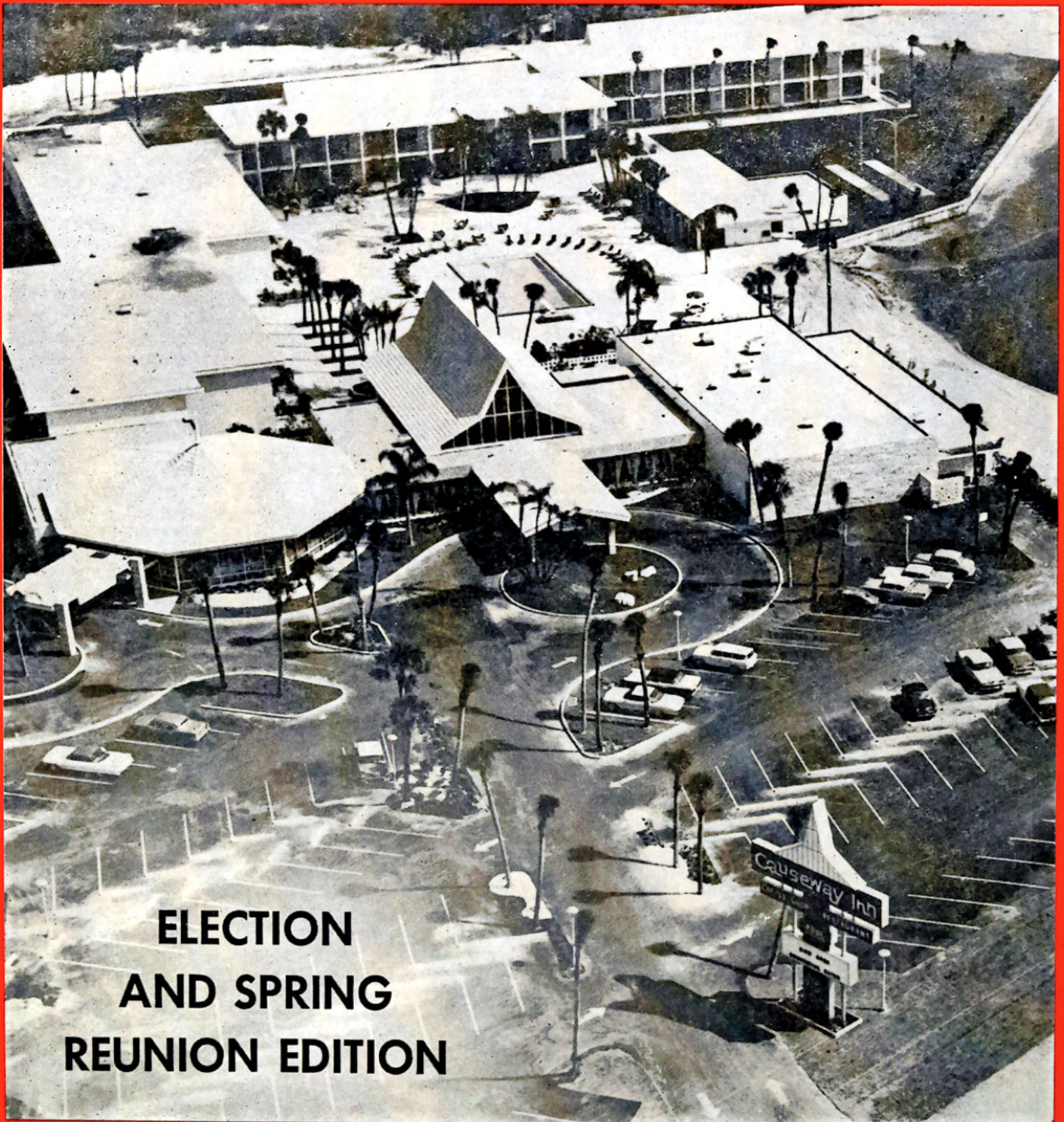

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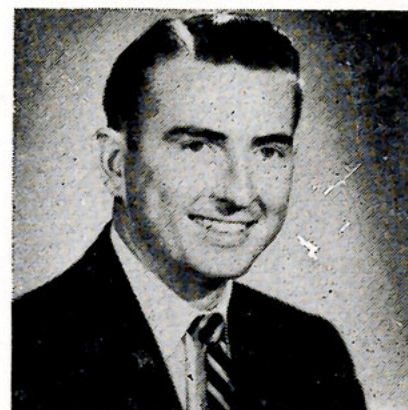
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COVER STORY . . .

President's Annual Report

The Alumni Association has experienced a year of successful projects as a result of hard work and cooperation on the part of the Board Members and interested alumni:

Beginning with the first meeting of the new term, the Alumni Association has been called upon to pool its efforts with other university projects. First on the list was the University Concert Tour under the direction of Dr. Harvey Maier. Much credit can be given to Dr. Maier for a successful "first" for the university, and to George Crites and Sam Giunta who assisted Dr. Maier in making contacts with alumni living in the tour areas. As a result of their efforts, Dr. Maier was able to accommodate 50 members of his group in housing and meals en route. As a result of the University's first Concert Choir Tour, much publicity was given to the university. Dr. Maier was pleased with the reception given to his group.

Under the direction of Dr. Stephen Speronis, a network of university projects was started as an opening gun for the Student Center Fund. The Alumni Association pledged \$15,000.00 to help furnish the new Student Center and Dick Cole, Chairman of the Fund Drive Committee, launched his opening with a Kick-Off Dinner at the Rocky Point Restaurant last October.

Homecoming, 1961, was a great success. An alumni poll was taken for an afternoon football game. Returns were 5 to 1 in favor of it. The Alumni Association proudly boasts a precedent has now been set so that future Homecomings will feature an afternoon game which will enable a program of smoothly run activities, beginning with the parade, climaxed with a dinner-dance in the evening. MacDill AF men participated for the first time with their own Open House prior to the dinner at the Hillsboro Hotel. Their report was a very successful attendance.

The issue of retaining football for the university was widely discussed. The Alumni Association went on record as being strongly in favor of it; T.V. coverage and public opinion was in favor of it and it now stands that the university will continue its football program.

The Spartan Bowl Game was proposed too late in the season and Coach Huerta was unable to work out a program. It will probably become an annual event in the future.

Alumni projects which followed in rapid sequence were Coffee Day, Roller Rink Day, Holiday on Ice, Phanathon and others. Holiday on Ice was a definite disappointment. Whether Tuesday was not an ideal day for alumni participation is not known. Some said it was a school night and the family could not attend. Coffee Day was successful in that it indicated to us the interest and co-operation of the local merchants. A vote of thanks must be given to Jack Bradford and Colby Armstrong for launching this project. Phon-A-Thon was, by far, the most successful. It indicated the value of personal contact. Alumni never before heard from cooperated and pledged. Valuable alumni information was received which you may read about in future bulletins. We cannot overlook giving proper credit for the original idea to Mrs. Shirley Adema and to Colby Armstrong for making available his offices and trunk lines for the length of time Phon-a-Thon was in progress. We also want to thank some of our Tampa alumni for their assistant at the switchboard: Alumni George Smith, Gene King, Dick Swirbul; faculty member and alumna Alice Rodriguez who brought along five students to help out; faculty wives Mrs. Maier, Mrs. Baker, Mrs. Thompson, Mrs. Park, Mrs. Allen, Mrs. Lovely, Mrs. Bettman, Mrs. Dwyer, Mrs. Umholtz. Mayor of Jacksonville

Mayor — Commissioner Haydon Burns of Jacksonville, a native of Louisville, Kentucky, was born on St. Patrick's Day, March 17, 1912, and is now 50 years old. He moved to Jacksonville at an early age and was educated in the Duval County public school system. Later he attended Babson College at Babson Park, Massachusetts, and is a member of the University of Florida Alumni Association, the Florida Chapter of Phi Sigma Kappa, and the Florida Chapter of Sigma Phi Epsilon.

The Mayor's political career has been little short of phenomenal. A public relations and business consultant for many years, he entered politics in 1949 because he felt his city needed bold, imaginative, aggressive leadership. As a newcomer to the game, he was given little chance when he announced for the office of mayor. But to the surprise of many, he swept to a smashing victory.

He was reelected in 1951, 1955, and 1959, each time in the first primary. And each time, despite strong opposition and large fields in the Mayor's race, he polled more votes than any other candidate on the entire ballot.

The reasons for the Mayor's remarkable political success are not hard to find. For many years before he became Mayor, Jacksonville had been stagnating and even slipping back in some respects. Some areas of downtown Jacksonville were virtual slums, traffic problems seemed almost insurmountable, the abandoned wharves on the St. John's River were so run-down and obsolete as to be described as the worst eyesore in any major American city.

But when Burns — described by a Miami newspaper as "the master magician" — took over as Mayor, things began to happen. Today, Jacksonville is prospering and growing as never before.

Haydon Burns To Speak At Spring Reunion

The physical changes in the face of the city are striking enough in themselves. Block after block of grimy, ugly waterfront is no more. Abandoned wharves and dilapidated warehouses have vanished.

In their stead stand the following: four blocks of off-street parking, a modernistic county courthouse, a new 16 story skyscraper city hall, a new municipal auditorium, the largest retail Sears-Roebuck store in the country, the new 17 story Atlantic Coast Line Railroad headquarters building. And the remarkable part of it is that all this was accomplished without any federal aid and without any increase in taxes. In fact, Jacksonville's tax rate is one of the lowest among Florida's major cities.

Other municipal improvements include a new sports coliseum that well may be the finest in the south, and a \$15,000,000 sewage system.

The four blocks of off-street parking spaces developed under Mayor Burns' leadership have done much to alleviate Jacksonville's critical traffic situation. And the \$100,000,000 Jacksonville Expressway Authority program, which Burns has pushed hard ever since he took office and which is now nearing completion, provides a great deal of additional help.

Burns' achievements have been widely recognized far beyond the limits of his city and he has received many honors as a result. A past president of the Florida League of Municipalities, he is presently serving as President of the U.S. Conference of Mayors. He is a former member of the executive committee of the American Municipal Association and in 1961 received a Distinguished Service Award from the association.

In 1957, Burns was selected as one of eight official delegates from this country to the International Municipal Congress at the Hague. Earlier, he was one of 11 American mayors selected by the Christian Palestine Committee to conduct a political and economic study tour of the Middle East Arab countries and Israel. He also has served as an official delegate from the United States to the Canadian Conference of Mayors, and in 1961 as an official delegate to the World Conference of Local Governments in Washington.

The Mayor and his family attend the Southside Methodist Church. He has been a steward of the Methodist Church for 27 years.

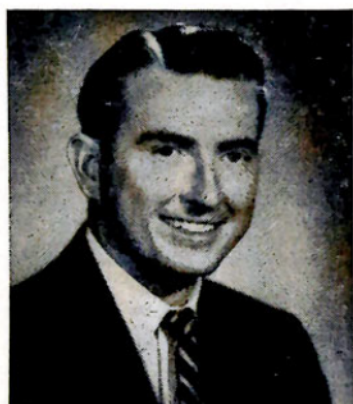
