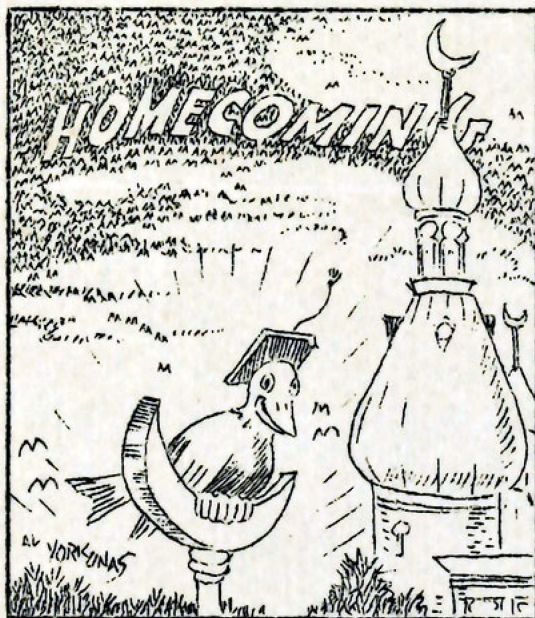

Efforts are now being made by the University of Tampa Alumni Association to secure the largest gathering of former students in the history of the school at its sixth annual Homecoming on November 8.

During the last two years, graduating classes have been so large in comparison to former years that the number of alumni has almost doubled in that time and now is almost two-thirds of the size of the student body itself.

Especially these recent graduates, and all others since 1934, are being urged to return to the university during the second weekend in November.

All indications point to a record attendance of at least 100 at the opening event, the general meeting, to which all alumni are invited.

No definite arrangement of the program has yet been made, but tentative plans call for a parade, bonfire, dance and the central attraction, a game between the Spartans and Oglethorpe.

The principal purpose of the general meeting will be to elect new officers of the association. Nominations are now being considered by a committee appointed by Billy Ailor, acting president in the absence of John Hall. It is composed of Robert Kasriel, chairman, Mrs. Al Yorkunas, Don Giunta, Rudy Rodriguez and Campbell Criddlebaugh.

Officers to be elected are a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer.

## DUES REINSTATED AT DOLLAR A YEAR

Dues are back again. The problem of these much-needed contributions by members, after being bounced around for a year or two, has been settled at least temporarily by the board's decision that a payment of \$1.00 a year is not too much to ask.

The original dues requirements were \$2.00. The board felt, however, that this amount might be responsible for the lack of interest in the association and reduced it to \$1.00. Later, with percentage of payments no better under this plan, dues were abolished, making membership free.

This resulted in a larger group participating, but another problem arose. The fund from which the board intended to draw money for expenses proved unable to fill the need and the association found itself in financial straits with an almost exhausted treasury.

So now \$1.00 dues are back. If response is as good now as when dues were first introduced, many of the financial worries connected with Homecoming will be eliminated.
