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IN DEFENSE OF BERMUDA SHORTS

As I brought out in my campaign speech, I favored having bermudas allowed on campus between the 1st of May and the 31st of October. However, the administration wants facts before they will approve of this type apparel on campus.

While at the SUSGA convention, I took the opportunity to check the various regulations on other college campus to see how they handled this situation. As you may understand, each college had its own set of rules which varied.

The U. of Florida was most lenient of all. Men and women students are allowed to wear Bermuda shorts on campus at anytime. There are certain restrictions which govern this dress. For women; blouses must be tucked in, no sweat shirts, sweaters only if they have a blouse underneath, they may not be shorter than three inches above the knee, no slacks or peddle pushers, bermudas may only be wool or cotton and not elastic or knit, dresses must be worn downtown, and shoes or sandals must be worn.

Mississippi Southern allows Bermudas for women in the cafeteria, Student Union, on Campus, and to Art classes. They must wear a dress to all other classes.

Most of the other campus allowed women to wear them on Saturdays and to Special Bermuda parties.

As for the men, they are allowed to wear them on all the campus which I had opportunity to question. Some of these are L.S.U., F.S.U., Miss. Southern, Florida Southern, Auburn. This includes classrooms except for Florida Southern. Men must wear shirts with a collar when they wear Bermudas.

These are the Facts. I am not telling you what conclusions you should come to, but at least there is more than just "hear-say" for you to go on if you wish to press the issue.

Rene Carrera will look into the prices for Student Congress letterhead stationary.

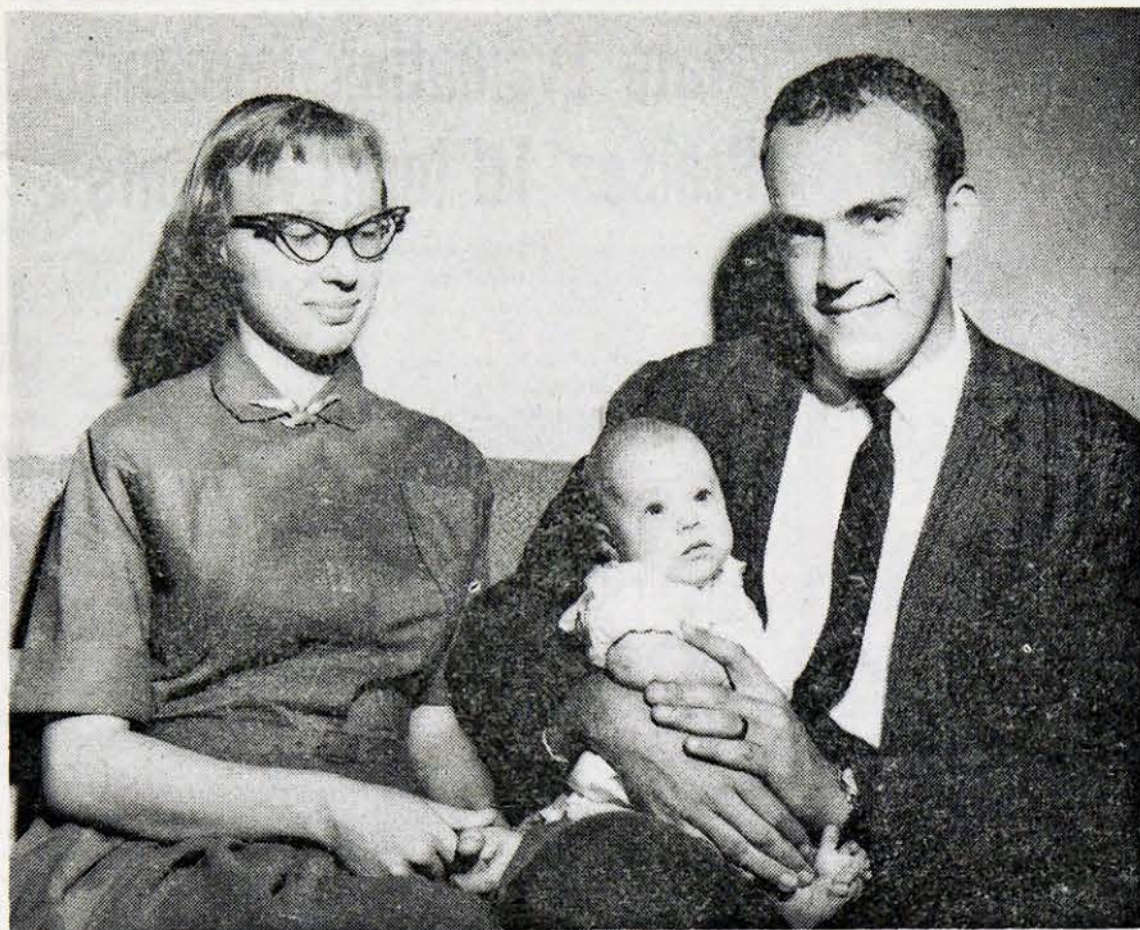
*Andrew Mirabole moved that a suggestion be offered to IFSC recommending that a name band and or name vocalist be obtained for the 1960 Homecoming Dance.

REVIEW OF MY THREE ANGELS

My Three Angels Big Success, Abounds In Audience Appeal

The University Theater ended its already fine season with its best yet "My Three Angels," which began on April 29 and closed May 7 after four performances. Regulars to the University Theater hailed it as the finest production since "Come Back, Little Sheba."

Over the season, it was easily the most appealing to the audience. Tyrone Lavin, Roy Weissinger and Rick Barry (Kutchy) held the audience in the palms of their hands during all four performances as Joseph, Jules, and Alfred, the three convict-angels Lavin, a theater veteran, carried his role as Joseph, a con-man sent to the French Guiana Penal Colony for 20 years, with the case of a professional. His portrayal of both the prosecutor and defense attorney in the mock trial of the wicked Uncle brought him not only laughter but ovations.

Roy Weissinger was the surprise of the play. Playing Jules, murderer of his wife

("She didn't expect me — He didn't expect me") he provided most of the punch lines. His performance was very well brought off. Rick Barry seems to have come into his own in this play. Playing Alfred, another murder, (Of his step-father with a poker,) we can expect bigger and better things from him next year.

Patti Lane was outstanding as the patient and faithful wife of the errant shopkeeper, played by Jerry Wetherington. Mrs. Lane is a newcomer to this year's theater and may well become the long sought after replacement for the talents of Gerry Law and Felicia Dolgin. Carlene Phinney as the debting-drinking customer added just the right touch of the ridiculous and was another surprise.

Joanna Nichols, Budd Adams and Jim Klapps were well balanced in their performances and John Gonzalez seems to have learned a lesson in the theater with his performance of the Lieutenant. He will

probably be a challenge to the Three Angels performance wise next season.

The production, setting and direction were under the guidance of John von Szeliski who made the 20th season of the University theater a memorable one. In announcing the 1960-1961 season, von Szeliski has planned for "The Epic Stage," an arrangement for dramatic readings including everything from Greek tragedy to Elizabethan comedy. The University Theater also plans another original play production. Both the original play and "The Epic Stage" will be Salon Theater presentations. The theater plans to wind up its season with Shakespeare's Romeo and Juliet. Even with the success of "My Three Angels," next season will be the first in which the Salon Theater presentations will outnumber the regular productions of the University Theater.

FACULTY FAMILIES

Introducing The John Leppers

One of the new members of the faculty at the University of Tampa is Professor John Adair Lepper. A native of Massachusetts, he attended Boston University on a football scholarship. After one year he decided to play football as a hobby instead of being under any obligation to the school, so he transferred to Heidelberg College in Ohio. There met his wife, Claudia, and they were both chosen to go to Europe on a student tour which included traveling through seven countries.

In 1957 Professor Lepper graduated from Heidelberg college and was married in September of the following year. He then entered John's Hopkins University in Washington D. C., where he majored in South East Asian studies. After completing graduate school and receiving his M.A. degree, he and his wife moved to Tampa, where he now teaches American Government, State and Local Government, International Relations, and International Organization at Tampa U.

The Leppers recently had an addition to the family, their first child, Anne Adair. Anne is now ten weeks old, "is very fat" (her father says), has just learned to smile, and

is the pride of the family.

Mrs. Lepper attended Tampa U. one semester and plans to resume her studies when Anne Adair is a little older. Professor Lepper also intends to further his studies and receive his doctor's degree as soon as financially possible.

During their spare time they both enjoy listening to classical music. Mrs. Lepper plays the piano and Professor Lepper has recently started to take flute lessons from the first oboist in the Tampa Philharmonic Symphony.

Asked his opinion of the new core curriculum, Professor Lepper stated, "The new curriculum will take a while to develop properly, but I certainly feel it's a step in the right direction. This new emphasis on quality is a healthy sign. I'm especially pleased with it because I feel it will stress the study of international affairs."

Professor Lepper's pet peeves include:

1. a need for better understanding of international affairs by students since, "this is more important than provincial politics".
2. looking at education as a matter of grades rather than a process of broadening the mind.
3. this Florida heat.

New USAF Plan Offers A College Education

A new Air Force plan to offer college education and subsequent commissions to airmen presently in service was announced today by M/Sgt. William Zolman of the Tampa Sector, USAF Recruiting Office.

Called the Airman Education and Commissioning Program, the plan calls for airmen with a minimum of 30 semester college credits to apply for the AECF program to obtain a degree in an engineering or scientific field.

Following completion of up to two years college—concentrated college—the airmen will move to three months of Officer Training School and emerge as second lieutenants.

Starting July 1, the Air Force expects to enter 200 airmen in AECF. Similar numbers are scheduled for enrollment each subsequent year.

Young men contemplating leaving college and entering the Armed Forces are urged to investigate this opportunity for a free college education and a commission through service in the U.S. Air Force.

State Evaluating Committee Praises TU Improvements

Periodically evaluating committees visit the University of Tampa. Recently the Committee from the State Department of Education came to look over the teacher education program because of the many changes which have been made in consultation with the Director of said committee.

Members of the committee were: Dr. Benjamin Rogers, vice president of Jacksonville University; Dr. Eugene Boyde, Assoc. Dean, School of Education of Florida State University; Dr. John Berry, Dean, School of Education from the University of Miami; Dr. Gene A. Battle, Dean, College of Education, University of Florida; Mr. L. E. Swatts, General Supervisor of Instruction of the Hillsboro School System; The Director is J. T. Kelley, Director Division of Teacher Education State Department of Education.

The University passed with flying colors and in commending on the committee's findings, Mr. J. T. Kelley, Director had this to say:

"The committee saw wonderful improvement in the University of Tampa. This improvement was indicated in the selection and preparation of your faculty, in the attitude of the faculty and students, in the total program of education which is offered, and par-

ticularly in the program of teacher education. The committee was impressed with the cooperative endeavors of the staff in arriving at a total university approach to teacher education. This was most realistically presented in the core program for the University which has been developed. You and your staff are to be commended on this program...

Finally, I would like to state that the committee appreciated very much your hospitality and the courtesies which were extended to us by you, every member of your staff and the student body."

Dr. Dwyer, head of the education department here was particularly pleased with the Committee's report and when asked made the following statement:

"I am very happy with the committee's report. Teacher Education at the University of Tampa is a university-wide endeavor and not limited just to the department of education. The preparation that was necessary prior to the visit involved faculty members from all departments of the University."

In my opinion this inter-departmental cooperation is responsible for the fine showing our program made and is the keystone on which future progress will be built."

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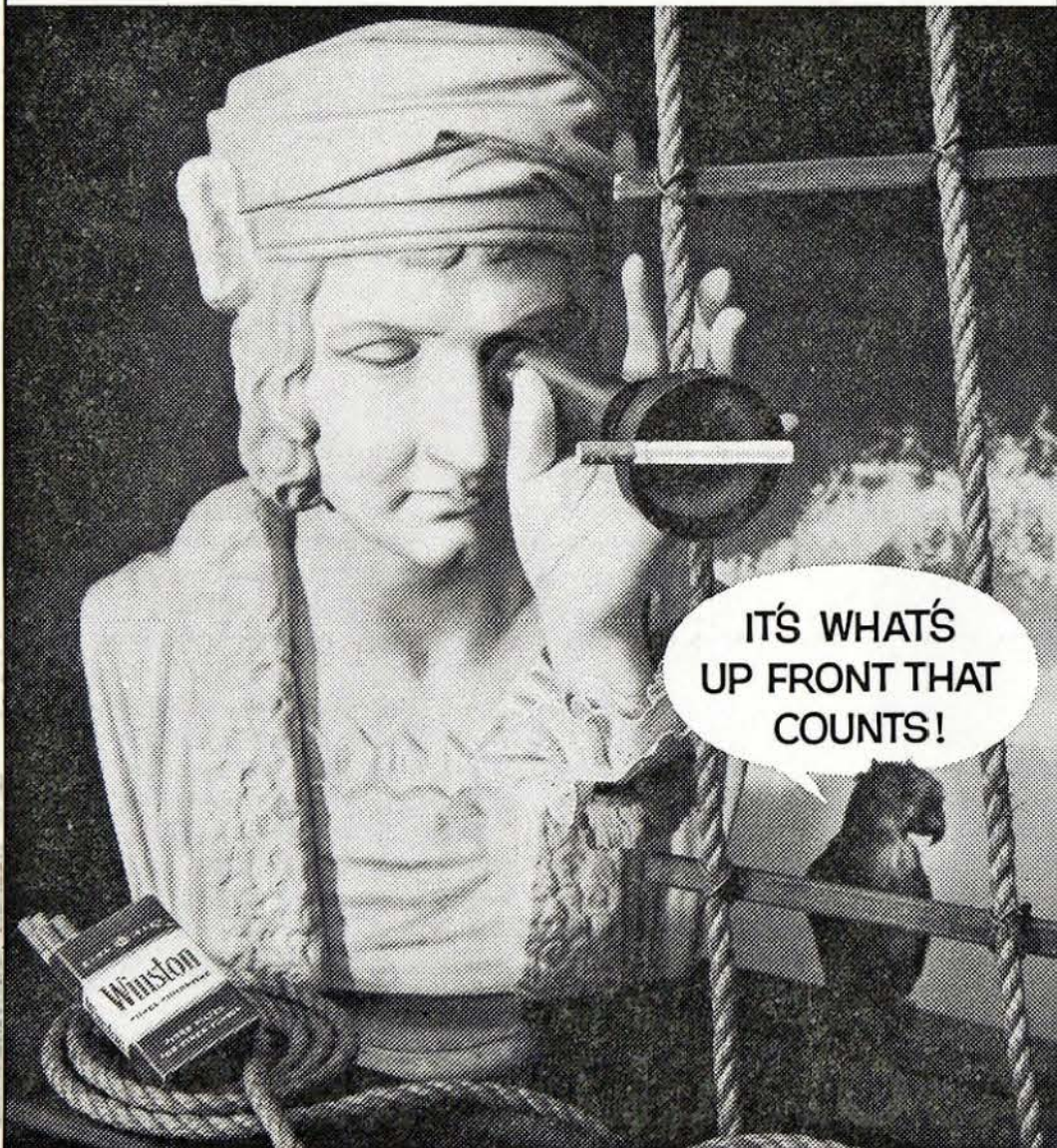
The Veep Speaks - - -

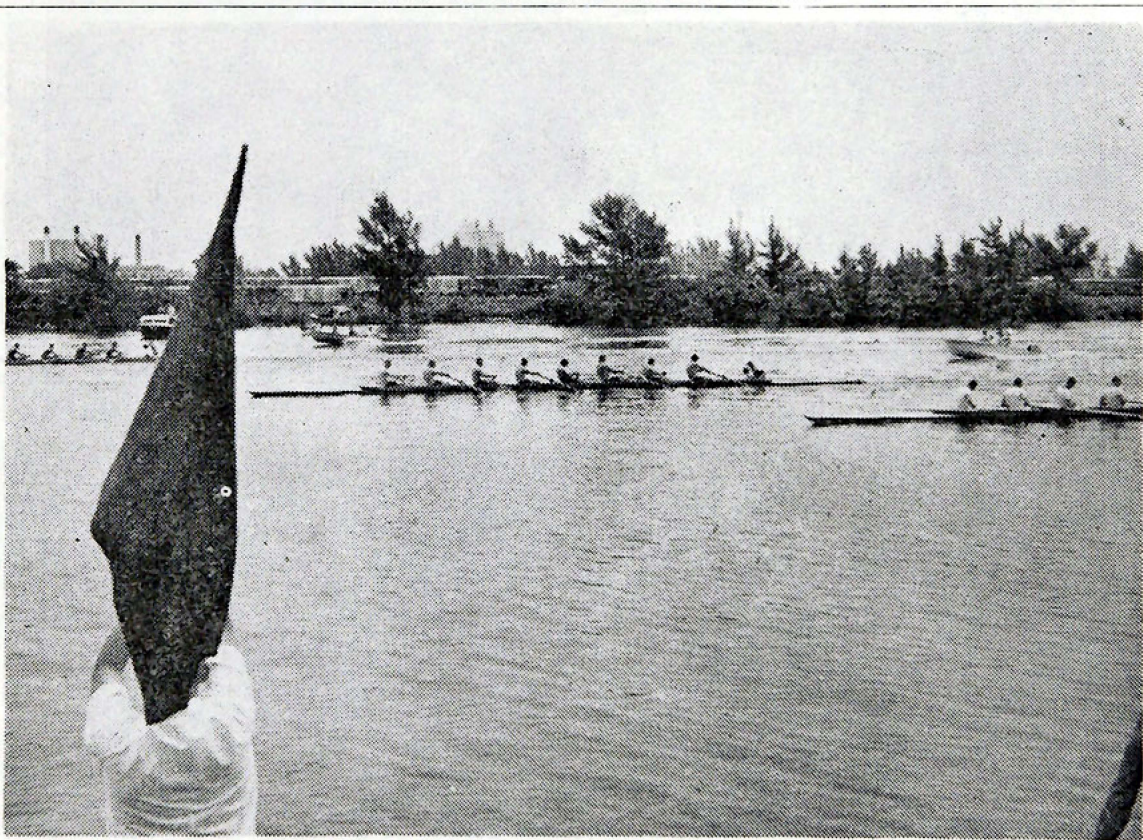
Rollins Cops State Title; Tampa Third

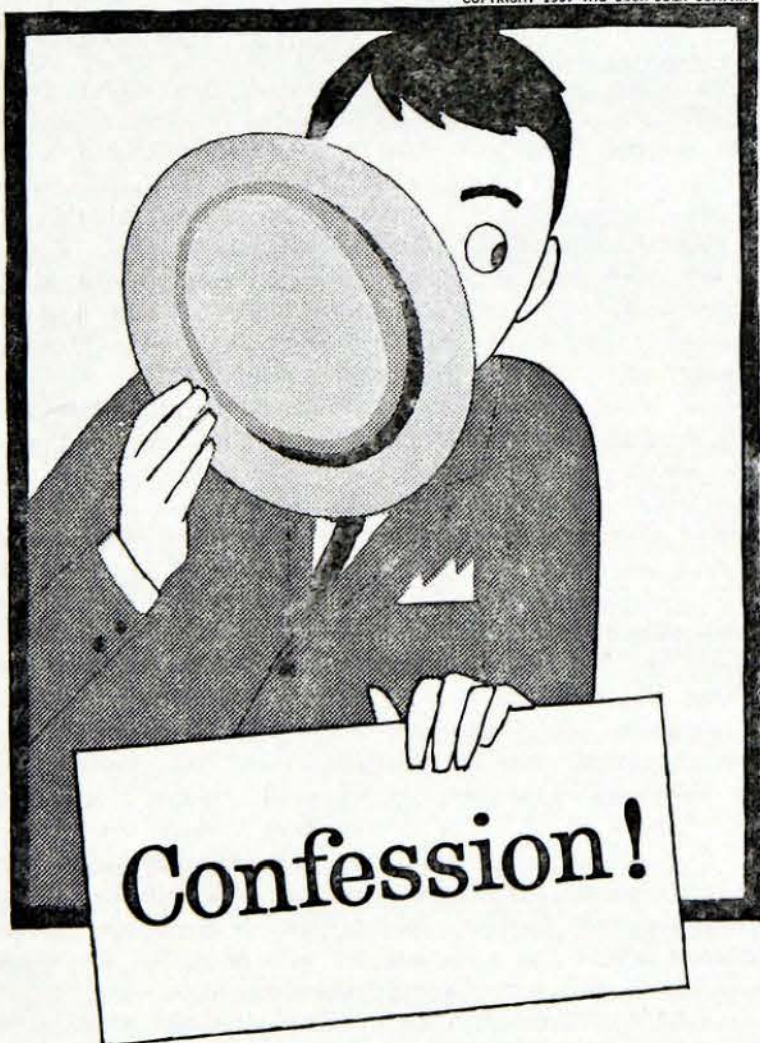

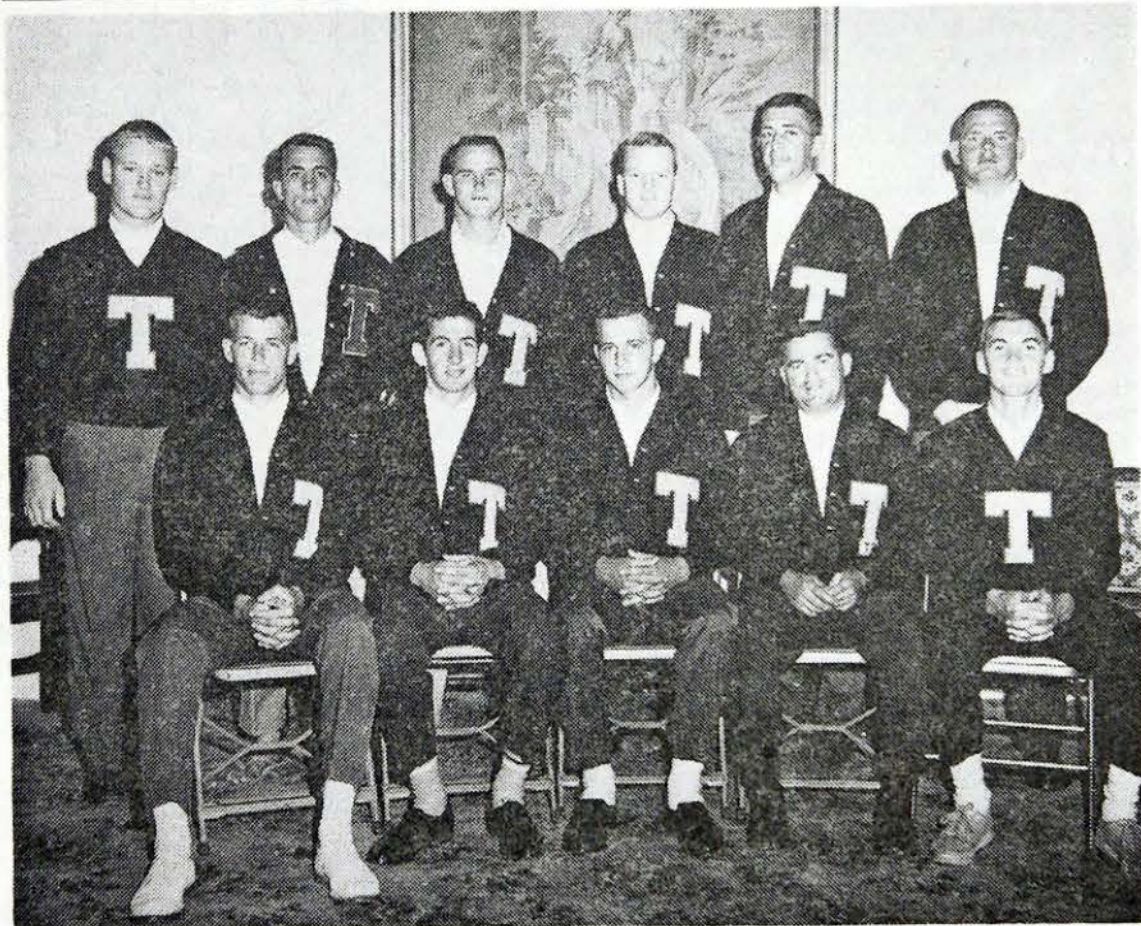
Elected to the office of President for the forth coming year was Charlie McCullers, who will be assisted by Joe
