

WALSH WINS RUNOFF

John Walsh, in a recent election run-off against Jack Spirtos, won the privilege of exercising duties and powers as the new SGA president.

Presently from Pasadena, Calif., John is a junior and a criminology major. He will be graduating in May, 1974.

John has always been an involved student. Former activities include being attorney general, junior justice and sophomore senator of the SGA, Pi Kappa Phi brother, ROTC member, sergeant-of-arms for Lambda Alpha Epsilon, dorm advisor and coxswain on the varsity crew team for three years.

How does he feel now that the elections are over? "I'm relieved a lot. We were all under a lot of tension," Walsh said.

One of John's platform policies was, "Not everything that is faced can be changed; but nothing can be changed until it is faced and we're going to change things."

There are several major problems John plans to solve during his administration. "We'll be working for the students, to get students into the faculty conferences to bridge the gap between students and faculty."

One of John's main objectives is unity. "We want to get the SGA, SPC and the Minaret unified, working together. We don't need cliques. We want people out and involved. We also have to get the administration,

faculty and staff working with the students."

On lowering the drinking age to 18, John said, "If a law is not passed by June, we will go into full swing," working to lower it.

In reference to the parking problem, John stated that he would work for "more parking facilities. Students should get parking priority over non-students because students are paying the bill."

Other goals John plans to work for are publishing a student directory and a guide to off-campus housing, making the "Morning After" an efficient piece of literature, including special events and student announcements, checking into food service and meal tickets, setting up a new swimming pool fund, starting a revenue sharing, and working for more senior privileges.

What did John think of the elections? "They were run the best they could ever be run. The election committee should be thanked for doing all that work. Both the chairman, Bob Briely, and the co-chairman, Ivan Hernandez, did an excellent job. And the workers were great."

And what about his opponents? "I had very tough opposition. There was tough competition in every class. All the people who ran really had to work at it," Walsh insisted.

The spring semester at the University of Tampa will be over sooner than you think, and little signs have been put up around the campus concerning pre-enrollment for fall, 1973.

If you are sure that you are coming back to U.T. next year, it would be to your advantage to pre-enroll. You have a better chance to get what you want; a certain class, a certain teacher, or a certain time.

Your money has to be in prior to May 2. If you are going to take 12 hours or more it will cost \$150, if 11 or under, \$50. To get an appointment you have to pay your debts, and have paid your deposit by May 2.

Registration will be held in the University Union's International Room 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday, May 2 for juniors and seniors; Thursday, May 3 for sophomores, and Friday, May 4 for freshmen.

You can pre-enroll by appointment only. Appointments start Monday, May 7 for juniors and seniors; Tuesday, May 8 for sophomores, and Wednesday, May 9 for freshmen.




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


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Freedom Room Dedication

The University of Tampa's new Freedom Room, donated by UT's Pen and Sword Society and Lt. Gen. Sumter Lowry, U.S. Army Retired, in recognition of Medal of Honor winners Capts. Ronald E. Ray and James A. Taylor, graduates of Tampa, and all members of the U.S. Armed Services who gave so much to make this country free, will be dedicated at 10 a.m. April 26.

Over two years in the making, the room (343) was conceived by Maj. George Quigley, a UT graduate, and went through various stages of development during regimes of Pen and Sword presidents Capts. Ron Dennis (graduated), David Milton and Thomas Smith, the current outgoing president.

The room will be dedicated by President B. D. Owens, who will receive the gift on behalf of the University from Gen. Lowry and Capt. Smith.

Including Gen. Lowry's \$1,000 gift, total cost of the room is \$3,000, but primarily because Pen and Sword members gutted the room themselves before construction and firms or individuals like Harris Paint Co., Beverly Studios, architect J. Priede Rodriguez, George Levy, Waller's Framing and UT's Capt. Al Nicolini donating items, materials or services.

Following the ceremonious ribbon-cutting, refreshments will be served in the hallway.

Delta Sigs Sponsor Second Annual University Of Tampa Golf Tourney

The second annual University of Tampa golf tournament sponsored by the professional business fraternity, Delta Sigma Pi, will be held on Sunday, April 29, 1973, at the USF golf course.

The tourney, an overwhelming success last year, will find all participates possessing an equal chance of winning, regardless of proficiency.

This year, "winter rules" will provide the guidelines for the tourney. Basically, this means that players' may improve their lie on the fairway within a clubs' length, however, no closer to the hole.

"Winter rules" are, without doubt, the most lenient and will result in a better tourney for all who enter. All entrants will receive a copy of the local rules prior to actual play. Scoring will be determined by the handicap method with the low gross determining the winner in all ties.

As a result of donations from many of the area merchants, the trophies and prizes will probably come close to matching the number of participants. The perpetual trophy will again be awarded to the team with the low net score, that is, after deducting their respective handicaps.

Fans will have an opportunity to find out Friday at 7:30 p.m. when Coach Dennis Fryzel's young club concludes spring practice with the annual spring game at Tampa Stadium.

Offensively, fans can be expected to watch a



talented unit that will include junior-to-be Freddie Solomon, fullback Morris LaGrand plus tailbacks Frank Pitts and Ken Moorehead. Also expected to see plenty of action running the ball is sophomore Mark Deeb who has been impressive during spring drills.

Solomon has also been impressive during the spring, not only running, which everyone knows he can do well, but also passing. His chief receiver will be Mark Wakefield, who should set a school reception record next fall, and sophomore-to-be Anthony Williams, who caught two passes last fall, both for touchdowns.

On the defensive side of the field, the new coaching staff has spent the spring trying to locate replacements for a group of talented seniors — John Matuszak, Wilbur Grooms, Dave Bankston, Dave Tomeo, Eddie Caldwell and Bob Bissell.
