Six Faculty Promoted

Six University of Tampa faculty members, including two women, have received promotions for the 1976-77 academic year. The announcement was made by Dr. Michael Mendelsohn, University of Tampa vice president for academic affairs and dean of faculties.

Advanced to full professor was Dr. Francis Gillen (English), while Rev. George Cave (religion), William J. Lohman (English), and Elyse Sheppard (mathematics) were promoted to associate professors.

Instructors of music with UT's Fine Arts Department, Dale Newton and his wife, Andrea Een, were elevated to assistant professors.

Joining the UT faculty in 1971, Dr. Gillen was named among the Outstanding Educators of America in 1973. The Buffalo, N.Y., native came to Tampa after teaching seven years at St. John's University in Brooklyn, N.Y., where he organized a black studies program. He was awarded the President's Citation for Outstanding Academic Achievement at Canisius College and received a fellowship to Fordham University as well as a New York State Fellowship for advanced graduate study. Dr. Gillen earned his Ph.D in 1969 from Fordham University.

A University of Tampa faculty member since 1969, Rev. Cave received his S.T.B. degree from Berkeley Divinity School, New Haven, Conn. and his S.T.M. degree from the University of the South. The Newton, Mass., native served as an Episcopal priest in Okeechobee and Marathon, Fla., before becoming chairman of religious studies at Berkeley Preparatory School in Tampa. Rev. Cave is an assistant priest at St. John's Episcopal Church and is chaplain to Episcopal students at UT.

A native of Jacksonville, Fla., Dr. Lohman received his Ph.D from Duke University where he was a Danforth fellow. He served with the United States Marine Corps as a commissioned officer prior to joining the UT staff in 1970. Dr. Lohman is a specialist in 19th Century British literature.

Ms. Sheppard has spent 29 years as a UT faculty member, coming to the Spartan campus in 1946. The Sylvester, Ga., native received her A.B. degree from Florida State

College for Women and her M.A. degree from the University of Michigan. She is a member of the Mathematical Association of America.

A member of the Florida Gulf Coast Symphony, Newton became affiliated with the University of Tampa in 1974. He earned his Bachelor and Master of Music degree from the University of Illinois where he was recipient of the William Anderson Award and the Music Alumni Award. A cellist and composer, Newton has appeared with numerous symphony orchestras throughout the country and has performed at UT in the Ballroom Concert Series.

Ms. Een earned her Bachelor and Master of Music degree from the University of Illinois. A university fellow, Ms. Een also was awarded the Stiven Musical scholarship and was named as Commended Merit Scholar. She is a member of the Florida Gulf Coast Symphony and has appeared on the UT campus as violinist during the Ballroom Concert Series. A UT instructor since 1974, Ms. Een is working toward her doctorate degree.

Jazz Series at McKay

Recently the UT Jazz Lab Ensemble together with the Ybor City Sertoma Club presented the Dizzie Gillespie concert in McKay Auditorium. The show started with the Jazz Lab Ensemble. They played three charts, with Dizzie soloing. They led off with "Round Midnight", then "Wisper Not", and finishing with "Manteca." There then was a brief intermission while Dizzie set up for his quartet. The evening was ended by Dizzie playing five charts with his quartet, consisting of Dizzie on trumpet and conga drums, a regular drummer, a bass guitarist, and a standard guitarist. In all, the concert went very well. They played before a house of about 600 people.

There is one more concert in this series. It will be the Don Ellis concert. Don Ellis is a jazz trumpet player and composer. Besides writing for his band, he also writes for T.V., movies, and commercials. One of his more notable achievements was the writing of the score to **The French Connection**, for which he won a Grammy Award.

Ellis will conduct three special workshops, March 23, combined with rehearsals beginning at 9 a.m., 11 a.m., and 1 p.m.

The concert is the final in a series of three being sponsored by the Florida West Coast Jazz Committee of the Ybor City Sertoma Club and the University of Tampa, in cooperation with Freedom Federal Savings and Loan Association.

The proceeds will benefit the University of Tampa music scholarship fund and the Robert McCord Oral School for Deaf and Hard of Hearing children.

This concert will take place on Tuesday, March 23, 1976 at 8:00 p.m. in McKay Auditorium. Price of admission is \$2.00. Tickets may be purchased at either the Fine Arts Division Office in room 200 in McKay Auditorium or from Mr. Michaelson in Falk Theater. Outstanding Alumnus Named

The University of Tampa National Alumni Association named an outstanding alumnus and two professors as recipients of special awards, presented Saturday at 11 a.m. in the Ballroom of Plant Hall as a highlight of Homecoming activities.

Florida historian-author Hampton Dunn, who is vice president of Peninsular Motor Club (AAA) and editor of its monthly publication, "Florida Explorer," was cited as Alumnus of the Year.

Dr. Francis J. Thompson, professor of English, was singled out for the Outstanding Faculty Award for over-five-years-service while Dr. Dan Faye Smith, associate professor of education, was presented with the under-five-years Outstanding Faculty Member Award.

Dunn, who was a scholarship student at UT in 1935, handled publicity for the Spartan football team and edited campus publications. The former managing editor of the Tampa Times is an author of note on Florida history and was the speaker for UT commencement last December.

Dr. Thompson, a native New Yorker who joined the UT faculty in 1955, earned his Ph.D from New York University. A specialist on Irish literature, the former chairman of the Division of Humanities donated an outstanding Irish collection to UT's Merl Kelce Library. Dr. Thompson, who will retire in June, is known widely for his interest in cross-country cycling.

A 1964 graduate of UT, Dr. Smith earned his doctorate in education at the University of Miami and then taught at the University of South Florida where he supervised interns in the county school system. Smith's wife, Rose Marie, is also a UT graduate and now studying for her masters degree at UT.

Turner To Leave UT

Billy Turner, coordinator of intercollegiate athletics at the University of Tampa, apparently will leave the University on June 30 to become the next football coach of Hillsborough High School.

At a recent Board of Trustees meeting, Turner responded to a question by Trustee Bill Ebsary that "for personal reasons I have decided to return to the public school system." He added that he felt the athletic program at the University of Tampa "is in good hands."

The Board then passed a resolution expressing its regrets that Turner plans to leave and its appreciation for the excellent job he has done with the athletic program at the University. Turner has been in charge of intramurals as well as intercollegiate athletics.

Hillsborough High Principal, Robert Collins, said that he will recommend Turner for the physical education position now open, and at the same time ask the Board of Public Instruction to approve his appointment as head football coach.

Highly successful with a 35-13-2 record in five years as head coach at Hillsborough High before Joining UT three years ago, Turner feels he is much better prepared and "a lot more qualified" for coaching because of his coaching and administrative experience at the University.

He also had been assistant coach at Hillsborough four years, coach at Auburndale High two years and Monroe Junior High a year. He had a previous part-time coaching stint at UT while teaching at Mitchell Elementary, but left for a professional football tryout with the Buffalo Bills.

In the past year, Turner has coordinated the programs for 13 athletic teams at the University of Tampa, strengthened the intramural program and spearheaded the planning and improvement of the new playing fields in Plant Field inside the Fairgrounds and athletic offices in the old Cattle Building at the fair.

Turner is a 1960 graduate of the University of Tampa where he won letters in football, basketball, baseball and golf. He is a native of Auburndale.
