DEFENSE TRAINING DEPT. OFFERS FIVE NEW COURSES

Five new Engineering Defense Courses were offered at the beginning of the Summer Session by the University of Tampa, working in coopcration with the Univerhaity of Florida.

These courses were offered as a result of many requests received from various industries in Tampa. No charge is made for instructions in any of these courses.

The courses were list od as Elementary Electri cal Engineering, Elementary Surveying, Structures, Applied Mathematics and Foundations of Engineering.

The hours range from three hours per evening, three evenings per week, to eight hours per day, five days a week.

This department of the university has shown rapid improvement since its beginning January 20 the ivy was observed. Many of the details of handling the courses have been handled by Robert Kasriel, graduate of 1940, who is Administrative Assistant to the President and Coordinator of National Defense Courses.

Approximately 225 per sons are now enrolled in the defense courses. Classes are given in Engineering Drawing, Marinepa will cover only a Design, Airport Design, Mold Loft Layout, Principals of Chemical Engincering.

STATE LEGISLATURE GIVES TAMPA U. FINANCIAL ALD

A permanent, system atic finance program for the University of the recent State Legislature.

Under a new law enacted at the session, the County of Hillsborough is enabled to levy a one-mill tax on all real and personal property in the county. Approximately \$25,000 a year from this levy will go to the university to provide funds for operabilities and make it postion of the institution. The remainder of the tising the county.

Sponsored by the Tampa Chamber of Commerce, the legislation gives a sound financial backing to the university, making it eligible for endowments and other benefits.

The Legislature also passed a law permitting the City of Tampa to lease the present building to the university for a period of 99 years. Under existing laws before this, the city was prevented from entering into any long-term leases and the building was rented to the university on 10-year terms.

Another law affecting the university designated its law library as a State Depository.
