





FOREWORD



LOOKING BACK ...

AT JOURNEY'S END . . .





Year One saw the class of "39" go to town "a la pajama" to establish a tradition now followed by all freshmen. The first freshmen football team led by Dick Spoto, Al Yorkunas, Beynon, Mandula, Freedy, and Dmytryk, went into action against the frosh of other colleges in this year. Two organizations laid their stepping stones on the University campus during this freshmen year. The "313 Masquers" began their dramatic progress while Rho Nu Delta became the third social fraternity to organize. Year One also produced the first Moroccan with Al Yorkunas, T. L. Ferris, and Dick Spoto helping initiate this annual.

Year Two added two new social organizations which have become quite active in campus affairs. The Alpha Gamma sorority with Evangelina LaFuente as president became the third sisterhood of the college. Tau Omega fraternity, the youngest frat in the school, was also founded in this same year. In June the inauguration of the University's new president, Dr. John H. Sherman, provided the first step toward a greater University of Tampa. In the fall several new faculty members put in their appearance. The Alpha Psi Omega, composed of outstanding members of the "313 Masquers," became the first national honorary chapter to be installed in this institution.





The completion and dedication of Phillips Field, the Spartan's athletic center, was one of the outstanding events of Year Three. The formation of the Quill club, literary organization sponsored by Dr. Hinckley; the Spanish club; and the International Relations club, were other activities which added perstige to the growing college. The several recitals of the Glee club, formed during this time under the direction of Walter Bethel, were a definite contribution to the cultural progress which was beginning to take place. The Junior-Senior banquet of Year Three carried the Hawaiian theme cleverly collaborating with the entertainment of the evening.

Time soon rolled around with Year Four. The chorus under the direction of Professor Wiltse led the student body in its first Christmas Carol service. Three new organizations, the Math, Home Ec, and Art clubs, were added to the long list of student activities. In this same year the Quill club, the Dramatic club, and the Physical Education and Music departments joined in presenting an original operetta, "Castles in Spain," which became the talk of the town for months after the performance. Late in April of Year Four the first "Front Porch Frolics" sponsored by the Music department established itself as a novelty worthy to be repeated yearly . . . the work and pleasures of four years comes to a rapid close in three short days . . . Baccalaureate Sermon . . . Class Day . . . Commencement . . .








A scene from the proving grounds of the Spartan. Camp Owen Brorein near Odessa where for the past three years the boys have reported to make their bids for positions on the squad.

THE 1938 FOOTBALL SEASON

Sept. 23-Tampa vs. South Georgia Teachers.

Tampa fans were pleasantly surprised by the effective deceptive offense that was displayed by the Spartans in this opening game. Champ Williams scored the first touchdown with a run from the Teachers 30 yard line, crossing the goal standing up. The Spartans added five more tallies with Mandula making two of them. Final score: Tampa, 40—South Georgia Teachers, 0.

Sept 24—Tampa vs. South Georgia College.

The Spartans resorted to wide runs frequently and had little trouble downing South Georgia by a comfortable margin. Champ Williams and Paul Hance, who ran a kickoff back for 65 yards, were the chief offensive threats. Final score: Tampa, 29—South Georgia College, 0.

Oct. 7—Tampa vs. Miami.

For the first time in five annual attempts the mighty Hurricane team finally humbled the fighting Spartans. Before a crowd of thirteen thousand the Miamians were down the resistance of a stubborn Spartan and led by Captain Eddie Dunn soon began rolling up the score, with "Touchdown Tommy" booming in triumph at each tally. Fighting gamely, the Spartans managed to cross the Hurricane's goal line. The break came in the second quarter when Al Yorkunas blocked a quick-kick by Dunn and Phil Thomas scooped the ball up and ran 30 yards to score. Final score: Tampa, 6—Miami, 33.

Oct. 15—Tampa vs. Cincinnati.

In a true come-back style the Spartans showed up well against Cincy. Tampa easily outplayed the visitors the whole game after Cincy scored in the first quarter on a long run by Dixon. A long run by Williams put Tampa in position for a score which failed to materialize when Mandula's fourth try was declared short by inches on a disputed decision. Final score: Tampa, 6—Cincinnati, 7.

Oct. 22—Tampa vs. Florida



A 40-yard pass by Spoto to Sleichter put the Spartans in scoring territory but the drive terminated on the one-yard line. Final score: Tampa, 0—Florida, 33.

Nov. 5—Tampa vs. Boston University

Playing at Boston, on the longest trip ever made by the Spartans, Tampa was vanguished by a superior team. Although the first to score by means of a sustained drive of sixty yards in the first few minutes of play the Spartans proved no match for the Terriors. Final score: Tampa, 7— Boston U., 31.

Nov. 11—Tampa vs. Stetson

Lyn Warren led the Hatters in piling up a lopsided score against the Spartans. The Stetson team showed the same power and versatility they displayed in their victory against Florida. Sleichter's punting saved the Spartans several times during the contest. Final score: Tampa, 0— Stetson, 42.

Nov. 25—Tampa vs. Rollins



The swan song of six Spartan seniors came in the tune of defeat against the strong Hilltoppers. Manucy scored the only Tampa touchdown on a pass from Spoto. Taking to the air, the Spartans completed 10 out of 27 tosses to no avail. Final score: Tampa, 7—Western Kentucky, 50.









Jim Mandula . . . weighing 190 pounds and standing 6' in height, he was perhaps the best line plunger Tampa has ever had . . . from Youngstown, Ohio . . . started out at end but his speed and drive soon earned him a berth in the backfield . . . in 1938 he was high scorer for Tampa with four touchdowns . . remember the Cincinnati game? . . . in four plays from the 9-yard line Jim carried to the 6-inch line.

Richard Spoto . . . the Spartan's outstanding passer during the last three years . . . a fine running back from Tampa, 5'9" tall and weighing 170 pounds . . . few who saw the game will ever forget the 95-yard run he made against Stetson in 1936 . . . a clipping penalty brought the play back to midfield . . . in the Florida game he completed a 42-yard pass to Sleichter . . an intramural official in his senior year.



SOCCER


