GADDIS RESIGNS; TAKES JOB AT JUNIOR HI SCHOOL



The sports writers of this paper wish that Coach Gaddis would decide to stay at the University, but we hope that he will like his new job.



Mayor Gives T.U. Courthouse Site

A towering 205-story skyscraper will house the University's classrooms and administrative and organization offices. The entire first floor will be the home of the Minaret and the Student Senate. Facilities will include two legislative chambers, a printing shop, and a wire-press service.

WUTO, Mr. McGilivray's new radio station, will be on the second floor. The station, will be on a twenty-four-hour schedule, with alternating P-M and television programs. First guest on the show, will be Pete Spencer, president of a New York promotion firm. He will interview Mr. Jesse Keene, who will speak on the subject, "How to Irrigate The Suez Canal." The program will be sent by short wave to Slobbovia.

Bob Hancock, construction expert, has designed the new University building. An artificial lake is to be dredged out of Franklin Street, and Italian style gondolas will glide the lake to provide diversion for the students.

A private subway will connect the new building with the structure inherited from H. B. Plant. The former Tampa Bay Hotel will be a squirrel sanctuary for nut lovers.

The University will be expanded in the next two years by Federal Aid which has been secured through the efforts of President Nance. The appropriation which amounts to two million dollars must be used in an extensive building program to handle an enrollment of over six thousand.

A major part of the construction for dormitories will be in Clearwater, where the Science Department will be moved for the purpose of marine study. Everyone taking science will be required to live there during the semesters that the course is taken. Also to be placed in Clearwater will be branches of the Language, English, History, and Economics Departments. Efforts have been made to obtain land from the county for the infirmity that the school must have for a large enrollment. All students enrolled will receive treatment at a small rate which will be set by the Administration.

There will also be several buildings placed in the near vicinity of the present site. Also the expansion program calls for several repairs for all University facilities that are not used at the present time. T.U. Switchboard Explodes, Injures Mrs. Avery

School officials and Peninsula Telephone Co. engineers are investigating the breakdown yesterday of the University's heavily overloaded switchboard, while physicians at the Tampa Municipal hospital are trying to determine the extent of Mrs. Avery's injury. She is reported to be still in a coma.

The mishap, which ended when ambulance drivers extracted the struggling Mrs. Avery from an entanglement of telephone cords, coil wire, and wood fragments of the switchboard, has left the school without telephone service.

Trouble was first noted when Mrs. Avery's screams for help were heard over the public address system at 10:30 A.M. Rushing to the scene, students and teachers found the operator in dire distress. The plug cords of the machine were flailing her, while steam poured from the head set mouthpiece. The cabinet was vibrating and splintering apart while a sound resembling a giant Bronx cheer came from its interior.

A record number of calls had been coming through during the morning, and it is suspected that over exertion of both the switchboard and the operator are at the root of the trouble.
