





# President's Report The State of the University





he month of August marked the conclusion of my third year as President of The University of Tampa. During the period, the institution has passed through a struggle to find balance and stability, and even in some instances, to survive.

When I took the presidency in the summer of 1986, I inherited a two-year accumulated operating deficit of \$1.75 million and a physical plant that had not been regularly maintained for

many years. H. B. Plant Hall, Tampa's most visible symbol and a National Historic Landmark, was in desperate need of attention and the institution's academic mission lacked focus and direction.


Today, we can look on a number of changes and achievements that have provided the University with balance and control and have prepared us for advances in several areas. We are now mobilizing our institutional efforts and can begin to look with confidence to becoming an even better small, private, liberal arts institution.

This past academic year, the University retired its accumulated deficit. More than a symbolic act for us, this accomplishment marks the end of a difficult chapter in our long history and clears the way for new growth. Three years ago UT was experiencing staff layoffs, salary freezes, and severe spending restrictions which were painful, but necessary. Basic equipment for teaching was in need of replacement, residence halls were showing their years of use, and our main classroom and administration building, Plant Hall, was in worse shape than anyone suspected at the time.

Today, we are enjoying the third straight year of operating budget surpluses. The institutional endowment has finished a third year of healthy growth and the University has awarded its employees — faculty and staff — a record pool for pay and benefit increases. All of the minarets and the domes over the Ball Room and Dome Room have been fully restored and work has begun to restore the east and west verandas. Thus far, contributions from the University, city, state, and private donors have provided more than \$3.5 million toward the estimated \$12 million restoration costs and, as proud stewards of the old Tampa Bay Hotel, we look forward to its rededication in the 1991 centennial celebration.

Fall 1989 finds The University of Tampa aggressively moving forward in several directions. Under the leadership of our new provost, we are implementing a new academic structure which already includes a College of Business with a Center for Ethics, and will soon include a College of Liberal Arts and Sciences. We are rethinking the scope, function and structure of our Center for Continuing Studies to more closely identify with and serve the needs of our community. We are reevaluating our liberal arts programs, while at the same time ensuring that our professional education offerings are well rooted both in liberal education and in the professional standards of the field. We are internationalizing our curriculum to better prepare students for life in a shrunken world. And, we are reestablishing the role of our faculty in the University's governance.

There is progress in other areas: we have appointed a new affirmative action officer to assist us to further diversify and strengthen ourselves through pluralism.

We are investing more in our library and are turning our attention to faculty and staff renewal opportunities to help our already fine faculty and staff enhance their teaching, advising, scholarship, and management skills. We are working to reinforce the connections between the curriculum and the co-curriculum in such areas as academic development, international education and athletics. We are enhancing our administrative and academic capabilities through the installation of a \$500,000

computer system. We are positioning the University to undertake a reorganization of the institutional development, alumni affairs, and fund raising operations necessary for a major capital campaign, as well as the aggressive pursuit of federal grants, individual and corporate gifts.

This year we have the largest undergraduate enrollment in several years while continuing to strengthen the academic profile of our entering class. Basic academic skills are being specially taught to students who need them, while a challenging program of honors classes is benefitting our better prepared students. With international student recruitment at an all-time high, we are developing new services to meet these students' needs. Part-time commuter students from the Tampa Bay area are also receiving extra attention: the University will be a more accessible and responsive place for them. We are renewing our commitment to intercollegiate athletics at UT by promoting high standards of academic and athletic performance for our student-athletes. Recently the \$400,000 McNeel Boathouse has been constructed with generous support from the McNeel family and others in the community, and a new director of athletics has been hired to provide leadership for the future in our intercollegiate sports program.

The University of Tampa is on the move. After persisting through some difficult times, we are up and running, preparing to meet the challenges and opportunities presented higher education by the decade of the 1990's. Ours is a rapidly changing society which places heavy demands on our educational system. Just as certain as our society is changing, though, The University of Tampa is committed to doing its part to educate the students of both the local and larger communities.

The '90s is UT's decade. We look forward to it with great anticipation, confident that we are both equal to the task at hand and uniquely prepared to contribute our own, private, liberal-arts-based brand of education.

# A Look at UT's Academic Future

Thomas J. Hegarty's two-page resume speaks for itself: UT's new provost has built a career around his drive for academic excellence, beginning with

his days as an undergraduate at Harvard University.

At 54, he has cultivated this drive into a mature understanding of the process of excellence in higher education, from the perspective of students and faculty. It comes as no surprise that after a few weeks on the job he already has in mind a multi-faceted plan to stimulate UT's intellectual life and better serve the Tampa community.

At the top of his list is a new College of Arts and Sciences with its own dean. And before the next academic year, he also hopes to hire a new dean for the Center for Continuing Studies to reevaluate and fine tune those programs to better meet the needs of non-traditional students.

But he realizes that achieving excellence is more than an organizational or marketing strategy and that it's not a oneman show.

"Excellence requires everyone's vigilance; it requires going the extra mile; it means stretching ourselves," says Hegarty. "Excellence grows out of our combined efforts. It's not a new provost who creates excellence, but an institution that's poised for excellence."

Hegarty said he accepted the position at UT because he sees the University in just such a stage of development, poised to communicate its strengths.

"We have a highly credentialed and talented faculty. We have academic programs of great significance in the liberal arts as well as select professional areas. And we're admitting increasingly good students who can benefit from our fine faculty and fine programs."

Given these opportunities, Hegarty sees his role as one of facilitator, bridge builder and academic leader.

"My role lies in facilitating the process of academic excellence by providing academic leadership and building support for desirable changes," he said. "My goal is the building of bridges across which people can walk in both directions, between the community and the university."

One of his top priorities, a new College of Arts and Sciences, may look like one more wall of bureaucracy to the outside world and many students. But

Hegarty says UT is a large and sophisticated enough institution to warrant such a structure.

The University's decision to create a

College of Business almost two years ago was a wise decision, Hegarty adds, but it also created a situation that could lead to an actual or perceived imbalance in the University's priorities.

"It is not entirely fair to the arts and sciences faculty not to have the same kind of advocate in a dean that the College of Business now enjoys. Rather than fund a new position, Hegarty plans to eliminate the position of associate provost and use the funds to hire a dean for the College of Arts and Sciences.

With seven years' experience as dean of graduate studies at Boston College (now merged with the University of Massachusetts at Boston), he knows something of the skills required. Hegarty became vice president for academic affairs, provost and professor of history at State University of New York at Potsdam, and in 1982, he ac-

cepted a position as vice president for academic affairs at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana.

At Butler, he solicited \$1 million in grants to reconsider the university's course work for general education and implement changes. Half of the grants came from the Lilly Foundation and half from the National Endowment for the Humanities.

From there it was on to Washington, D.C., where in his last year as a senior consultant to the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), Hegarty helped various in-

stitutions measure and evaluate the impact of core courses offered in various majors. In an age of market analysis, not even academics can afford to assume what effect their product has on the consumer.

Another of Hegarty's priorities is to lead UT in an evaluation of its majors, "so that our programs will be everything they're capable of becoming."

Coupled with that is Hegarty's desire to help the faculty become all that they're capable of becoming. To accomplish this, he is meeting with individual teachers to discuss their needs.


"I want to ensure that the intellectual stimulation that brought them into university life never ends and that it's fun for them," he says.

He also intends to reduce the number of adjunct professors and professors who in addition to their regular courses teach overload courses for a stipend.

Finally, Hegarty is looking forward to working with UT alumni and members of the community to create opportunities for them, as well as UT faculty and students.

"I'm very glad to be here and to work with a stimulating and open-minded president, as well as a talented and creative faculty to serve students who I see as hard-working and very bright," says Hegarty. "This is a delightful opportunity for me."

When Nikita Kruschev and Richard Nixon shouted at each other in the kitchen exhibit at the American Expo in Moscow thirty years ago, more than the question of capitalism versus communism as a way of life was at stake.

Kruschev, a bit embarrassed that he would argue with his guest over the availability of kitchen appliances in Russia, offered his apologies by granting President Nixon a few favors. And so it was that the wheels of bureaucracy were set in motion to allow Louisa Ivanova Hegarty to leave the U.S.S.R. with her American husband, Thomas Hegarty.

At that time, Hegarty, UT's newly appointed provost, was one of a small group of graduate students from Harvard University who were exchanged with Soviet graduate students. He chose the University of Leningrad where he met his wife, a junior faculty member at the same university. Ten months into his stay, the two were married, but that didn't guarantee her freedom to leave the Soviet Union.

Fortunately, several well-known political personalities, including then Sen. John F. Kennedy of Massachusetts, lobbied with Nixon on the couple's behalf. So, their names were at the top of the president's list when a contrite Kruschev offered to demonstrate his goodwill.

About six months later, on the same day that Hegarty was taking his oral exams for his Ph.D. in history at Harvard, Louise arrived in New York City. Since Hegarty couldn't be there to greet her, Kennedy did.

That was in 1960. Since then, the history of East and West has taken

many bizarre turns, as have the lives of the political leaders who helped the Hegartys. But the couple remain on the same basic course, a sort of living testament to detente.


The daughter of a Soviet diplomat assigned to South America, she already was accustomed to life in the West. And he continues to live close to her roots in his professional life as a student and teacher of Russian history. At home they often speak Russian.

The way he has chosen to live has much to say about what Hegarty brings with him to the office of provost. From his perspective, the study of languages and other people's history and culture is an important part of a college education. Since the early 1970s, many universities have dropped their language requirements. Today those requirements are being reinstated on many campuses and Hegarty would like UT's faculty also to consider them.

For now, Hegarty is concentrating on the administrative aspects of his job, bringing to bear more than ten years of previous experience as a provost and vice president for academic affairs at Butler University and the State University of New York at Potsdam. But eventually, he would like to teach Eastern European history and perhaps Russian.

"I don't see a demand for Russian right now, but that could change," says Hegarty. "Tampa does have trade in many directions and we do need to consider other languages, whether Chinese, Japanese, Russian or the languages of the Middle East. Americans are most deficient in that area."

#### **EYESORE NO MORE**

During its lifetime, the Snow Building has gone through a metamorphosis on the inside, from housing exhibits and livestock for the Florida State Fair to accommodating UT's music, art and dance programs. Now the outside of the building, which has remained largely untouched since the 1920's, is undergoing a major facelift. \$135,000 renovation project began this summer outside the Saunders Art Center and will continue throughout the year. The building's patchwork walls of precast concrete panels, brick and cement block are receiving a new stucco finish, at a cost of \$90,000. The remainder of the money will be spent on demolition work, waterproofing and painting.

# RUSSIAN VISITOR

An English language teacher and psycholinguist from the University of Leningrad visited UT on July 20 and 21, the guest of Acting Provost Bill McReynolds. Natasha Hapugina, a psychologist by training, made her stop in Tampa during a month-long visit to the United States at the invitation of the Summer Institute of Psychosynthesis in Concord, Mass. The institute brought together Russians from different ethnic backgrounds along with citizens from the United States and Canada to discuss the psychology of peace and peace making.

#### SECOND EDITION

The second issue of UT's Tampa Review has been published and is available in bookstores and newsstands in the Bay Area. The issue features the artwork of UT faculty members Joe Testa-Secca and Harold Nosti and a

color cover by UT's Gilbert De Meza. "This issue also includes outstanding international art and a fascinating glimpse of "perestroika" in a conversation with Dmitri Prigov, the Russian avant-garde artist who visited our campus last February," said Richard B. Mathews, editor of the *Tampa Review*. The issue also also contains an interview with internationally-known poet William Stafford, one of the "Writers at the University" last year and new fiction from prominent Australian novelist, Elizabeth Jolley. Cover price is \$8.95.

# TIDY SUM 1959

The Chiselers, a volunteer group formed in 1969, has spent more than \$553,000 for the restoration, preservation and beautification of Plant Hall and the areas comprising the campus in the 30 years since their modest beginning. The group's most profitable money-making event of the year is the annual Chiselers' Market, held each Spring. Proceeds from the first "Market" in 1964, were less than \$3,000. Proceeds from the 1989 event totaled \$31,000.

#### GRASS ROOTS MARKETING

A UT professor and his students showed this summer that academics and community service can go hand in hand. Little did the ten marketing students in business professor William Rhey's retail management class know that a project they were supposed to complete in six weeks may turn out to be both a regular community service for residents of a downtown retirement home and a regular part of the marketing curriculum. Because of the success of the project, which had the students buy and deliver groceries to residents

of the Baptist Manor retirement home, Rhey will ask UT's marketing club to continue the program.

#### SECOND GULP

University of Tampa Assistant Professor of Biology Barry Rosen has learned a lot about the tiny blue-green algae that give Tampa's drinking water an earthy taste and smell in the summertime. To resolve those questions, the City of Tampa last Spring approved a \$4,995 grant that will fund another year of Rosen's studies. This time, Rosen worked in his UT laboratory, where he cultivated hundreds of millions of Anabaena algae. Based on this research, he advised city workers on how much copper sulfate to add to the reservoir to rid the water of the earthy taste caused by Anabaena. Rosen's work also attracted the attention of the Public Works Department in Manatee County. In May, that county awarded him a \$3,100 grant to study similar odor and taste problems in drinking water drawn from the Manatee River reservoir near Bradenton.

### CHILDREN AT WORK

A conference designed to share information among leaders in the public and private sector on the issue of child care for working parents was held Sept 21 at the Sheraton Grand Hotel in Tampa. Presented by The University of Tampa and The University of South Florida, the one-day event brought together leaders from both business and government. Among the topics that were discussed were corporate models for child care services; national and state legislation related to child care; tax benefits to corporations; and public/private initiatives.

# **FACULTY NOTES**

Dr. Richard Gude, Professor of Biology, attended a Chautauqua Short Course for College Teachers entitled "Exploring a Barrier Island System." offered at the University of Texas Biological Station at Port Aransas, Tex.

Gilbert W. Joseph, assistant professor of accounting, will have an article entitled "Computer Virus Prevention and Detection: Auditor Concerns" published in the December 1989 "Journal of Accounting and EDP." He will also give a presentation on computer virus auditing concerns to the Florida Conference of the National Association of Accountants (NAA) in September and will teach a continuing professional education session on the same topic for the Tampa

Bay chapter of the NAA in January 1990.

Drs. Marcy Kittner, Computer Science and Steven Platau, Accounting, have received a \$14,000 grant from the Florida Department of Professional Regulation's Real Estate Commission to prepare a study of broker and salesmen sanctions for the years 1980 through 1989. The research grant was received from the Real Estate Research Advisory Board, to provide the Florida Real Estate Commission and the general public additional information regarding broker education and violation patterns. Research findings will permit the Real Estate Commission to propose additional legislation requiring broker education, establish consistent sanction guidelines, and to modify existing educational curricula.

Dr. Michael Mendelsohn, Professor of English, presided at the summer meeting of the Academic Advisory Panel to the College Board of Southern Region in August. From Sept. 28-30, he attended a symposium on Stephen Crane at Virginia Polytechnic Institute. As part of the program, he chaired a panel on Crane's journalism.

Dr. Stanley A. Rice, Assoc., Professor of Biology: Spent four weeks at the the University of Florida last summer, developing methods for isolation and characterization of mitochondrial DNA from polychaetes; attended the Third International Polychaete Conference in Long Beach, Ca on Aug 6-12 and presented a paper "Reproductive Isolation in the Polydora ligna complex and the Streblospio benedicti complex (Polychaeta: Spionidae)." The paper will be published by the Bulletin of Marine Science; received a grant of \$2,300 from the Florida Sea Grant Program for preparation of a Sea Grant Extension Bulletin on marine wood-boring organisms in Florida.

Dr. Fred Punzo, Dana Professor of Biology

had a paper entitled "Effects of hunger on prey capture and ingestion in the tarantula spider, Dugesiella echina" published in the Bulletin of Arachnology, and a paper "Composition of the hemolymph of mygalomorph spiders" published in Comparative Biochemistry and Physiology.

Dr. Richard W. Rodean, former chairman of the division of fine arts at UT, has been appointed chair of the department of performing arts at Texas Woman's University (TWU) in Denton, Texas. Rodean was a member of the UT faculty from 1966 to 1981, when he moved to TWU. In Tampa, he served in a performing arts residency with the Tampa Ballet Company in 1976.

Dr. Norma Winston, Associate Professor of Sociology, presented a paper entitled, "Domestic Labor: Changes and Prospects" at the Annual Meeting of the Florida Council on Family Relations in Jacksonville in May.

# Schenck Recieives Fulbright Scholarship

Dr. Mary Jane Schenck, Professor of English at University, has been awarded a Fulbright grant for 1988-89 and will leave in September for a year of teaching at the University of Benin, Republic of Togo, West Africa

Dr. Schenck is the fourth University of Tampa professor to receive a Fulbright Scholarship. She is one of approximately 1,500 U.S. grantees who will travel abroad in the 1988-89 academic year under the Fulbright Program.

Individuals are selected through open competition on the basis of academic and professional qualifications plus their ability and willingness to share ideas and experiences with people of diverse cultures.

Dr. Schenck will teach English as a second language and American Literature in Togo, a former French Protectorate in which French is still the official language. She is fluent in French, and in addition to her other specialities, she has been teaching African Literature for 14 years. She hopes to use one of her books: Read, Write, Revise: An Introduction to Academic Writing" which is aimed at multilingual students in first-year college writing courses and advanced intensive English programs. It has has been adopted by more than 40 universities nation-

She also has written a scholarly book, numerous articles, and read papers on medieval French literature, the focus of her dissertion, as well as on new ideas for teaching composition to college students.

Dr. Schenck came to UT as an adjunct professor in 1975 and has held various positions, including chair of the Division of Humanities,

assistant provost, and director of freshman composition.

A 1966 graduate of Eckerd College in St. Petersburg, she received the MacArthur Distinguished Alumni award in 1989-90 from Eckerd. Early this year she received a \$1500 award from UT for her distinguished scholarly achievements.

Established in 1946 under Congressional legislation introduced by former Senator J. William Fulbright of Arkansas, the Fulbright program is designed to increase mutual understanding between the people of the United States and the people of other countries.

Under the program, approximately 5,000 grants are awarded each year to American students, teachers and scholars to study, teach and conduct research in more than 130 countries round the world, and to foreign nationals to engage in similar activities in the United States.

More than 167,000 "Fulbrighters", 58,000 from the U.S. and 109,000 from abroad, have participated in the program since it began 43 years ago.

# Wall to Lead Spartans



he University of Tampa's new athletic director Bill Wall concluded his Aug. 17 press conference at the Martinez Sports Center with "It's very, very challenging and a big responsibility"...." that I willfully accept."

With that, Wall assumed his position as the top administrator of one of the outstanding Division II athletic programs in the country.

The survivor of an exhaustive national search that saw more than 100 applicants and took nearly four months to complete, Wall was chosen from a field of eight finalists.

"Gosh, I've seen professional football teams change ownership faster than this, " joked Wall, making an obvious reference to the recent sale of the Dallas Cowboys. As associate athletic director for the University of Miami, he was speaking from experience, having seen football coach Jimmy Johnson hired away from the Hurricanes to lead the Dallas resurgence.

Wall, 50, who officially assumed his position Sept.1, takes over for interim athletic director Chris Catanach who has presided over the athletic department since the resignation of Fran Curci in January

Catanach said he was impressed with Wall's financial background and work ethic. "I think we're in a really interesting stage here," said Catanach. "We're looking at a lot of different things about the program and seeing what our op-

tions are. It will be Bill's job to assess what direction we're going in.

With his extensive background in both college and professional athletics, Wall seems like just the man to provide that direction. He has been involved in college athletics since 1971 when he served as athletic business manager and ticket manager at the University of Tulsa.

From 1984 to 1986 he was director of business and finance with what was the Oklahoma Outlaws and then the Arizona Wranglers of the now-defunct United States Football League. Since 1986 he has served as associate director of athletics for business and finance at

the University of Miami.

Born and raised in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Wall spent three years in the Marine Corps before earning his degree in accounting from The University of Tulsa in 1969. He worked as an accountant with Noble Drilling Corporation and as an auditor with Peat Marwick Mitchell & Co. before beginning his career in athletic administration.

In each of his previous athletic positions Wall has been heavily involved in marketing, fund-raising and promotion, a priority of the UT administration in its search. "I learned about intercollegiate athletics from some excellent people at Miami, and I'm very

fortunate to be able to work with the fine coaches and administrators here. That frees me up for my administrative duties and to market and promote Spartan athletics."

One person who had high praise for Wall and the job he's capable of doing is University of Miami athletic director Sam Jankovich. As reported in the Aug. 18 issue of the Tampa Tribune, Jankovich said Wall should fit in well at UT. "He did a tremendous job with our budget," Jankovich said. "He was involved in all our policy and procedure meetings and he has a very good knowledge about how an athletic department should be run."

Wall indicated to the athletic staff that his first order of business will be to meet with each staff member individually and begin to formulate plans for the future.

"The ship has been sailing along very smoothly under Chris' guidance," said Wall. "I don't plan on coming in and making any immediate waves."





# A Well-anchored Vision

At heart, Jack N. Rodriguez is a careful, small-town man. He draws the boundaries of his personal and business world around the Tampa neighborhoods south of Interstate 275 where he grew up and went to school.

He never was struck with wanderlust. From Christ the King Elementary School he moved on to Jesuit High School and then The University of Tampa, graduating in 1968.

"I never had the desire to go off," says Rodriguez, his blue eyes lighting up with amusement as he summarizes his life in a cliche. ".. Everything I do or own or think about is all on the south side. It's all right here, all in this neighborhood."

He even married his high school sweetheart.


But his perspective is anything but parochial. From his base in one of Tampa's oldest and wealthiest neighborhoods, he has expanded his vision as Realtor, contractor and developer outward from the center of Tampa to encompass Hillsborough County and the burgeoning Sunshine State.

In a business often criticized for shortsighted thinking and fast-paced change, Rodriguez sounds like a man from a more genteel era.

"I have always tried to think in the long term, how what I do today will affect me five or ten years from today. I'm very much aware of that in anything I do," says Rodriguez. "Burning bridges comes back to haunt you; over time you can't continue to do that."

Burning bridges is viewed by some as a way of describing Florida's hap-hazard development. But when asked to comment on that, Rodriguez couches it in more gentle terms: "Thirty or 40 years ago, there wasn't the population in Florida. You could take things because just down the road there was plenty more."

Rodriguez should know, since he's one of those people who could plaster his car with "NATIVE" bumper stick-

ers. An only child, he was born into a family of established Tampa natives. During the '40s, his father bought cigars from small "buckeye" manufacturers around town and packaged them under the label "Pancho Garcia." Then in 1948, he opened the Tampa real estate business where his son went to work in 1969, shortly after graduating with a degree in accounting from The University of Tampa.

The younger Rodriguez, whose name is distinguished from his father's and his 16-year-old son's by the middle initial "N", has been with the business since. He's a licensed real estate broker, state certified building contractor and president of Jack Rodriguez, Inc., Realtor, Rodriguez Land Corporation Inc. and Rodriguez Construction Company, Inc. He focuses on developing small office and retailing centers, building executive homes and renovating or restoring existing structures.

Luckily, the South Tampa area that he's dedicated to also has kept him busy.

"During the last five or six years redevelopment has brought new life to the South side," says Rodriguez.

"People don't want to spend an hour coming and going to work. This redevelopment has created another choice for people. They didn't have that choice five years ago. . . Also, instead of continuing to sprawl out, we can take advantage of existing infrastructure."

As a developer himself, Rodriguez makes clear that he's sensitive to the issues facing development in Florida today. He knows the pioneer approach doesn't work anymore and he predicts that the only viable growth management solution is one formulated and carried through on a statewide level.


That's his opinion after six years on the Hillsborough County Planning Commission. He was appointed in 1981 by the Tampa City Council and served until 1987. During the last year, he was chairman of the commission, which is responsible for the ongoing comprehensive plan for present and future growth of Hillsborough County and its three municipalities.

"Florida is a nice place to live so a lot of people want to come here," says Rodriguez. "We need to sit down on a state level and decide how to plan for the future. The cities, counties, regions all have responsibilities, but the problem is so massive that it's hard to know what steps an individual city or region needs to take."

The problems should have been addressed years ago, Rodriguez says, and the financial burden of Florida's tremendous growth spread out among the various regions of the state. But the biggest challenge the state faces, he adds, is for elected officials to reach a consensus since a variety of opinions flourish on the subject of growth management. Advisory bodies such as the Hillsborough County Planning Commission have no governing power, Rodriguez explains, so plans and controls for growth ultimately must be approved by elected officials.

Rodriguez got a brief taste of politics himself when he ran for Tampa City Council in 1987. Although he lost the election, he says his family and friends in the community were wonderful supporters. Members of the Theta Chi fraternity he belonged to at U.T. even canvassed on his behalf. After six months of almost full-time campaigning, Rodriguez concluded that running for political office is a demanding and

at times frustrating venture. He doubts he could or would "budget" time to seek office again.

Still a youthful 42, he's got plenty of time to reconsider that decision. But for now, he's concentrating his energies on business and various commitments in the community, including those at U.T. He's a past president of Tampa Alpha and immediate past president of The University of Tampa National Alumni

Association, a position that meant a seat on the U.T. Board of Trustees between 1986 and 1988. As a business man, he recognizes the significance of a successful downtown university to a successful city.
