The reception is a welcome addition to the Homecoming program, and the board hopes that a large number of alumni will attend the event, which may become an annual affair for reunions.




Sooner than expected, but here we are again with more of the same.



Absentee ballots will be accepted by the committee provided the ballot shows the stamp of a notary public and is sent by a member in good standing.

To be in good standing, a member must pay at least half of his annual dues, which would be fifty cents.

This ruling will also apply to all voters at the general meeting, and all should come prepared to meet this requirement.


My dear Alumni:
