

The Senior Secretary of the Student Senate has not attended one Senate meeting this year. She has roken her pledge to every one of you that cast a ballot so that she might represent you. The Jr. Class secretary is her carbon copy.

Your Senior Vice President, Senior Woman Representative and Jr. Vice President when candidates for office made promises to represent you. Have they? It is very evident that they have not. The Jr. Vice President attended one meetting this year. The Senior Vice President and The Senior President and The Senior Representative did not attend any.

The Senior Class President attended several meetings; now he is nterning, and can not attend meetings, but he does work with the Student Senate body.

Those Student Senators who do participate at meetings give valnable time investigating Student proposals . . . They work long hours bringing the proposals to reality. They assume the responsibility for the whole Student Body. They attend sessions regularly and, thereby, represent every student n this college. The active members of the Student Senate are doing everything possible to promote student welfare.

It is impossible for The Senate to function to its fullest capacity uness each class representative cooperates 100% with the student government body.

Holding an office in the Student Senate is not based on honorary status. The Students expect to be represented. They should call for an impeachment of every senator who has violated the trust of his offire. This writer suggestes they resign, or make amends for their behaviour.

On Monday, April 2, the Student Senate was shown evidence for the need of a Date Room for resident coeds. The Senate decided to hold a hearing for the proposed project, after the administration viewed its opinion on this proposal.

Monday, April 9, Warren White released administrative views on the Date Room. The administration gave its sanction for the proposed project.

The Women resident students have been informed by the Senate to prepare a set of regulations to govern the Date Room policy. They were also asked to propose a location for it and to list what furnishings they wished to have.

Young children will have an opportunity to develop their talents in the new classes which will be held in painting, sculpture and design at the University of Tampa on Saturday mornings. A series of 10 lessons is offered Tampa children, to discover, guide and encourage the cultural education of the young ones.

The older and younger pupils will be taught in separate groups. There will be a class for young children at 9:30, and a class for junior high and high school children at 10:30. The materials are furnished.

Work in charcoal, painting, ceramics, sculpture and drawing will be stressed with accent on furthering and developing the individuality of the children.

In charge of the classes is Miss Alice Jean Small, head of the department of handicraft and design at Tampa U. Miss Small is a graduate of the University of Washington School of Fine Arts. She conducted children's classes in New York City and in California. She is a student of Paul Bonifas, one of the world's leading ceramicists, and of Fernand Leger, of Paris, one of the most famous of contemporary painters.

Miss Small received first prize at the Florida State Fair recently and has been chosen as one of the international jury for the Cuban-American Exhibition to be held at the University of Tampa in April.





It's pretty tough to mention that you've graduated from a defunct school and perhaps that corld happen to Tampa U if we don't offer a more well rounded sports program to interest students from the state and from afar to come and benefit from the other fine advantages that the school offers.




