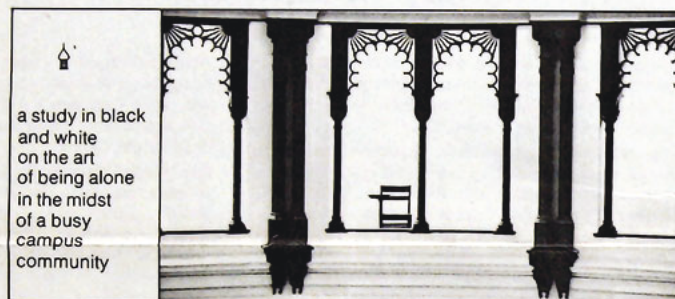

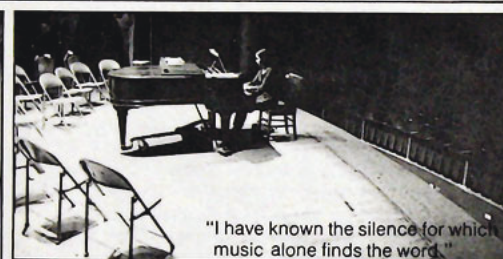

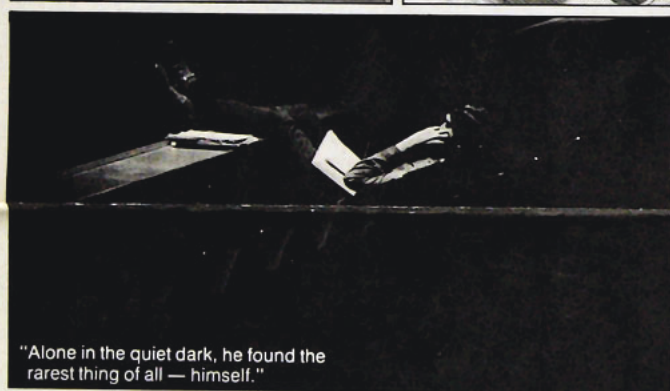

inflation necessitates tuition increase

The inflationary trend which has swept this country during the past year has necessitated an increase in tuition and food costs at the University of Tampa. On February 26, the UT Board of Trustees approved the increase of \$200 per year for tuition and \$100 per year for food, effective next September.

At present tuition is \$1,900 per year, with food costs of \$550. According to President B. D. Owens, this ranks UT as "one of the lowest cost private universities in Florida, and certainly far below the national medium of private colleges."

The increase would have been larger were it not for ongoing savings in other areas. Savings are achieved through employment of what Dr. Owens describes as cost efficiency measures and "management by objectives." Through efficiency programs, said Dr. Owens, "the University of Tampa has been able to improve its productivity, raise salaries and increase the number of faculty members holding doctoral degrees from 40% in 1970 to more than 62% now."

accreditation team visits UT

An accreditation team of 17 educators from various Southern colleges and universities were on UT's campus from March 10-13.

Their eyes and ears were open for the purpose of observing, evaluating and reporting their findings on "the state of the university" to the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges.

The accreditation team was aided in their evaluation by a self-study report recently compiled by Dr. James Covington, Dean Charles Hyde, and various faculty and student committees. According to Dr. Covington, head of the self-study activities, the guidebook probed deeply and honestly into all aspects of University operations.

Preliminary results of the team's visit and subsequent report will be available to President B. D. Owens within several weeks.

♦ "See Red" was the theme as UT opened its 1974 football season ticket campaign and also a new ticket office on March 20.

The new ticket office at "B" and North Blvd. has been in use for over 50 years by the State Fair, but now for the first time it will be used by the University. The move from Howell Gym will offer greater convenience, better visibility and better parking.

On hand to open the new facility, which has about twice the space of the former office, were Dr. B. D. Owens, Coach Dennis Fryzel, cheerleaders, news media representatives, ticket buyers and football fans.

The occasion was highlighted by the introduction of the "Redheads," who arrived in the WDAE double-decker bus. Dressed all in red and sporting red wigs, the girls will help promote the 1974 season ticket theme of "See Red." In keeping with the theme, red punch was served, and the first 50 season ticket buyers received free red Spartan shirts.

The new office will be open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on weekdays, and until 3 p.m. on Saturdays. Both season and single game tickets will be on sale, as well as tickets for other University and area events.

The honor of purchasing the first season ticket went to long-time spartan booster Angelo Ferlita, who has supported UT and its football teams since the University's inception.

A quarterly tax letter, memorial packets and a revision of the popular History of the Tampa Bay Hotel are now available to Muezzin readers.

First published in 1966, the history is replete with photographs of Plant Hall in its heyday as a hotel when it entertained Teddy Roosevelt, Clara Barton, Stephen Crane and other guests.

The revised version contains two new full-color photographs of Western Civilization class rooms, an introduction by President Owens and a short review of the University's recent accomplishments. Copies are available at \$1.50.

The quarterly tax letter, Quid Pro Quo, contains estate planning information and hints on tax savings and finances. It is sent free on request.

The memorial packet is a method of memorializing or honoring loved ones through donations for books to the University library. Attractive book plates cite both the donor and the person to be remembered or honored. Packets also are free.
