TAMPA BEATS GAME PATRICK AF TEAM

The Tampa Spartans handed the Patrick Air Force Base a real trouncing before 7500 football fans last Saturday night at Phillips Field. The strong Spartan team tallied 72 points to the Airmen's 0.

The Rockets were a game team and they fought hard, but their green team was no match for Sinkwich's well trained grid-men.

In three of the plays when the Spartans smashed the Rockets defense they injured three Rocket players. The players injured were rushed to MacDill Air Base Hospital for a complete check up. Tom Johnson, tackle, suffered a sprained knee and was x-rayed for a possible broken leg. Fullback Bill Munson suffered a dislocated shoulder and W. T. Wesnech came out of the game with a sprained knee.

The Spartans played a good game of ball with only one exception and that was when one Tampa player caused the Spartans to be penalized for his unsportsmanlike conduct.

Roaring ovations from the fans greeted many of the Spartans for their outstanding performance in the game. One such Spartan was big Luke Aplin. He turned in a fine performance. Not only did he do some fine blocking but he


ARE YOU A RAT?

Dean Announces New Instructors In Math, Spanish

The University of Tampa is happy to announce the appointment of two new faculty members: Dr. C. G. Schilling, Associate Professor of Mathematics and Mr. Eustasio Fernandez, Instructor in Spanish.

Dr. Schilling comes to us from Holy Cross College of Worcester, Massachusetts, where for six years he was a member of the Mathematics Department. He holds the A. B., A. M., and Ph.D. Degrees, all from the University of Illinois, with his major work in Mathematics and his minor work in Physics. In addition to teaching in Holy Cross, he has taught in Carroll College, Helena, Montana, St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, St. John's College in Brooklyn, N. Y., as well as Boston College in Massachusetts.

Mr. Eustacio Fernandez is a former student of the University of Tampa, having attended the University from 1936 to 1939. He later transferred to the University of Florida and obtained his Bachelor's Degree there in 1941. From the University of Florida he went to the University of Maryland and obtained his Master's Degree there in 1947. He then went to Middlebury College and obtained a second Master's Degree there in 1950. He has also attended the University of Havana. Although his teaching experience is limited, his academic background is such that he should be well qualified in the field of Spanish.

The University takes pleasure in welcoming these new faculty members and predicts for them a happy and satisfying association with the University.

University Mourns Dr. Chas. C. Denney

The University and the community were saddened Tuesday, Sept. 4, by the death here of Dr. Charles Crockett Denney, professor of psychology at the University of Tampa and a member of the University faculty since 1943.

Dr. Denney was in his 73rd year. He had been prominent in fraternal and civic affairs and church activities in Tampa, and was widely known as a lecturer.

He was born in Berryville, Ark., Nov. 2, 1877.

Before coming to Tampa, he taught for 24 years at State Teachers College, Conway, Ark., where he was head of the department of psychology and education.

Dr. Denney was graduated from Valparaiso University, Valparaiso, Ind., in 1902. He received the master of arts degree from George Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tenn., in 1917, and the degree of doctor of philosophy from the same institution in 1942, majoring in psychology for both advanced degrees.

He was a member of Fellowship Lodge, F. and A.M., No. 265, the Tampa Kiwanis Club, the Executives Club and the Hyde Park Methodist Church. He was a member of the Board of Stewards of the church and taught the Men's Class.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Daisy Denney; a daughter, Mrs. P. L. Horton, Jacksonville; an adopted daughter, Mrs. Eugene Black, Poplar Bluff, Mo.; two sons, R. A. Lynch, Tyrone, Ark., and Raymond Lynch, Little Rock, Ark., and six grandchildren.

Fellowship Lodge conducted funeral services Wednesday at 4 P. M. at the University of Tampa. Dr. Ellwood C. Nance, president of the University, and The Rev. Laurie G. Ray, pastor of the Hyde Park Methodist Church, assisted in the services. Pallbearers were Dr. M. C. Rhodes, Dr. Guy G. Becknell, Prof. Louis A. Nava, Prof. Clyde T. Reed, Prof. Laurence P. Geer and Dr. H. G. Baker of the University of Tampa.

Burial was in Conway, Ark.


Here's a hot tip for the Student Body. I understand that there will be a very nice reward for students who best serve the school. Remember I said the school, not an organization.

A Message From The Dean

With the opening of the current semester, the University of Tampa begins its twenty-first year. Naturally, those of us who have been with the institution for a considerable period of time take pride in the progress and achievements of the past twenty years. Furthermore, we look forward with confidence to the further progress and achievement of the institution.

One of the major attractions of the University of Tampa has been its close personal relationship between students and faculty. This close personal relationship is something the administration feels contributes in a major way to the training for good citizenship.

It is my privilege as Dean of Administration to extend to each and every student a most cordial welcome for the ensuing year. Many students may be hesitant in approaching the Dean's Office on the assumption that only students who are in scholastic difficulties or are involved in disciplinary troubles are supposed to contact the Dean. Actually, such is far from the truth. All students are welcome to visit the Dean's Office any time they desire within office hours. If you have problems to discuss, by all means feel free to come by and discuss them. If you simply wish to pass the time of day, then again, you are to feel free to do so. In other words, this office is for your benefit and you are to feel free to utilize it accordingly.

For the benefit of new students I wish to call attention to certain regulations embodied in the catalogue. First of all, under current catalogue regulations, no student may be absent from any class for a total period of time in excess of two weeks during an entire semester. Should any student absent himself from any class for a period in excess of this time, he will be permanently dropped from the class in question. The University feels that if a student is to get the

most out of his courses it is essential to attend classes regularly. Hence, the reason for the above rule.

Another important principle is that, unless some very exceptional circumstances necessitate otherwise students should follow the sequential order of subjects listed in the catalogue. Much of the difficulty encountered by seniors in meeting degree requirements arises through failure to observe the above procedure. Many students find Mathematics and the Natural Sciences together with Foreign Languages difficult. This being the case, they tend to put off such courses until the last possible moment. Such a procedure invariably results in conflicts during the senior year and frequently results in necessitating the student to spend an extra summer session or semester in order to meet degree requirements.

Another problem closely allied to the above is the tendency on the part of the student to want to begin specialization too soon. For example: John Jones decides, upon enrolling in the University, that he is going to be an accountant and therefore wishes to begin the study of Accounting immediately. After he has been in school a couple of years he decides that Accounting is not his forte but rather he will be a teacher in the public schools in the field of the Social Sciences. Naturally, if he has specialized during his freshman and sophomore years in the field of Accounting, he will have necessarily neglected the basic general requirements which he must now go back and complete. Thus he finds himself having to earn additional hours of credit over and above the minimum of one hundred and twenty-four hours required for graduation. Had he followed the suggested schedule and completed his general academic requirements during the freshman and sophomore years he would have avoided this dilemma. Again students feel confident that they will

Kenny Stewart a new Tampa U Grid-man brought in two T.D.'s for Tampa. He gave a fine performance.

Sequella made some fine runs. He carried the ball 62 yards once and right to paydirt, but he didn't collect the tally for he stepped out of bounds on the 31 yard line.

Every able man on the Spartan team was fielded in the Tampa vs. the Patrick Air Force game. They did a good job of playing. And it goes without saying that the Spartan line did a slam up job. They stopped up all runs by the Rockets and allowed only one first down. The line was largely responsible for breaking up a lot of Rocket passes. The Airmen tried 23 passes and completed but 2 for 17 yards. The linemen fixed the setting for the Tampa passers. The passers completed 13 out of 18 passes for a total of 194 yards and they cleared the way on the ground for a total of 197 rushing yards.

The passing department on the Tampa team struck terror into the hearts of the Airmen every time the Spartan sharpshooters picked a target. Lahosky did his fair share of sharpshooting. Peck, a new quarterback heaved a 37 yard pass to Aplin for a score and a 38 yard pass to K. Stewart for another T.D. 1/4

In the first quarter the score was 20 to 0. At the half time 40 to 0. At the three-quarter mark it was 59 to 0 and in the final period the score reached the 72 mark to the Rocket's 0.



never complete requirements for a degree but rather wish certain specialized training. However, after the completion of one or two years of work they suddenly realize or decide that a degree is essential but find themselves faced with the necessity of earning hours in excess of the minimum of one hundred and twenty-four in order to comply with requirements as laid down in the catalogue for a degree.


