INDUSTRIAL PSYCHOLOGY **NOW MORE IMPORTANT**

Editor's Note: Industrial psychology is becoming increasingly recognized as a vital factor in personnel departments throughout the business world. Industrial psychology and the related field of vocational guidance are currently being extensively utilized by businesses of all sizes, as well as helping individuals plan their careers more intelligently.

Dr. James J. Kirkpatrick is typical of the many outstanding leaders of our community. He is affiliated with Byron Harless and Associates, Inc., in the capacity of Vice President and Director of the Industrial Division. The firm, which renders consulting services to business and industry on personnel and management problems, is the largest psychological consulting firm in the South.

Dr. Kirkpatrick has a formidable background both professionally and academically. He is a transplanted Tennessean having been raised in Johnson City. In preparation for his profession, he covered a wide area not only geographically but also in the field of psychology.

He received his undergraduate training and Master's De- John White, III. gree from the University of Tennessee. While a graduate student, he served as research assistant to the Psychology Department, conducting research on psychological measurement techniques. conducted research projects dealing with selection, training, and evaluation of personnel. In the light of personal experience as a World War II Air Force Pilto, the major portion of his work at the American Institute for Resarch was centered upon aviation personnel. He has accomplished much in this phase of psychology, and has published many articles on personnel research. Included in his thorough and experienced researching is the development and validation of selection procedures for civil airline pilots and flight engineers, and evaluation and training procedures for Air Force air crew members.

An active participant in community affairs, he is chairman of the Vocational Guidance Committee of the Tampa Kiwanis and renders further service to numerous civic clubs and organizations in the form of lectures and discussions on vocational guidance and industrial psychology.

His membership in the American Psychological Association, the Industrial Relations Research Association, and the Nello Rimoldi, and Ed Steph-Southern Society for Philosophy and Psychology confirms that he is as active in his field nationally as well as locally.

As has been indicated Dr. Kirkpatrick is a definite authority in the field of industrial psychology. He described the field as "comparitively small" and revealed that development since World War II has advanced quite rapidly with particular emphasis on research. Due to the constant and increasing demand for psychologists, students holding Master's Degrees are vir-tually assured an above average job with, generally speaking, exceptionally good remuneration. He stated, "More and more positions are being opened in industrial psychology by both the Government and private enterprise and while the Ph.D. degree is not now a requirement for the industrial psychologist, the student who goes all the way for the higher degree is likely to have even greater opportunities."

When asked if he would advise any student, presently in college and undecided on a course of study, to enter the field of psychology, he replied, "If the individual possesses sufficient interest and ability to undertake the desired graduate work, I would wholeheartedly recommend that this course of study be pudsued."



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


