Calandriello And Company Are On The Move

The first student council meeting of the academic year got off to a quick start last Wednesday as Tony Calandriello, student council president, welcomed the newly chosen organizational representatives and the student *citizens* in attendance. In his opening speech, President Calandriello introduced the members of the Executive Council and discussed the basic organization and function of the student council.

President Calandriello explained that the system of government at UT consisted of two major elements: the Executive Council - composed of himself, Vice President, Attorney General, Secretary and Treasurer; and the General Assembly - composed of the class officers and the student representatives from the residence halls, clubs and other campus organizations as well as six student committees, each headed by a chairperson responsible to the Executive Council.

After his opening speech, Calandriello introduced Dr. Carl Hite, dean of students, who spoke about the importance of participation in student government and the degree of accessibility students at UT have regarding participation in the decision making processes which affect them. In his talk on student involvement, Dean Hite particularly noted that: "The University of Tampa is one of the only colleges in the U.S. that has student voting members on its policy making body, The Collegium." Dean Hite went on to say that he felt this year would be a great one for UT students and as always, said: "You will get out of this university what you put into it."

Speaking of student participation, many of the six committees of the General Assembly still need members. The following is a brief breakdown of the activities for which each of these committees is responsible:

COMMITTEES

- Proposal - appropriation of funds, revenue sharing (deciding who gets what, when and how).
- Special Events - Campus parties, Octoberfest and miscellaneous activities.
- Recreation and Activities - Recreation and activities.
- Music - Bands, dances, concerts and student performances.
- Movies - Films shown at Falk Theater.
- Arts and Humanities - Cultural activities, art exhibits, drama etc.

At the end of the meeting, President Calandriello answered a couple of questions I asked about this year's student council:

Cheshire

'78 A Good Year To Come

"We're better than we were a year ago and not as good as we will be next year," began Dr. Richard Cheshire in his report on the State of the University to faculty, staff, and administration on September 12, 9:30 a.m. in McKay Auditorium.

In his State of the University Report, Dr. Cheshire spoke of some of the achievements and improvements the University of Tampa has made in the last year. One of the achievements is the increase in enrollment. The freshman class has increased from last year's 430 new freshmen to this year's enrollment of 580 new freshmen. Although transfer enrollment dropped slightly, there is still a 22% increase in new students this year. Additionally, more students are returning to the University of Tampa than ever before. This year four out of five students eligible to return to UT came back. Dr. Cheshire pronounced this "the single most important academic trend in this year's enrollment. It shows we're having more success."

Another heartening trend in UT's progress is the substantial increase in funds. The Forward Fund has increased 83% from last year and now contains, without counting pledges, \$302,000. Dr. Cheshire has set a Forward Fund goal of \$800,000 to be reached by December 31. Even Dr. Cheshire admits this is a "tough goal but one I feel the university must achieve."

UT faculty salaries were increased by 6% this year. Dr. Cheshire made clear that this was "only the first step in increasing salaries."

Not content with just these improvements, Dr. Cheshire enumerated many goals for UT's future. The "first and foremost priority" he feels is to implement "partnership learning" in the classroom. Under partnership learning the student is no longer a passive spectator in class but an active participant in the classroom. The students share with the

instructor the responsibility for teaching and learning. Gradually as the students become more involved in the learning process, classroom lectures become only supplemental. Dr. Cheshire feels that when students are required to become active in the learning process the knowledge "becomes more a part of them so that they do not forget what they have learned after the final exam, as happens all too often."

Another goal Dr. Cheshire mentioned is to place the University of Tampa on a 1-3-1-3-1 calendar. Under a 1-3 calendar students would have only one class during September, January and May. During October-December, and February-April students would carry three courses. Under a 1-3 calendar system, students would attend school nine months of the year instead of the present eight. "It is easier for students to deal with three courses instead of five and students generally experience a decline in morale during the middle and end of a school year which this system would help overcome. It would also increase UT's academic standing to be under a 1-3 calendar system," Dr. Cheshire said regarding his proposed calendar change.

Other priorities which Dr. Cheshire feels are important are: to reaffirm and strengthen UT's relationship with the Tampa area, to improve recruitment of new students, to increase the scholarship fund, and to revise our present programs and curriculums so that UT is "distinctly better than other Florida institutions."

Despite the many goals and improvements Dr. Cheshire has planned for UT, he still feels that, "We have had a wonderful year. We must continue on and it must be a joint effort. This is a very special place and people beyond this campus don't know how good we are. There is no problem here that we can't solve."

DW—In general, what are your major goals for the coming year?

Calandriello—"Basically to encourage more student involvement in student government and to establish better coordination between different aspects of campus life."

DW—What are a few of the changes you plan to make in student council organization?

Calandriello—"I plan to work more closely with different representatives from all areas of campus activities such as ROTC, residence life, etc."

Voting for Freshman Class Representatives and Attorney General will be held September 18-19 and Collegium elections will be held September 26. The next student council meeting will be held on September 26 at 9 p.m. At this meeting the budget will be voted on and amendments to the constitution will be considered.

Finding Time To Study

The University of Tampa Counseling Center will present the first in a series of study skills workshops on Thursday, September 14. The workshop, entitled **Finding the Time to Study**, will deal with the organization of a student's time schedule, methods of increasing concentration, and ways of changing ineffective study habits.

The workshop will be from 7-8 p.m. in Plant Hall, room 312. All students are urged to attend.

Future workshops will cover the topics of studying for tests, taking lecture notes, and efficient reading techniques. Students who are not able to attend the workshops but are interested in improving their study skills, are invited to come to the Counseling Center, Plant Hall, room 300 and make an appointment with Mrs. Arleen Shearer.

Counseling Center Needs Tutors

Tutoring is one of those jobs you do on your own time and get paid what you ask. It also has the intrinsic quality of being rewarding work.

The Counseling Center has had a peer-tutoring program for two years. Students who are proficient in a particular area (and who want to earn extra money) have their names on file. When a student asks for tutoring, he is given several names to contact. Not all subjects are covered and many requests cannot be filled. The same holds for community requests from elementary and secondary school students for reading, math and science.

Any UT student interested in the program should contact Mrs. Arleen Shearer in the Counseling Center, room 300. Prospective tutors should sign-up soon — requests have already begun.

The Contest

As most of you are already aware, there will be a contest to determine the best residence hall on the University of Tampa campus. As soon as the hall councils are elected, I will be meeting with the presidents of the hall councils to explain further the details and requirements of the individual residence halls and their participation in this contest. I think you will find the contest a challenge and also a lot of fun. To the winner will go a very nice trophy as well as a cash prize. In addition, there will be cash prizes for the runnerup and for the residence hall that comes in third. The major contestants in contest will be: Delo, Rivershore, Smiley, Howell, McKay, and the outlying buildings of University South, University West, and Alumni. The outlying buildings will be treated as one unit — thus a total of 6 entrants. Each event will be worth a specified number of points. Following is a list of those events or activities.

1. Grade point average - the greatest weight will be given to this category.
2. Building appearance - this will involve a tabulation of the damage reports for the various buildings.
3. Holiday Decoration Contest - to take place fall semester.
4. Room Inspections - the Housing Office will be inspecting the residence halls three times a semester. One of those inspections will count in the competition.
5. Best Hall Council Achievement for the Year - each Hall Council will turn in at a pre-determined date a list of their achievements for the year. A committee will decide which hall council has done the most for their hall during the past year.
6. Most imaginatively decorated room - this contest will take place each semester. A committee will determine which resident units are the most imaginatively decorated.
7. Best Attendance at Student Council for the Year - at the end of a year attendance will be checked at Student Council to see which residence hall had the best percentage of attendance.
8. Residence Hall Olympics - a number of events will be planned for one day which involves contests of a variety.
9. Conservation Drive - this will involve either a newspaper or aluminum can drive, to be held sometime during the semester.

At this time there may be additional events added. Very shortly you will be receiving the exact criterion for each competition, what will be involved in order to participate and how the judging or scoring will take place. Here is a grand opportunity to get involved so stay tuned and make sure you do find out what your hall is doing and when they start doing it. Get involved.

The UT Skiers held their first meeting of the new season on Thursday, September 7, lead by former UT Coach Vicki Johndrow. The purpose of the meeting was to inform students of the prospect for another good season in the world of intercollegiate competition water skiing. Each year we have had to beat back tough challenges from the other 20 to 25 colleges in our conference to earn a spot in the top five qualifying positions.

UT was also one of the first three schools in the United States to participate in intercollegiate water skiing. Coach V. J. was one of the founders of the Southeastern Conference water skiing program. Today, the number of schools involved in the program is close to 175 nationwide.

We would like to congratulate Vicki, by the way, for her Senior Women's Overall Title victory at the United States National Water Ski Championships held late last month. She is now qualified to compete in the U.S. Team Trials next summer and is a top contender to represent the U.S. at the World Water Ski Championships in September of next year. Keep on skiin', V. To the left lies a cold hallway lined with closed wooden doors, seemingly lifeless. Yet at the end of this passageway, behind a sign bearing the numerals "305", a heartbeat can be sensed. The pounding heartbeat of a man whose modern plans and vivid ideas may have a devastating effect upon the university's personality and social status. Is he a superman? No, but Pete Mulry is a man filled with ambition and destined to be a winner.

With an undergraduate bachelor's degree in social science, a master's degree in physical education, and a dissertation away from a doctorate in counseling education, Mr. Mulry seems to be well qualified for the job of Career Placement and Vocational Choice Director. Mr. Mulry states that his job entails many duties including helping students with their career choices, teaching them job seeking skills in such areas as resume writing and interviewing, and building a positive self concept within the student.

Linn, a 3.9 honors student at Hillsborough Community College, plans to major in finance at UT.

"This is a good opportunity for me to get a good education and play baseball at the same time," noted the new Spartan.
