Thirty-two stalwart Spartans limbered up for football action again as Tampa U's season of spring training got under way Tuesday, giving the new coach Flucie Stewart his first look at the boys on the gridiron.

The group was the University's largest spring squad, but there are still more to come-half a dozen or so others are working at the fair, and will be out next week. They offered to give up their jobs for the grid grind, but Coach Stewart wouldn't hear of it.

Five From Stetson

Eight seniors were missed after their years of dependable service, but the squad was augmented by the frosh squad plus five former Stetsonites, who have changed their names from Hatters to Spartans-Mac Shadman, Willard Knight, Paul Straub, Art Spoltore and Bill Brennan,

The workouts will be short, Coach Stewart said-from 3:30 to 5 or 5:15 o'clock. They started out with calisthenics and leg exercise, and discussions of formations and plays, and won't have any rough stuff until next

Practice Games

With the point of view that "you con tell a football player best in a real football game," the coach said, they'll have two or three practice games during the spring workouts.

"I like the spirit of the boys," said "Coach Flucie," as he's sometimes popularly called, "and I believe they can play football. They're in good physical shape, too."

Champ Williams is assisting in the spring coaching. There's been some talk of an assistant coach, and the names of Jack Alexander, former Duke star, and Tom Brown, of Catawba, have been mentioned,

Alas! alack!! (quote the operetta) Deep in the clutches of the "demon." Eye Cue was forced to make a fateful decision.


