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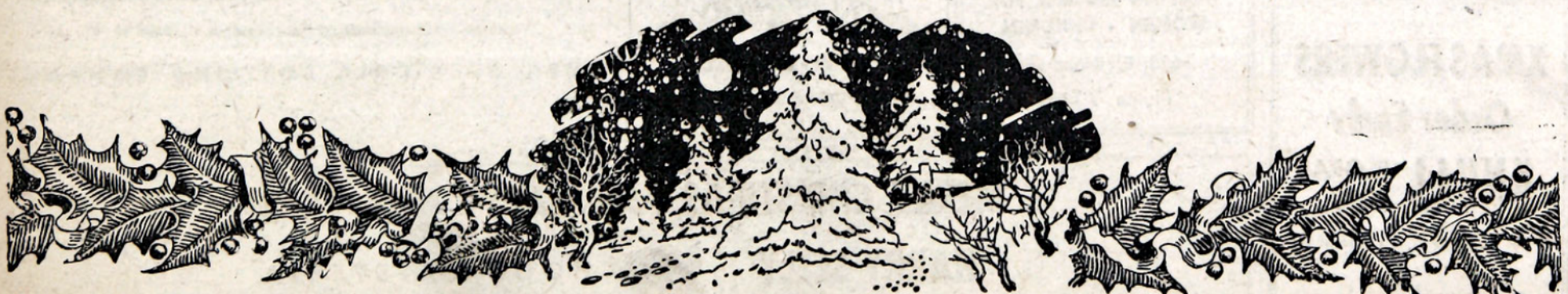

This committee, comprised of Pres. Nance, the Athletic Committee of the Trustees, the Alumni Athletic Committee, Prof. Jesse Keene, Chairman of the University Athletic Committee, Tony Ippolito, President of the student body, and several members of the board of trustees, agreed to recommend to the board of trustees that the University of Tampa be allowed to continue with intercollegiate football. This decision is to be presented to the board tonight and a public announcement of the final decision is to be issued tomorrow. Dr. Nance said he believed the trustees would agree to the recommendation.

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Sociology Students Tour Fla. Hospital

What started as an enthusiastic wish on the part of the sociology students ended this week in a tour of our state mental hospital at Chattahoochee.

This trip was interesting to us as sociology students, as taxpayers of Florida and as human beings. We found that we can be proud of the equipment, state buildings and directive personnel. Our hospital is crowded and understaffed, but that condition exists in all 48 states.

There are six doctors for this huge institution carrying as many as 1900 for an individual load. They are, however, well-trained, sympathetic men who were most willing to give us answers to all our questions. They realize their difficulties and are proud of the progress they have been able to make.

Having spent the night at Tallahassee, we reached Chattahoochee Tuesday morning, and at 8:30 were shown into a solarium where a clinic was held to show us representative cases from each of the demerit categories.

It became evident to us that these were people, real people, not some-

thing separate and apart. They could see us, hear us, understand our questions and respond, but in their answers was a confusion of logic and an unwillingness to face reality that was staggering. The doctors showed us that some of these people were college A-students. No lack of intellect was a factor here; their emotional breakdown was caused by a hundred different things that could occur in the life of any one of us.

As we went on a building tour later, Dr. Meyer impressed upon us that this was as much our hospital as his, and that is our responsibility also. It is up to us to see that the fine service being performed by the hospital shall be continued and that the conditions that tend to interfere with this service are as soon as possible overcome.

APO Fraternity Living Up To Oath

A new organization that in a few brief weeks has won a great deal of respect on the campus is the University of Tampa chapter of Alpha Phi Omega, national service fraternity composed of college and university men who are or have been affiliated with the Boy Scouts.

Charles Lazo, who took a prominent part in forming the local chapter, is president. Other officers are Victor Rogers, first vice president; Philip Megahee, second vice president; Clifford Palmer, recording secretary; Raymond Pratt, corresponding secretary; Frank Stump, treasurer, and Robert Bruns, historian.

Faculty advisors of the group are Prof. H. T. Grace, Prof. Jesse L. Keene, Prof. Clyde T. Reed, Prof. Donald Urquhart and Prof. Russell C. Apple.

Having as its purpose "to assemble college men in the fellowship of the Scout Oath and Law, to develop friendship and promote service to humanity," Alpha Phi Omega renders service in four fields—to the student body and faculty, to youth and community, to members of the fraternity, and to the nation as participating citizens.

Membership requirements are previous training in Scouting, a desire to render service to others, and satisfactory scholastic standing. Scouts and former Scouts of all ranks are eligible.

Alpha Phi Omega has two other chapters in Florida. One is at the University of Florida, and the other at the University of Miami.

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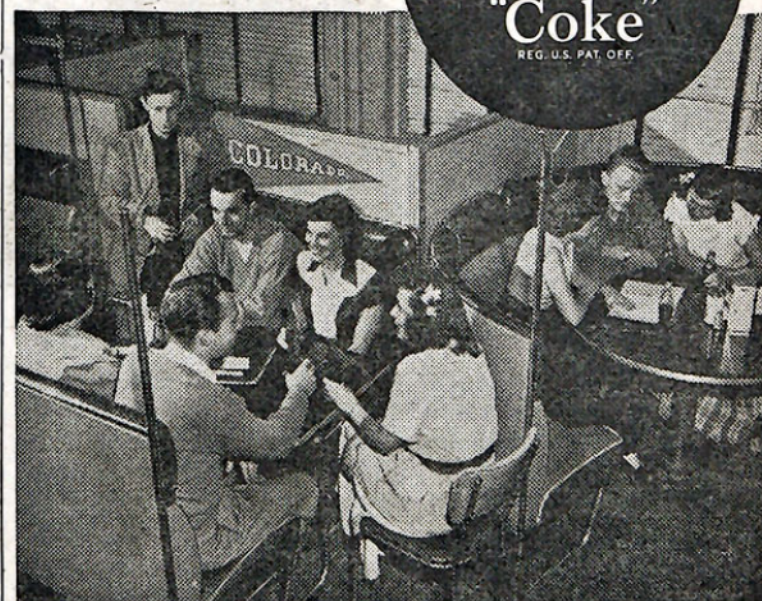

Tonight the University of Tampa basketball team will tangle with Toledo University in their third game of their current trip through Yankeeeland. The Spartans will play four games while they are in the Buckeye state of Ohio before they head for home. Tomorrow night they will tangle with a highly rated Bowling Green, then move on to Dayton and Akron for games on Sunday and Monday nights respectively.

On December 21 the Tampa cagers will stop over in Chattanooga, Tenn., where they will play the University of Tennessee before resuming their bus trip home.

Fort Homer Hesterly Armory will be the scene of the Spartans' first home game on Dec. 23, when they meet the University of Mississippi (Ole Miss.) The SEC quintet has a mediocre record over strong opponents thus far this season. On the 27th of this month the University of Pennsylvania will appear on the Armory court against the Minaretmen as part of the Cigar Bowl festivities. On Friday, Dec. 30, the locals will entertain Sewanee at the Plant High gym before they take on the first of their state opponents the University of Miami Hurricanes, on Jan. 6.

Siena, Villanova Defeat Spartans

Siena College proved the old saying "Experience is the best teacher" was the truth last Saturday night, as they scored an easy victory over the locals in Albany, N. Y. When the visiting Spartans left the floor the scoreboard read 69-36, with the Tampons on the short end of the score.

The all-senior team of the New Yorkers took an early lead over the sophomore quintet of the Spartans and coasted to their sixth victory of the current season. This was the first game of the 1949-50 season

for the locals, who are touring the East and Midwest playing some of the top college fives in those sections, including Villanova, Toledo, Bowling Green, Dayton, Akron and Tennessee. Bill Mullen led the Cigar team in scoring by netting 10 points.

A travel weary Spartan basketball team was battered to the short end of a 72-47 decision. This was the second defeat in as many starts for the local hoopmen. The Spartan squad was impressive in the first half, holding the strong Villanova squad to a seven point lead, but the Villanova quintet breezed ahead in the second half for an easy win. High scorers for the evening were Paul Arzin, Villanova, with 17 and George Montz of Tampa with 16 points.

The Spartans continue their jaunt through the states and will stop long enough in Ohio to meet Dayton, Bowling Green, Toledo and Akron Universities.

UT Science Faculty Present Research Papers To Academy

On December 2nd and 3rd, three of our University's faculty attended the yearly meeting of 'The Academy of Science', which was held at 'Stetson University' in Deland. The aforementioned are as follows: Prof. G. G. Becknell, Prof. C. T. Reed, and Prof. J. T. Grace.

Prof. Becknell, head of Tampa U's physics department, presented a paper on "The Problem of Elizabethan Literature" before the Chemical Society and members of the Academy Saturday. He also served on the Committee of nominations for 1950.

Prof. Reed, our associate prof. of Biology was elected chairman for 1950 of the biological Science group.

Prof. Reed, our Associate Prof. of Geology and Geography, presented a paper on Friday to the Social

Science group. The title was "The Development of the Anglo Saxon Idea of Mineral Rights." He has been requested to submit this paper for publication in the Florida's Academy of Science's quarterly magazine.

The Academy will meet at Florida Southern College in Lakeland next year.

THREE U. T. FACULTY HERE SINCE 1933

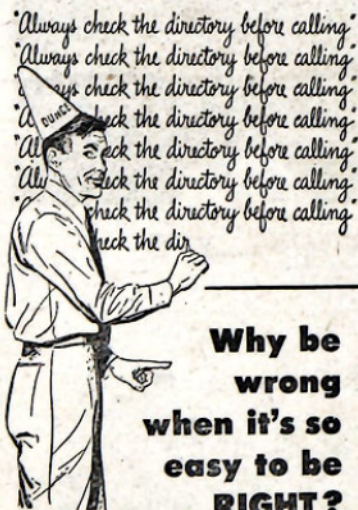
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
