During the year, considerable progress has been made at the University of Tampa in creating and arousing interest in professional organizations. The University's student FEA has grown in membership during the year from 14 to 107. The new chapter of the Association of Childhood Education which was organized on the campus this year for the first time has a membership of 102 members. Mrs. Ida Eastburn is sponsor of the student FEA and Dr. Louis Robles, sponsor of the ACE. It is hoped we can establish a chapter at the University of Tampa in the near future.

COACH HUERTA MAKES NATIONAL HEADLINES

This is a "hats-off" tribute to a guy who is one of the nation's best coaches, one of the most-liked and popular speakers, especially during the winter banquet tour, and a guy whose tireless efforts have brought the University of Tampa to the front in many ways.

He is Athletic Director Marcelino Huerta who recently set up a nation-wide Easter Seal drive to help crippled children. The following story is reprinted from the March 6 publication of the Tampa Morning Tribune describing the plan:

TAMPA U. GRADUATE AWARDED FELLOWSHIP

Charles Anderson, who graduated from the University of Tampa in January, has been awarded a fellowship by Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Physics.

He will study for a year at one of the four universities which participate in the program: Vanderbilt, University of Kansas, University of Rochester, and University of Washington. The following summer he will work in the laboratory at Oak Ridge. The fellowship, which includes a stipend of \$3200 and tuition and college fees, will begin in the fall.

Charles majored in physics and minored in mathematics and chemistry at the University, maintaining a high scholastic average. He held a job throughout his college years. By attending summer school, he completed four years of study in three years.



GOMEZ REPLACES HALL AS BUSINESS MANAGER



A standout on Spartan teams of 1949-52, Pancost returns to the University from Hillsborough High School where he tutored the Terrier backs under Coach Hal Griffin last season.

Regarded by Huerta as "one of the greatest defensive football players I have ever seen," Pancost was a student assistant at the University in 1955-56 before moving to Hillsborough and "is a welcome addition now that he is back at the University".

Married and the father of a daughter, the 25 year old Pancost started his football career at Pensacola High School and won a scholarship to the University of Tampa when he caught they eye of Spartan coaches in a contest against Hillsborough.

NEW PROGRAM OF REQUIRED COURSES

Dr. Rex C. Kidd

Some changes in the courses required in education have been approved and will go into effect during the 1958-59 school term. Some of the changes will become effective the fall semester of the 1958-59 term, others the spring semester. We think this information will be of interest to all alumni in the field of education.

In the program for elementary

Dr. J. Ryan Beiser has accepted an invitation of the Federated Republic of Germany to visit West Germany this summer.

He will be in a group of 10 educators who will leave New York on June 22 to fly to Dusseldorf via the German airline, Lufthansa.

He will tour German educational facilities and industries and will meet with important men in all fields. He will also have some time on his own for sight-seeing.

Dr. Karl Schoenbach, German Counsel of Southeastern United States, suggested Dr. Beiser. Dr. Beiser received his invitation from the office of the German Secretary of State.

teachers, the courses Education 208, Methods of Teaching Science in the Elementary School, Education 307, Teaching Social Studies in the Elementary School and Education 312, Teaching Arithmetic in the Elementary will be offered as separate courses rather than being included in the internship program as is now being done. The courses, Education 300, The Elementary School Curriculum, and Education 412, Administration and Supervision in the Elementary School will be included in the internship program. These changes will take place the second semester of the 1958-59 term. Also, beginning at this time, the internship program will carry fifteen semester hours credit istead of 12 hours.

The courses 208, 307, 312 when offered as separate courses carry three hours credit instead of two. The education courses 204, Teaching fine and Practical Arts in the Elementary School, Education 230-31, Elementary School Music and Education 305, Methods of Teaching Physical Education and Health in the Elementary School will be reduced from four hours credit to three hours credit. These changes will become effective beginning with the first semester of the 1958-59 term.

In order that no hardship may be imposed on any student, provisions will be made for students to intern under the old program or the new

New Program of Required Courses

program, the second semester of the 1958-59 term. After this semester all students will be required to intern according to the provisions of the new program. Any student interning under the new program who had 300, 412 or any other courses included in the internship will get only 12 hours credit.

In the secondary field under the new program Education 301, The High School Curriculum, will be included in the internship program. The internship will then carry 15 hours credit instead of 12. This change will become effective the second semester of the 1958-59 term. Students interning at the time which had Education 301 will get only 12 hours credit for the internship.

After the courses 300, 301 and 412 are included in the internship, they will be offered as separate courses only during summer school. A new course, The School Curriculum, which will give consideration to both the elementary school curriculum will be offered beginning with the fall semester of the 1958-59 term. This course will be designed to meet the needs of those students that are required to take both elementary and secondary curriculum. This included students majoring in physical education, Art and Music.

One other minor change has been made in the internship. Students will be required to return to the campus during the internship only at the end of the third and sixth weeks of the internship rather than weekly. This change will become effective the fall semester of the 1958-59 term.

Huerta Makes National Headlines

Through the tireless efforts of one of the youngest members of the coaching profession, the University of Tampa's Marceino Huerta, mentors across the nation have banded and will quarterback their clubs in the fight to help crippled children.

Their battle will be under the auspices of the National Easter Seal Drive and wherever there are football teams, the "Huerta Plan" will be in effect.

Form of attack will be for every college football player in the country to help solicit funds on March 29 and because of the "Huerta Plan," officials are hopeful of reaching their goal in every community.

Hillsborough County footballers, both college and high school, will spearhead the drive since Huerta is chairman for the county.

He reported yesterday that "On March 29, every high school and college player in the county will be out to canvass assigned areas and solicit funds for what we think is a worthy cause."

Locally, the "Huerta Plan" has been in effect five years. Starting in 1953, University of Tampa gridders went out en-masse one day during the month-long drives and solicited funds for the Easter Seal Foundation.

The results were so rewarding, Huerta took it upon himself to write every college in the country and urge that they have their teams aid in the drive. In addition, he wrote the governors of every state asking their endorsement of the plan.

Reception was almost unanimous. Huerta received endorsement from more than 40 governors and at their January meeting in Philadelphia, members of the American Football Coaches Association gave unanimous approval to back the drive.

Now, as chairman of local fund raising, Huerta vows to work harder than ever. And, he thinks the other coaches across the country "will do everything they can to make the drive a huge success.

Our Spartan athletes also deserve a big hand for their part in this gigantic and worthwhile task.
