BANQUET GREAT SUCCESS

The annual banquet of the University of Tampa, for the year 1933, was held Wednesday night at the Forest Hills Country Club and was pronounced a glorious success by students and guests.

Jack Fitzgerald, who acquitted himself splendidly as Toastmaster took advantage of the intense interest in the development of the University to arrange a unique banquet program on this theme. The speakers represented the qualities necessary to build a strong university. President Spaulding represented "Vision," Winston Fowler, "Tact," Mr. Webb, "Leadership," Thomas and Gail Armour, the brilliant dance team whose performance was greatly enjoyed, "Beauty," Bill Hippenmeier "Strength," Art Tyler, whose xylophone solo was a delight, "Harmony," Edna Frances Prince, "Love," and Marcus Hall, "Ambition."

The speeches were original, and well given. The musical numbers were splendid; no less. Thomas and Gail Armour proved themselves a dance team worthy of the most appreciative audience.

The dance was everything the college could have hoped for in its major social event of the year. Manuel Sanchez' Orchestra furnished the music for the dance. The excellent floor, and attractive lighting effects completed an attractive background.

Each student of the University was given three invitations to the dance. Many guests attended and enjoyed three hours of dancing in this pleasant atmosphere.

UNIVERSITY GIVEN FARM

At the University's annual banquet last evening Mr. George Howell, member of the Board of Trustees, disclosed the fact that Mrs. H. W. Brewster had donated a 40 acre grove and farm to the University.

The grove is to be used as an experimental farm in case a College of Agriculture is added. For the present it will probably be used to provide material for the Biology classes.

Mr. Howell also stated that, since plans had not yet been completed, he was unable to make any definite statement concerning the new home for the University, but that there would be one "if it had to be stolen."
