

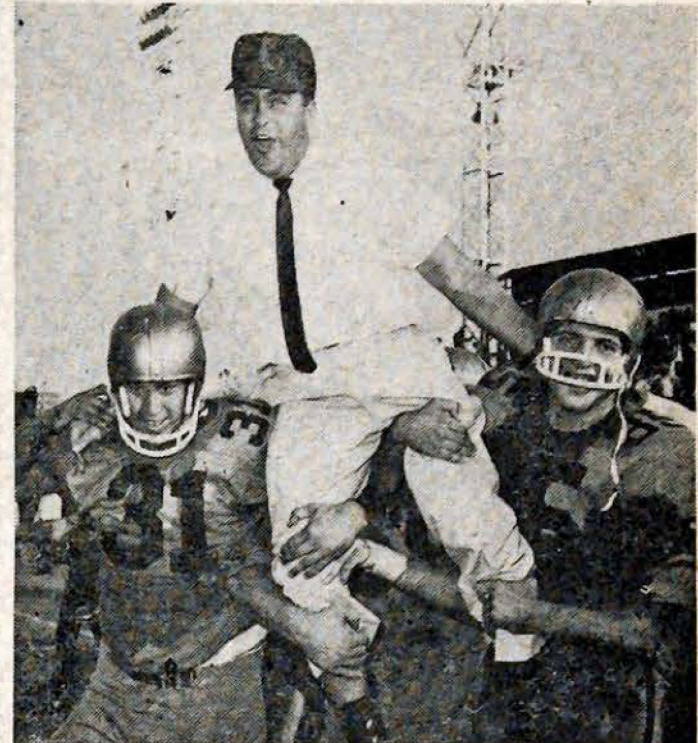

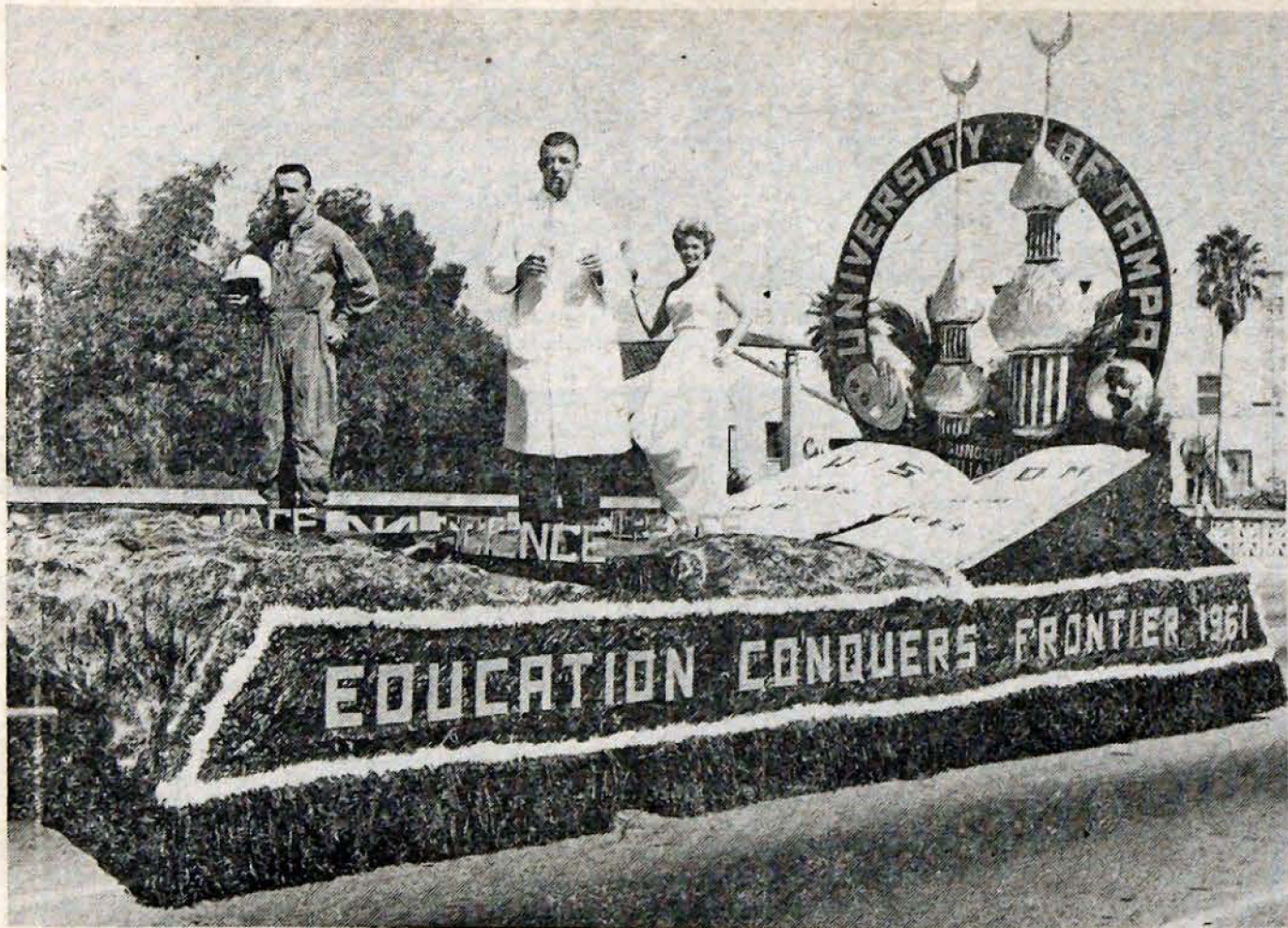
Yolanda Gonzalez, sponsored by Theta Chi, is the 1961-'62 Homecoming Queen.

Sigma Phi Epsilon received the "Best Fraternity Float" trophy. Emphasis was on the peaceful linkage of the United States and Russia.



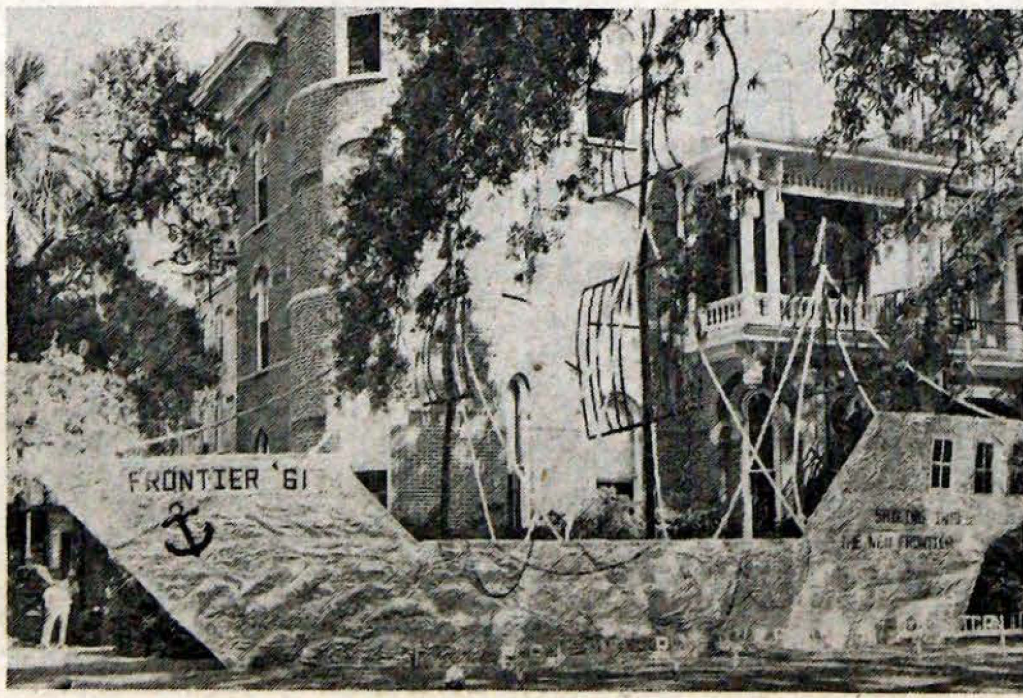

Sigma Sigma Sigma's skit won this sorority its second award. Sigmas received "Best Skit" trophy.



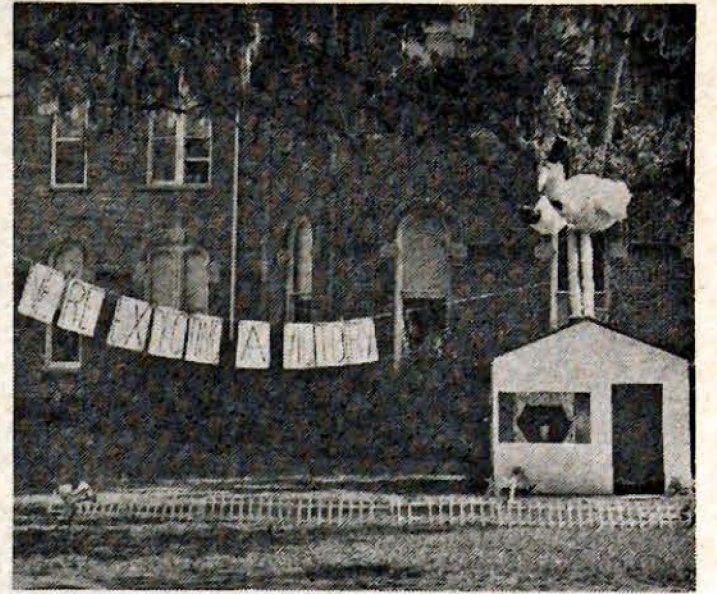
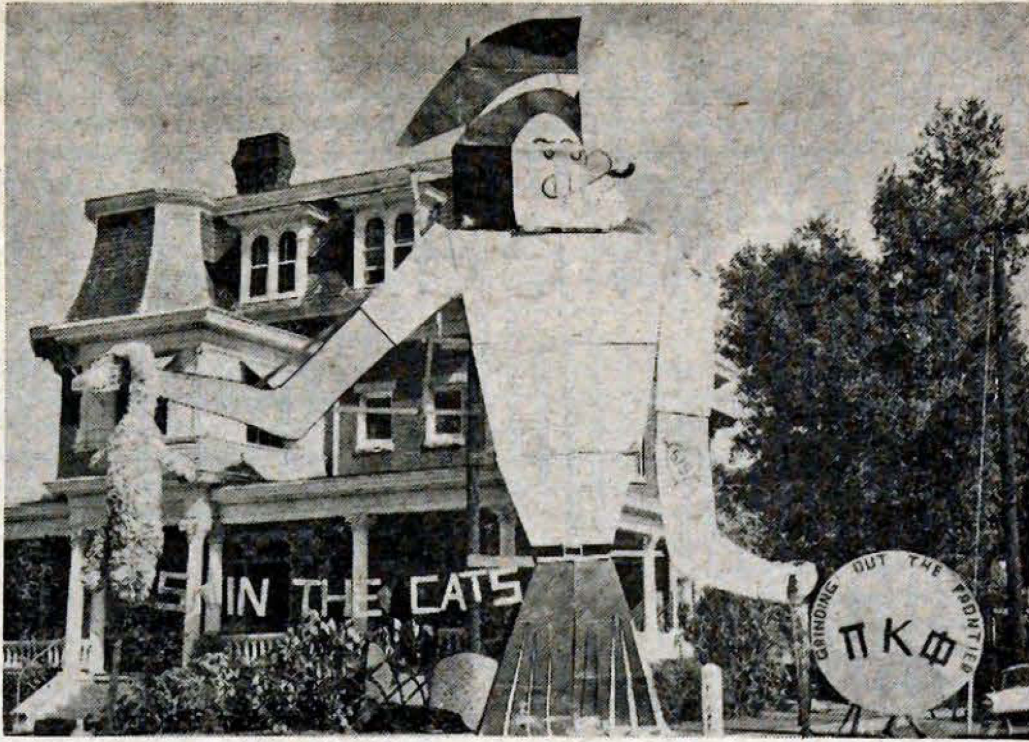
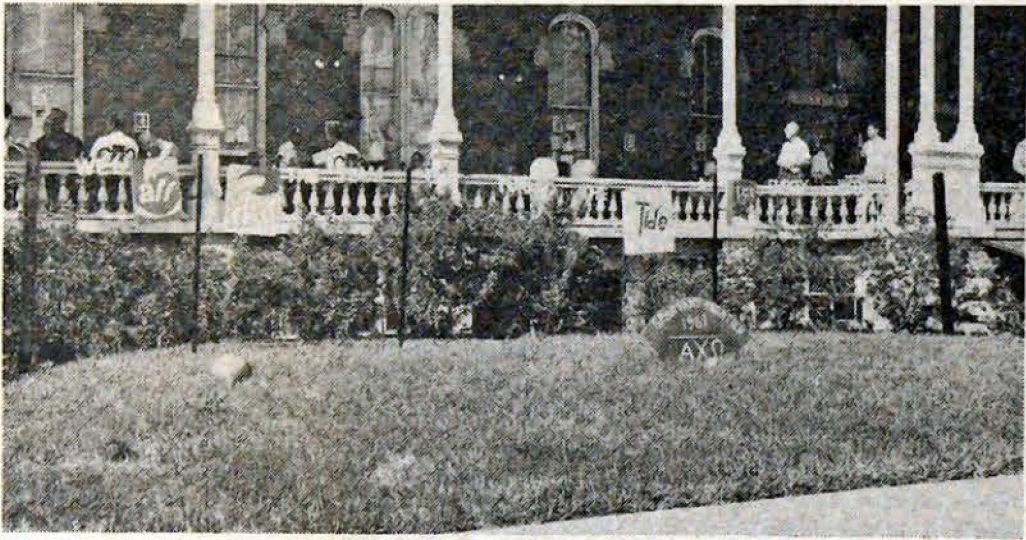
Don Blair, as vice president of the student body, was in charge of Homecoming activities.

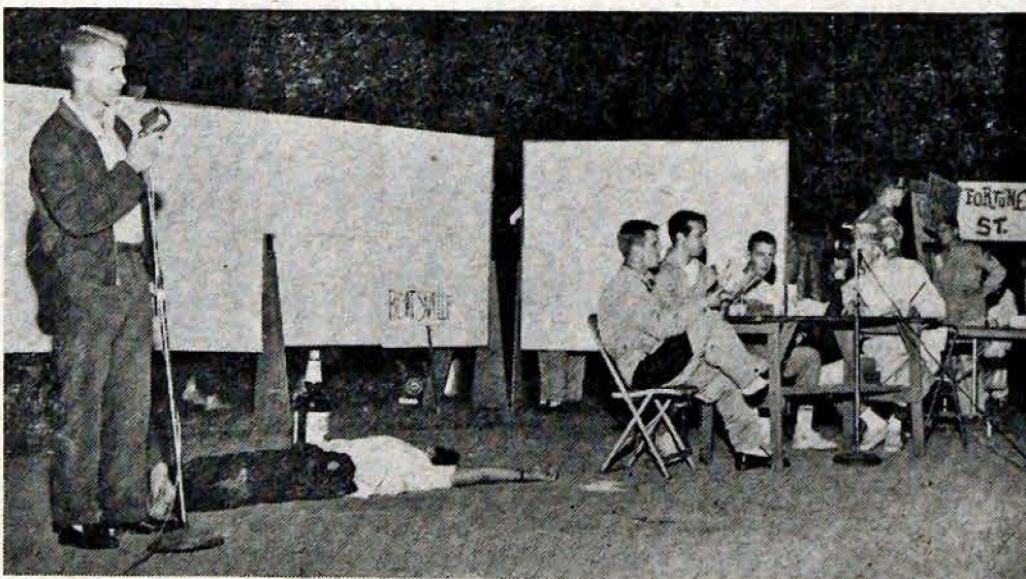

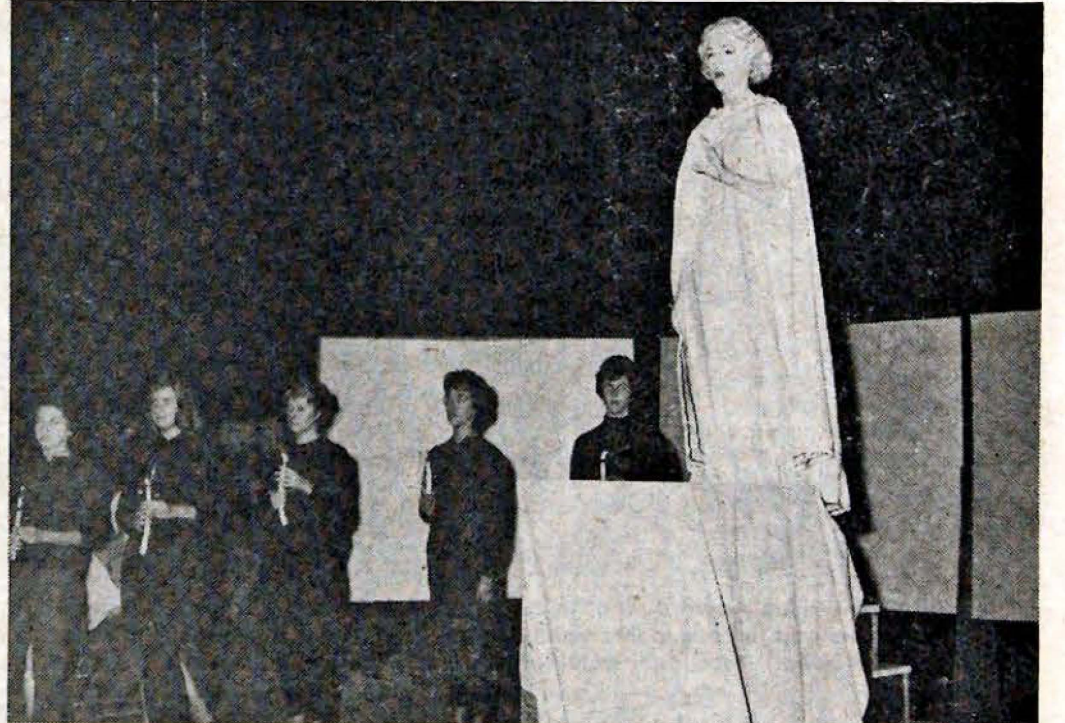

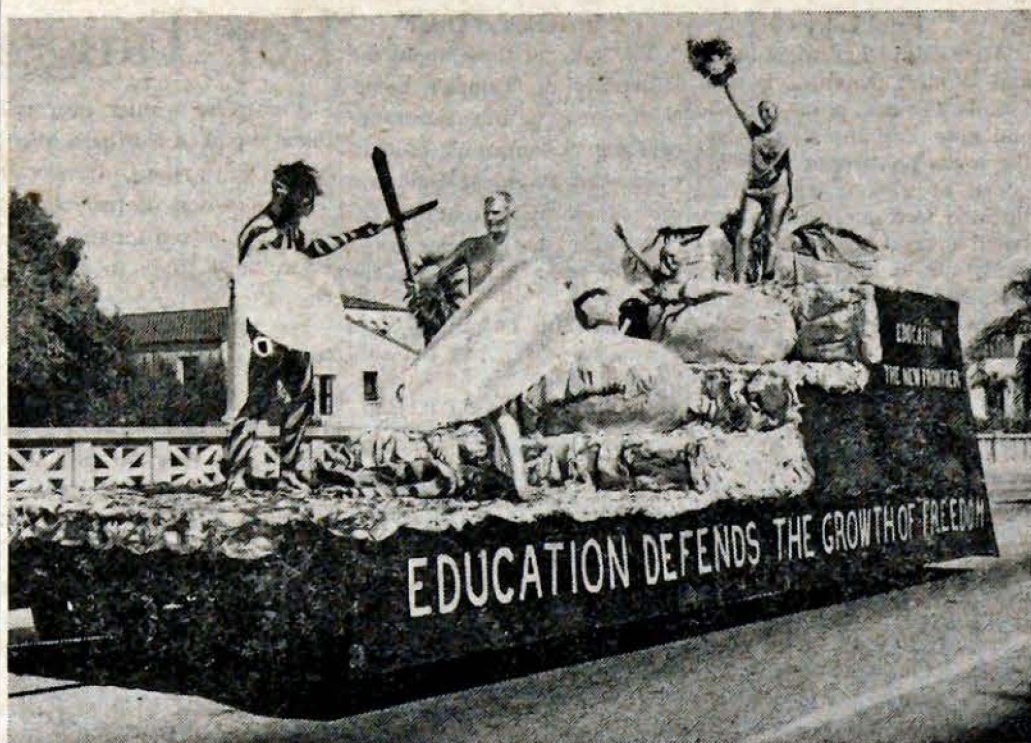

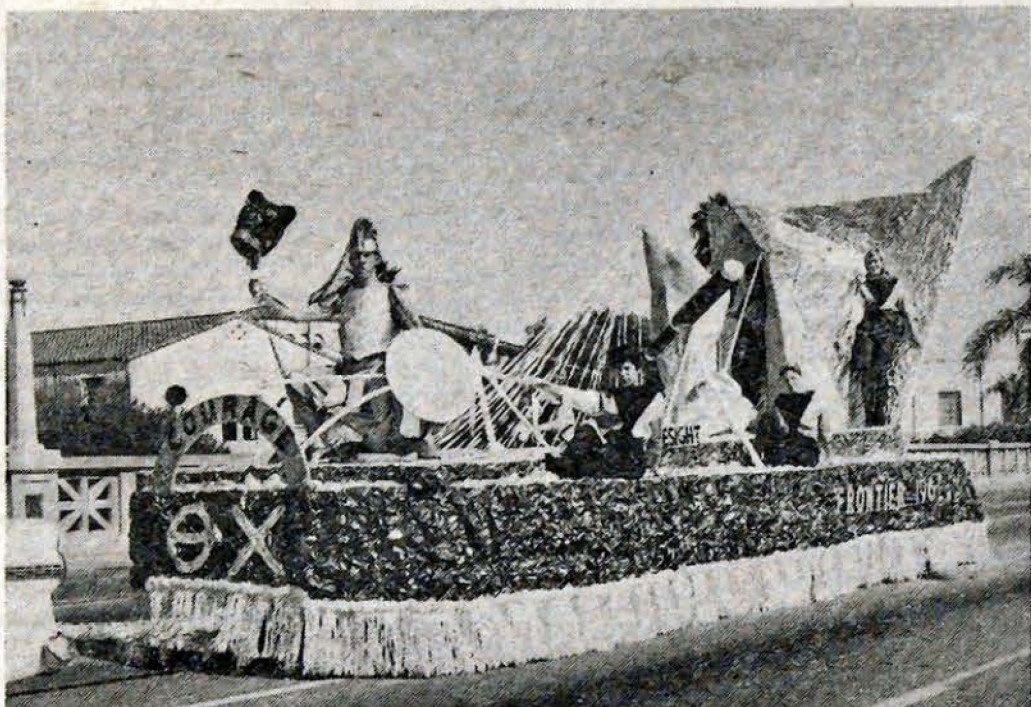

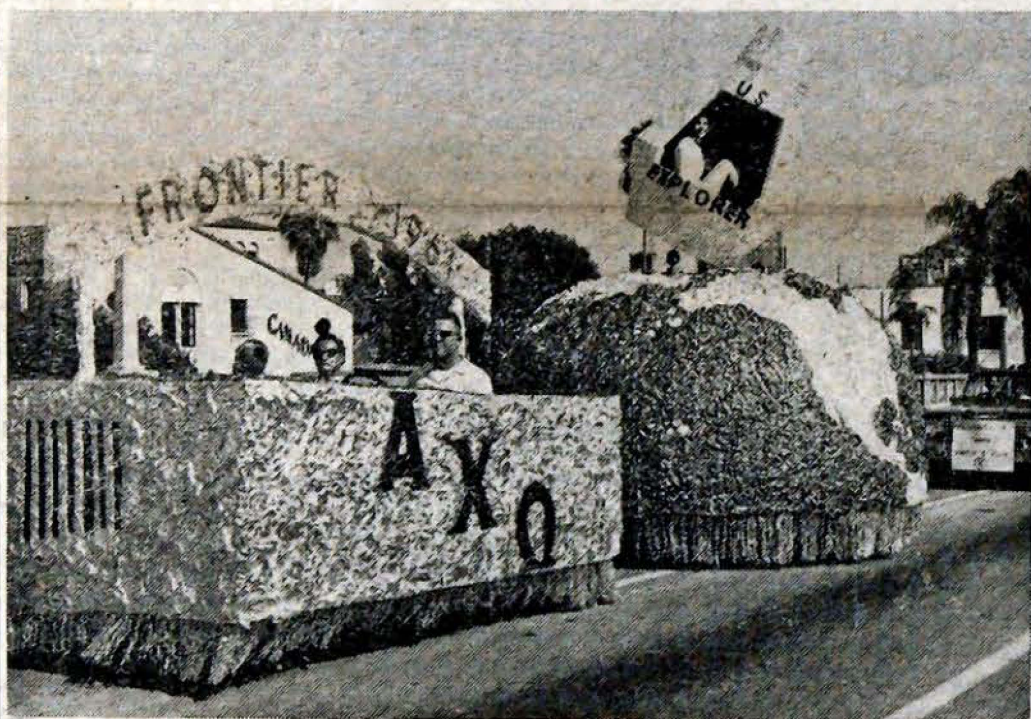

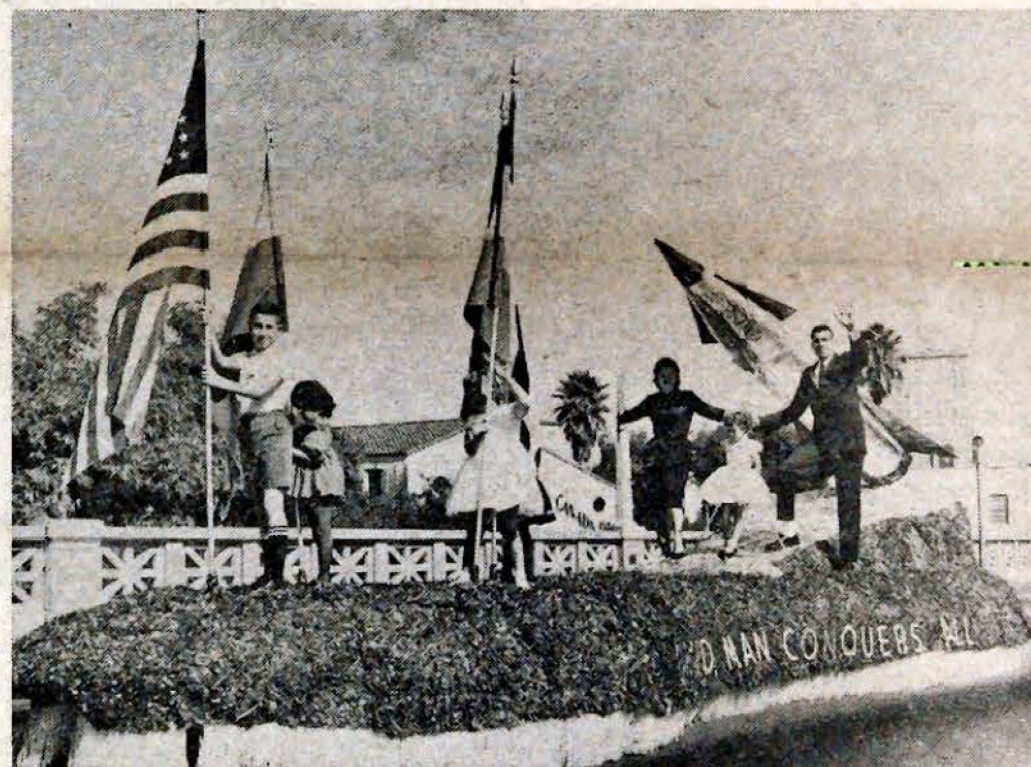

# Tampa Upsets 4th Ranked No. Michigan 27-6

Making a bold bid for national recognition, the University of Tampa capitalized on three Northern Michigan mistakes upsetting the hapless Wildcats with a 27-6 Homecoming victory before 8,500 fans at Phillips Fields.

Turning an intercepted pass, fumble, and bad pass, the Spartans shocked the fourth-ranked team into submission with a 20-0 halftime lead after turning back a solid scoring threat early in the game.

## Triumphant Victory

The triumph may have been the biggest in the school's 25 year football history — rivaling a victory over Florida State in 1952 — and may also have been the most important because it could easily influence a decision in form of retaining the sport at the downtown university.

## 6-1 Record

It could also pave the way to the Spartans most successful season ever. It was the sixth in seven games and only Appalachian and Wofford remain to be played here. No Tampa team has ever played an entire season without losing at least two times.

Ronnie Perez, a veteran hometown quarterback intercepted two passes, returning the first 25 yards for the initial touchdown, and knocking down several more.

Vaden Bessent, sophomore from Jacksonville pitched touchdown passes to Ernie Stout in the second quarter and Sonny Trulock in the fourth, completed three of four passes altogether and gained 16 yards running.

Bob Moore turned in another fine performance. The hard-hitting sophomore fullback lead all Tampa ball carriers with 52 yards in nine carries and scored his sixth touchdown of the season, the last one for the Spartans in the second period.

## Spartan Defense Strong

A vicious defense contained the Wildcats' controlled running attack, the 19th best in the nation according to the NAIA with an average of 241 yards a game. Northern gained only 196 yards while butting against Paul Gore, Tony Yelovich, Don Scott, Jim Neve and Charlie Rose.

After a threatening first quarter, the Spartans virtually stopped quarterback Frank Novak's passing. The instigation of 14 touchdown passes this season, Novak completed only six of 14 pitches for a scant 33 yards.

## Threatening Drive

A series of 11 plays covered 58 yards and was Michigan's best of the game, excluding its touchdown march in the third quarter. Two offside penalties against the Spartans kept it alive, but when Gore threw George Medley for a yard loss at the 16 and then the Wild-

cats were set back another five for offside, they were in trouble.

Taking over on the 20, Tampa moved to Michigan's 3 late in the quarter. Jim Neve's fourth down field goal was blocked. The Spartans drive was led by Moore's gaining 28 yards and Bessent's passing to pose for 16 yards which gave Tampa a first down on Northern's 32.

## Perez Gets Initial Touchdown

On the second play of the second period, Perez snagged Novak's third down pass from the 21 in the right flat. Running at full speed at the time of the interception, the quarterback kept right on going to the goal post, covering 25 yards, past the surprised Wildcats. Neve made the conversion.

The subsequent kickoff from Neve got away from Dick Kost and all he could do was return it to the 13. On the second down, Novak fumbled a poor snap and Gore recovered for Tampa at the eight. Bessent gained a yard and on the next down was hit hard, but not before he was able to get off a wobbly pass to Stout in the end zone. Again, Jim Neve kicked the extra point.

## Yelovich's Defense Too Much

After gaining a first down, the ball was lost to Tampa when Co-captain Tony Yelovich crushed Jack Warner at the 35. The Spartans went all the way on the ground, with Moore cracking right guard

from the four to score. This enabled him to stay tied with Florida's Lindy Infante for the sole scoring lead.

## Wildcats Fight Back

In the third quarter, the Wildcats marched 66 yards for their only tally. The conversion was incomplete. After Tampa was forced to quick kick in the fourth quarter gave Northern another scoring opportunity, but Ron Perez intercepted Novak's first down pass at the Tampa 42.

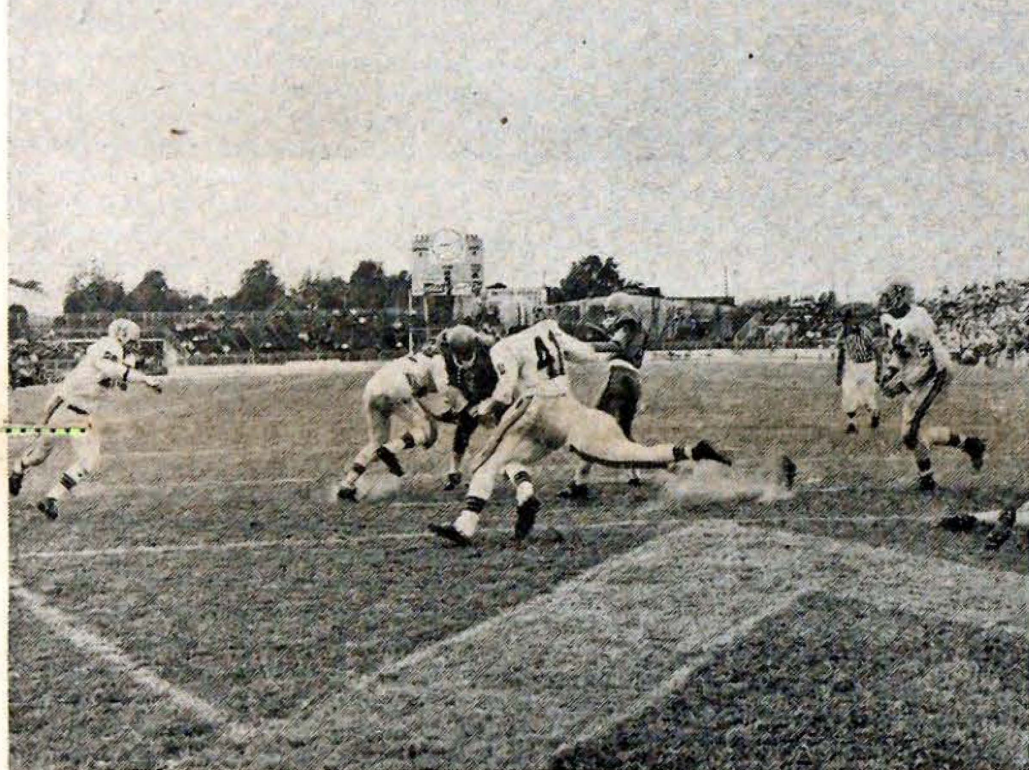
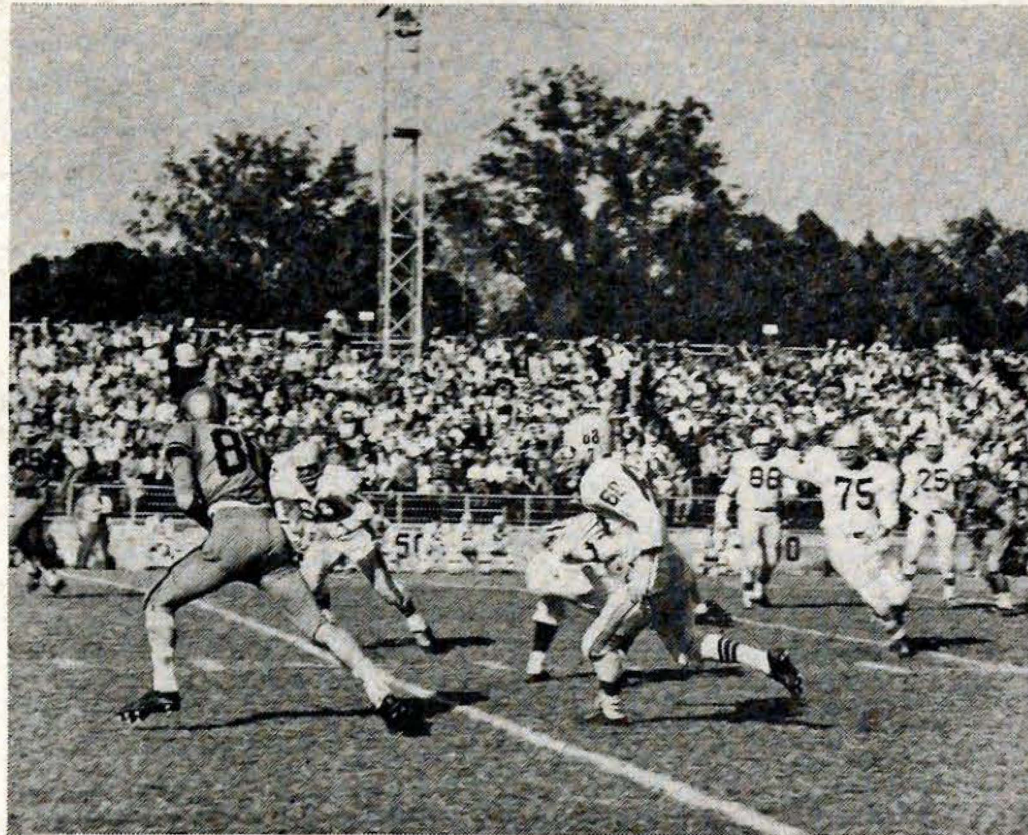
## Final Tally

After gains by O'Brien, Stout, and Wildcat penalties, Bessent found Trulock alone in the end zone. Earl Bramlett kicked the extra point, and the score ended at 27-6. The Spartan linemen were merciless as they failed every attempt Northern made for another score. This was the second loss in eight games for the Wildcats, who had averaged nearly 35 points per outing prior to this contest.

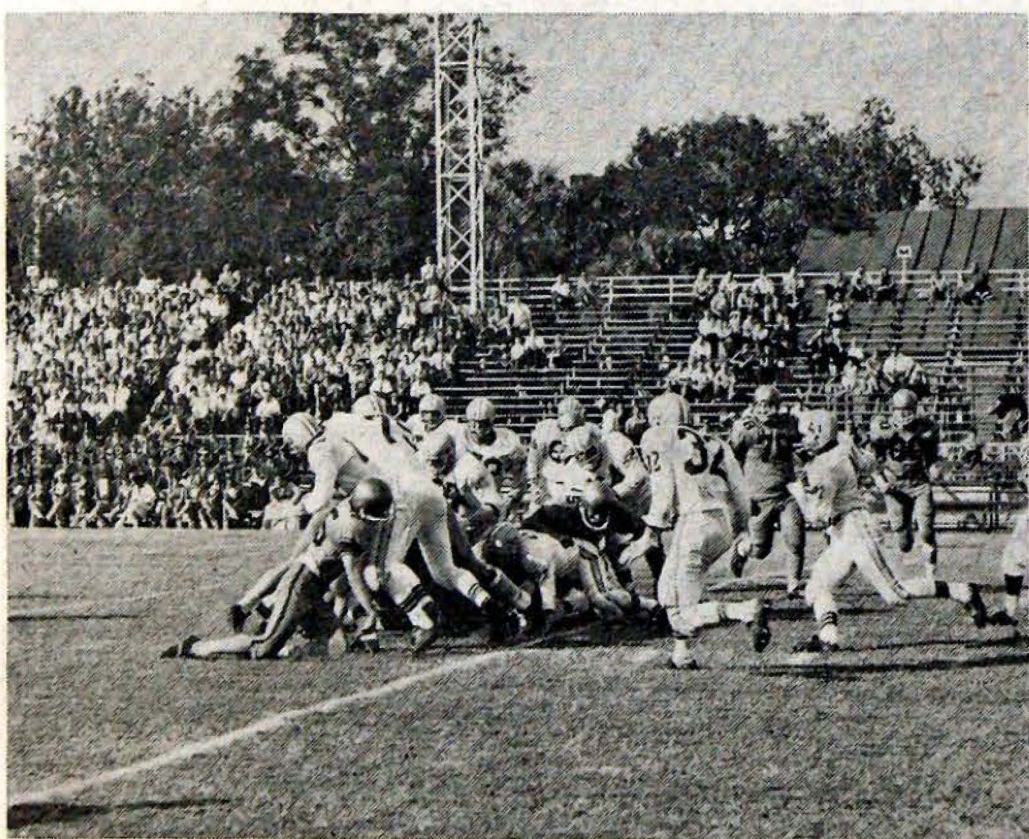
## 2 Victories in One?

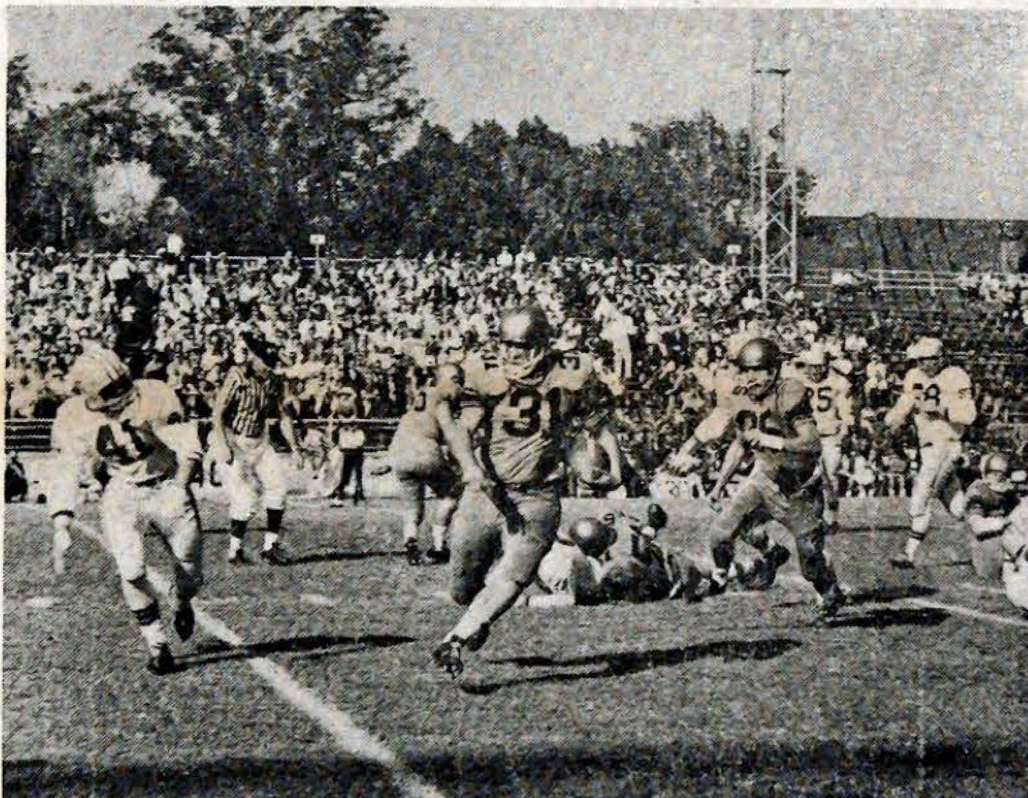
Coach Huerta greeted his men after the game and said simply, "There is no need of me telling you how I feel."

## Spartans Considered For Tangerine Bowl

A surprise winner over nationally ranked Northern Michigan recently, the University of Tampa is one of five schools being considered for the Tangerine Bowl game in Orlando Dec. 29.

Cel Wehmeyer, chairman of the Tangerine Bowl Committee, said that the Spartans were very much in the running, especially in view of their 27-6 conquest of the Wildcats, No. 4 among the nation's small colleges.

One team has already been picked, Middle Tennessee which has a 7-2 record, including a 27-0 win over East Tennessee. Middle Tennessee beat Presbyterian 21-12 in the 1959 game.

"We consider it an honor to be considered," said Tampa Coach Marcelino Huerta last night. "But right now we are thinking of nothing but next Saturday's game with Appalachian."

If Tampa, which has a 6-1 record, gets past Appalachian and Wofford in its final two games and receives a bid, could it be accepted?

"It would be up to the school and the boys," Huerta stated.

According to Wehmeyer, others being watched are Southeastern Louisiana — the only team to defeat the Spartans this season; Southern Conference champion Citadel, beaten last night by Florida State; Furman and Mississippi Southern.

The Elks charity game is played in behalf of a crippled children's home in Umatilla. Last year's game, in which The Citadel beat Tennessee Tech, drew 13,000 fans.

"Naturally, it depends upon what happens the next two weeks," said Wehmeyer. "We meet every Monday night. We'll probably make a decision before Thanksgiving."

"We would consider a state team. Tampa would probably bring a good following."

Also in Tampa's favor is the fact that there are about a dozen players on the squad from this state, including Charlie Trulock, a junior end from Orlando.

The Spartans have played in two bowl games, both times its own Cigar Bowl, beating Lehigh after the 1952 season and Morris Harvey after the 1954 campaign.
