





# **Reprint from Tampa Tribune** Tampa Upsets 4th Ranked No. Michigan 27-6 Spartans Considered

Making a bold bid for national recognition, the University of Tampa capitalized on three Northern Michigan mistakes upsetting the hapless Wildcats with a 27-6 Homecoming victory before 8,500 fans at Phillips Fields.

Turning an intercepted pass, fumble, and bad pass, the Spartans shocked the fourth-ranked team into submission with a 20-0 halftime lead after turning back a solid scoring threat early in the game.

#### **Triumphant Victory**

The triumph may have been the biggest in the school's 25 year football history - rivaling a victory over Florida State in 1952 - and may also have been the most important because it could easily influence a decision in form of retaining the sport at the downtown university.


