


### **GUY EULIANO**





### **Judicial Openings For 1979-1980**

There are a total of eight positions that need to be filled between both the Student Judicial Board and Traffic Court for next year. The Student Advisory Board will be interviewing and selecting among the interested applicants on Friday, April 13. All students who are interested in serving on either the Judicial Board of Traffic Court can pick up applications in the Student Affairs Office, Plant Hall, Room 301 today through Wednesday, April 11. Interested candidates can also secure an interview time slot with the secretary.

Participating on one of the boards (i.e. Judicial, Traffic) can be a very challenging opportunity. The appointed students will be able to take part in court procedures such as: determination of guilt or innocence, deliberations, and decisions of appropriate levied sanctions. The idea is to give the students input into the enforcement of university articles and traffic regulations.

It should be noted that for both the Junior Justice on the Judicial Board and Junior Judge on Traffic Court, the applicants must meet qualifications outlined in Article II Sections A & E in the Student Handbook pp. 55-56.



### Career Corner

Cover Letters - from Career Planning and Placement Today, "C. R. Powell

All letters of application should be personalized to be most effective. An obviously reproduced form letter should never be sent. The placement office or a number of directories in libraries can supply names of persons to contact, preferably employment managers or supervisors in departments of interest. As a last resort, a functional title such as Personnel Director, Sales Manager, or President, if it is a very small firm, can be used.

A number of examples in the book, Career Planning and Placement Today, give typical cover letter formats. Unlike the resume, a preprinted letter is unacceptable.

The cover letter should never exceed one page. Emphasis is placed upon facts and brevity. In the applicant's own style, it is necessary to say, "I am interested in you; here is why you should be interested in me; can I have an interview appointment?" Sounds simple - it isn't!

Introduction. The first paragraph must attract attention. The reason for writing should be stated by naming the position for which applying, and how the opening was heard of or how the employer's name was obtained. One technique is to straightforwardly ask in the opening sentence a question, "Are you interested in employing a hardworking, energetic and aggressive recent college graduate in a sales position? I have the personality and ambition to advance into marketing manage-

ment in a few years." Whatever the opening, the letter must spark enough interest to cause the employer to want to press forward.

Body. In the second paragraph the reason is stated for writing to this particular employer and for wanting to work for the organization. Concrete reasons should be emphasized and flowerey phrases describing growth, challenge, advancement, etc., avoided. In this paragraph, the applicant's specific challenges and aspirations should be mentioned. Why success can be achieved should be supported. How education and past achievements will support the capacity for which consideration is desired must be indicated.

The resume data should not be repeated any more than is absolutely necessary. Only a few seconds are available to capture the employer's imagination, so wasted words must be avoided. The meat of the resume should be emphasized and personal qualities documented.

The third paragraph should be short and refer to the resume. It should emphasize career interest and personal qualities. This message must get through! For a third party referral, or mutual acquaintance the party's name and how highly the company was recommended should be stated. Wanting to work for that employer must be emphasized!

Close. The closing paragraph is just as important as the opening. The response desired should be stated. Phrases like "if you have further interest, please write," should be avoided. Since the purpose is to get an interview, it should be requested in this paragraph.

One very positive response is to state that a call to the firm will be made on a specific date to arrange a specific time. Few people will turn down the

call. Often it is wise to tell the employer that plans to be in the area during a certain week have been made and that a call for an appointment will be made at the end of the preceding or the beginning of the next week. Arrival of the letter should be timed so that it arrives one or two days before the call and five to ten work days before the visit to the firm's community, if it is different than the applicant's.

If requesting information concerning the existence of an opening, the applicant should end the cover letter with a specific question.

Few employers are likely to encourage applicants, unseen, to come in for appointments if it is necessary to travel more than 50 miles. Qualified applicants may be waiting in the lobby so employers would hesitate to hedge on the inquiry; therefore, the initiative must be taken by the applicant after sending the letter. However, it is not desirable to force a "no" decision without getting a chance for a personal presentation of one's qualifications.

Summary. The cover letter is likely to get a favorable response if it contains a tone of modest confidence. The closing paragraph might, therefore, assume that the employer is interested and that the next logical step is an appointment. Asking for a specific day for an appointment is another approach. Still another idea is to ask for information on specific jobs, a job description, an employment brochure, or an application blank. Keeping the reader in mind when writing the letter and keeping the letter concise by focusing on a specific position, gives an idea of what might be done if the applicant were the employer. Is the letter effective enough to elicit a written positive response if an opening exists? With the cover letter and resume finished, most of the written communication is complete. Preparing an interview presentation is the next step.

#### Risk-Taking

Most of us are familiar with the expression that "Anything worth doing is worth doing well," and probably most of us agree with it. I would like to make a small, but significant change so that it reads "Anything worth doing is worth doing poorly." Heresy! you say, but let's take a closer look at what this means. It does not mean that you should strive for poor performance or establish failure as a goal. What it does mean is that if you think you might want to try something new, go ahead and try, even if you are not perfect at it. For many of us, our initial attempts at walking, riding a bicycle, giving public speeches, or submitting a professional article for publication met with poor results. Little children do not expect or demand themselves to be perfect at walking, so they continue to try until they have mastered the task. The same is true for anything we do, although we have differing levels of mastery. But how many times have you refused to try something new and different because you knew you wouldn't be perfect at it? Perfection, by humans, is unattainable, yet we often demand it of ourselves. If we don't demand perfection, then at lease we believe we must be thoroughly adequate and beyond comment or criticism before we

act. Not all people do this all the time, but it is safe to say that there are probably one or more areas in your life where you do this.

By refusing to take risks because of your perfectionistic beliefs, you prevent the possibility of failure, humiliation, or embarrassment which may result, although you are most likely over-exaggerating its effect. Not only are you avoiding the unlikely possibility of being criticized, but you are also losing out on a whole lot of opportunities to experience something positive.

Risk-taking is rarely easy and it certainly is safer to hold back. Not taking risks can also be self-defeating because you give up longterm gain to avoid short-term pain. If something is worth doing, do it even if you never become perfect at it (and you won't). Take a risk knowing that it might take a while to improve. Keep in mind the rational and probable results of performing poorly, not the exaggerated ones that are preventing you from trying. Remember that it is more important to try than it is to try to be perfect. But also keep in mind to try your best, not the best.

If you find yourself in a position where you avoid taking risks more than you like and want to do something about it TAKE A RISK stop by the Counseling Center in Plant 300 and let's talk about it. Next week: Dealing with Stress.

### Correction

Dr. Lois Benjamin, faculty member of the Ad Hoc Committee on Freedom and Responsibilities, was incorrectly quoted in last week's **Minaret**. Her comments should be amended as follows.

"The only function of this committee is to make a broad statement in support of the 1940 Statement of Principles on Academic Freedom. It is not necessary, and would seem most inappropriate, to establish a review board or any other committee to pass judgment on speakers who are invited to campus."

In addition, Benjamin was summarized as saying she agreed with Board of Trustees member Louis de la Parte, when he said that it was ridiculous to have a speaker that discusses the philosophies of Lenin or Karl Marx when the subjects have never been taught, or when students are unfamiliar with and perhaps subject to the emotional lure of these viewpoints. Benjamin did NOT agree with de la Parte. "I don't feel that it is necessary to prepare students for a particular speaker. What I do see is the need for learning and developing of the intellectual tools necessary to analyze any speaker who comes onto campus," said Benjamin.

Finally, Benjamin should have been quoted as saying, "Both (Carmichael and the South Africans) have a right to speak on campus, but here you have the furor generated on campus by Stokely Carmichael and here you have someone speaking representing (a country that is) oppressive. Are we to condone that?"

The Minaret regrets these errors.

### O'Donnell Scholarship Established

A Paul D. O'Donnell Memorial Scholarship has been established at the University of Tampa in honor of the 53-year-old author, engineer and civic leader who died Sunday in Tampa.

O'Donnell was a former director of production resources for Westinghouse Electric Corp. and prior to becoming ill was director of generation projects for Florida Power Corp.

The scholarship was endowed by a \$5,000 gift from associate and long-time friend Al Lang of Tampa. Friends of O'Donnell have been asked to fund the scholarship through the development office of the University of Tampa. Dana Todsen, UT Annual Giving director, is coordinating the scholarship fund.

O'Donnell's interests were widespread, covering culture, business, industry and education. He also demonstrated an interest in youth as president of the Junior Achievement of Greater Tampa and a member of the board of the Gulf Ridge Council of Boy Scouts of America.

He was on the board of the Florida Gulf Coast Symphony, a director of the Exchange National Bank of Tampa, a member of the Board of Governors of the Greater Tampa Chamber of Commerce, a past president of the American Institute of Industrial Engineers and a past member of the visiting committee of the board of trustees of Lehigh University.

O'Donnell was listed in Who's Who in the World, and in America in Finance, Industry and Engineering. He was the author of the book, "Production Control," published by Prentice-Hall, and "Management Handbook and Industrial Engineering Handbook," published by McGraw Hill.

He is survived by his wife, Clare; sons Daniel, David and Edward, and daughter Ellen.

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### Check Cashing Closing

Effective April 13, the Check Cashing Service will close operation for the semester. The service does not operate during the last two weeks of each semester. However, cashier's checks, money orders, traveler's checks and University checks will be honored.

### **Parking In Front Of McKay Hall**

A number of students continue to park between the post office and McKay Hall throughout the day. Campus Police have been in the process of having cars either ticketed or towed away. The reason why this road must be kept open and cleared of cars is because the US Postal Service needs to have access to the Post Office three times a day. They are having difficulty getting the mail delivered to the university because of cars blocking the roadway. However, the US Postal Service has threatened to drop their service to the university, if cars continue to block the road for US postal trucks. So if you want mail to come to the University of Tampa, please park your car in areas designated for student parking. If this problem continues to exist, you may have to go downtown for your mail.

### **Measles Outbreak**

As most students are well aware, there has been an outbreak of measles on campus this past week. I would like to inform students of the Health Center's policy concerning a patient who has been diagnosed and confirmed as having a communicable disease. The patient must be confined or isolated in the contagious stage. If the student lives in the residence hall, he or she must stay in the Health Center. If the student lives off campus, he or she must be treated in the Health Center but may stay in his/her apartment. You will not be allowed to stay in the residence hall except under extenuating circumstances. Therefore if you are told to report to the Health Center, you must report. Failure to do so could result in your immediate removal from the university as a threat to the health of others.


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

The Spartans met Harvard in a doubleheader last Tuesday in the continuation of the tournament. In the first game, Harvard got two quick runs off loser Lou Daniele (1-2), without the benefit of a hit and pitcher Rob Alevizos of Harvard made it stand up, as he kept the UT bats in check, allowing only four hits and no runs. Joe Salanitri was the hitting star for UT, going two for two.

The Spartan bats woke up in the next game, as the Spartans collected eight hits, in scoring six runs, with the aid of three Harvard errors. Using a new line up, the Spartans scored four runs in the first inning and never looked back. Bob Kinckiner, now the lead off hitter, started off with a single. Frank Ramppen got on on an error by the third baseman. Andy Faza then got on on the benefit of an error by the Harvard centerfielder, which scored Kinckiner. Larry Reasonover then doubled; driving in two more runs. Joe Salanitri got his third hit of the day, as he drove in Reasonover for the fourth run. The Spartans scored twice more, once in the second and again in the fifth, but the initial four were all that starter Mike Moran needed, as he breezed to his third win against four defeats, while holding the Harvard bats in check, allowing only three hits, and one harmless run. Offensive stars were junior Larry Reasonover, who went two for three, with two doubles, two RBI's, and a run scored, sophomore Frank ramppen, who went two for three, with two runs scored, and freshman Joe Salanitri, who went two for three with an RBI.

But the Spartans weren't dead yet as they battled back, sending eleven men to the plate, while scoring five runs to

take a one run lead. Junior Braulio Pardo started it with a walk, and, after Bob Geist struck out, was followed by consecutive singles by Kinckiner, Ramppen, and Faza, with Faza driving in Pardo. Reasonover followed with a fielder's choice, which saw Faza forced at second, but scored Kinckiner. Joe Salanitri reloaded the bases with a walk. Rich Vollrath followed with a single that drove in Ramppen and Reasonover. Frank Yurchak walked, and Pardo, batting for the second time in the inning, singled in the fifth and final run of the inning in Salanitri. But the Spartans could not hold on, as Harvard, with one out, loaded the bases on a single, a walk, and a hit batsman. Senior Jim Budnick then gave way to Kris Kelley. Kelley got the third out, only after allowing a hit that scored the tying and lead runs for Harvard. This was enough, as the Spartans could not get any offense started in their half of the inning.

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
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
