Economic's Majors **Publish Booklet**

Under the direction of Charles L. Hyde, assistant professor of economics and business, a group of senior economics students at the University of Tampa has compiled and had published a booklet titled "Some Aspects of Growth and Development."

Professor Hyde said this was a voluntary project and the result of the economic students' senior thesis papers in the class 'Economic Development and Growth." There were 14 contributors with Dennis Schill, president of the economics honorary, as editor.

Papers by students appearing in the booklet include such topics as "Population: Some Social and Cultural Aspects," "Government Objectives for Growth and Development."

Kingston Trio Coming To Curtis Hixon Nov. 7

Af a meeting with Mr. Sid Morse, Jr., Director of Curtis Hixon Convention Center, it was agreed to engage the Kingston Trio for a performance at the Convention Center on November 7, 1965.

On the recommendation of Mr. Morse and Mr. Manley, it was decided to price the house at \$2.00, \$1.50 and \$1.00. A capacity house at these prices will bring in \$8,040. At a 60% house it will bring in \$4,824.

With the Trio at \$2,500; Curtis Hixon rental at \$900; taxes at approximately \$505; insurance, head usher, head ticket takers and the like, we can expect an approximate expense of \$4,100. This would include approximately \$500 for advertising and \$500 for taxes which, both Federal and State, would be included in the prices above.

The University is expected to furnish the ushers as well as door guards.

Mr. Morse will arrange to contract for the tickets immediately. If they can be put on a reserve basis, he will order them accordingly. If not, they will be simply by color and section. They will also put our tickets in their four distribution locations, such as Belk Lindsey and the like in town. Both believed that distributing the tickets to the High Schools would be a good idea.

We have now committed ourselves to the performance on November 7, at Curtis Hixon Center, at 8 p.m., with a \$2,500 guarantee versus 60%, whichever is greater, and the minimum house scaling of \$8,040.

Minaret Prepares To Reach For The Sky By Moving To Its New Fifth Floor Office

The first of November may find the Minaret staff in their new offices on the fifth floor. The new quarters are now undergoing remodeling under the direction of Mike Hildreth,. This will include painting, paneling, addition of new doors and equipment, and eventual air-conditioning.

Plans for the move were initiated because of the bad conditions under which the Minaret staff must labor in its present offices. The basement location is plagued by frequent floods, stifling heat, and lack of ventilation. For two years conditions have been getting worse and the quality of the University newspaper has suffered accordingly. Present hazards became so bad that early last spring they were called to the attention of University President Dr. Delo who made a personal inspection. The Publications Committee, headed by Colonel Hutchins, also made an inspection and not long after, Mr. Hildreth suggested new quarters be arranged on the fifth floor.

The new offices will be cleaner and more conducive to work. Numerous windows provide good lighting and proper cross ventilation.


Attendance for the first three home games this year has averaged around 8,000 fans and the SPARTANS have thrilled them in
