Dell Davis, candidate for Vice President of the Student Body was born 20 years ago in Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. In 1963, he graduated from Lee High School in Springfield, Virginia.

Mr. Davis' activities include: Pi Kappa Phi Social Fraternity; freshmen class Representative; Cabinet, University of Tampa; Chairman, Homecoming '65; Pi Delta Epsilon National Honorary Collegiate Journalism Fraternity, pledge; Cheerleader, two years; and Minaret, Student Government Reporter.

If elected Mr. Davis promises the following: "It is a necessity for any person running for the office of Vice President to have had previous experience in Student Government in order to know the many problems that are to be faced. In the past two years that I have worked with Student Government I have seen it grow and improve. It is my hope that if elected I may further improve the Student Government and the University of Tampa. 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EDITORIAL . . .

The Editorial Staff of the Minaret, having witnessed the revitalization of Student Government under the present administration, feels the need to lend support to those candidates it feels are best qualified to further Student Government as a vital reality.

For the office of President of the Student Body, the Minaret supports Gary Garbis.

The decision to support Gary Garbis rather than Kevin Hurt was not a unanimous one. We regard both as fine gentlemen and distinguished members of the Student Body. The decision was, therefore, not one based on personalities, rather it was based on displayed qualifications. The position of President requires more than willingness to serve. It requires, from one chosen to serve, the time and stamina to achieve substance from his efforts. The Serendipity Singers will be on the University of Tampa campus on Monday, April 26. The performance will be held in McKay Auditorium. The price will be — U. of T students \$1.00 and adults \$2.00.

SERENDIPITY . . . translated from the original Greek, is a word meaning “an unexpected discovery of a new and happy event,” and so it is with the remarkable group known as the SERENDIPITY SINGERS.

The creative vitality and enthusiasm of the Serendipity Singers has propelled their meteoric rise to fame in an incredibly short span of time.

Bryan Sennett, along with Brooks Hatch and Mike Brovsky originally formed a trio while attending the

University of Colorado. Their musical aspirations far exceeded their size and so they added bass player, Bob Young; twelve-string guitarist, John Madden; and tenor guitarist, Jon Arbenz who were also fellow students. They began by performing at University parties and for local civic and social groups. Six months later, the group enlarged to its present size by the addition of Tommy Tieman, a talented tenor and guitarist from the University of Texas who had been working with pretty, blonde and impish Diane Decker as a comedy duo. Their most recent addition is talented Lauree Berger, a singer from Pittsburgh, Penna., whose exciting vocal quality rounds out the group to a perfect musical team of nine.

Their first major nightclub appearance was as headliners at the

New York's BITTER END . . . a coffee house owned by Fred Weintraub who is well known for having discovered such notables as Peter, Paul and Mary; Woody Allen and Bill Crosby and many others.

The group's first recording, an album for Phillips Records, was a national hit, from which came the smash single “Don't Let The Rain Come Down.” In a matter of weeks, it rose to number five position on the nation's music popularity charts. Since that time, they have recorded two more albums for Phillips, the last of which became “the rage” in its first month due to a song called “Same Old Reason.”

The Serendipity Singers have appeared on six ABC-TV “Hoote-nanny” shows and most recently on the Jack Paar Show.
