Large Subscription For Paris Match This Fall

The University of Tampa mailroom will find its work a little heavier in the near future when the French equivalent of *Life* magazine begins to arrive in bulk. Dr. William Leith of the Modern Language Department recently mailed off to the City of Light (Paris) a bank check for \$235.00, payment in full for 47 subscriptions at special student rates to the popular weekly *Paris Match*.

This figure compares favorably with the 46 of last year, even if the several renewals sent in by students on their own are not counted. As for others who would like to read *Paris Match*, Dr. Leith points out that the latest issue can also be found in the periodical section of the Library.

In addition, *Les Nouvelles Littéraires*, a Paris weekly reviewing recent books, plays, shows, etc., is now available at the Library for the first time. If anyone is interested in other French, German, or Italian periodicals, he should check with Dr. Leith in room 208 where a complete list of titles, addresses, and the latest prices is on hand.

Up To You

For most college students this will be the first Presidential election in which they can vote and take active participation in. The addition of these millions to the voting roles has left little doubt in anyone's mind that the youth vote could be the deciding factor in this Presidential election.

In keeping with the spirit of this nation it seems only fitting that we the youth should approach our newly acquired responsibility with the utmost concern and personal diligence.

Freedom of choice has always been the mainstay of America and it is in the exercising of this right, by all Americans, that determines who is to be the leader of our nation for four years. This is not the time for apathy or for ignorance of the issues.

Never before in a Presidential campaign have the differences between the two candidates and their ideologies been so distinct and accessible. It is our responsibility to investigate and learn about both men and their positions and to then decide which in our individual opinion is the man we feel is best suited to be President of the United States. No measure of time or shrug of the shoulder can erase the importance of this decision.

For many people the choice has never been clearer. Many of us are under the opinion that, all things considered, the reelection of President Nixon is America's safest choice. It is with this opinion in mind that some of us have organized the Committee for the Reelection of the President on campus. It is our opinion that involvement, positive involvement, is the course for youth.

Our objective is not to merely gather together and sing praise nor is it to gather together and mock, mimic and masacre our opponents. We believe in positive involvement. It is our desire to bring the issues out into the open and to the people.

It is only natural that those who support the President do so for many varied reasons. The Presidents record speaks for itself. In light of all the factors that must be taken into consideration we feel that the President has proven himself an extremely capable man.

We said the issues speak for themselves: The President's handling of the war in Viet Nam, the fact that he has brought home over 90% of our men in the face of unrelenting Communist aggression and continued North Vietnamese obstinance in Paris, has been a hard decision but one made as the only alternative to North Viet Nam's ambitions. The history making visits to China and the Soviet Union and the subsequent record setting economic and trade revisions are unprecedented in American history. The Arms Limitation Treaty between the Soviet Union and the United States, the 18 year old voting amendment, an 84% drop in draft inductions and its total elimination due for July, 1973, the total overhaul of the government documentation classification system, an all-time high of 81.7 working Americans, and his maintenance of Presidential calm and self-control in the face of bitter personal attacks on him by his opponents, plus numerous other reasons have made the choice so perfectly clear.

The Tampa University chapter of Reelect the President must be composed of you the students, students who want to get involved

and have the satisfaction of knowing that they were a part of the campaign. We, the local chapters, are truly the "grassroot" campaigners. Our work consists of manning the Downtown and Dale Mabry Campaign Headquarters, helping with precinct work, canvassing neighborhoods, speech making, school projects such as the upcoming speech—debate by the Viet Nam Vets for the President, shopping center rallies, telephone surveys, working for visiting government officials, and much much more. There is no pay or benefits outside of maybe a free meal every now and then and the personal satisfaction of knowing you were involved.

The true point of this though is for all the students to brush off the feeling of apathy that has engulfed our campus and much of the nation and for us, the youth, to carry the responsibility that has been entrusted to us at our urging.

Whether you are for the President or not you will have trouble disagreeing with these few words by him, "There can be no generation gap in America. The destiny of this nation is not divided into yours and ours. It is one destiny. We share it together. And in the way we respond, history will judge us together."

An Eye For An Eye! Not At This School

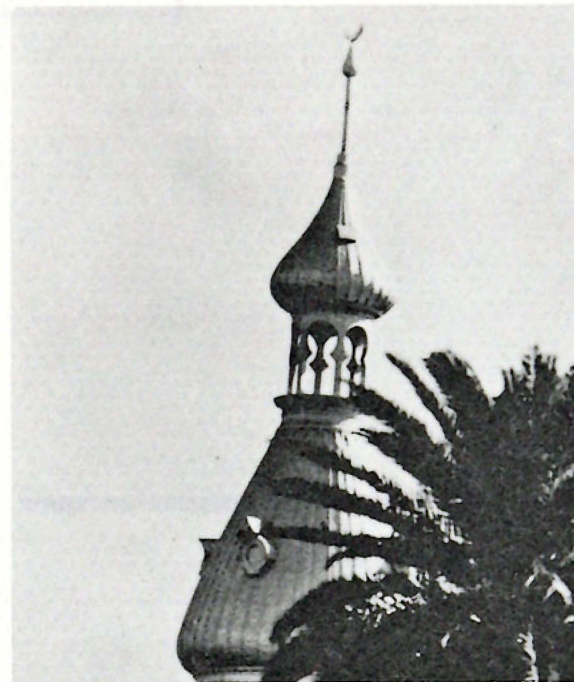

The Judicial Board is in existence to ensure uniform justice in disciplinary matters and to give a student, who may have overstepped a University regulation, an opportunity to be heard by his peers.

When I mentioned earlier that we are independent, without question we are. This is not to guarantee that you can skate by without too much trouble. Nor do we shuffle the deck and deal out punishment on an eye for an eye, tooth for a tooth basis. What we do guarantee is an honest fair and open approach to the problem and to its solution. We attempt to halt the problem at its source by frank give and take discussion with the person before us and in some instances must institute disciplinary measures.

Another topic which I would like to touch on is that of who may institute action in the Judicial Board. Anyone in the University Community may bring to our attention any alleged violations occurring either against themselves or against another person or property on this campus. Using the efficiency of a new format and modified type of parliamentary procedure the Student Government meeting of October 11 was a satisfying and refreshing experience.

The students responsible should be commended for their new organizational structure.

After some debate the SGA voted not to support Prince Barbar's Bangladesh Relief Fund.

Jim Lucas, traffic committee chairman, asked that complaints be put in writing for consideration. Said Lucas, "Quite frequently I get arguments in ambiguous terms."

According to reports from Junior Senators Wycliffe and Schloesser the students do want a "Help Line". Jim Lucas, creator of the project, said he would continue his work concerning the telephone counseling service.

Sophomore Senator Denise Letizia in reporting on advances in creating a "five-day" meal ticket said that due to contract obligations it would be unfeasible until next year.

Jack Spirtos, speaking in behalf of the National Cancer Society moved that the SGA support and work with the Cancer Society on their Bike-A-Thon fund-raising campaign October 28.

The motion was approved and Luther Clemens, Black Students Association, was voted as coordinator for all UT cooperation in the program.

Peter Nuccio, Philosophy Club, moved that a letter of apology be endorsed by the SGA and sent to the Minaret for publication. It would be an apology to Dr. Owens for the poor student turn-out at the President's Inauguration. The motion was defeated.

One Time I OD On Coffee

Fun, Entertainment And Beverages: Where To Go On A Weekend

After a long, strenuous day of classes TU students can relieve their tensions by listening to music, playing games and visiting with friends at various bars in the Tampa area.

Numerous bars in the Tampa area actually cater to TU students. These bars include the Tarot and the Trophy Room, both located on Kennedy Blvd. The Tarot is new this year and is known for its Sangria on tap, along with a variety of other wines and beer. You can occupy yourself by playing games such as pool and fuz ball, while listening to the juke box.

For inexpensive drinks, the Trophy Room is the place to go. You can order anything from rum and cokes to Harvey Wallbangers for only fifty cents per drink.

The Tab Inn, located on North Armenia Avenue is a beer bar with a very friendly atmosphere. You can play fuz ball, pool, pinball and darts with the sound of a jukebox in the background. Every so-often the Tab features a live band or "oldie but Goodie Night". If you really want your money's worth, go there Wednesday nights and drink your beer for fifteen cents a glass all night.

Other bars in the immediate Tampa area include the Retreat, where anything can happen and the Islands Club on Davis Island, another action - packed bar.

If you care to drive a little further, you will find some fun - filled bars near South Florida. The collage, Witt's Inn and the Triste are all located on Nebraska Avenue, so hit them all. They are all beer and wine bars.

All these bars provide a great deal of fun

and entertainment. However, if you are under 21 you should be aware of the risk you are taking if you do not have a good I.D. card. Although most of these bars only require one sufficient I.D., the vice-squad may be stricter.

The vice-squad is a group of authorities whose sole purpose is to investigate these bars for under-aged drinkers. If your I.D. is barely acceptable, you have two alternatives. Either wait until the drinking age is lowered in Florida or spend ten or fifteen dollars for a good I.D.

Also avoid bars that are extremely strict with college students.

ABC Lounge, although extremely popular with TU students last year has "cracked down" this year. They now require two age I.D.'s.

Remember, it is much better to take precautions than to get an enormous fine or thrown in jail for under-aged drinking.

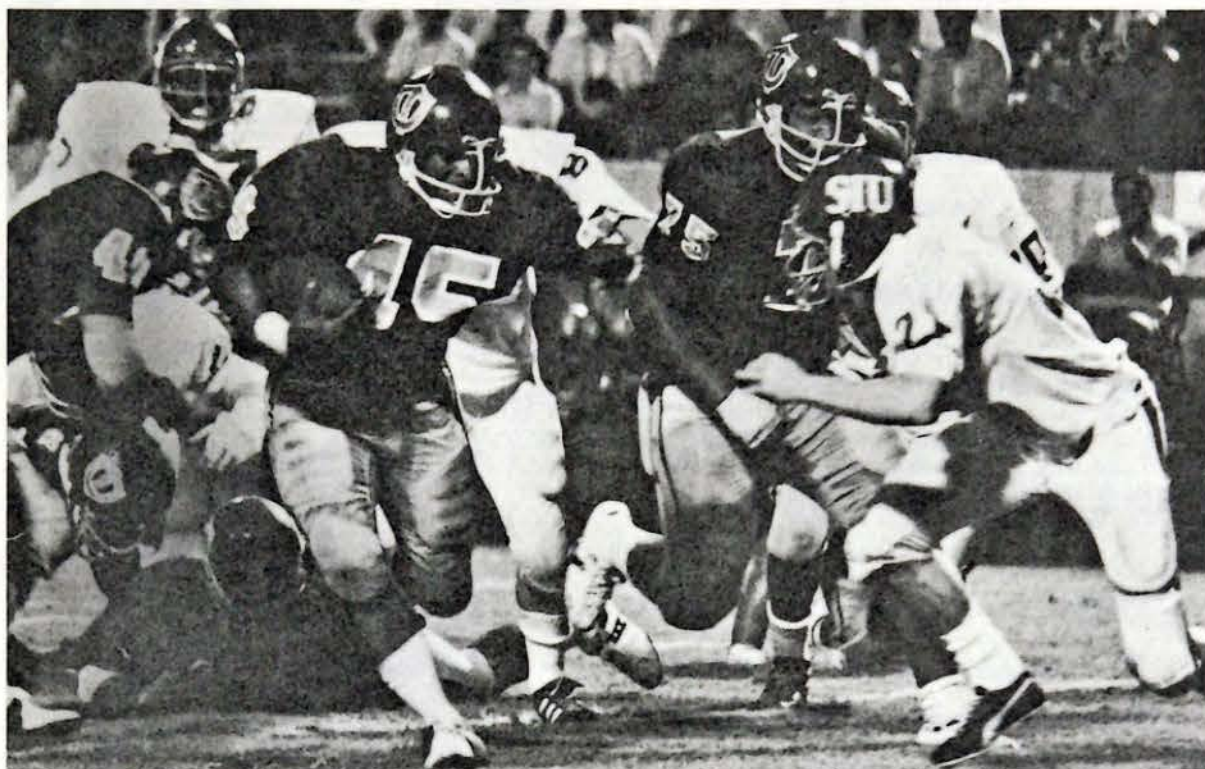
Varsity Volleyball

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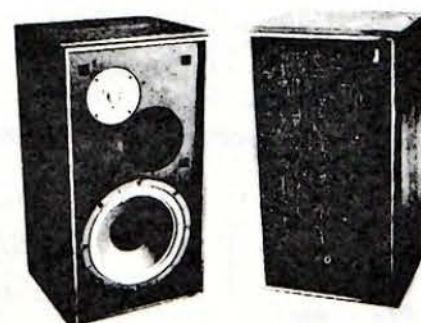
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
