The University off Tampa is noted as having the largest percentage of its students turn out or vote in student elections in the State of Florida. Lets not have our record

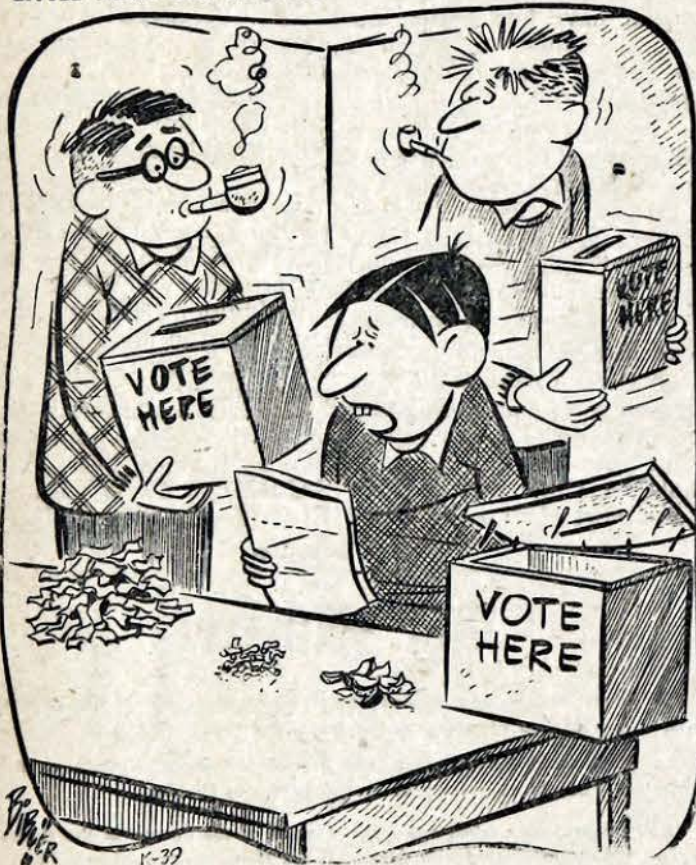

Southern, two lengths back, finished in seven minutes, 13 seconds. Tampa, the defending champion, was four lengths behind Southern.

Tampa pointed for Southern in the state race, having been beaten twice by the Lakeland team.

Making the trip to Philadelphia are John White, Nick Nickols, Henry Valencia, Art Blau, Joe Hewlett, Jack Harnett, Don Felts, Larry Mason, and Jerry Voyemm along with Coach Bill Stalnaker.

It will be Tampa's last race of the 1956 season.
