U. OF TAMPA JOINS REGIONAL GOV'T GROUP

The Student Senate of the University of Tampa is now affiliated with the Southern Universities Student Government Association, a regional organization of student governments and publications.

Delegates from Tampa attended their first SUSGA conference Friday and Saturday, April 24 and 25 at Auburn, Alabama, on the campus of Alabama Polytechnic Institute.

Phil Rotolo, Student Body President, Lloyd Hines, vice-president of the Sophomore Class and Dale Garland, vice-president of the Freshman Class, attended the meetings.

The conference was to promote a better working relationship between the universities and colleges of the South. Sessions of the conference were devoted to student entertainment such as concerts, dances, lectures; traffic problems including automobile parking, speeding, regulations; student publications; Code of Ethics and Honor Courts.

The delegates will report their findings and recommendations in a formal report to the Student Senate.

Tampa University Debaters To Meet Harvard University

The internationally famous Harvard University debaters have accepted Dr. Edward Palzer's invitation to meet the University of Tampa debaters in the top forensic event of the year.

This is an exclusive for the University of Tampa because the Harvard team will not meet any other Florida college this year, nor in fact, any other college in the entire southern area. The University of Tampa can be proud of this distinction.

Although this is the first forensic meeting between the two schools, it is not the first contact. The last took place in 1936, when Harvard was celebrating its Tercentenary. On that occasion, universities and state departments from all over the world sent in congratulatory messages Harvard University had been in existence for three hundred years. It is not only the oldest college in the United States, but the oldest one on the continent of North America.

Historical annals reveal that the University of Tampa also sent a congratulatory message at that time, which read as follows:

"To Harvard University, upon the completion of three hundred years of uninterrupted service in the cause of Higher Education."

Dr. Speronis Talks To Foreign Diplomats

Dr. Stephen L. Speronis recently represented our University at the Sixty-third Annual Meeting of the American Academy of Political and Social Science held in Philadelphia. While at the conference, Dr. Speronis met and talked with eighteen Foreign Diplomats. He reports that it was very interesting and informative.

Dr. Speronis talked with the Soviet Representatives at great length, especially with Vladimir S. Alkhimov who stressed his desire for increased trade between the United States and the Soviet Union. Mr. Alkhimov also said that they want more and more U. S. citizens to visit Russia.

Wilhelm G. Grawe, German Ambassador to the U.S., stated that Germany wants independence for their whole country and will fight for it if necessary.

The conference also pointed out that we can expect trouble with Russia for the next twenty to thirty years, but that the danger of nuclear warfare is greatly exaggerated. NATO and the U.S. remain the main Russian target while the Middle-East is in serious danger of being the hot bed of the cold war for some time.

Dr. Palzer Replies To Dr. Griffin On 'Barbarism' Charge

Dear Martin,

You may be interested in knowing that none other than Harvard University officials were concerned about the problem of civilizing students. In 1660 Harvard had erected the first brick edifice on the college grounds, which had rooms for some twenty of the "aborigines". In fact, Harvard's object as stated in its charter was "the education of the English and Indian youth of this country in knowledge and godliness." This is the 1660 spelling which also allowed "schoole or collidge."

I do not know what progress Harvard has made in erasing barbarism since its founding. We will know more in May when the Harvard University debate team will meet ours here in our own campus halls.

I note that you lament that after fifteen years of your best effort you can count only one civilized student.

Of course I cannot resist putting in the "commercial" here. The latest approach in speech education includes not merely elocutionary skill, but training to promote more courteous as well as creative listening; devices in delayed reaction in speech, checks against oververbalization, and a means of controlling emotion as well as merely generating it. Semantically, it sets safeguards against the "allness" statement, where the individual fails to qualify, index, date, hyphenate, and to say "et cetera."

This type of training seeks to encourage the timid, but it also discourage the already bold in their egocentric extrovertic speech behavior. This no doubt irks some people who want to be rewarded for what should be toned down instead of pumped up further.

Thus the new school is as much concerned with the appropriateness of the communication behavior as it is with the "effectiveness" as measured by a mere elocutionary standard. I know that you would say a hearty "Amen!" to all this, although I was puzzled at your ironic reference to personal improvement courses, especially since clinical psychology and counselling also operate in this category, more or less.

How much "de-barbarizing" takes place in spite of any college's best efforts will probably never be known. However, I do not feel that you believe what you have said about your own-observed results. Anyway, it makes for colorful oratory for the student assembly. Now we may all look forward to evidences of Harvard University's success as well as our own in the process of civilizing "barbarians."

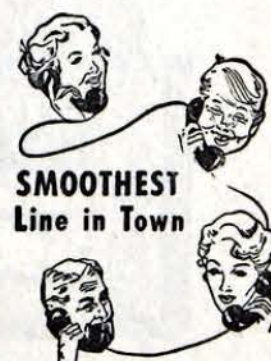
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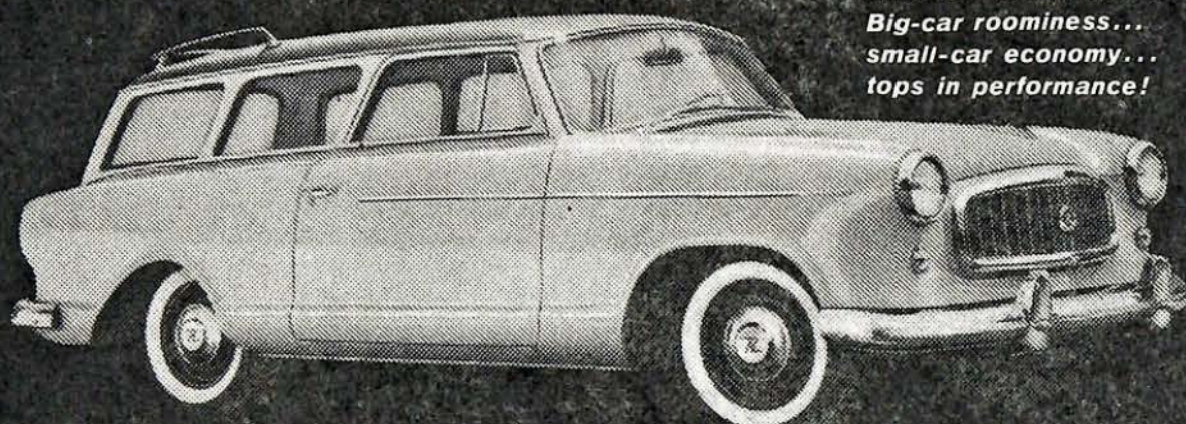

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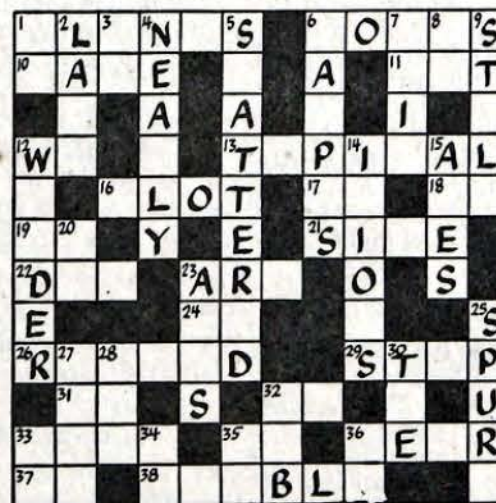

NIGHT BEAT

Dr. Martin I. J. Griffin was born in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and was educated at Georgetown College, Loyola College (A.B.) and the University of Pennsylvania (M.A. and Ph.D.)

Dr. Griffin, (to squelch anticipated comments) is not one of my current professors... nor is he likely to be one again in my college career. He is, however, a rare and valuable teacher. One of the standard comments on campus is, "Your education is not complete until you have elected a course with Dr. Griffin". How true! If you simply read one of Dr. Griffin's weekly columns (each Sunday) in the St. Petersburg Independent, you will begin to understand; or, if you observe one of his frequent appearances on the University of Tampa television program, "Perspective" (1:00 P.M. Sundays), you will, to a lesser degree, (there may be distractions) realize some of his unique abilities.

1. Dr. Griffin is somehow able to awaken interest in, and enthusiasm for literature which lies inert in many students. True... this is not done in a conventional manner, such as having the students "commit to memory" certain hackneyed lines or phrases (which generally achieves a goal other than interest or enthusiasm), but he does attain his objective, which few do! His is the most uniquely effective method I have witnessed. I am not at all certain that I could describe it. Perhaps it should be witnessed... not described. But, what, after all is literature's purpose? To me, it seems to be a means of communicating

tales, ideas, and records of incidents in the history of the race, for posterity. Hence, it is a subject, the main purpose of which is man's enjoyment of mankind. It is most important that students develop a thorough appreciation and enjoyment of literature, then; for that is its primary reason for existence. Again and again, I have seen bored-looking, arrogant students sneeringly enter a literature class. In a matter of a few short weeks, Dr. Griffin has done it again! Even the athletes have decided literature might not be sissy, after all! Lo and behold, students can be observed devouring unassigned literature (yet) entirely on their own initiative.

2. He causes the authors and the literary characters to pulsate with animation, and brings the situations into a current frame of reference in such a way as to seem very real problems that we, ourselves, must meet and solve.

3. Dr. Griffin does that which is most needed in our educational situation today, and of which it is most devoid... he insists (not encourages) that students think for themselves (and most of them become completely lost and terror stricken!) For his tests, he takes a theme expounded upon by one or more authors, and he asks for the students' opinions, backed up by logical reasons for those opinions, and expounded upon after thoughtful consideration.

Parroting his views or the author's is a sure way of making a poor grade... he already knows what he and the author think! It's really surprising how many students have no opinions or "don't know".

4. Dr. Griffin is a psychoanalyst (and that always helps a teacher).

Dr. Griffin has taught at the University of Tampa since 1947, and has, in addition to literature, most ably taught philosophy (and again will, we hope) and psychology. In addition to being a full time teacher at T.U., he has, for ten years, maintained an office in St. Petersburg, where he does counseling of marriages and emotional problems. He claims to have no hobbies, no vocations, and to loathe physical exercise. His son, Martin, who holds a doctorate degree in history from Yale, is currently studying in London on a Fullbright Scholarship.

Dr. Griffin has also just become a grandfather, again, he reports. His daughter recently bore her second son.

Dr. Griffin teaches early morning classes, and night classes, commuting to and from his home office in St. Petersburg. This trip four times daily must be an unpleasant task, and we students of the night division thank him for offering courses to us so consistently. If only one of us can become the successful teacher that he is, perhaps we shall have, in some measure, repaid him.
