The Arts Management Program, recently approved by Tampa U's Standing Curriculum Committee, is currently being offered as a professional alternative for Fine Art Students to couple their particular "arts" interest with a sound business background, enabling them to qualify for arts management professions.

Such a program is especially advantageous for those students majoring in music, art, or drama, who do not want to teach but do not seem to have another practical alternative.

Providing a unique degree opportunity, in correlation with UT's immediate resources, the initial student enrollment should come from sophomore and junior students enrolled in the Bachelor of Music or Bachelor of Fine Arts programs.

Fugitive Caught On Campus

On March 13, at 4:26 in the afternoon, U.T. Security officer James Cremer, apprehended a fugitive on the U.T. campus.

The man, Jeffrey Donahue, age 24, was first questioned on March 11, when Officer Cremer found him sleeping on a park bench in Plant Park. Donahue was allowed to go free as a security check was run on him. The security check revealed that he was a fugitive from the state of Massachusetts where he is wanted on a rape charge.

Donahue was again seen on March 13 as he was walking by the U.T. security office. He was quickly taken into custody and turned over to local authorities. He was unarmed.

It was not until after he was arrested that U.T. security officers discovered that local authorities suspected Donahue of five rapes in the Hyde Park area. The rash of rapes in the area had left many U.T. coeds and local residents fearful of going anywhere alone.

Donahue is presently being held for questioning in the Hillsborough County Jail. If he is not connected with the local crimes, he will be extradited to Massachusetts.

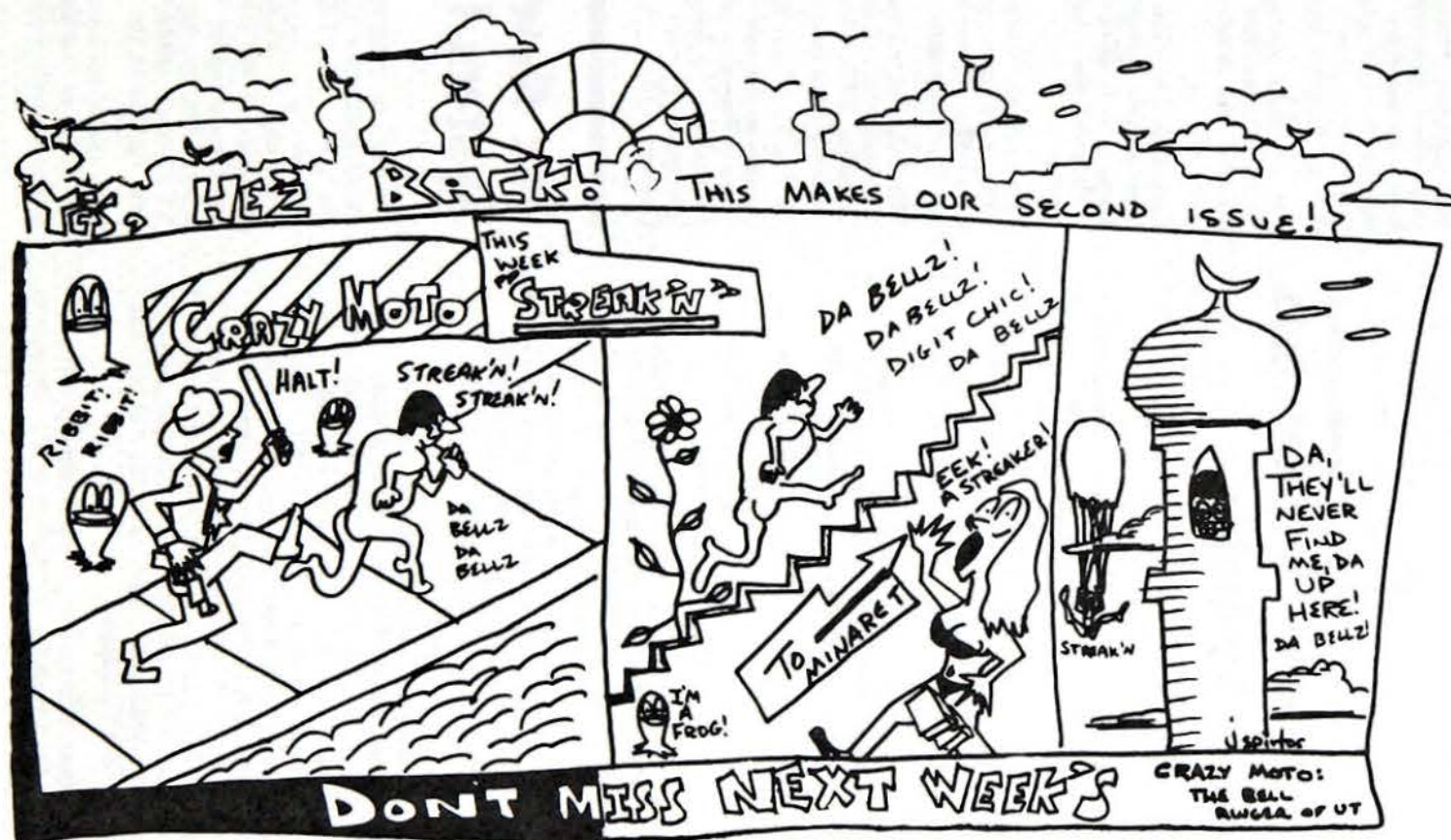
V.P. Ford Addresses Press Conference

There were many questions that were asked of the Vice-President at the Press Conference on March 8. Most of these questions were related to President Nixon's policies, and the future plans of the Vice-President himself. Ford replied to a question on how much real power that he has in what Nixon does, "I have an open door policy with the President, and with all the people on his staff. The President and I have an excellent rapport."

One question that directly applies to college students, was one that was asked by a Tampa U. student about middle class student loans, and Ford replied by saying that there are two basic programs. One which is called the Basic Opportunity Grant, which for any one student the amount could not exceed \$1,400.00, the other program applies more to the student who has serious problems at home, this program comes under the heading of Loan Guarantees.

The Vice-President said that he has no intentions of running for any political office in 1976. Since Ford has held the Vice-Presidential position he has urged the President to make more trips, and give more press conferences. Ford feels that these would be beneficial to the country.



Streaking On Campus:

Student Activism Laid Bare

(CPS)—It began as a few sporadic events—but lately streaking or nude racing—has reached epidemic proportions at colleges and universities across the country.

From Florida to Alaska—where below zero temperatures necessitate calling the sport blue streaking—students have been turning out in droves for nude marathons and attempting to set streaking 'firsts' for their schools.

Any attempt to acknowledge a streaking record would be premature since the fad has probably not reached its peak, however, the reported high so far was at the University of Georgia at Athens where 1000 students streaked across the campus.

In the beginning practitioners of the sport shrouded themselves in the darkness of late evening or early morning, but lately more and more streakers have been coming out in the daytime and have been making their brief appearances in such places as dormitories, cafeterias, supermarkets, basketball courts, police stations, libraries, hockey rinks and one cheeky group even plans to streak through state legislative chambers.

An anonymous nude, to be known in campus history only as the Lone Streaker, set off the craze at the University of Northern Colorado (UNC) campus as he ran through the student center in midafternoon, wearing only sneakers, a cowboy hat and a Lone Ranger mask, and shouting "off, off and away."

Where did the streaking fad begin? To be strictly historical Lady Godiva bears the title of the first streaker, but heated debate rages in collegiate circles as to what school held the first modern day streaking match.

Fraternity members at Indiana State University maintain streaking has long been a part of IU Greek life. Annual naked Olympics have reportedly been held in the Greek neighborhood for almost 10 years. It is said that 12 University of Colorado (CU) students were arrested in Mexico in 1965 for a pubic dash.

Unfortunately, some streakers have dashed right into the path of disapproving campus

police. In Texas authorities are desperately trying to stifle statewide streaking and police have been ordered to take pictures of campus streakers and then arrest them. Reportedly streaking is against Texas law, as it falls under disorderly conduct for indecent exposure and is subject to a fine from \$1 to \$40 and a maximum of 40 days in jail if the fine is not paid.

"If streaking is the most serious problem ahead, we're going to have a pretty uneventful spring," said Paul Ginsberg, the dean of students at the University of Wisconsin.

Among students there is little if any adverse reaction to streaking although one student at the University of Tennessee termed it as "gross". Students are proud when their school's streak squad makes news.

Although the streaking movement is for the most part impromptu, streakers at the CU campus claim membership in the American Streaker's Society. (ASS).

So the fad grows despite cold weather, fines, arrests and expulsion threats. Spurred on by heavy television, radio and newspaper coverage, students around the country make plans for "super streak" and "the world's greatest streak."

And if this were not enough the latest reported prank is nude parachuting.

As this degree becomes better known, a definite interest will be generated within the entertainment business, museum managements, and cultural centers for qualified personnel.

Since the Arts Management Program is open to any opportunity that may arise within the Tampa area, it is given a great deal of leadway and flexibility.

Although all opportunities for Arts Management intern study have not been researched, positive reaction and support has been expressed by Cypress Gardens, Disney World, the Ensemble Theatre, Tampa Bay Arts Center, Busch Gardens and the Tampa Concert Ballet Company.

Already Arts Management students have visited a television studio to learn various promotional techniques and how to put a show together.

Although a number of colleges offer an Arts Management program on the graduate level, Tampa U. is allegedly the second undergraduate school to initiate such a program.

This program is presently being offered with an initial enrollment of three students. The enrollment will be kept small for awhile until the Administration sees how it works.

The B.S. degree with a major in Arts Management will be administered through the Division of Fine Arts. The minimum course content requirements include:

21 hours in either Music, Art, Speech (Drama) 6 hours in the related Arts Disciplines, 18 hours in Business oriented courses, 3 hours in Journalism, 15 hours of Arts Management Internship (Junior and Senior years), and Business 498.

The New Sound System Is In

The Student Program Council debuted its new sound system for Falk Theatre last Sunday at the movie "The Life and Times of Judge Roy Bean."

Regarding the sound system, Karl Funds, President of the S.P.C., said, "The system has been on order for some months. It was delayed because we did not know whether S.P.C. could afford it or not, and it was held up due to the truckers' strike."

With the acquisition of the new system, S.P.C. hopes that there will be no more problems with Falk Theatre.

Academic Scholarships Now Available

The University Academic Scholarship Committee, chaired by Dr. James Dinsmore and consisting of members from the faculty, staff, and student body, is beginning consideration of applications for scholarships for the 1974-75 school year. Starting this fall the basic requirements for consideration are a minimum grade point average of 3.0 at the University of Tampa and registration as a full-time student (12 hours). All applicants must file either a Parent or Student Confidential Statement with the Financial Aid Office. This information is used to determine if the student needs financial aid to be able to stay in school. Because of the limited amount of scholarship funds available, most scholarships go to students with financial need but some scholarships are also awarded to students with no financial need.

The main sources of the scholarship funds are proceeds from benefit days held at Tampa Downs, Tampa Jai Alai Fronton, and the Tampa Dog Track. In addition, a variety of other scholarships and loan funds are available. These include some scholarships with very specific requirements, some of which have no applicants.

For students who do not qualify for scholarships or whose scholarship does not meet the total demonstrated need, a wide variety of other forms of aid can be obtained including loans, government grants and work study programs. The goal of financial aid is to provide a total package that makes a college education financially possible for all students. A relatively new program this year is the Florida Student Assistant Grant program for Florida residents. This program provides grants of from \$200 to \$1200 per year to qualified students.

In Race For SGA President

There are four candidates running for the office of President of Student Government Association. Marc Kelman, Frank Farmer, Karl Funds, and Don Marinelli.

Marc Kelman, is a Business major, who is President of Intra-Fraternity Council, a member of Theta Chi Fraternity, Delta Sig Business Fraternity, and also a member of the House of Representatives for the last three years, and has worked on Homecoming and Orientation. Marc seems to feel that "the S.G.A. needs to be promoted to the everyday student, and S.G.A. should try to get him involved." He is unhappy with the House of Representatives, and if he is elected he wants to talk to the leaders of all organizations, trying to get them involved, by sending representatives. Marc wants to work on Minor Sports, to help them gain financial support from the University, and work on the promotion of S.G.A. starting the new Freshmen during their orientation.

He feels that in the past Student Government has been too conservative; "they don't apply pressure in the right way. Being a business major will help me see problems and solve them in a business-like way."

Another candidate who is running for the office of President is Frank Farmer, a sociology major. Frank was his class's Freshman Senator and is now Junior Senator. He has been an active participant in S.G.A., working on Orientation, the original Visitation, and this semester he worked on the Code of Ethics with the other Junior Senator.

As President, Frank would like to see better communication with the students. He is striving for unification of S.G.A., S.P.C. and the Minaret. Especially using the Minaret as a tool for communication. "Moving all student organizations under the same roof."

"The S.G.A. is only as effective as the people behind it." Frank wants to stress receiving a responsive feedback from people. He would like to see "the campaign run as smooth as possible, and that none of the other candidates stoop to slander."

One thing that is bothering me about the election is that in the last three years that I've been involved in S.G.A. we have had difficulty finding more than two people that were willing

to devote their time and energy to the student body. Now that the most prestigious position is open, we are swamped with candidates. I would like to ask, "Where were these people the last 3 years when all the work was to be done?"

Karl Funds is an English and Economics major who is President of Student Program Council, Assistant Editor of the Minaret, a Representative to Student Government for two years, a member of Pi Delta Epsilon, Delo Forensic Special Events Committee, former President of the Photography Club and Chairman of Music for Homecoming for two years.

At the present time Karl is organizing a Student Credit Union with Dean Hyde. Karl says "this is the most beneficial program that is being organized at this time for students."

He feels that S.G.A. has failed to work for Student Organizations that are in need of help. He would like to "help coordinate all branches of the organizations and the arts that are floundering and need help. The President of S.G.A. should be someone aware of the system and all the organizations."

"I hope to follow in the footsteps of great leaders like George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, Albert Einstein and Jack Spirtos."

The fourth candidate for President is Don Marinelli. He is a psychology, philosophy and Speech and Drama major. He came to Tampa U. on a drama scholarship, which was later changed to an academic scholarship. Don's activities include, Assistant Editor of the 1974 Moroccan Yearbook, President of Alpha Psi Omega, vice-president of Delo Forensic Society; member of: Omicron Delta Kappa, Alpha Chi, Phi Eta Sigma, Pi Delta Epsilon, and he is a staff writer for the Minaret.

"The office of Student Government President is a position that demands 24 hour participation, constant work, research, thought and communication. Communication is what it's all about. I have endeavored most of my life to broaden my span of knowledge to allow me to communicate with as many people as possible in as many different fields as possible."

Among Don's ideas are, "with the huge increase in tuition fresh on everyone's minds,

and the growing acceptance by the Tampa City Council of the Riverpark Plan (which includes our present pool) students should be guaranteed that plans are under way for construction of a new pool in the very near future.

I would pledge SGA's assistance and my own help as someone involved actively in theatre organization and production to iron out the weaknesses that plagued this year's Homecoming and see that they do not happen again. The SGA Library Assistance Act, by which SGA would oversee the donation of badly needed used-literature books. Undertake the task of organizing a week, sometime during the spring, that would be equal in stature to Homecoming.

With the wealth of activities and business flourishing in and around the Tampa area I feel SGA should work with the administration in seeking out places for possible field work and also engage in the fine print aspects. I feel it would be highly beneficial to the school and students if Tampa U. could engage in active field work with say, the Aquatarium and Sea World for marine biology majors. Disneyworld for Arts Management majors, etc.; opportunities are limitless.

He will continue to dedicate SGA to guarding the interest of the entire University.

"I need only make mention of the events that took place when Drama was dropped. I would initiate a State of the University address by which the President would have to appear before the House the first meeting of every semester to report on his programs planned and the overall state of the university before the student body. If elected, the welfare of the student body and the whole of Tampa U. shall take precedent over anything."

There are two students who are running for the Vice-Presidency in S.G.A. They are Kathy Hayne and Dan Krzywicki.

Kathy, who is a marine biology major, was a Freshman and Sophomore Senator. In SGA she was an active participant working on visitation, the health center, was appointed by Dr. Owens to the Curriculum Committee, and is now working on an off-campus housing directory.

VONNEGUT INTERVIEWED

In his first interview since the publication of his No. 1 best-selling book "Breakfast of Champions", KURT VONNEGUT, JR. told CRAWDADDY Magazine that he is working on a new novel that is radically different from everything he has written to date. VONNEGUT explained that, among other changes, in his new novel he would make no references to the cast of eccentric characters who served him so staunchly in the past.

KIGORE TROUT, a Jesus figure VONNEGUT cast as an aging science fiction writer in several of his novels, was "freed" in "Breakfast of Champions" after VONNEGUT decided that he was going to "shun storytelling—I would write about life." On the first anniversary of his freedom from bondage, the somewhat mystified TROUT paid a visit to his Creator and, free to write about it for anyone, chose to submit it to CRAWDADDY, an ever-expanding publication formerly

associated with the rock music market but now a highly-regarded general interest magazine. TROUT's encounter with VONNEGUT will be revealed in the fact-and-fantasy April cover story of CRAWDADDY, on sale March 13.

The article is a tour-de-force, depicting VONNEGUT at a turning point in his professional and personal life. VONNEGUT looks far back into the past and way ahead toward the future and expounds on everything from low-level pornography to high-level politics. "I've been shrewd about publishing," VONNEGUT concludes, "but stupid about life."

With the publication of "Slaughterhouse-Five" and "Breakfast of Champions", KURT VONNEGUT, JR. became one of America's most popular writers after enjoying a limited, if legendary status among college students for more than a decade. He presently teaches writing at City College of New York.

ABC Censors Dick Cavett

(CPS)—ABC has ordered a show prepared by Dick Cavett to be censored because it was "unfair" and "unbalanced politically."

The show was an interview with four Chicago Seven defendants: Tom Hayden, Abbie Hoffman, Jerry Rubin and Rennie Davis, during which Hayden talked about Indochina, and how much aid was going to the Thieu government. The opinions were aired although Cavett doggedly tried to steer clear of politics by asking Hayden questions about his wife, Jane Fonda, and dwelling on Rubin's enthusiasm for food. ABC said that Hayden's comments would not be broadcast to "insure fairness and balance."

The ABC decision has provoked a great deal of uproar, including a bitter protest from the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU) that ABC was denying Cavett's guests

their First Amendment rights. Since its original decision, ABC has offered a compromise where Cavett may broadcast Hayden's comments if he cuts a half hour of the show to present opposing Nixon administration or "some sort of conservative point of view."

Cavett said he received a letter from former FCC Commissioner Nicholas Johnson explaining that there is no FCC regulation "which insists on so-called 'fairness' in a single program." Cavett noted that, "when I put Vice-President Ford and his family on the air for 90 minutes on Jan. 10, the network made no demand or proposal that anti-Nixon views be represented on the same program in the interest of fairness."

One ABC censor was quoted as saying, "Nixon's foreign policy is magnificent, why didn't anyone mention that?"

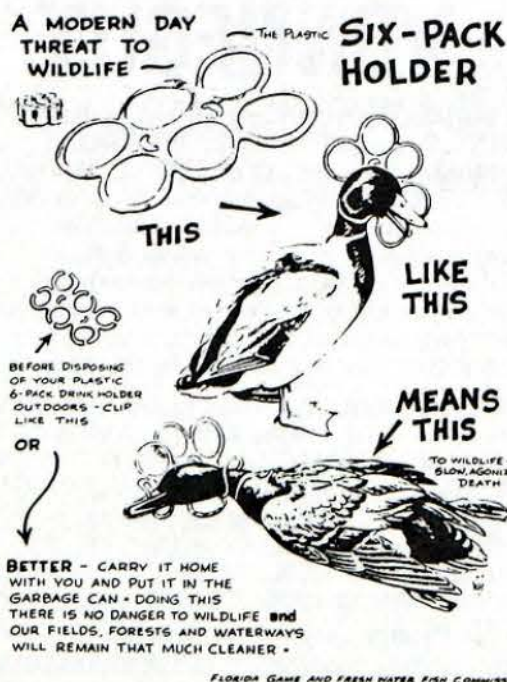
Cavett will not accept the compromise and ABC will not give in, so the program will be aired without Hayden's comments on Indochina.

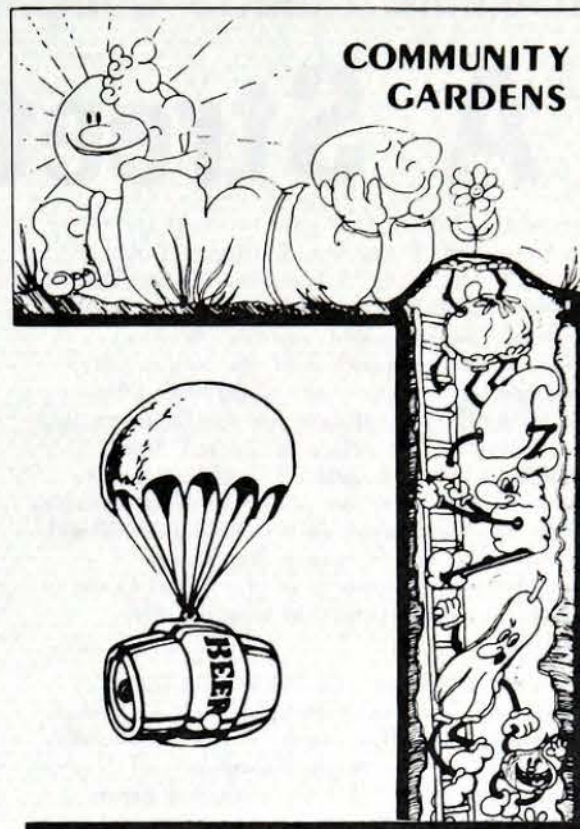
Did Chuck Dick Chuck Dick
