NASH HIGGINS SPEAKS

Last Wednesday the student body had the pleasure of listening to Coach Nash Higgins for a few minutes.

The new coach was introduced by President Spaulding who briefly sketched the history of the university and talked for a moment on the pleasant relations with Mr. Higgins in the past.

Coach Higgins expressed his happiness at being back "home" in Tampa, since he coached in Hillsborough for several years. He said that he had every confidence in the school; its president; its dean; its future.

He spoke of the program which he hopes to put into effect as soon as he takes up his active duties here. Embracing all of the minor sports, track, tennis, golf, aquatic sports, etc. with the majors, football, baseball, and basketball, in a well rounded inter-scholastic and intra-mural programme, there is no reason why each student should fail to have a good, varied course in sportsmanship and physical education, said Mr. Higgins.

Touching on the close relations of the boys to a coach, and on the development of sportsmanship in the girls through athletics, the coach described the condition in many schools were the athletic "Tail wags the dog." He showed that most of the first string men anywhere are also smart men scholastically.

Mr. Higgins seems to feel that he is particularly fortunate in having an absolutely free hand here; as he puts it, no alumni to kick him around.

The coach comes to Tampa from Florida U where he has been in charge of the track work. In addition to his work there, he has had much experience in high school and college coaching. He has, in the past, been connected with Notre, Dame, the University of Southern California, and Chicago University, among others. He was signed with the University of Tampa recently for a period of five years.

CONSTITUTION ACCEPTED

The constitution, yes, the mythical constitution, has at last been drawn, presented to the students, accepted, and approved by the faculty. The constitution is short and to the point. It is the product of several months' labor by the committee appointed to draw it, and it carries with that labor several suggestions and some very favorable criticism from Judge H. P. Baya.

Several amendments were offered from the floor, the principal changes being these: first that all class officers as well as the president of the student body be elected on the second Friday in May, second, that the principles of initiative, referendum, and recall be incorporated in the document, and third, that the constitution takes effect at once, rather than at the first of the next Fall term.
