Beginning at 9:00 a.m. tomorrow, there will be many activities offered to UT parents.

All parents will register at the University Union at 9:00 a.m. tomorrow and thus begin their weekend at UT. During the morning hours they will be able to have faculty consultations, class visitations and a campus tour. During the afternoon transportation to Busch Gardens will be provided.

There is a special luncheon with President Owens for all Parent Donors of \$100 or more at 12:30 p.m. in the Fletcher Lounge.

At 7:30 p.m. there will be a special ceremony, the lighting of the minarets, to commemorate the Third Annual Parents Weekend. Parents are asked to gather at the fountain in front of Plant Hall.

At 8:00 p.m. the University of Tampa drama students present at Falk Theatre: Presentation '71, "Excerpts from the World of Carl Sandberg." There will also be an address by the University's youthful President, Dr. B. D. Owens.

There will be a strange transformation taking place in the Cafeteria at 10:30 a.m. Saturday. The UT Brunch brings out the best of the cafeteria, with delicious food, nice surroundings, and even the best silverware. For students whose parents did not come to Parents Weekend, there is a barbeque in back of the Union.

The "We're Number One" Spartan football highlight film of 1970 will be shown before and after brunch.

Anyone who missed Busch Gardens on Friday will be provided transportation on Saturday afternoon at 1:00 p.m. There will also be open houses in all the residence halls from 1:00 p.m. until 4:00 p.m.

The 1971 Spartans will provide the entertainment Saturday night at Tampa Stadium as they meet the University of Mississippi at 8:00 p.m.

Dr. and Mrs. Owens will host a coffee at their home, Barritt House, on Sunday at 11:00 a.m. This will be a chance for students and parents alike to meet the new president and his wife.

## Homecoming draws near

Homecoming activities are rapidly approaching for this year. The yearly struggle as for who will build the best lawn display or who will have the funniest skit, and most important of all who will be crowned Homecoming Queen will come to a climax on Friday, November 12 at Falk Theatre.

However, Homecoming is not just for organizations to compete against one another. It is for all the members of the University, past and present. For the Alumni, there are a number of events ranging from an early bird cocktail hour on Friday night, November 12, to an Industrial Arts breakfast on Saturday, November 13, and ending with a post-game cocktail party and a post-game dance on Saturday night.

There will be an outdoor concert with a major group, Alice Cooper. For those of you who know the Homecoming budget, you will agree that we have a major group for our

On Thursday and Friday voting for the Homecoming Queen will take place in the Lobby of Plant Hall. Registered machines will be used and students must have their I.D.'s in order to vote. machines will be in the lobby all day Thursday and Friday from 9 a.m. til 6 p.m.

Judging of the lawn displays begins at 6:30 Friday night. The winners will be announced later on that evening in Falk theatre. Spartan Skits follow the lawn displays announce-

ments at 8 p.m. in Falk theater. At 9 p.m. the presentation of the lawn display awards and Skit trophies will take place.

The Queen contest will begin at 10:00 p.m. Dr. Owens will crown his first Homecoming Queen at the University of Tampa and present her with a bouquet of roses. All are invited to attend the 1971 Homecoming Spartan Suncoast Showcase to begin at 8 p.m. on Friday, November 12 at Falk theatre. There is no admission charge.

All classes will be cancelled Friday, November 12, 1971 so that students may participate in Homecoming activities.

## Dr. Edward Ward is fresh addition at UT

## Computer Course begins

The University of Tampa and GTE Data Services Incorporated have combined to offer a pilot course in computer programming and systems analysis.

Announcement of the experimental university-industry computer education program was made jointly by Dr. B. D. Owens, University of Tampa president, and John B. Renwick, president of GTE Data Services Incorporated. The Tampa based nationwide computer services subsidiary of General Telephone & Electronics will conduct the computer classes.

According to Dr. Owens, the data processing education plan began October 26 and will include initial classes in basic

computer education at the MacDill Air Force Base campus of the University of Tampa.

Commenting on the University of Tampa agreement, Renwick said, "We are pleased and proud to begin this computer education curriculum with the University. The offering of a college credit course in data processing is an important milestone for Air Force personnel, for the University and for us."

GTE Data Services will provide all faculty members and course materials under the contract agreement. Classes are to take place at GTE Data Services' Tampa Education Center and the MacDill campus.

## Ticket policy under student fire

## Dorm visitation is discussed at SGA

On Wednesday night, Oct. 27, 1971, the SGA witnessed a first of the semester. Present at its meeting along with a substantial gallery, were Dean Johns, Dr. West and Dean Benton. The reason for this meeting was to discuss the dorm visitation proposal.

This proposal was composed by a group of students. It was passed through the House and the Senate — both unanimously. It represented a great deal of work, thought and effort.

There are eight major elements of the proposal. Included in these are provisions for hours, in accordance with Howell Hall, consent of roommate, escort from main

desk, one specific entrance per dorm, sign-in and sign-out procedure, prohibited use of facilities on the floor, spot checking after hours, and a handling of infractions.

The reason for these rules is to protect the student who is against visitation so he or she will still be assured of his/her privacy and security. Also, if there are certain floors who do not wish to adopt it, or only on a limited basis, that as well may be arranged.

I would like to see a trial period of visitation go into effect at the beginning of next semester. It was voted upon and passed at the meeting to have a trial visitation period for the last weekends in November.

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## Intercession courses to be open to public

This year's Intercession will be open to the general public as well as to continuing students of the University of Tampa. Many new, exciting courses will be added to last year's curriculum.

The Winter Intercession, a three week period in January, provides students with the opportunity to participate in unique programs not offered as a part of the regular curriculum. During the Intercession, the University of Tampa provides an opportunity for both students and faculty to derive an educational experience that is both contemporary and relevant.

In addition to the advantage of a wider choice of courses, and time for concentrated study on a single topic, this calendar now provides the opportunity for the superior student to graduate in three years. In this case, his schedule could be: five courses — Fall and Spring Semesters; one course — Intercession; three courses — Summer sessions. A student who wishes to work at a slower pace during the Fall and/or Spring semesters may use the Intercession and Summer sessions to complete a degree program in the usual four years.

Pre-enrollment for classroom courses will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday, November 16, and 17, 1971. Students wishing to participate in the trip to Mexico must register before December 10, 1971, and there will be no pre-enrollment fee. Registration for all classroom courses is Wednesday, January 5, 1972. All classes begin on January 6, 1972.

Each student pre-enrolling or registering for the Winter Intercession will be charged a \$50. non-refundable deposit. Tuition payable at registration, will be charged at the current rate of \$135. for a 3-semester-hour course, and \$175. for a 4-semester-hour course.

Students presently living on campus will be permitted to occupy the rooms now assigned to them at no additional charge during Intercession period. Students who do not now have a room assignment, but who wish to live on campus will be permitted to do so if space is available. Such students will be charged \$50. and should secure their room assignments through the office of the appropriate personnel dean. Food service will be provided only on a cash basis, and participation is voluntary.

Because of the short duration of the Intercession, positively no requests for late registration will be honored.

The study tour of Mexico is a 3 semester hours course and the cost is the \$135 for tuition, and \$329. for fare and accommodations—which does not include meals—for, a total of \$464.

The maximum class load that a student may undertake is 4 semester hours.

Students are encouraged to make suggestions for the Intercession and to watch the bulletin boards for programs planned for future periods. Booklets are presently available in the Registrar's office for further information on classes available.

In the third quarter, linebacker Tom Jackson picked off a Buddy Carter pass at the Tampa 28. From there, Mike Campbell directed the Louisville attack to its second score

highlighted by a 5 yard scamper by Howard Stevens, Scott Marcus kicked the point to give Louisville a 14-10 lead.

Tampa blew any chances in the final stanza on two fumbles.

The final score came on a desperation Carter pass which was deflected into Greg Campbell's hands who carried it 20 yards to score. Marcus kicked the point and the Spartans to the tune of 21-14.

Tampa faces the Ole Miss. Rebels Saturday night at Tampa Stadium.
