Early season games are supposed to be guaranteed wins. Teams build their season around their first few matches.

"I intentionally scheduled this. These out-of-region matches are vital for postseason play," commented head coach Chris Catanach. Catanach has been the coach at UT for 23 seasons.

The University of Tampa volleyball team entered the Colorado Premier Challenge ranked second in the nation with a 4-0 record, and left ranked first with an 8-0 record. After defeating West Texas A&M 3-1, the Spartans moved on to the semifinals with a 3-1 victory over Augustana College (Ill.).

The semifinal was a flash back to the 2005 Elite Eight match against Concordia University, St. Paul (Minn.).

Currently ranked fourth in the nation, the Golden Bears took a 2-1 match lead into the fourth game. With the score tied at 25,

Tampa's Alisha Green had three key kills to give the Spartans the final lead, forcing a decisive fifth match.

The fifth match was all Tampa as the Spartans wrapped up their seventh victory of the season with a 15-12 win.

"To be honest, if we played five times, [Concordia] would win three. They are that good," said coach Catanach.

False Alarms Raise Concern

In the early morning hours of September 2, malfunctioning Rescom fire alarms forced residents from their beds and into the courtyard. "It shocked me a little," said Nils Bjorkman, a freshman originally from Sweden. "I don't think something like that should happen here [UT]."

The alarms began around 2:30 a.m. and concluded at 4:45 a.m., after at least eight false alarms. Residence Life and Security did not expect the subsequent disturbances.

After the last alarm, a Rescom Resident Assistant addressed the crowd, saying, "If you have somewhere else to stay, go there! If not, don't bitch and complain if the alarm goes off again." The Minaret decided to withhold the name of the Resident from this article for confidentiality purposes.

Brittany Decker, a senior,

the 5am fire alarm. I recognize that my choice of words was unprofessional and unwarranted. If I have offended you in any way I do apologize, for I am deeply sorry."

While some students were dismayed by what they heard, many were just as upset two days later by what they did not hear. "I still don't know what the cause was," said Jaime Dickson, a senior in Marketing. "I just don't think that it was handled well. I didn't see Resident Assistants walking to check if people had left the building."

Nora Bugg, Assistant Director of Residence Life, asserts "residents are informed as information is made available to our staff."

Not all students were dissatisfied with the Residence Life response.

In one Rescom room, the fire alarm was the least of residents' worries. "If there was really a fire, we would have never known because the fire alarm in our room was broken. We didn't know until the next day what really happened," said Juliann Raymond, a senior.

"People barged into our room but we never came out since we had no idea who it was. I locked my door right after they left. They didn't say anything to identify themselves at all."

What Code Of Conduct?

The conduct code is a critical but often unnoticed facet of campus life. Many students only take the time to look over the code of conduct after being charged with a violation. Indeed, most students say that if they were more aware about the code of conduct and exactly what it was, they would probably be more inclined to follow it.

For starters, the code of conduct consists of 24 policies, or articles, which the University has set out as its expectations for all students who attend UT. The rules and policies are enforced by campus RA's and Security, and are executed by the conduct board. The conduct board is a group of students who hear cases from students charged with a violation of the conduct code. Too often during their hearing students say - ''I didn't know that we could get into trouble for that." But not knowing is not an excuse for violation.

The point of the code of conduct is to ensure that students act in an appropriate fashion in order to help make UT a safe and pleasant environment for all who work at and attend the university. The code of conduct is covered in some detail during orientation in order to ensure that all students are aware of it. Unfortunately, since orientation is a lengthy process, it is difficult to go into all of the details of the 24 articles that the code of conduct contains. So, what's a student to do?

The code of conduct can be found online via the UT website, or you can pick up a copy from the Office of Student Conduct located on the 2nd floor of Vaughn in room 210. In addition, the staff at the Office of Student Conduct are always more than happy to go over the code of conduct with you. They spend most of their time with individuals who have broken the code - it would probably be refreshing for them to talk to students who are trying to take an active interest in not violating the code.

Over the next few months, there will be other columns similar to this describing the various articles of the code of conduct. Don't follow my example of not being aware of the code of conduct. Pick the book up. Read it. But more importantly, join the Office of Student Conduct in the journey of exploring each of the policies as we explain and share them with you.

Many choose the University of Tampa because they are impressed with its reputation – let's not change that!



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Sex Predators Beware: Don Pedro Is Coming For You

On a sunny Sunday April afternoon, a 25-year-old UT student known as "Don Pedro" sat inside one of the rooms of a vacant home in Fort Myers, idly typing away in an internet chat conversation. Several other people sat nearby, in front of other computer screens, chatting online with other people.

They had been doing it all weekend: logging on to various chat sites and posing as young girls and boys. On this particular day, Don Pedro was posing-as he usually does-as a 14-year-old boy. He had set up an account and profile stating his gender and fictitious age, entered a regional Florida chat room, and waited.

Within minutes, more than with questions of age, location, etc. But, also within minutes, the process of what is referred to as "grooming" began. The men would ask pointed questions:

before that. The men would arrive at the house and subsequently be arrested by Fort Myers Police officers who lay in wait nearby. After that, they would be counted in amongst the hundreds of sex offenders busted by Don Pedro and the group known as "Perverted Justice."

To those who don't know him, there might not be much to make the man who is known to some as Don Pedro seem very different from most other UT students.

Although he is slightly older than most of his classmates, at age 25 he could easily go unnoticed amid of his 20-ish counterparts.

A junior-level Pre-Med major with ambitions of going into the field of biomedical research, Don Pedro (who chose not to have his real name used for this story) spends much of his time between one man had begun chatting with classes studying. In the little spare him. Most of the conversations time he does have, he enjoys started out innocently enough, playing poker with friends and occasionally playing online computer games. Coupled with his remarkably youthful physical appearance, these traits are a part of what make Don Pedro good at blending in. One or sometimes two weekends a month he volunteers with Perverted Justice. The selfdescribed "civilian watchdog group" locates and exposes people who attempt to solicit children and teens for sex over the internet. The group is a diverse cast of over 35 volunteers with a variety of backgrounds and beliefs who have become well-known for their exposure of internet child predators. To date, the group boasts of over 60 criminal convictions from around the U.S.

on its website, pervertedjustice.com.

Pedro's basic duty as a volunteer is to talk to people in internet chat rooms while posing as a young homosexual boy, usually 13 or 14 years old. Other Perverted Justice volunteers pose as boys or girls of various ages.

The ultimate goal is to get the chatter to solicit the boy for sex, which usually entails setting up a place and time for the chatter to meet.

Once the solicitation has occurred and the chatter has been verified to be a real person, Perverted Justice then notifies the proper authorities and the chatter is usually arrested.

Upon the person's conviction of the crime in court, Perverted Justice then posts to the web the entire chat transcript along with a photo of the chatter and contact info if available.

Visitors to the site are also able to vote on a ranking for the posted man based on the vulgarity of the chat. The rankings are on a scale of one to five, with one being "not really slimy" and five being "oozing, dripping with sliminess!"

Despite his knack for successfully portraying underage boys, the chats are not something Pedro necessarily enjoys. Many of the conversations read like pornographic literature. The fact that these men talk this way with what they think is a young boy is something that further disturbs Pedro.

"You've almost got to turn your emotions off," he says. "You almost have to ignore any feelings you have towards it. You've just got to go through the process."

"You get kind of numb to it after a while," he adds. "Sometimes you just want to puke."

For Don Pedro and the other Perverted Justice volunteers, that Sunday afternoon in Fort Myers was one of those times.

The Fort Myers bust was orchestrated by Perverted Justice, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, and NBC's Dateline news program. Dateline had previously covered similar stings by Perverted Justice in other jurisdictions as part of its heavilywatched "To Catch a Predator" series. Chris Hansen, a reporter for Dateline, produces the series and conducted brief interviews with nearly every man who entered the Fort Myers house expecting to meet a minor for sex. Some of the men appeared visibly shaken upon learning of the setup. Others became angry and walked out.

As Dateline's camera's rolled and the house's occupants peered out its windows, a dark-colored SUV rolled up the street and parked in front of the house. They continued to watch as a 40-yearold heavy-set man stepped out of the driver's seat and came around the vehicle to open the passenger door.

Most of them expected him to remove alcohol or something else intended to entice the fictitious 14year-old he was expecting to meet.

A series of gasps could be heard as the object removed was revealed to be the man's five-yearold son. As the man entered the house and walked, hand-in-hand with his son, into the dining area, Chris Hansen appeared and confronted him.

Abandoning plans for an interview, Hansen identified himself and sternly, but politely, told the man to leave. Upon exiting the house, a female police officer swooped in, picked up the child, and carried him away as several other officers put his father in handcuffs. The man's intentions were in bringing his son along are unknown.

"Is your mom home a lot?"

"Does she keep track of you?

Almost inevitably the chat would then turn sexual, with further questions asked as the grooming process continued.

"What is the oldest person you've ever been with?'

Eventually an agreement would be made, between the older man and the supposed 14-year-old Pedro, to meet at the house for sex.

It was the typical chain of events. On this particular day, it played out as it had earlier that day, and the day before, and the day

It all serves the purpose of both embarrassing the person as well as discouraging other potential child-sex solicitors from committing similar crimes.

As a gay man himself, Don Pedro is one of a few individuals who are permitted to take on the role of a closeted gay teen in the online chats. Chat transcripts on the Perverted Justice website reveal that it is a role he plays well, with many men frequently being taken in by the ruse.

"They all follow the same pattern and you can just tell where they're going," he says.

Some of the men appeared to be more sinister than others. Some brought alcohol with them. One man was found to have a rope and duct tape in his car after it was searched. But perhaps the most disturbing was one of the four men who had been lured in by Don Pedro himself.

"Nobody said a word for at least an hour afterwards," Don Pedro said as he later recalled the incident. "Everyone in that house was just outraged and shocked."

Upon exiting the house, all of the other men were also instantly taken into custody by the Fort Myers police.

All told, 24 men were arrested after arriving at the house, making the Fort Myers sting among the most successful that Perverted Justice and Dateline have done together.

Don Pedro's reasons for getting involved with the group

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are simple. He says that the abundance and prevalence of sexual predators luring children on the internet is something that has been generally ignored by the public for a long time.

"It's an issue that needs attention brought to it," he says. "It was open feeding grounds for quite a long time. Stopping these predators from using the internet is pretty much why I do it."

Having stumbled across the Perverted Justice website in early 2004, Pedro liked what the group was doing and decided to contribute to their online forums. After several months, the site's creators asked him to join the official staff, which he did in August of 2004.

The alias "Don Pedro" was given to him by the site's main creator, a man who calls himself Xavier Von Erck, and who names many of the staff members after restaurants and food products popular in and around his hometown of Portland, Oregon. "Don Pedro's" is the name of a Mexican restaurant.

Since he became a staff member, Pedro says he has personally busted close to 100 people, some who turned out to be more outrageous than others.

One man was a former TV news anchor in Palm Springs, CA, who has claimed in court that his chat was part of a fantasy-role play and that he never intended to actually have sex with a minor. It is a claim that makes Don Pedro laugh.

"I just reread it the other day and it was not fantasy-role play." Another man who was busted as part of one of *Dateline*'s previous "To Catch a Predator" programs, turned out to be a Rabbi in Virginia. Pedro recently traveled to Virginia in order to testify in front of a Grand Jury, which later indicted the man in connection with the incident.

Pedro says his favorite bust was one in which state officials in Rhode Island used a newly created law against internet sexual solicitation to prosecute the Vice Principal of a Catholic High "Which is a good thing."

Additionally, the work of Perverted Justice has caught the attention of law makers concerned with protecting children from predators. *Dateline*'s Chris Hansen recently testified in front of a House committee on what the Dateline investigations had uncovered.

Hansen said that the best way to prevent a child from being victimized is to ensure the establishment of a dialogue between parents and children or

School who had approached Pedro online.

With such prominent and productive members of the community being exposed in this manner, the group was bound to get the attention of both Law Enforcement and the general public. While they were initially hesitant to get involved prior to the group's numerous successful convictions, various police agencies now frequently seek the help of Perverted Justice to not only assist in sting operations like the one in Fort Myers, but to train people within the agencies themselves on how to find and bust child predators.

"Now it seems like everyone is on the sexual predator bandwagon," Pedro says, teachers and students.

"It's really the same talk our parents had with us, years ago," Hansen said. "About strangers at the playground or accepting a ride from someone you don't know. You just have to apply it to the internet."

While the general response to the efforts of Perverted Justice is positive, there has naturally also arisen much controversy and criticism.

A website called *corrupted-justice.com* sprouted up as a result of the public humiliation of the busted men. The site makes numerous claims of impropriety against Perverted Justice and their methods. Among them are the accusations that the group rarely works with police and that the public posting of chat transcripts violates the men's right to privacy.

Pedro says that while some of the criticisms have merit, others are just "blatant lies."

"We're not making people do anything that they're not predisposed to do."

When the group was first established in the early 2000's, many in law enforcement did not take them seriously; therefore, police were not involved as a matter of practice until around 2004, when convictions began to occur. Now, it is the group's official policy to always notify the police once a volunteer has been solicited.

Regarding individual rights to privacy, Pedro asks, "What's the bigger right? The right to privacy or the right for kids to be able to use the internet and not have anyone going after them for sex?"

In order to combat some of the criticism from Corrupted Justice, the group has set up another website of its own, at corruptedjustice.net.

Still, other criticism has come from the mainstream media. An article in the April 9, 2006 edition of The Washington Post reported that *Dateline* had paid Perverted Justice \$100,000 in return for their participation in the Fort Myers sting and another sting in Ohio. The article said that NBC executives had no reservations about the action, despite that fact that some have questioned the ethics of it in addition to the fact that Perverted Justice members were allowed to be "deputized" by law enforcement in order to facilitate the operation.

An Op-Ed in the July 3-10 issue of Newsweek was also critical of *Dateline*, saying their series may be exaggerating something that is only a small problem and rare occurrence, leaving some with the false impression that the internet is "evil."

Despite the criticism, support for Perverted Justice seems to be abundant and on the rise. The group has received awards and praise from various law enforcement agencies. They also recently received a letter of thanks from Utah Senator Orrin Hatch for their efforts. Hatch implied that their work was part of what led to the passage of the Sex Offender Notification and Registration Act on May 4.

Although the administrators of Perverted Justice frequently give their successes a prominent place on the main page of their website, Don Pedro prefers to downplay his own involvement with the group.

"I don't usually talk about it much," he says. "It's just something that I do."

As far as his own opinions on the issue of what to do with the people he busts, Pedro says a long period of rehabilitation and counseling should follow jail.

"They should be getting help for that," he says. "If it takes them getting busted to get help with it, then I guess it might be a good thing in the long run."





"What we [Security] do is help [RAs] make sure the building gets evacuated," said Charles Mascenik, Director of Safety and Security. Mascenik added that security wears uniforms and only enters when there is no response from residents.

Simplex, the fire alarm company, was on campus Tuesday checking the fire alarms. This caused several fire alarms to sound.

When asked why residents were not notified of the potential for fire alarms to occur today, Bugg responded, "We didn't know that the alarms would be going off. It's always a possibility that they will go off. Simplex checks the system several times a year." Since the system is tested frequently, Bugg explained that it would be "overkill" to e-mail residents since many times the alarm does not go off during a test.

UT Provost Brings Big Plans, Positive Outlook

As UT's new provost and Chief Academic officer, Janet McNew will oversee all academic affairs within the university. Prior to coming to UT, McNew was provost for Illinois Wesleyan University,

where she helped reduce the faculty course load and develop the General Education Program.

Questions:

-I understand that you were in high demand while you applied for the provost position at other schools. What other schools were you invited to? Why did you choose UT?

I can't give you names of other institutions where I interviewed due to confidentiality issues. There were about a dozen, and all but this and one other were for president,

not provost. I chose UT because I find it a dynamic institution, one that is on the move in terms of growth

with my very first week of work, even before my office renovation was complete, and I have enjoyed talking with the dozens of faculty members who took me up on that offer in July and August. The fall faculty workshop further allowed me to get to know the faculty

and they, me. So far, I am most impressed by the willingness of the faculty to think beyond their own self-interest and to focus on what's best for UT as a whole.

-One of the requirements for UT's provost position was that applicants have experience at private institutions. Is there anything about private colleges and universities that particularly appeals to you?

I've spent my entire 27-year career in private institutions. Nonprofit private universities are just

as focused on offering a public good-higher education-as public ones, but we are generally more



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but also in terms of quality and creativity of the programs offered. I was also attracted to Tampa itself and especially to the people-faculty, students, staff, and trustees-that I met here. You all, to a person, were warm and welcoming-a wonderful community.

-As provost, a major part of your job will be working with the faculty, particularly department heads. How much time have you spent (so far) working with the faculty? Are there any specific dynamics that might be either helpful or troublesome in future years?

Since most of my time here so far has been summer months when most faculty members are not on campus, I have primarily worked with the deans in preparation for this academic year and in planning for the future. I did, however, invite faculty and staff members to stop by my office, beginning

Key Additions

Edgerrin Jame, Arizona Cardinals- Running back Edgerrin James was clearly the most prized player on the free agent market. He is a strong, uphill runner who has the ability to plow through defenders. For his career, James has averaged 1,318 rushing yards per year. He also has been a legitimate receiving threat, finishing with 337 yards on 44 catches last year. The bottom line is he is a game changer. That is exactly what the Arizona Cardinals needed. Through the years the team has been a laughing stock. Questionable Moves





Bethel tied the game at one, scoring off of a corner kick in the 68th minute. Devin Shaw responded for UT, scoring the goahead and game-winning goal in the sixty-eighth minute. Next up for UT is a trip to Memphis, Tennessee as the team takes on Harding College on Friday, September 8 and Christian Brothers University on Saturday. The team's next home game is Wednesday, September 20 against Rollins at 7 p.m.
