Enthusiasm ran high at UT's Forward Fund kick-off luncheon March 6, at the Riverside Hilton Inn in Tampa. At the luncheon, Stewart Bryan, Chairman of Advance Gifts Division, announced gifts and pledges of \$180,350 already received, which represents 62% of the Advance Gifts goal of \$275,000, According to Forward Fund '74 chairman Joe Smiley, Jr., the total campaign goal is \$550,000.

A record crowd of 149 volunteers attended the luncheon. Among them they will make over 900 calls for the Forward Fund.

A highlight of the luncheon was the introduction of University of Tampa coeds competing for the title of Miss Forward Fund: Sonya Surrency (Tampa), Marna Dillane (Tampa), Susan Anfanger (Pittsburg, Pennsylvania), and Gretchen Pence (Kensington Maryland). The winner in close balloting was Gretchen Pence, who will serve as Miss Forward Fund 1974.

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# vice president ford and congressman cramer visit university of tampa

The week of March 8, 1974, will long be remembered at the University of Tampa as the time when Vice President Gerald R. Ford and former Congressman William C.

The occasion for the visit was Congressman Cramer's donation to the Merl Kelce Library of his congressional papers and private political science library. Vice President Ford, a close friend and political associate of

Cramer, assisted at Cramer's request in the

establishment of the library collection by speaking at a non-political fund-raising cocktail party and dinner at

One of the high points of the evening was the awarding of the University's Distinguished Public Service Award to both Ford and Cramer. This high honor has been awarded in the past to only six other persons. The presentation was made by UT President B. D. Owens and UT Board of Trustees Chairman Fred D. Learey This is Cramer's second honor from the University: in 1957 he was awarded an honorary doctorate in jurisprudence when he was commencement speaker

The Cramer papers provide a unique documentary of the political infighting that swirled around some of the most powerful legislation to come out of Congress in

Area scholars will now have available to them background information on such national crises as the anti-rioting legislation, the anti-busing amendment, pollution control, care for senior citizens and the role of the Supreme Court.

Of particular interest to Floridians and Tampa Bay area residents are papers documenting the history of the federal aid interstate highway program, including Florida Interstates I-4 and I-75: materials revealing complicated legislative processes regarding the Tampa harbor expansion and the Hillsborough River drainage canal project.

Gerald Ford, the nation's second most powerful man, by appearing as the special attraction of the party and dinner, made possible the accelerated use of the Cramer materials. Funds raised are to be used by the library for processing the many boxes of papers and books, and for general operating costs.

At the formal, elegant and well-attended affair, Ford graciously met with guests for conversation and photographs. Following the dinner, he commended the contributions made to the country's political well-being by schools such as the University of Tampa, and spoke about the challenges being faced today by concerned political leaders. He concluded by urging the audience, in the words of Jefferson, "to enlighten the people generally," so that "tyranny and oppressions of body ill vanieh like ovil enirite at the dawn the day.

In the aftermath, now that the dignitaries and their Secret Service men, the media crews and TV cameras have all left the University community is left with some outstanding memories; and the library staff will begin the long but rewarding task of processing the Cramer Collection.



"See Red" was the theme as UT opened its 1974 football season ticket campaign and also a new ticket office on March 20.

The new ticket office at "B" and North Blvd. has been in use for over 50 years by the State Fair, but now for the first time it will be used by the University. The move from Howell Gym will offer greater convenience, better visibility and better parking.

On hand to open the new facility, which has about twice the space of the former office, were Dr. B. D. Owens. Coach Dennis Fryzel, cheerleaders, news media representatives, ticket buyers and football fans. The occasion was highlighted by the introduction of the "Redheads." who arrived in the WDAE double-decker bus. Dressed all in red and sporting red wigs, the girls will help promote the 1974 season ticket theme of "See Red." In keeping with the theme, red punch was served, and the first 50 season ticket buyers received free red Spartan shirts.

The new office will be open from 10 a.m. until 6 p.m. on weekdays, and until 3 p.m. on Saturdays. Both season and single game tickets will be on sale, as well as tickets for other University and area events. The honor of purchasing the first season ticket went to long-time spartan booster Angelo Ferlita, who has supported UT and its football teams since the University's inception.

# inflation necessitates tuition increase

The inflationary trend which has swept this country during the past year has necessitated an increase in tuition and food costs at the University of Tampa. On February 26, the UT Board of Trustees approved the increase of \$200 per year for tuition and \$100 per year for food, effective next September.

At present tuition is \$1,900 per year, with food costs of \$550. According to President B. D. Owens, this ranks UT as "one of the lowest cost private universities in Florida, and certainly far below the national medium of private colleges."

The increase would have been larger were it not for ongoing savings in other areas. Savings are achieved through employment of what Dr. Owens describes as cost efficiency measures and "management by objectives." Through efficiency programs, said Dr. Owens, "the University of Tampa has been able to improve its productivity, raise salaries and increase the number of faculty members holding doctoral degrees from 40% in 1970 to more than 62% now."

# accreditation team visits UT

An accreditation team of 17 educators from various Southern colleges and universities were on UT's campus from March 10-13.


Their eyes and ears were open for the purpose of observing, evaluating and reporting their findings on "the state of the university" to the Southern Association of Schools and Colleges.

The accreditation team was aided in their evaluation by a self-study report recently compiled by Dr. James Covington, Dean Charles Hyde, and various faculty and student committees. According to Dr. Covington, head of the self-study activities, the guidebook probed deeply and honestly into all aspects of University operations.

Preliminary results of the team's visit and subsequent report will be available to President B. D. Owens within several weeks.
