Vandals Hit Parking Meters Second Time; DeCarlo Warns

A couple of weeks past, or to be more exact, the last Friday in November — this may well be known by some of the faculty as "Black Friday" for Tampa U. — was the malicious destruction of one street of meters. It was discovered that every meter on the street facing Howell Hall was uprooted.

This is truly a black mark for T.U. The school gets only a bad reputation from such a crime. Yes, crime of felony to be exact. This is the second time this has happened in fifteen months and it must be stopped.

We would all appreciate more and better parking facilities; however, this must take time. This incident only gained unfavorable recognition and a degrading of the reputation of Tampa University students. We were being considered for a donation of City parking property prior to this incident.

We had an incident last year where fifty flags were confiscated from Plant Field. This totaled a great monetary loss and efforts were made to recover the loss. After some time forty-eight of the fifty were returned (voluntarily) and the other two were paid for.

During an interesting talk with Dean DeCarlo he disclosed this information. He said, "We were under sincere consideration of a parking area donation before this incident. I am asking these individuals to come to me voluntarily, to absorb the cost of this destructive act."

"They will receive a year's probation for their act plus the cost of the destruction. If, however, this act goes uncompensated for, sooner

New Honorary, Psi Chi To Be Installed Here

Thirty enthusiastic members of the Psychology Club met on Thursday, November 21, and learned that the National Council approved the club's petition for a Psi Chi charter of the National Honor Society in Psychology at this University.

The Psychology Club was organized at the University of Tampa a year ago last November, and has been active since that time. This is the minimum length of time required for establishing a charter at any institution. This in itself is a fine recommendation for the Department of Psychology.

Official verification of our acceptance came from Washington on December 4, 1963, and on December 10, the Administrative Council of the University of Tampa gave their approval. No specific date has yet been set for the installation, but the date will be announced on the psychology department bulletin board and in the Minaret. Dr. Delo, President of the University, will be asked to officiate. He would like to thank our Dr. Gilgash, our club officers, both last year and this year, and all of the members who have worked so hard for us to get this Chapter of Psi Chi.

The guest speaker at the last meeting was Dr. Thomas A. Rich, from the University of South Florida, who gave an interesting talk on Community Mental Health and research. Following his talk, Dr. Rich conducted a question and answer session with the club. This was an interesting and informative meeting.

Appreciation is expressed to all members for their participation and attendance. A special thanks is due Katring Blank, chairman of the refreshment committee and Charles Sherrill, chairman of the membership committee.

On December 16, the Psychology Club once again aided the Community by assisting in a drive to collect gifts to be given to patients in the Mental Institutions of the State of Fla. The Hillsborough County Mental Health Association has expressed its appreciation to the club, and to each individual member who worked so hard to make this year's drive a success. They have also expressed their appreciation to the Panhellenic Council, who also worked very hard for this worthwhile cause.

Coast Guard Officer Candidate School Classes To Start In February

WASHINGTON, D. C. — If you are a mid-year college graduate, you may apply for a commission as a Reserve Officer with the U. S. Coast Guard. The next Officer Candidate School class starts February 9, 1964.

The Officer Candidate School is a 17-week training program conducted at Yorktown, Virginia. The curriculum covers courses in leadership, navigation, seamanship, communications, ordnance and gunnery, damage control, anti-submarine warfare, military justice and Coast Guard operations.

As an Officer Candidate you will be able to specify the kind of duty and location you desire upon graduation. A large variety of assignments is available throughout the world.

Since the Coast Guard has only about 3,000 officers on active duty each officer is an important member of the team. It also means that you may have a chance to assume command responsibility early in your career.

A Small Tribute; A Sad World

On November 22, 1963, the United States of America lost its President, John Fitzgerald Kennedy. On November 22, 1963, the United States lost its prestige and its aura of power and glory when a bouquet of roses lay ignored in the back of the presidential limousine.

On November 22, 1963, history may report, the United States of America awoke from a long stupor of ignorance and petty hate to realize the vital importance of its ideals and standards as embodied in the Constitution and Declaration of Independence.

The assassination of President Kennedy came the day after the one hundredth anniversary of the Gettysburg Address. It came a little more than 98 years after the assassination of President Abraham Lincoln.

It came from a window on the sixth floor of a building, and with three gunshots, the explosion of violence and hate that had brewed so long surged to the surface of the nation's eyes, and was exposed to the entire world.

To many there is still an awing sensation of disbelief, that such a thing could happen, in this country, today. Such a feeling is probably similar to that held by those who read the news of the assassinations of Presidents Lincoln, McKinley, and Garfield; and those who witnessed the attempted assassination of F. D. Roosevelt.

But all too true were the facts, the films, the live documentaries being watched by half a world as the President died, the accused killer was arrested, that man was killed, and his killer was taken into custody.

To those who protested about violence on television, it must have been a day to remember past letters: there is so much difference in seeing an actor 'shot,' and watching a police prisoner murdered, live, on nationwide TV.

What could have caused such a chain of incidents? What could

prompt any man to kill a President?

Hate, says the President of the United States, Lyndon B. Johnson, hate and misunderstanding. Hate, say the columnists. Hate, said the late John F. Kennedy in many pleas for a new moral revitalization of American ideals and judgments.

When a country built on equality and the ideal of freedom can be caught in the throes of a struggle for 'white supremacy' and the quarrel over whether one man, because of race, religion, color belief, should be allowed to vote, to live, to attend functions both public and private according to his wishes; when such a country can be degraded to such a controversy, then can a man who believed in justice and equality for all be assassinated.

The same struggle which saw the death of Negro leader, Medgar Evers. The same struggle that has seen riots, and demonstrations, and the fiery outbursts of men who have been chosen to lead this country.

As for the man who killed the President, whether he was related to this struggle does not matter. The fact that such a struggle existed, that the fear was prevalent that murder could be done, that tension could try in vain to shield a man in an open car: this was the tool that assassinated the President of the United States. Hate, fear, and violence.

The president is dead, and there is a new President. He has the ominous task of leading a country still in shock, the awful shock of awakening.

It is the duty of every citizen of the United States to raise his head and open his eyes, to see what has happened for its causes, and to correct these causes in the best manner in which he is able, with an understanding mind attuned to the ideals by which this country was founded, by which this country became great, and by which, with the support and help of its people, it shall be sustained.

Spartan Cagers Off To Slow Start In F. I. C. Competition

"You can measure people by the way they respond to a challenge!" These were the words of Spartan basketball coach Boy Lavoy and this is how the basketball team would like to be judged by the student body. The Spartans were pre-season favorites to win the Florida Intercollegiate Conference title but are now 0-2 in conference play. There is only one question to be asked. WHY?

The problem is two fold: First, defense — opposing teams are averaging 100.3 points per game; second, shooting — The offense is completing only 36 per cent of field goals attempted. Forty-two per cent is considered a good average and the Spartan's conquerors have hit for a fantastic 47 per cent.

There is no question as to team effort and enthusiasm. The hard-

wood quint is averaging 88 points per game and this is including an unbelievable 40 free throws per game, at a 72 per cent clip. Somehow, something is lacking.

As expected, George Shary is the big gun in the not-so-perfect offense. Shary is averaging 29.7 points per game. Following the classy red-head are Chuck Andrews 16.5, Pete McKinnon 11.2, Jim Stephenson 11.0, and big Wayne Harden 9.7. Coach Lavoy quickly commented: "Harden has scored on 55 per cent of his shots and we are going to have to try to work the ball into him more."

The board work has been about even through the first four games with Andrews and Harden carrying most of the work. Andrews is averaging 12.5 rebounds a game and is closely followed by Harden with 11.2.

A most pleasant surprise was the insertion of little Joe Pizzano into the starting lineup. This giant among men was moved up to this position because of the spark he has ignited in the ball club and the fans.

"As for our season to date, two weeks ago nobody would have thought it would turn out like it has," spoke the cage mentor. "We are very disappointed in ourselves. I think the student body is behind us all the way. We still have 22 games left, and a 22-4 record isn't a bad thing to aim for."

"You can also measure students by the way they respond to a challenge. The challenge was met squarely by the entire student body the first few home games and the school spirit was that of the victor. The challenge is ours and the team's."
