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## Faculty restates position

# Calendar task force requested by Trustees

A substitute resolution to clarify the faculty's position on the academic calendar was proposed and passed at this past Monday's faculty meeting.

The resolution calls for a clear statement that the calendar of the University of Tampa is a 14-week calendar with a provision for seven-week courses if preferred by the individual faculty member, said Assistant Provost Jim Drake. It calls for a statement that the *semester*, rather than the *bimester*, is the primary calendar, he said.

The only debate on the resolution, passed by a 42 to 15 vote, was over the wording of it, and not over its merits, Drake said.

Another proposal, circulated to the faculty the week before the meeting, was discussed prior to the emergence of the substitute resolution. The two-part proposal consisted of: 1) an endorsement of the division chairpersons' March 29 memorandum to UT President Richard Cheshire on the pragmatic difficulties of full implementation of the bimester calendar; and 2) a reiteration of the faculty vote approving the 1983 revised bimester calendar.

The faculty did not, however, pass the resolution, Drake said, as they felt the whole proposal was a restatement of action already taken, and that it would not accomplish anything new if passed. He said they questioned the accuracy, integrity and intent of the resolution.

The faculty wanted to address the bimester/semester matter directly, said Drake, and, above all, wanted to be direct and forthright in their actions. They therefore did not pass the original resolution and developed and

passed the substitute one.

Cheshire, who was not at the faculty meeting, said the passed resolution "recognizes what will exist next year," a 60 percent coupled-bimester/40 percent bimester calendar.

He said the wording of the resolution was "quite deliberate" in leaving out the terms "bimester" and "semester," and that this "leaves the door open" for further actions.

Also presented to the faculty was a copy of an April 10 memorandum from Provost Ed Wilde to Cheshire, which recounted the actions of the Board of Trustees Educational Affairs Council meeting.

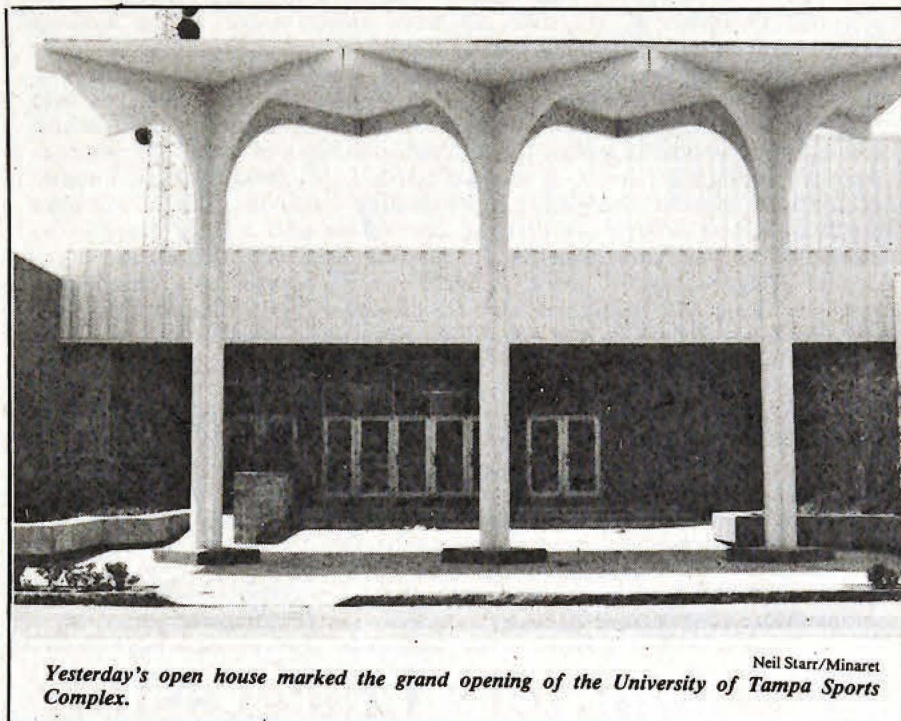
The first of the nine points contained in the memo says: "The Council voted unanimously to request a joint task force of trustees, faculty members, and administrative officers to resolve the calendar issue with deliberate speed but without presumption of result."

The memo also says: "The Council requested that the task force use as its two primary criteria for proposing resolution: academic quality and marketability, in that order."

Cheshire said the Council requested a task force "to formulate future direction for the calendar." He said the division chairpersons would constitute the pro-active end of the task force, proposing solutions and models to the Executive Committee of the Board, who would be the reactive side of the task force.

The goal of the task force will be to "take what we have . . . and try to develop an identity for the calendar," Cheshire said, and, at the same time, hopefully keep the term "bimester" in use.

A result cannot be predicted, he said, but the final solution must be satisfactory to the faculty and to the

Board and must meet the two stipulated criteria of academic soundness and marketability.

In resolving the calendar issue, the task force, particularly the faculty members, must consider the importance of the academic outcomes of each course as they relate to the University's mission to help students become "productive, responsible, self-reliant, and free persons," Cheshire said. They must ask: "Why are we teaching what we are teaching and why are we teaching it the way we teach it?" and "Does the way we teach it . . . reinforce the mission?"

Though there are no students proposed to be on the requested task force, Cheshire said it is important to have student input. This could be done in a wide range of ways. He did not rule out the possibility of students joining the task force, and also suggested that the Collegium may be able to assist in having student opinion available on the issue.

The task force will painstakingly piece together the best possible resolution of the calendar issue, he said, and will try not to force the process nor the result, but will try to evolve both in a "consensus building manner."

Cheshire said he sees the positive

aspect of seeking a consensus without forcing the process, but sees a negative aspect in that it takes time and leaves uncertainties. He said the principle work of the task force will take place in the fall and that the target date for finalizing a calendar proposal is December.

Another important goal of the task force will be to define the "bimester" in student-related terms. Cheshire said there must be an agreement of its definition to explain to students so they can relate to it in such areas as choosing courses and knowing what to expect in the future.

He said a definition is also needed in order for evaluations to take place, especially in the area of academic outcomes assessment.

"[We are] trying to develop the task force with a minimum of work, but with sufficient work to get things done," Cheshire commented.

The process will "require the faith of the people [involved] and will necessitate agreement on the commonality of educational philosophy, especially in the area of partnership learning."

It is important that the formulated calendar allow for both a proper mix of subject matter and enough time for student/faculty interaction.

## National dean search continues; field narrowing

After receiving approximately 170 applications for the position of University of Tampa Dean of Students, the Dean Selection Committee is busy working to complete its task. Within two weeks its goal is to narrow the field down to the top three to five candidates, at which time Provost Ed Wilde may invite any or all of them to the University for personal interviews.

The committee is comprised of Chairman David Ford, associate provost; Walt Turner, director of admissions; Dr. Daniel Shaw, director of the Counseling Center; Jan Jardiou, director of Residence Life and Housing; Dr. Eric Vlahov, associate professor of Physical Education; Dr. Linda Musante, assistant professor of psychology; and students Brenda Foody and Stephen Yates. The com-

mittee advertised nationally for candidates with an earned doctorate and a minimum of two years' administrative experience in student affairs.

Ford explained that a national search must be conducted for equal opportunity purposes. "We must offer the opportunity for all others . . . to apply. It's not that [Suzanne Nelson] is doing a bad job at all," said Ford.

Once the most qualified applicants are selected, they will be interviewed by Wilde, President Richard Cheshire, and committee members. However, the final hiring decision primarily rests with Wilde and Cheshire.

While most of the applicants do not presently hold the office of dean of students, "Those with dean level experience should have an advantage," said Ford.

The office of the Dean of Students should be filled by early summer, and Ford is confident his committee will make a good choice.

## Graduation requirements lowered

Beginning next year, 124 credits will be required to graduate from the University of Tampa, lowering the current requirement by four credits.

"The faculty voted Monday to make the requirement of 124 hours to apply retroactively for graduation for all individuals who would have needed 128 credits before," said UT Provost Ed Wilde.

The change was in direct response to a perceived student dilemma because the 128 credit requirement imposed a hardship due to the change in many courses, particularly in the business area, from four to three credits, Wilde said.

"This is the third change in number of hours required to graduate in the last four years. We've gone from 120 to 128 to 124," he said.

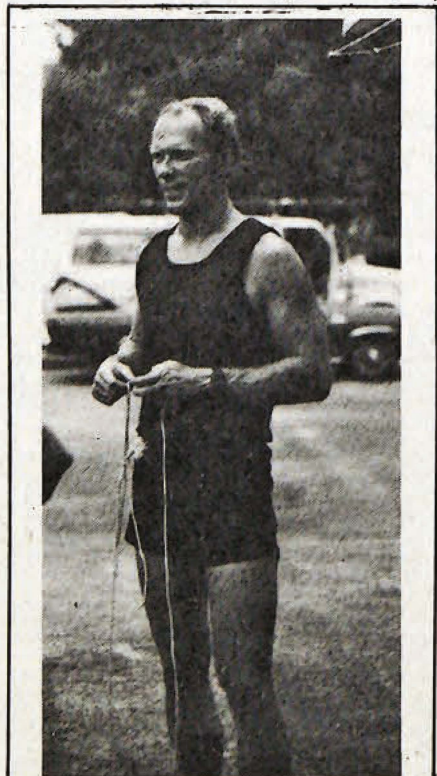

## UT computers inaccessible

Will computers really make the world a better and more efficient place in which to live? It sure doesn't seem that way, especially if you try to learn how to use them, and use them well, here at the University of Tampa.

With this being the last week of classes, computer projects for many students need to be completed. I don't know about everyone else, but for me it is coming down to the wire in getting my final project finished.

And this wasn't due completely to procrastination. Of course, I didn't spend every free minute I had in the Computer Center, but I planned plenty of time for the programs around working, going to class, and helping to produce a newspaper.

But what good is it to work on the programs if, for one reason or another, you cannot gain access to computer time?

Three good reasons exist for the unavailability of the computers to students for the better part of these past two weeks:

1. NCR, which furnished UT with the hardware and software for the Computer Center, teaches classes here and uses the IRX computer room many afternoons. The IRX is superior to the time-sharing system when it comes to programming in BASIC; when given a choice, most students will opt for the IRX because of speed and ease in use. With NCR in the room, students cannot use it. So, with morning classes, only evenings are left for students, and only until 10 p.m. Considering

the cafeteria hours, and the scheduling of campus activities, this does not leave very much time for computer work.

2. The IRX does not always work. From last Friday to this past Wednesday, the system was either shut down completely or was only sporadically coming to life. This is not the first time the system has been shut down this bimester. Earlier, the IRX was unavailable for about a week because of system malfunctions. This makes it very difficult on students in classes that are dependent upon having computer use during the whole bimester (or semester), and not just for a final project. Without them working throughout the term, assignments keep backing up until the end of the year.

3. There are only eight terminals in the IRX room. So, even when there is functioning computer time for students, quite often, particularly near the end of a semester, there are not enough terminals available. Two-hour waits are not uncommon during the final week.

Hopefully, these problems will be extinguished come next year with the installation of the TOWER system and the expanded use of Decision-mate computers.

But this doesn't make up for the problems that are occurring now. I should be in the Computer Center now, typing in a program, instead of writing this commentary. I just hope it doesn't come down to a last-minute, Thursday night rush. I'll never make it, and I bet I won't be the only one.

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

## Tele-seed sown

The age of video has been in full swing during the past few years. Commercial television is slowly losing ground to cable television, people are sprouting satellite dishes in their back yards and television manufacturers are producing televisions that can play favorite video tapes or discs in full stereo.

The telecommunication market is booming and the University of Tampa is hot on its heels. Joann Valenti, professor of English, said that by the Fall of 1984, UT hopes to have a full-time telecommunication faculty member and offer one or two telecommunication courses. The courses will be offered with the cooperation of Tampa Cable Television, which will have their facility located on campus.

"Right now the [telecommunication] seed is planted and we are waiting for it to grow on campus," said Valenti. This "seed" was planted by Dr. Richard Cheshire, president of the University. According to UT Provost Ed Wilde, Cheshire presented a request for a \$150,000 grant from the Tampa Cable Television Foundation to be paid over a three-year period. "The grant will be used to kick off the program itself while the leasing contract which the University has with Tampa Cable will pay the salary of the full-time faculty member that will be hired to oversee the program," said Wilde.

The telecommunication program will eventually be offered as an interdisciplinary program with other majors such as marketing, writing or computer science. "Right now we have a cooperative commercial venture with Tampa Cable which will create an educational opportunity for UT students at no cost [tuition]," said Wilde. "This program is supported at a level that most academics would drool over."

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## Baseball profile

## Spartan seniors say goodbye to UT

The University of Tampa baseball team are in the midst of their best season ever. Coach Brian Sabean's squad sports an impressive 29-11 record.

Much of this success can be attributed to the experience of the 12 seniors on the team.

The following is a brief profile on those Spartan seniors who have not been profiled in previous issues of *The Minaret*.

**Ricky Bernaldo**

Tampa, Fla.

Shortstop/lead hitter

Bernaldo was born and raised in Tampa, where he started baseball at 5 years old. At Chamberlain High School, Bernaldo played catcher until his junior year when he switched to shortstop. He was named MVP of his team and was selected to the Western Conference second team that year.

Bernaldo went to Hillsborough Community College where he played second base his first year, and shortstop his second year.

Sabean recruited Bernaldo from HCC two years ago.

"In high school, UT wasn't the place to go to for baseball," said Bernaldo. "It's funny I ended up going here."

"But Coach Sabean came in and got more Tampa players. I know some high school players who would love to go here next year."

"It was great to get [Pitching] Coach [Mike] Marshall," Bernaldo continued. "He gives the pitchers so much confidence. It's a great ability for a coach to have which wears off on all our players."

Sabean is pleased with Bernaldo's performance of 17 RBI, 8 doubles, 2 triples, 3 home runs, 46 hits, 39 runs and 134 at bats this season.

"Ricky is a real competitive contributor," said Sabean. "He's so even-tempered — that's what makes him so consistent. At shortstop, he anchors the defense. We feel very confident with him out there."

Bernaldo is an accounting major. He has to complete another year of schooling before he can become a CPA, which he'll probably take at the University of South Florida.

But if Bernaldo was drafted by a professional ballclub, "I would throw a big party. I wouldn't think twice [about accepting the offer]. But I'm not counting on it at all."

**Mickey Farrell**

Zephyrhills, Fla.

Third base/captain

Farrell started organized baseball at seven years old in West Orange, N.J., but his family moved to Zephyrhills, Fla. several years later. At Zephyrhills High School, Farrell was on the baseball, basketball and cross country teams. As shortstop, Farrell was named to the All-Area, All-County and All-Conference teams. As point guard, he was voted to the previous three teams, in addition to being named MVP and Best Defensive Player.

Farrell came to UT "for the academics — the business connections — and the chance to play [baseball]."

After four years at UT, Farrell feels that the Tampa baseball program is "definitely on the upswing. We always had talent, but not like the other conference teams," he said. "We've come a long way in four years. I guess we've grown with the times."

"Mickey is the type of student-athlete that any coach would want on any team," said Sabean. "He's an older influence. He's really got his act together — better than

other people his age."

And that is putting it mildly. Farrell, a business management major, has achieved a 3.9 GPA; was voted a Second Team Academic All-American last year; was named Who's Who; is a member of Alpha Chi, Phi Eta Sigma and Omicron Delta Kappa.

In addition, this year Farrell played in 31 games accumulating 18 RBI, 2 doubles, 2 triples, 1 home run, 24 hits and 22 runs in 89 trips to the plate.

After graduation, Farrell hopes to go to graduate school, majoring in sports administration.

**Bob Fernandes**

Bridgewater, Mass.

First base/sixth hitter/captain

Fernandes started baseball at age 6, but "really got into it" when he attended the Ted Williams' Camp at age 7.

Fernandes was influenced by his brother, Glen, who was drafted out of high school by the Cleveland Indians. Glen was the fifth pick in the 1973 draft.

"He was my inspiration and my best friend also. He's my best teacher too," said Fernandes.

While enrolled at Bridgewater High School, Fernandes made All-County his junior and senior years as first baseman.

Fernandes came to play baseball at UT after "my brother trained at Eckerd College and he met Coach Sabean there."

Since then, however, the program has "come a long, long way. We're as strong as we've ever been. I hope it's on the uprise," he said.

"Coach Sabean is more of a players' coach," Fernandes continued. "He'll work you hard and praise you if you do a good job. He has a better rapport with the players."

And Fernandes has the respect of Sabean.

"In our minds, Bobby is the best first baseman in the league," said Sabean. "He's very nimble for his size [6'4"]. He gives the infielders a lot of confidence and security. He doesn't just make the routine play, but he saves a lot of plays. He makes it look so easy. And he rarely makes a mistake."

Fernandes' statistics stand at 30 RBI, 7 doubles, 3 home runs, 37 hits, and 32 runs in 122 trips to the plate.

Fernandes, a criminology major, hopes to join the Secret Service. But he would like to turn pro like his brother.

"I'd most likely sign, but you've got to realize your potential," said Fernandes.

**Jim Petrillo**

West Orange, N.J.

Second base/third or fifth hitter

Petrillo started baseball since "my brother played in the Little Leagues and I was the bat boy." Petrillo attended Mountain High School where he was selected to the All-County team in baseball and the All-Conference team in basketball.

Petrillo was recruited by Sabean. "I wanted to come to Florida — there's better competition and you play all year," said Petrillo.

Now, four years later, Petrillo has been a key ingredient to the success the Spartans now enjoy.

"Defensively, he is probably as good a second baseman there is in the league," said Sabean. "He's very consistent. Offensively, he's just starting to come into his own."

Petrillo has racked up 23 RBI, 12 doubles, 1 home run, 48 hits, 34 runs and 144 at bats.

"It's on the upswing. It's moving in the right direction," said Petrillo on the vastly improved Tampa baseball program. "Coach Sabean's good

since he's young and he relates to the players better than previous coaches. He doesn't treat us like kids, but like adults."

After graduation, Petrillo, a business management major, will be looking for a job in the New York/New Jersey area. "I'll probably start out in sales," he said.

Unless of course, Petrillo is drafted by a pro ballclub. "I'd sign and give it a shot. You can never tell what'll happen," he said.

**Tim Wahl**

New Port Richey, Fla.

Left field/seventh hitter

Wahl started baseball at age 10 in his native Houston, TX. Wahl continued his love for baseball after his family moved to New Port Richey, Fla., in January, 1978. At Hudson High School, Wahl dabbled in football as halfback and excelled as shortstop in baseball. In his senior year, he was voted to the All-Suncoast team and named MVP in baseball.

After attending St. Petersburg Junior College, Wahl transferred to UT.

"I came here mainly because of the

location and academics — not just for baseball, even though it was a pretty high priority," he said.

And Wahl doesn't regret coming to UT. "The program has definitely improved, especially since Coach Marshall came," said Wahl. "If you have a good year, it makes all the difference. People notice you and we can recruit players that we definitely wouldn't get normally."

Sabean has been pleased with Wahl's performance this season of 30 RBI, 4 doubles, 7 triples, 1 home run, 27 hits and 115 at bats.

"Tim's enjoying a productive year offensively and defensively," said Sabean. "He's a real catalyst for our offense. He has an exciting type of speed. He can outrun balls other people couldn't."

Wahl is majoring in business management, but he hopes to get into the computer field. However, if he is recruited by a professional team he won't let the opportunity slip by.

"I'd love to, but it's a long shot," he said. "It's rough living in the minor leagues — traveling around, but I'd definitely take it if it was offered."

# Tampa drops two games to top-ranked Moccasins

The University of Tampa baseball team, currently ranked fifth in the NCAA Division II, pulled out a close 3-1 win over the University of Central Florida April 10.

Senior Rob Abromson started for UT, going six innings, scattering four hits. Pat DeVincentis, Marty Reed, Mike Marshall and Steve Mumaw pitched one inning a piece, allowing UCF only two hits.

Mumaw drove in the deciding run in the top of the tenth inning when he knocked in Tim Wahl who had reached base by tripling. Tampa made it 3-1 that same inning when Dean Kelly walked and was driven home by Bryan Hubbard's single.

Mumaw walked the first Central Florida batter he faced in the bottom of the tenth inning, but then retired the next three batters in a row to receive the win.

The Spartans came up winners again against UCF on April 11, this time by the score of 6-2. Mumaw raised his record to 10-2 in pitching UT to the win. Mumaw struck out nine batters and allowed only two hits in his seven inning appearance. Reed and Marshall also saw pitching action in relief.

The Spartans struck early, getting on the scoreboard in the first inning when Jim Petrillo reached base on an error by UCF first basemen Ben Spitale, allowing Todd Stetson to score. Tampa scored three more runs in the fifth inning, highlighted by Hubbard's home run. Hubbard, a junior who has played well since coming to UT this year, said after the game, "I felt confident. I knew he was going to come in with a fastball."

The Spartans finished their scoring in the eighth inning when Hubbard doubled home Wahl, who had reached base by singling, stealing second and advancing on a misplayed run

down.

The Knights mounted a mini-rally in the ninth inning, scoring two runs before going down to end the game.

"This is certainly a big win," said Sabeau on the game. "Central Florida has a good team."

Sabeau's team took on conference leading Florida Southern College on April 14. Tampa lost in a tight game 3-2.

Spartan starter Reed went five innings, allowing two runs. Abromson, Marshall, and Mumaw also saw pitching action for UT.

Tampa was down 2-0 in the fourth inning when Wahl's basehit brought home Bob Fernandes who had reached base on a double.

UT found themselves down 3-1 in the sixth inning when Bill McEvoy's ninth homerun of the year made the score 3-2. The Spartans mounted several rallies the rest of the game, but couldn't bring home the tying run.

"Leaving men on base was the

key," said Sabeau on the game. "They [FSC] got the big hits. It was a well played college baseball game."

Tampa took on Florida Southern in the second game of the home and home series April 16. The Mocs, playing on their home field, came up winners once again by a score of 8-5.

UT had a 2-0 lead until FSC erupted for four runs in the second inning to take the lead.

The score was tied at 5 until the fifth inning when the Mocs scored 2 runs off Abromson, who was pitching in relief of starter DeVincentis. Florida Southern scored one more run in the sixth inning to finish the scoring. Abromson was hit for the loss.

Ricky Bernaldo had a fine day at the plate with two hits and two RBI. Petrillo also had two hits for UT.

Tampa takes on conference foe Biscayne College today at 3:30 at Sam Bailey Field.

## Women row to victory in Governor's Cup

Both the college women's varsity four and the college women's junior varsity four dominated their fields in the regatta sponsored by the South Brevard Chamber of Commerce.

1,000 meter course in a winning time of 4:02.0. Finishing after them was Jacksonville University, 4:04.5; University of Central Florida, 4:06.1; Florida Institute of Technology "A" boat, 4:08.5; and Rollins College, 4:08.6.

After a little difficulty at the start, the women's varsity four pulled away to place first in 3:47.8. The varsity four consists of Ossenfort, Lucy Rocas, Jeanne McNiff, stroke Tara Duquene, along with coxswain Batsavage. It was a tight race, with UCF closely behind at 3:48.0, followed by JU, FIT, and Rollins.

UT crew coach Bill Dunlap equal-

ed the feats of the women's shells in the Master's Single race. His winning time was 3:52.1, with the Miami Rowing Club's "A" and "B" singles finishing next in 4:06.5 and 4:45.1, respectively.

Although the men did not fare quite as well, a battle was seen between UT and JU in the college men's four event. The results were JU, 3:08.6; UT, 3:09.0; FIT, 3:20.4; and UCF, 3:27.2.

FIT's "A" shell dominated the college men's freshman four event by winning in 3:35.7. Rowing in second was JU, 3:37.2; UT 3:40.8; Rollins, 3:43.4; UCF, 3:48.2; and FIT's "B"

shell followed.

The final event of the day was the men's varsity eight race. The finishing crews with their corresponding times were FIT's "A" shell, 2:50.7; JU, 2:53.1; FIT's "B" shell, 2:55.1; UCF, 2:56.1; and UT, 3:02.1.

One step away. In a season full of awards, the University of Tampa's soccer team fell short of the most important, the national championship.

The team ran up an impressive 18-3 record. One of the losses was to Division I's Cleveland State University in the McDonald Classic at the University of South Florida. UT gave perhaps their worst performance of the year on that Oct. 8. The following day they played perhaps their best in defeating Alabama A&M, another Division I school. The loss to UT was the only regular season loss for the highly ranked Bulldogs.

Because the Sunblazers had defeated Tampa, they were seeded higher in the Southern Regional. So when UT was awarded the home field advantage, the Sunblazers were irate. Tampa used this break to their advantage and won in overtime, 3-2. Penalty kicks again were the difference as it went only five rounds this time.

Moving into the semi-final round, UT met last year's runners-up, Southern Connecticut State University. No overtime was needed this time and the Spartans dispatched the Owls 2-1 to move into the final.

The NCAA Division II final pitted Tampa against Seattle Pacific University. UT dominated all aspects of the game but one, the scoreboard. Seattle walked off with the championship trophy and a 1-0 victory. Despite the loss, the season was still one to be proud of.

"I thought it was an extremely successful year," said Miller. "Anytime you make it to the national final you have to be proud and happy. We showed disgust in losing in the final. Our expectation level was the highest it could be. In retrospect, we have to be proud."

Named to the SSC first team were Hans Olofsson, Al Smith, Goran Swardh, and Kent Engstrom. The second team included Kurt Devlin, Steve Savage, Jim Willenborg, Roger Ramsay and Keith Fulk. Mark Keymont was an honorable mention selection. Coach Miller was SSC Coach of the Year.

It seems that all the University of Tampa Lady basketballers could do this year was lose!

They started off the season losing 11 of their first 12 games, and they ended up by losing two of the best players in school history, Linda Hadfield and Dorrane Wolf to graduation. Then they lost Head Coach Jan Boxill, who resigned as coach at the end of the season.

## Men's basketball

### Surprises.

Who would have believed that a first year team could win its conference, become the first team to reach the NCAA playoffs in their first year, and do it starting four or five freshmen? No one in their right mind would, but the University of Tampa's men's basketball team did just that.

Under the direction of Head Coach

Richard Schmidt, the Spartans faced intimidating competition in the early going. UT lined up against five Division I schools losing to each one, but they were in every game except the one at Purdue University.

The tough scheduling prepared Schmidt's squad for the conference games. UT raced out to a 7-0 conference record before things began to falter. All-American candidate Al Miller suffered a severely sprained ankle late in the year. The only veteran player on the team sat out most of the season after that. Thus, the Spartans had to depend on their freshmen.

Tampa faltered to a third place finish in the conference's regular season. Most people counted them out for the post season tournament. However, UT put everything together and walked away with the conference title and a playoff berth. UT's Todd Linder was named the MVP of the SSC Tournament and was named, along with Johnny Jones, to the All-Tournament team. Linder and Miller were named to the SSC second team. Jones was an honorable mention selection.

The victory in the SSC Tournament gave Tampa the distinction of being the only first year team to win that conference tourney and make the NCAA playoffs. In their first playoff game, UT bowed to the West Georgia Braves in the Southern Regional. The Spartans salvaged a third place finish the following night. The bright spot for UT was Linder, who was named the Southern Regional MVP.

"We were pleased to get to the NCAA playoffs in our first year," said Head Coach Schmidt. "It was quite an accomplishment being the first, first year team to make the playoffs. Personally, I think we could have gone farther in the playoffs. All in all, with the injuries we had, the kids did a good job."

## Crew

They started their work-outs in the fall, and will continue to do so until mid-May.

Months before their official season opened, the University of Tampa crew started pounding away once or twice daily, both on and off the water for what proves to be a successful year for these rowers.

The month of November saw the rowers Boston-bound to compete in the prestigious Head of the Charles Regatta. Over 3000 participants partook in this colorful three mile regatta in which UT's women's eight and men's four placed 15th, respectively, in fields of 40 shells each.

Two weeks later, the crew was once again on the road to race in the Head of the Chattahoochee Regatta in Atlanta, Georgia. They consolidated their strengths with that of the Tampa Rowing Club and together these combined forces captured the point trophy. Medalling in the "Hooch" were the UT novice women, the heavyweight men in the men's open four race, and the women in the open eight race. Even UT crew Coach Bill Dunlap got his share of the spoils by winning the men's master single race.

It wasn't until March 23 that the crew season officially opened with the 1000 meter President's Cup Regatta. It was truly a day of victory for the heavyweight men as they shut out Yale University in the rematch of the men's heavyweight four race. The lightweight men made it to the finals, and placed third. Two second-place wins went to both the defending women's lightweight four and lightweight eight. The women's open four and open eight finished fourth and fifth, respectively. Overall, UT's accumulated points placed them fourth, with Yale winning overall.

Undaunted by their loss at President's Cup, the women proved their mettle by winning the Bradley Plate at the 2000 meter Bradley Cup Regat-

ta in Orlando. They claimed first in both the women's open four and women's open eight races, while the men's and women's novice fours each placed second in their events.

In their penultimate race in Florida, the Governor's Cup Regatta in Melbourne, the women outpulled their competition in both the women's freshmen four and the women's open four races. Again, Dunlap showed his rowers how it's done by winning the masters single. The men came home with a second, third, and fifth place win after tough competition in the men's varsity four, freshmen four and men's eight races.

Tampa crew members continue their rigorous training as the day of reckoning draws near. Under the direction of Dunlap, crew has grown and reached new dimensions in excellence. Tomorrow, April 21, the crew will demonstrate its abilities by racing in the Florida Intercollegiate Rowing Association Championships to be held at the Tampa Bypass Canal. "I think the men's and women's fours will be competitive," said Dunlap, "and the eights should do well." The crew will compete against Florida Institute of Technology, University of Central Florida, Rollins College, and Jacksonville University.

After exams and students head for home, the crew will continue training for the Division II National Championships, known as the Dad Vail Regatta in Philadelphia, held May 11 and 12. The heavyweight men, two year champions, will be defending their title and the women will aim for a championship title.

With the close of the 1983-84 academic year, it is proper to recognize the graduating crew members who have devoted numerous hours training to make UT crew an athletic program of such high caliber. These are Vince Carrodegua, John Stimus, Charlie Norberg, Tim Vagen, Mike Palmer, Joe Matuziak, Michelle Marcogliese, Paul Gouin, and Willie Kuhlman.

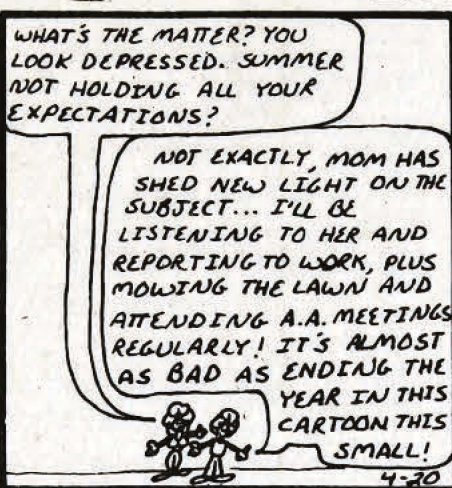
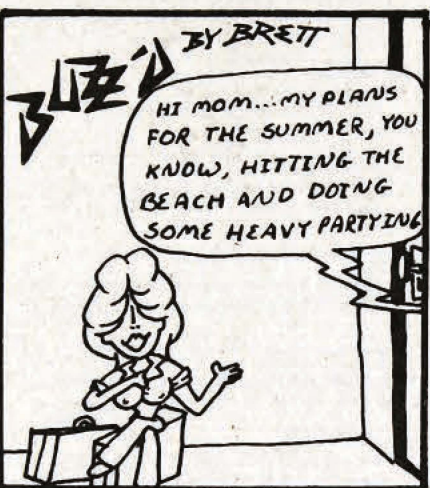
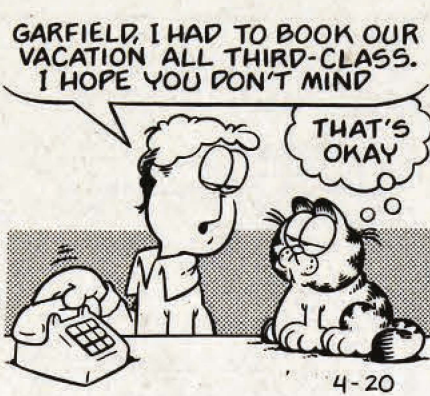
