the float.
