During the war, he was overseas as a captain in the field artillery. Since that time, he has been employed by several large companies as field engineer and inspector.

UNIVERSITY ACQUIRES NUCLEUS OF A MUSEUM

Due to the generosity of friends of the University, we have recently received two excellent maseum collections which are, no

doubt, the beginning of a real University Museum.

The Stebbins Collection is largely Natural History and History Material. It consists of four distinct groups of specimens. One group contains diversified collections of rocks, minerals, and fossils; a second group is made up of Pre-Columbian North American Indian relics: spear heads, arrow-points, tobacco pipes, and pottery fragments; the third group is a biological collection illustrating Marine

of the Gulf of Mexico; the fourth group is a Historical collection consisting of Civil War relics and a coin collection. lection.

Of quite a different sort is the Collins Collection. This consists of objects of art, antiques and historical objects.

Mr. Webb, with the assistance of several students, is now cataloging the collections and preparing them for exhibition.

CORNELL MAKES GIFT TO LIBRARY

Through the efforts of Mr. George Howell, a member of the Board of Trustees, the University of Tampa has acquired over 650 books from Cornell University, of which Mr. Howell is an alumnus.

The books, many of which are quite valuable, are being catalogued and repaired by Anna Regener, librarian, with the assistance of Mary Agree Troopsees

of Mary Agnes Thompson. The tentative list includes 114 volumes of Literature, 142 of Physics, 68 of Mathematics, 73 of Chemistry and Engineering, 52 of Law, 50 of Philosophy and Religion, 43 of Geology, 27 of French, 25 of German, 24 of History and 22 of Economics.

As there is no room for additional books in the Hillsborough library, they will be placed in a separate room but will be available to any students who are in need of them

COURSE COMMENT

Well folks, this week we leave the calm but hectic everyday life of the North American college student, and move to foreign parts. A discussion of the second year Spanish course is now in order.

In the first place, the student who takes Spanish 200 must have two years of high school Spanish, or the equivalent, and one year of college work in this language. Believe me, these prerequisite requirements are not the least bit too high.

The course includes a general survey of Spanish literature, and a review and expansion of grammar already studied.

During the first semester, the students read two representative Spanish novels in class, and two more as outside reading. Exercises, translations from English to Spanish, are part of the work, but students are allowed to write their reviews of outside work in Eng-

The second semester is a different story. All reports and exercises are written in Spanish. The semester begins with the years allotment of grammar work. The remainder of the term is the same as the first semester except that the amount of work is increased, and that the English language is eliminated from the class-room.

That's the hard part of Spanish 200; now for the fun. The class is small, and the students get lots of individual attention. Also, a great deal of conversation in Spanish is carried on. It's quite a thrill to converse in a foreign language. After the assignment is covered, open discussion of Spain and Spanish affeirs is held. Mr. Nava, the instructor, is a native of Spain. His views on Spanish life in general bear the mark of authority. More power to Spanish 200, in general, and Mr. Nava, in particular.
