

Colleges Must Avoid Politicizing To Keep Freedom To Learn, Delo Says

Attempts to politicize institutions of higher learning can lead to their destruction, according to UT President David M. Delo.

Dr. Delo told the 40th annual UT Opening Convocation colleges should remain neutral in order to maintain an atmosphere of freedom to study and learn and to discuss objectively all aspects of the

He said this freedom is possible only within a framework of regulation which protects the individual and the basic mission of the institution.

He pointed to the student who considers the campus a refuge from common justice and the "so-called campus intellectual elite" who maligns the American system which provides his livelihood as leading malefactors in the blight of discontent threatening higher education.

The greatest problem on American campuses, according to Dr. Delo is the lack of definite goals. He said at colleges like the University of Tampa the learning task must be personalized. "Our goal should be close knit cooperation between students, faculty, administration and trustees," he said.

"We are providing the mechanism through student representation on an increasing number of

Total Involvement UT Credo for '70's

Credo for the new decade in higher education at the University of Tampa is total involvement.

Students, faculty, administrators and community leaders will be working together in unprecedented ways to enhance the growth and well-being of each other, the institution and the community.

Trustee Chairman Fischer S. Black said board committees for Student Affairs, Educational Affairs, and Planning and Development, previously restricted to trustees and counselors only, each will have two voting student associate members and two faculty representatives this year.

Black said the changes are being made to enable the institution to relate better to "our modern democratic society."

Dr. Floyd E. Allison, acting dean of faculty, said students also are being named to faculty committees. Faculty committees for Religious Activity, Special Events, Curriculum, and Student Life will have student members for the first time this year. Discipline and Publications committees previously have included students and will continue to do so.

Allison said the faculty committees will include two or three students chosen from a wide variety of study departments to provide "a fair balance of representation." He said he expects the students to be given voting privileges in most instances, as such has been the custom at other institutions utilizing students on faculty committees.

"A published poll of institutions in the Southern Accrediting Region shows 57 per cent include student members on the Curriculum committee," Allison stated, "and 44.6 per cent grant the students voting rights." He said 18.7 per cent utilize students on board commit-

Mini-mesters Are Latest UT Rage

"Mini. Midi. Maxi." may sound like something Julius Caesar might have said about Cleopatra's wardrobe, but the literal translation from the "kid-Latin" is purely academic: "A *mini*mum of study at mid-term brings maximum benefits."

On this premise the University of Tampa is basing its new plan for sandwiching a complete session of full scale study courses between the end of Christmas vacation and the beginning of spring semester.

According to Dr. Floyd E. Allison, acting dean of faculty, the break between fall and spring semesters has been doubled to approximately five weeks to allow time for an accelerated intersession, January 4-25, without forfeiting Christmas vacation, December 18-January 3.

In this program a student takes only one three or four-hour course. Class meets five days a week instead of the usual two or three

days. "In this way a student accumulates approximately the same number of in-class hours he would get in a similar course during a regular semester," Dr. Allison ex-

plained.

"In addition to selected courses offered in the regular curriculum the intersession will include many unique study opportunities such as local and foreign travel, research projects or work-study programs and advanced seminars or lectures," Dr. Allison said.

Drama Department Opens Theatre Season With Williams' Dynamic "Glass Menagerie"

For its first dramatic fare of the 1970-71 season the University of Tampa drama department offers the unbeatable combination of an internationally celebrated actress and a great contemporary classic

Miss Eugenia Rawls, beloved of New York and London theatre buffs, will play the lead role of Amanda Wingfield in Tennessee Williams' "Glass Menagerie", Oc-tober 21-24, at Falk Memorial Theatre. Curtain time is 8:30 p.m. throughout the run of the show with student matinees at 10:30 a.m., Wednesday through Friday.

During a six-week period before and after the production Miss Rawls will act as artist-in-residence, marking the first time in UT history that a world renowned performer has coached the school's drama students.

Besides conducting acting seminars in preparation for the performances and critical analysis workshops after the show closes,

Miss Rawls will lead question and answer sessions at matinees attended by secondary school students from various Florida coun-

"Glass Menagerie" is the Williams masterpiece about a teenaged girl whose dominating mother has driven her into such a state of withdrawal that the girl's only friends are a collection of miniature glass animals.

Tickets, now on sale at the Falk Theatre box office, are priced at \$2 for adults, \$1 for students at evening performances and 50 cents for students at matinees.

The season's drama offerings promise something for theatre lovers of all tastes. Dickens' "Christmas Carol" heralds the Yuletide holidays, December 1-5, followed by "Taming of the Shrew", February 23-27.

Providing the rollicking finale for a jam-packed season will be an original musical, "Lady Bountiful", by director Petti, scheduled for production in April.

Second Million Dollar Year for U. of Tampa

1969-70 Support **Passes Last Year** By \$100,000 Plus

Gift records toppled as the University of Tampa finished fiscal 1969-1970 beyond the million dollar mark in gifts and grants for the second consecutive year. This year's all-time high of \$1,156,-090.37 edged out the past record set in 1968 by \$132,608.02.

The annual Forward Fund topped its most ambitious goal ever of \$375,000, raising over \$50,000 in new gifts from more than 200 new donors.

University Vice-President for Development and Public Relations Robert B. Gronlund termed the year's campaign "a real team ef-

"Excellent volunteer leadership and the full cooperation of everyone made this year's record performance possible," he said.

Harris H. Mullen, chairman of counselors and publisher of Florida Trend magazine, headed the 1970 Forward Fund drive. Other gifts were solicited by University President David M. Delo, faculty members, trustees and other volunteers.

Of the million dollar plus record total, \$307,917.37 represents unrestricted gifts for the current operating budget. \$11,856.56 was received for unrestricted scholarships.

The \$836,316.44 in restricted gift income was highlighted by \$494,302.70 in Building Fund contributions, followed by \$216,554.76 in restricted current operating gifts, \$117,033.98 in restricted scholarships and \$8,425 for endowment purposes.

Government, both local and federal, contributed the largest single amount — \$337,552. Friends were next with \$269,306.02, followed by corporations with \$235,982.18.

President's Report

As inflation and the reach for quality increase operating expenses, the University of Tampa must depend more and more on the gifts of alumni and interested friends. These gifts represent the difference between mediocrity and quality; between a static condition and one of progress; between fiscal stability and eventual bank-

By way of comparison, in 1958, the year I assumed the Presidency of the University, our budget was

\$950,000. In 1970, it is in excess of \$5,000,000. Gifts from all sources in that first year were lass than \$100,000. In 1969-70, as indicated in the following Report, they are slightly more than \$1,000,000.

Most of the contributions listed herein are for special purposespayment of pledges for construction of Merl Kelce Library, for books, and for the science laboratories. These are worthwhile and necessary, but we also need large sums which are unrestricted to be used for day to day operational needs-renovation, replacement of equipment, and salaries of employees.

A recent national survey shows that the private colleges face grave financial difficulties in the next few years. Inflation; competition from low-cost, tax-supported colleges; a singular lack of interest in private higher education on the part of the Federal government; the pecularities of the young not understood by alumni and the older generation who are able to give-all these compound our difficulties.

During the past decade we have continuously tightened our management procedures at the University in order to reap the maximum benefit from each dollar expended. Gift dollars have been utilized scrupulously to accord with the donors' wishes. Under the new institutional calendar we are making maximum use of our physical facilities. But this is not enough. Over the next few years, if we are to continue to progress, we must create new and improved procedures-and these are now being studied.

We are deeply grateful to all those whose gifts in the past have enabled us to begin our fortieth year as a stable institution which has demonstrated much improvement during the past few years. We will need the assistance of these and many more to meet the challenge of the '70's. I hope that all of you will continue to invest in a greater University of Tampa. Smuld

UT Slips By Tight Money, Says Black

The University of Tampa, so far, has managed to escape the storm threatening institutions which have overextended themselves financially during the past decade, according to UT Board Chairman Fischer S. Black.

"Six private institutions have closed their doors this year due to a lack of students. Forty-eight per cent of UT's total student population this year — about 900 students — are new students."

Ironically, the strategy for maintaining healthy growth at UT in the near future is tied to stabilizing student population. "Cost per student above a total of 2,400 would be substantially higher than the average cost below that number," Black said. "With limitation of student number there will be time to improve and refine the academic program at minimum cost."

A curriculum consistent with the liberal arts concept, "but sufficiently flexible so that specific needs and interests of the individual student can be met," also was cited by Black.

"We plan to move ahead of our existing position by evolution rather than through radical changes so that we may provide the community with useful educational opportunities on a continuing basis," Black concluded.

Spartan Football Good Or Great?

The University of Tampa football team goes big-time with a vengence this fall.

The Spartans will play Miami, Vanderbilt and Florida A and M plus such small college standouts as New Mexico Highlands, Idaho State and North Texas State.

Coach Fran Curci says that it will have to be a "wait and see" season. "We will have a good football team," Curci said, "and we could have a great team." He cited ten new faces on the starting defensive eleven and seven on offense as reasons for his cautious optimism.

Curci, in his third year as Spartan coach, has had 7-3 and 8-2 seasons. In the process he has brought fame, attention and professional scouts to Tampa and the University. Highlight of last year's season was a losing thriller with Florida A and M before 46,000 fans in Tampa Stadium.
