The second annual Chet Atkins Guitar Festival is scheduled for Knoxville, Tennessee this year. It is set for Friday and Saturday nights, June 4 and 5, beginning at 8:30 o'clock at the Civic Coliseum.

The Guitar Festival was at Nashville in 1970, but is being shifted to Knoxville, "because of its sponsor's heritage." Chet Atkins, a native of Luttrell, Tennessee, spent many years during his early career in Knoxville.

Chartered in April of 1970, the Chet Atkins Guitar Festival is a non-profit organization designed to assist young aspiring guitarists in furthering their education and careers.

Stage shows will be presented nightly starring Roy Clark, Lynn Anderson, Homer and Jethro, Jimmy Dean, Grandpa "Goober" Jones, George Lindsley, Dottie West and Albert Coleman's Music City Orchestra with cameo appearances of the guitar contestants. And, of course, Mr. Guitar . . . Chet Atkins.

Competition is confined to the electric and classical guitars and is open to all guitarists between the ages of 14 and 23 years. More than 300 from throughout the U.S.A. and foreign countries competed in last year's Chet Atkins Guitar Festival.

Prizes in each category are \$1,000 for first place, \$500 for second and \$250 for third. In addition, each first place winner will receive a guitar compliments of two well known guitar manufacturers.

Semi-final judging to determine the finalists is scheduled for Thursday, June 3rd, and the Preliminary Competition, which closes May 1st, will be by audition tape.

New hope for addicts

"Addiction in a broad sense, by which I mean a harmful dependence on chemicals, is one of our most urgent contemporary health problems. When this dependence is extensive enough to be harmful and strong enough to be uncontrolled, it can eventually destroy all other interests and activities—family, business, social, or community," writes Dr. R. Gordon Bell in the preface of his new book Escape from Addiction (McGraw-Hill, \$5.95).

After 24 years of experience working with the problem of addiction, Dr. Bell is optimistic. He states: "By calling this book Escape from Addiction, I am trying to emphasize that there is hope for recovery and that the days of stigma-laden labels for chemical dependence of whatever kind are being left behind."

The author is the president of the Donwood Institute which operates a 50-bed hospital for addiction treatment, education, and research in Toronto, Canada. Much of the material in this authoritative, 224-page book is based on the comprehensive program of rehabilitation and treatment presently used by the institute. This provocative study provides full coverage on the effects of alcohol, as well as a review of the effects of narcotics and other addicting drugs. It investigates the clinical and social problems of addiction, giving equal attention to the physical, mental, and social components. Escape from Addiction will prove a valuable, thought-provoking aid for anyone concerned with the health and social questions resulting from the excessive or compulsive use of alcohol, tobacco, food, and a wide assortment of depressant and stimulant drugs.

Dr. R. Gordon Bell, in addition to being president of the Donwood Institute, is Special Lecturer to the Faculty of Medicine, University of Toronto. He is a member of the Professional Advisory Board, Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Research Foundation of Toronto. He also acts as consultant to the Department of Corrections for Ontario and to the American Association Against Addiction. He has been featured in four educational films on Chemical addiction.


Registration schedule set



Thousands of them sick and crying, 'Cos when it bumps it's very very sore.






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Serling speaks on all subjects

Breaking the ice by saying that the last time he was in a theatre like Falk, John Wilkes Booth killed Lincoln, Rod Serling, tanned and smiling, launched into a fast paced discussion of movies, television, the "Generation Gap", morality and politics.

A six-time Emmy winner, gaining an equally impressive reputation as a speaker, Serling stated that "Anyone who speaks on a college campus today had better shed any neurotic desires for popularity."

But Wednesday morning the only thing which threatened Mr. Serling's presentation was thunderous applause.

Speaking of movies, Serling confessed that he is addicted to the nostalgia of late night movies.

"Although my daughters led me to believe that Easy Rider possessed a shade less social significance than the Constitution, I must admit that after seeing the movie I was left with the irrevo-

cable feeling that Peter Fonda and Dennis Hopper should get out of movies and open a Honda agency."

Yet he feels that there is a renaissance taking place in the movie industry. "There is a new maturity and sophistication present," said Setling.

Going on to discuss the "Generation Gap", Serling mourned the fact that there are no villians in this American Tragedy.

"Today's youth is honorable in their intolerance for the sham and sentimentality which my generation grew up believing was patriotism," said Serling.

Serling met with an ovation when he said that no matter how "morally" a man might live, if he once said nigger, he no longer considered him a moral man.

Reminding the audience that what he expressed were his personal and subjective opinions, Serling summerized Vice President Agnew, Attorney General Mitchel and

his wife Martha as "three mouths in search of a brain."

Continuing in the political vein, Mr. Serling voiced his opinion that the Vietnam War defies logic.

"How can it be said that we must not withdraw because there will be a blood bath, when 45,000 are dead already?" queried Serling.

In concluding his lecture, Serling made a plea for all men to make use of their common ground, humanity.

The Me Everybody Knows

Rick Mitz is a cross between Peter Pan, Lassie, The Wizard of Oz, Sherlock Holmes, Sancho Panza, and you.

He is full of contradicting anxieties and nervous confusion. During the course of our interview, which lasted more than 21 years, he talked about everything from his college career ("I'vs majored in everything from journalism, English and humanities to nothing."), his writing experiences ("I'm really very talented, but I can't write."), his personal life ("None of your business.") to his reluctance to be interviewed ("I normally don't let anyone interview me -- that's my game -- but you look like an honest guy.")

Rick, a senior at the University of Minnesota in Minneapolis, comes from what he terms "a sickeningly affluent suburb" in Milwaukee. He came to Minnesota "because it seemed like the logical place to go after Milwaukee." And where will he go next? "I dunno. Back to Milwaukee."

"I get bored very quickly -- with the same apartment, with the same job, with the same me. I tried to change things a lot so I wouldn't get tired of things. One day I'd wear a black suit and tie -- like the day Bert Lahr died -- and another day I'd wear one of my Salvation Army outfits. I change my underwear at least five times a day. I get bored with everything fast," he said, yawning.

"I don't know how to write," he replies when asked how he manages, one a week, to turn out columns -- sometimes funny, sometimes touching, sometimes good, sometimes bad -- that are published in collegiate newspapers all over the country.

"I mean -- well, I get an idea and then I let it sit there in my head for a while -- anywhere from an hour to, to forever. And then just before the deadline I try to write it and usually can't, but I do anyway. Or I don't."

"Hey -- why are you asking me all these questions? Are you from the CIA or something? Who are you?"

Rick describes himself as the "typical-normal-average-token-student."

"I please everyone." Rick says. "My hair's just the right length. My grades are okay. I'm fairly productive. I look kind of clean cut, and yet manage to look acceptably scruffy. I use deodorant, mouthwash, all the leading brands -- the whole bit. I'm peripheral -- I fit into all groups, and yet really don't fit in any. Adults like me. Little kids like me. Radicals think I'm "Right On," conservatives think I'm okay, old ladies think I'm cute, policemen think I'm a credit. Everyone likes me."

"I don't like you," I told him, "if that makes any difference."

He smiled and looked at me. "Listen," he said. "I write this column, see. And you seem like a pretty interesting guy, you know? Maybe I could interview you some time for the column. What do you say?"

"Sure. Yeah," I told him. "That would be okay."

"Great. Listen -- I gotta run," he said, writing something on a slip of paper. "Gotta run downtown and buy a tennis sweater. Here's my phone number -- call me sometime and we'll arrange something." And then he

I looked down at the piece of paper. On it was a phone number -- my phone number. I looked off in the distance and watched him run after a bus marked "Downtown", his short legs flying as he ran, his hair -- just the Right Length -- blowing in the wind.

I kind of like him. He reminds me a lot of me.


He was tournament director for the Gainesville City Junior Tennis Tournament and the Gainesville City Tennis Tournament the last three years.
