RECENT OPINION POLL SHOWS THAT STUDENTS ARE WILLING TO PAY FOR NEW ACTIVITIES AT TAMPA U.

The Minaret Student Opinion Poll which went into operation three weeks ago wound up with nearly one-third of the students expressing their opinions. This is better than was expected for the first run of the poll. Let us all have our say next time.

Out of the 245 opinion ballots cast, 62 per cent favored raising the student activity fee, with recommendations as to how the additional money was to be spent. Most of the students want the money to go toward putting on an annual all-student dance with a name band, with votes for bigger and better assembly programs running a close second. Recommendations for once-a-week movies nosed the idea of publishing a student magazine out of third place. Publishing a student directory ran fifth in the list of recommendations. No one category received a majority of votes and it is interesting to note that there was such a diversity of ideas about the activity fee "increase" dollar.

EISENHOWER FAVORED

The Presidential candidate questionnaire showed a marked preference. Out of the total votes cast 40 persons were undecided as to who would make a good president. Gen. Dwight Eisenhower received three times as many supporting ballots as his nearest competitor Sen. Robert A. Taft, who scored 35 votes. In all there were thirteen men named as possible presidential material. Among the also-rans were Dewey, Talmadge and Sen. George Smathers, junior senator from Florida.

On the question whether an all-out offensive should take place in Korea the results were about equally divided. 122 wanted an all-out offensive and 105 decided against it while 18 were undecided.

RESULTS INTERESTING

Altogether the results were interesting. For one thing it showed that there would not be too much opposition if the student activity fee were raised, provided of course the students actually received full value for the raise. The poll makes it clear that if given an immediate choice the students would favor Eisenhower as president and are apparently not afraid of having a military-careerist as their number one boss. The poll also probably expresses the average public opinion about what to do in Korea. Some ballots even had very definite statements about getting the job done with the A-bomb and others echoed the old American common-man philosophy about "either put it in the pot . . . or get out of the game" or in other words "fight or pull out." Most, however, were non-committal.

Question No. 1: Would you pay a higher activity fee to create new student activities and improve present activities?

Answer: Yes, 152 (62 per cent); No, 93 (38 per cent); total 245.

He goes about like a convalescent, careful not to disturb his constitution on its road to recover, until it has got a firm hold. He has got rid of the will to get, and his will to avoid is directed no longer to what is beyond our power but only to what is in our power and contrary to nature. In all things he exercises his will without strain. If men regard him as foolish or ignorant he pays no heed. In one word, he keeps watch and guard on himself as his own enemy, lying in wait for him."

THE BEST PART OF LIFE

Wordsworth, English poet, once wrote that the best part of a man's life are his little unremembered acts of kindness and love. Yes, it is the little things which count much in the world today; the smile of genuine friendliness, the word which gives men renewed courage, the mite of material help which tides one over a crisis.

It is unfortunate that such ordinary actions do not embody dash and daring and dramatic appeal. People like to do things which excite admiration and stand out as enviable accomplishments. Nearly every person likes to feel he is a potential hero, that if some great challenge were to come, he would meet it unflinchingly. But the occasion for testing one's heroism comes to but few people in a peaceful life-time.

On the other hand, almost every day it is possible to perform some "little unremembered act of kindness." There are occasions to help or encourage another who needs it, occasions to make someone feel a little more hopeful about the world.

Drab and unheroic though this may be, each individual should seize and exploit to the utmost every such opportunity that comes along. That such acts may be "the best part of a man's life" is reason enough, but there is an added reason, expressed by Edwin Markham in these lines:

"There is a destiny which makes us brothers—
None goes his way alone;
All that we send into the lives of others
Comes back into our own."

SPARTAN WIVES CLUB

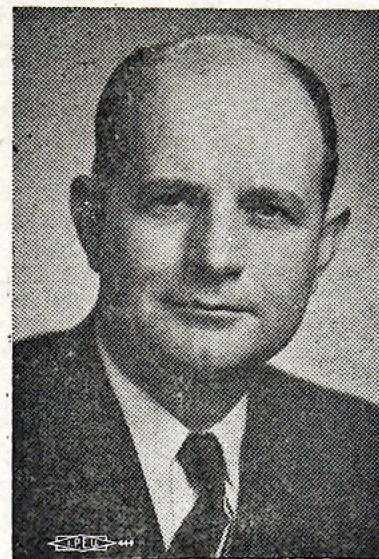
Tampa's Spartan Wives Club held a picnic at Lowry Park, Sunday, March 31. Their husbands and families were invited.

Politics Politics More Politics COUNTY SOLICITOR? WHAT IS IT . . . ?

"A Solicitor," says Webster, "is one who solicits . . . one who solicits business, trade, etc. . . also an officer having charge of the legal business of a city, town, etc."

In our town this is partly true. Our county Solicitor doesn't solicit business . . . he's got too much to do already. He does however handle county legal business.

This position requires the capabilities of an able lawyer and his staff. The office should certainly carry the title of "Prosecuting Attorney." Then the work would not be so often misunderstood.

Our County Solicitor, handles and prepares evidence on all cases from second degree murder down to the lesser offenses. It is the Solicitor's offices' duty to see that adequate evidence is obtained, a case is correctly presented, and that the offender is prosecuted.

The only cases not handled by the County Solicitor's office are cases punishable by death in the electric chair, or those where the defendant submits himself to the jurisdiction of the Justice of Peace courts.

The officer who is elected to this position should be a man with aggressive ingenuity, sound judgment, he should be honest and have a fine code of ethics, be morally true to himself, be fully capable to handle the legal problems involved and last but most important of all, he should have a lot of "finishitiveness." Only with such a man in this office can we be assured of the protection we are promised by our legislative body. This office is strictly the "teeth of anti-criminal protection."

Remember, when you go to the polls to elect a County Solicitor you are, in effect, asking for a good prosecutor.

HERE'S AN INTERESTING HIGH - LIGHT ABOUT THE POLITICAL MAN AND HIS CHURCH.

The First Christian Church, at Hyde Park Avenue and DeLeon St., which once boasted President Nance as it's Pastor, can claim five of the political candidates as members. Three are Democrats and two are Republican.

The Democrats, running in the May 6 primary are: PAUL B. JOHNSON, running for County Solicitor; K. C. It is not to be confused with “euphemism,” which means the substitution of a mild expression for a harsh or unpleasant one, as “passed away” for “died.”

Art. 5. Teaching Jobs In France Open To U. S. Students

Opportunities to spend a year in France are open to American college students, it was announced recently by the Institute of International Education. Approximately 80 grants are open for study or teaching in France.

Forty of the grants are for young Americans interested in teaching conversational English for one year in a French school. The French government also is offering approximately 35 fellowships to Americans.

To be eligible, American applicants must be single, have a good knowledge of French, and by this summer, have a bachelor's degree from an American college.

Applicants from many American students for these 80 grants are encouraged by the Institute. Inquiries should be made immediately to the U.S. Student Program, Institute of International Education, 2 West 45th St., New York, N. Y.

Paul H. Morrill Now Full Time Faculty Member

Paul H. Morrill, who taught afternoon and evening classes at the University of Tampa last semester, is now a full-time member of the faculty with the rank of assistant professor of English.

He is the grandson of Justin S. Morrill, Vermont member of the House of Representatives from 1855 to 1867 and U.S. senator from 1867 to 1898, and author of the Morrill Act of 1862, which led to the establishment of the institutions commonly known today as land-grant colleges.

A native of Ohio, Professor Morrill received the bachelor of arts degree from the College of Wooster, Wooster, Ohio, in 1935, and the master of arts degree from Columbia University in 1937. In 1938-39 he attended the University of Brussels, Belgium. He has studied at New York University and at Northwestern University, Evanston, Ill., and will receive the degree of doctor of philosophy from Northwestern this summer.

He previously taught at the Pennsylvania State College, and at Northwestern University. He has also had experience in the advertising, sales promotion and public relations fields. During the war he served as a lieutenant in the Army Air Corps.
