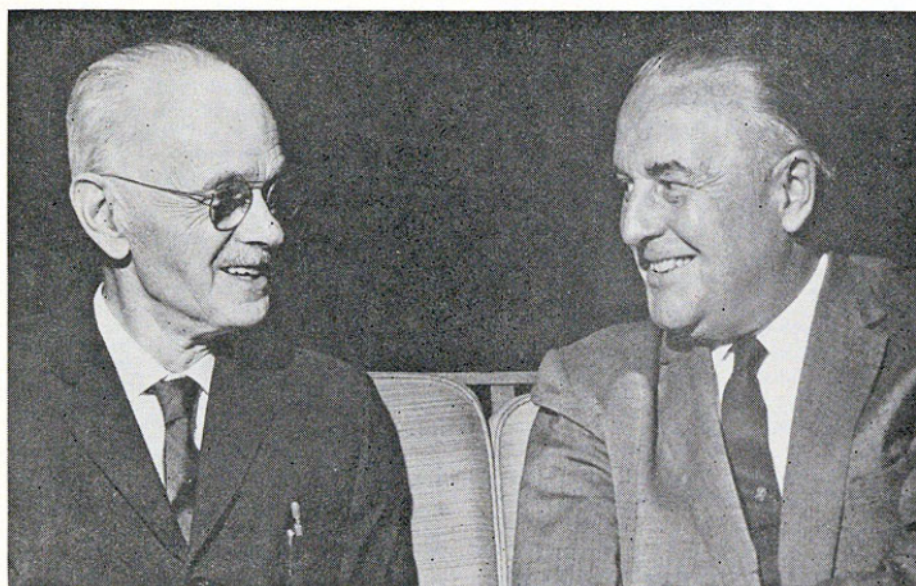

### LATIN-AMERICAN EXCHANGE SCHOLARSHIP

A contribution of \$1500 for the purpose of bringing a Latin-American exchange student to the University of Tampa next year, has been made by Mrs. Alma T. Stanley of Staten Island, New York.

A long-time friend of Dr. and Mrs. Delo and knowing of their interest in initiating a program of Latin-American Studies at the University, Mrs. Stanley has made this initial gift to assist in beginning the program.

A search has already begun for an appropriate recipient for this grant who will enter the University in September, 1961.

### ARCHAEOLOGIST WILL LECTURE

The University is fortunate to present Dr. Oscar Broneer, this year's lecturer for the Archaeological Institute of America, who will lecture on, "Gods and Games on the Corinthian Isthmus", on January 10th at 8:00 p.m. in the Ballroom.

Dr. Broneer has lectured at approximately 30 of the top schools in the country this year, among them Harvard, Yale, Pennsylvania, Duke and Syracuse. He previously taught at the University of Chicago, University of California, and American School of Classical Studies in Athens, Greece.

An author of note, he has published widely on Greek archaeology in both technical journals and the non-technical papers.

### Institute of International Relations

Created for the purpose of promoting an understanding of international affairs, and the forum of opinions and information, the University of Tampa's first Institute of International Relations was held November 18th, in the University Ballroom with over 300 people in attendance.

The afternoon session opened with a welcome by Dr. Delo, followed by a panel discussion on "Communism in Latin America." The panel consisting of Mr. Marcilio Marques Mareira, of the Brazilian Embassy, Dr. Herminio Portell-Villa, Professor of History at the University of Florida, and Mr. Jorge Zayas, exiled Havana newspaper editor, discussed various aspects of Communist infiltration in Latin America.

At the evening session, Dr. Speronis, Dean of the Evening Division, introduced Prince Andrei Lobanov-Rostovsky, keynote speaker of the Institute. His talk, entitled "Methods and Techniques of Soviet Penetration as Revealed in History", touched on historical incidences tracing the expansion and penetration of the Soviet Union throughout the world.

The Institute is organized on the assumption that an enlightened citizen is a strong citizen and his strength is the best guarantee of freedom. All sessions are open to the public. The next conference will be held in April of 1961.

## WORLD TRAVELER LECTURES

"The struggle for power in the Near East", and "Today's Crisis in World Affairs", were the topics of two lectures given by Dr. S. E. Gerard Priestley, British political scientist and world traveler on November 8.

Priestley spoke before a regular morning convocation of students and faculty in Municipal Auditorium, and in the evening gave a public lecture in the Ballroom of the University.

Dr. Priestley spent the past summer in the Soviet Union, Poland, the Near East and North Africa. He has traveled extensively in 70 countries on six continents. In this country he has lectured at more than 600 colleges and universities and before numerous civic and educational organizations.

## EDUCATIONAL GRANT WARNER RING

President Delo has been notified by the R. Warner Ring Educational Foundation of Miami, Florida, of a \$600 grant for the purchase of tax service and accounting materials to be utilized by the Department of Business Administration for the teaching of Accounting.

Harry Hurst and Richard E. Darby, prominent accountants in the Tampa area, will represent the Foundation and collaborate with the Department in choosing the materials. Mr. Hurst is also President of the University of Tampa Associates.

## MATCHING GIFT

Dr. Truman Hunter, an alumnus of the University of Tampa, and an authority on computing and data processing equipment, recently presented the University with one share of I.B.M. stock.

Dr. Hunter is presently manager of election processing activities for I.B.M. and for the past year has been training the CBS news correspondents, Howard K. Smith, Walter Cronkite and others, in the use of the I.B.M. data processing systems which were seen in operation election night.

Under the educational grant matching program of the I.B.M. Corporation, Dr. Hunter's contribution will be doubled by a matching grant from I.B.M. making his total gift to the University worth \$1,120.00.

Approximately 100 corporations currently have such matching programs of which alumni can avail themselves.

## STUDENT ACKNOWLEDGED FOR POETRY

L. Ewing Esch, a senior at the University, has been notified by the Board of Judges of the Annual Anthology of College Poetry that his poem, "Das Herzgebet", will be printed in the forthcoming edition. # Students Hear Both Sides of Presidential Campaign

Following President DeLo's policy that students should be fully informed concerning national political issues and should take specific interest in them, speakers representing both the Democratic and Republican sides of the presidential campaign spoke in convocation at the University late in October.

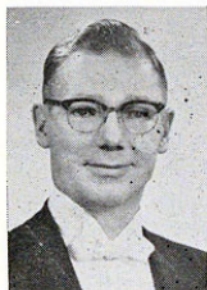
Representing the Democratic Party was John Sharon, Washington attorney who was Adlai Stevenson's manager in 1956 and prominent in the effort to nominate Stevenson again in 1960. Mr. Sharon was special assistant to the Undersecretary of War during the Korean difficulty and has been prominent in Democratic political circles subsequently.

Representing the Republican Party was Congressman Walter Judd of Minnesota, keynote speaker of the 1960 Republican Convention, member of the Foreign Relations Committee of the House, and long-time authority on Far Eastern affairs. In addition to being a speaker in great demand, Dr. Judd was a medical missionary in China prior to World War I.

Both men not only discussed the issues but answered many questions from the audience.

## STANDING OVATION

The University Music Department presented Mendelssohn's oratorio "St. Paul", under the direction of Dr. Harvey E. Maier, in the Ballroom on Sunday, November 13th. An audience of nearly 500 persons applauded the exceptional cast of soloists, accompanied by orchestra and combined University and Community choirs.

The "Oratorio" tells the biblical story of Paul once the persecutor of Christians, who was converted by a miraculous act of God into an apostle of the gospel.

Soprano soloist was Maria Hatges, mezzo soprano was Constance Speronis, wife of Dr. Stephen Speronis, tenor soloist was Guy Owen Baker, Professor of Music and Choral Director at Florida Presbyterian College, and singing the major role of Paulus, was basso Harry Waller, who has sung with the Baltimore Civic Opera Company, Peabody Opera Company and the Hilltop Opera Company.

## HEALTH EDUCATOR SPEAKS

Dr. Leonard Larson, Chairman of the Department of Health, Physical Education and Recreation at the University of Wisconsin, spoke to the physical education majors Thursday, December 1st, in the Ballroom, concerning recent research in health, physical education and recreation, and its application to the teaching field. His visit to the campus and Tampa was sponsored by the University, The County School Board, and the City Recreation Department.

## DRAMATIC SUCCESS

The University Theatre Arts Department presented members of the faculty and student body in its second production of the 1960-61 season in the Dome Theatre on October 27th and 28th. Entitled "The Epic Stage", the production consisted of dramatic readings of great scenes from the epic drama of Greece and Elizabethan England.

Selections were presented from "Lysistrata", by Aristophanes; "Faus-tus", by Christopher Marlowe; "Oedipus", by Sophocles; and "Richard III", by William Shakespeare.

## TWO NEW SCHOLARSHIPS

Mr. Ben Krupkin, President of the Gardner-Martin Asphalt Corporation of Tampa, has established two new scholarships at the University totaling \$500 per year.

The Martin Krupkin Scholarship will award \$150 to a deserving student regardless of major field.

The Gardner Asphalt Products Scholarship of \$350 will be awarded to a student majoring in Music who demonstrates both talent and financial need.

These scholarships will be awarded beginning with the second semester of the present academic year.

## N. Y. PARENTS MEETING

More than 170 parents from N. Y., N. J., and Conn., whose sons and daughters attend the University, were present at a meeting in the Park Sheraton Hotel in New York, the second week of November.

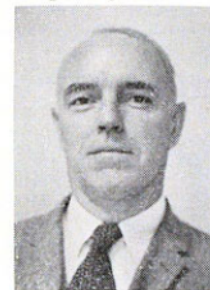

# FACULTY in the NEWS

Dr. David M. Delo and Dean M. C. Rhodes attended the 29th annual meeting of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools held in Memphis, Tennessee, the last week in November. The general theme of the conference was "The Recruitment, Development, and Evaluation of Faculty."

Dr. Eustasio Fernandez, Associate Professor of Spanish, spoke before the Propeller Club of the Port of Tampa on October 13th, on the subject "Castro, A Symptom of Latin American Problems". On November 29th, he participated as a panelist on the Civic and Public Affairs program of the General Adult Education Department of Pinellas Schools, held in the Clearwater High School Auditorium. On November 30th, he spoke before the National Council of Jewish Women, on the subject "Area in Crisis—Cuba".

Dr. Roy E. Dwyer, Professor of Education and Director of Teacher Education, represented the University at the Florida Congress of Parents and Teachers on the Committee for College Cooperation at a state-wide meeting held in the Florida Parent-Teacher Association Building in Orlando, November 29th.

The works of Dr. Charles S. Giles, Associate Professor of Fine and Industrial Arts, are currently being exhibited in a one man show at the Brooksville, Florida, Public Library. Included in the exhibit are water color scenes, casein and pencil drawings, some of scenes in Florida, the Carolinas, Guatemala, Europe, and pencil drawings of old New England houses. Dr. Giles was recently a delegate to the annual convention of the Florida Federation of Art, held in Winter Park.

Dr. Stephen L. Speronis, Dean of the Evening Division, represented the University of Tampa at a conference on "The Role of the University in an Urban Setting" sponsored by the University of Wisconsin, in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, October 28th and 29th.

Dr. Ralph E. Stout of the Education Department spent Thanksgiving week in Boston, Massachusetts, where he attended the 40th annual meeting of the National Council for Social Studies.

He also visited the South Newton, Massachusetts, High School which is gaining nation-wide recognition by initiating important new curriculum innovations including, "Team-teaching", "advanced placement classes", and problem solving classes in European and American History.

Mrs. Robbie Wooten, Instructor in Secretarial Science, spoke before the Seminole Business and Professional Women's Club, November 3rd at the Floridan Hotel on "Career Advancement".

Mrs. Florence Felton French, Instructor in Speech, attended a meeting of the Florida Speech Association in the Langford Hotel in Winter Park November 11th and 12th.

Dr. Miller K. Adams, Associate Professor of Physical Education, recently served as a member of an evaluation team for the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools at the Lakeview High School, Winter Garden. He also was guest speaker at the Hillsborough County Health and Physical Education Clinic held at the Booker T. Washington Junior High School Library on November 18th and 19th, where he discussed various philosophies in marking, reporting and grading in the public schools.

Professor James Bignell of the Industrial Arts Department and Dr. Charles S. Giles represented the University of Tampa at the state-wide Industrial Arts Conference in Orlando on October 14 and 15.

Mrs. Leta Hess, Lecturer in Art at the University, has had a painting entitled "It is; It is Not" selected by the Corcoran Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C., for the 27th Biennial Exhibition. Her painting was one of 150 works selected out of 3,000 submitted.

Dr. Thomas P.
