# Cars Without Stickers To Be Towed From Campus

## CANADIAN SCHOLARSHIPS NOW AVAILABLE FOR 1959-60

Five new fellowships for study in Canada in the fields of the arts, humanities and social sciences for the academic year 1959-60 were announced today by the Institute of International Education. The application deadline is April 15, 1959.

The scholarships are offered by the Canada Council for the encouragement of the Arts, Humanities and Social Studies. The stipend is \$2,000 for the year plus round-trip travel. The Council may consider renewing an award for another year upon evidence of satisfactory work.

Applicants in the arts may be artists, scholars, musicians, writers and teachers who have shown exceptional promise in their work. Candidates applying for academic study can do so only for work leading to a master's degree or the equivalent. Awards for academic study will be made subject to admission to a Canadian university. Students applying for institutions where French is spoken must demonstrate a good knowledge of the language.

Preference for the awards will be given to those under 35 years old.

Application forms may be secured from campus Fulbright advisers or from the Institute of International Education, 1 East 67th Street, New York 21, New York. Final selection of awardees will be made by the Canada Council in Ottawa.

## CITY OF TAMPA TO ENFORCE CURFEW

Due to recent outbreaks in juvenile crime the citizens of Tampa have become aroused demanding immediate action and a quick solution to the problem. So the city of Tampa establishes a curfew. This is always one of the first mechanisms thrown before the public in an attempt to pacify them and make the officials appear to be "doing their best." But let's take a closer look at the curfew. I charge it is absurd and ridiculous accomplishing nothing save the harassment of the decent kids.

Curfews have been in use since the 1800's and still haven't proved their worth. They do serve a fine "pass-the-buck" type of philosophy. Laymen consider them as appropriate for keeping the child home. Parents use them as a means to enforce "getting in" by a certain hour. Police regard them as a legal means for questioning juveniles loitering around the streets. Lawyers debate their constitutionality. Ah — but youth — the very ones who are most affected have no voice in this matter . . . they are not consulted.

If children are unhappy in their homes no law will keep them there and the curfew just serves as another item to use their ingenuity in violating. The curfew doesn't change the delinquent's personal character, attitudes, or needs. It only limits the scope of his operations. Anyhow, today the adolescent can steal a car or ride with an older licensed delinquent traveling to other parts of the county or surrounding counties

where no curfew exists. Another equally potent danger is that the law will just drive youngsters into other forms of delinquency behind closed doors.

Actually, a very small percentage of delinquent acts occur after the curfew hour. For example, a study of school vandalism shows that this type behaviour occurs mostly on weekends and during daylight hours. A study of delinquency made in Connecticut revealed that 86 per cent of all delinquent acts were committed before the curfew hour with only 14 per cent occurring afterward.

The constitutionality is questionable too. In 1957, a circuit judge in Miami ruled the curfew "unconstitutional, arbitrary, unreasonable, and discriminatory." To impose on 97 per cent of the decent juveniles in the city of Miami in an effort to curb the trouble-making 3 per cent was discriminatory.

Delinquency exists twenty-four hours a day. Juvenile vandals do not confine their activities to the period after 11 p.m. or any other curfew hour. Time and again these ordinances have been tried throughout the nation without success. Teenagers bent on getting into trouble are not stopped by a law which says they must be off the streets by a certain hour. This is a fact that any rational thinking person knows only too well. It only hurts the decent law-abiding youth who may thus be forced into delinquency themselves by violating this law.

Your reporter interviewed Dean Setear the other day with reference to our current parking problem. There are several factors I feel should be called to your attention with which you may not be acquainted.

To date the University has not had any car towed away. The cars were towed away by order of the neighboring tourist club. The cars that were towed away had no University sticker on them. If they have stickers, the police usually inform the Dean's office who in turn notify the student to move his car.

Dean Setear explained that the reason the University has not ordered cars towed away is because they would be hitting students as well as tourists. Many students still don't have parking stickers on their cars. These are essential and free for the asking in the Dean of Men's office.

**ALL STUDENTS PARKING ON CAMPUS MUST OBTAIN PARKING STICKERS IMMEDIATELY!** The University will begin having all cars without these stickers towed away in the near future. A definite deadline will be set and announced soon. If you are too lazy to drop in the Dean's office and register your car — then you deserve to have it towed away. If we are to keep the tourists from using our limited parking area YOU must cooperate.

Our deepest thanks to Mr. Huskisson, manager of the State Fair Grounds, who is trying to help alleviate our parking problem by allowing us to use the Fair Grounds for parking — free of charge. There are two restrictions which must be strictly adhered to if the privilege is to be continued:

1. Use the regular entrance and exit at all times (located back of the basketball courts). Never use the North Boulevard entrance for entering or leaving.

2. The grounds must be vacated by 4 p.m. every day. **THIS MEANS THAT EVERY CAR MUST BE OUT BY FOUR O'CLOCK.**

Remember, this is a privilege — **NOT A RIGHT** and everyone must cooperate. Surely this is not too much to ask of you.

The Dean further stated that he is truly "sorry but there will be no bus service between the Fair Grounds and the University." It would seem that some students feel there should be. We must have teamwork if we're going to lick the parking problem. If we are to win our current battle with the city we must unite and pull together! Together we win — divided we lose.

## LAST EDITION OF MINARET STIRS POLICE DEPT.

Who says a college newspaper isn't influential? After the last edition of the Minaret was published, the Tampa Police Department exhibited it at a meeting to discuss the parking problem. So far, they haven't come up with a solution . . . but at least they are aware that a problem exists.

## WHY DOESN'T THE TOURIST CENTER COOPERATE WITH TAMPA UNIVERSITY?

The cars that have been towed away in the past were a direct result of phone calls made from the tourist center, not the university. If they even bothered to check with the university the cars could have been moved by the owners, thus saving the students involved the sum of \$8.00 per car. Now you will ask, "How" does that affect me? . . . Here's the answer . . . here are fifteen hundred students at this university if each student complained to the proper authority, for example, Mayor Nuccio, maybe some action would be taken to force the tourist center to cooperate, but to let us use the parking lot when it is available. Or better still, maybe we could move the tourist center? The tourist center not only aggravates the parking problem but their loud speaker disrupt classes so that they have to be dismissed. This deprives the students who pay a "fair" tuition for the privilege of attending said classes.

## IS THERE AN ANSWER TO THE PARKING PROBLEM?

The parking problem is so acute that this editor wonders if there is an answer. With 1500 students, there is actually on campus parking for only 350 cars. Should they confiscate Plant Park? Build an airdrome parking lot? Provide helicopters? Tear down the auditorium? Wipe out the tennis courts? Dredge out the river? Do away with the new dorms? or move the university? Maybe you have a feasible plan, why not make it known? We accept all letters of recommendation. Just drop them in the Minaret office anytime. I dare YOU!

## STUDENTS GRIPE LOUD AND LONG . . . BUT DON'T ACT

I suggest that you read the column on this page entitled ACT OR SHUT UP. This is sound advice. We admit we have a problem, but it takes more nerve than any student has shown this editor to solve it.

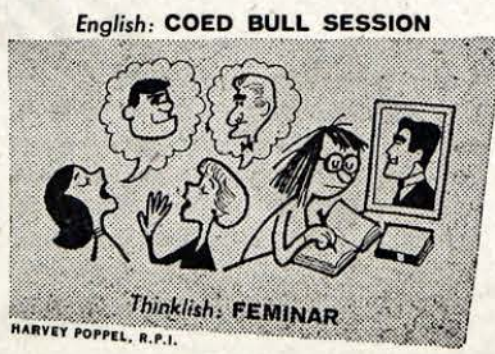

Mrs. R. Richard Black recently told the Tampa Civitans of her plans for a "big brother" movement here aimed at aiding rehabilitation of children confined to the County Juvenile Home.

Mrs. Black urged that all civic clubs appoint a Juvenile Home Committee and that each club buy some equipment for the Juvenile Home. This is the most important and essential project to be proposed for some time and one that has been needed for a very long time. The "big brother and big sister" movements in Northern cities have met with tremendous success in reclaiming young lives from the road to crime and turning them into decent citizens. It can be just as successful here — IF it is really supported by a truly interested community. Anyone not sincerely interested will be better off not starting this work as more harm than good will be accomplished.

Many American college and university students engage in this work, especially majors in Education, Sociology (Social Work), and Psychology. I see no reason why T.U. students should be the exception.

During the spring of 1949, a group of twelve students at Lafayette College in New York set out on a program of contributing their efforts to the curbing of juvenile delinquency. They became "big brothers" to twelve boys ranging in age from eight to fourteen years, who had experienced difficulties with the law. Several times each week and on Sundays the students entertain the youngsters at fraternity houses, join them in recreation, and take them on hikes. It is planned to expand the program in the future so that each boy who has been before the local juvenile court will have a "big brother" at the College.

There is no excuse for the various organizations here at T.U. as well as individual students not engaging in the "big brother" plan. I admonish you to at least give it deep and careful thought. It would be good training for you as well as serving your community — and most important of all sal-
