Working as an official Policewoman on the University of Tampa campus, Bernadette D. Paich, who arrived from Dade City on the 25th of September, finds her duties a comfortable challenge.

Finding the campus as a rather quiet area, Ms. Paich's activities include two different shifts in which the 7 AM-3 PM day-shift controls any traffic situation, while the evening-shift operates between 3 PM-11 PM locking and securing campus buildings. The midnight shift from 11 PM-7 AM also entails securing buildings and assisting the students in any possible way.

Mr. Chandler, who is director of the Security building, announces definite improvements being made, such as many more qualified policemen, modern facilities which provide direct communication with the Tampa police, and new radio equipment.

Having been exposed to a Police Department for a year and an Investigation Secretary for the State Attorney, Bernadette feels familiar and pleased with her new position. UT Receives \$250,000

The University of Tampa has been awarded a \$250,000 challenge gift from the Charles A. Dana Foundation.

Founded in 1950 in Connecticut by Charles A. Dana, philanthropist attorney and business executive, the Greenwich, Connecticut-based foundation has supported the cause of higher education for more than two decades.

The grant lends considerable prestige to the University of Tampa for it is only one of three institutions to receive a Dana faculty-support gift this year.

The grant permits the University to establish and support a Dana Supported Professorship Program. This means the University can add four full professorships to the University faculty.

Although continuing to operate in the black and the recipient of foundation and community

support, the University has never before received a gift of this magnitude from an education foundation of the Dana reputation.

Terms of the gift call for the University to raise a matching \$250,000 in the next three years. University of Tampa President B. D. Owens expressed confidence the University would be able to meet that commitment.

The four Dana Professors will be subsidized with money generated from the overall half-million dollar Dana fund.

According to President Owens, the Dana Professors will receive an amount in excess of the base salary now paid full professors at the University.

Dr. Owens said the University will receive the \$250,000 before the end of the year. A special selections committee will be established under the chairmanship of Dr. Herman Saatkamp to make recommendations for appointment of the first Dana Professors beginning with the 1973 fall semester.

The Charles A. Dana professorships were established six years ago with grants to nine colleges and universities. Professors appointed under the program must be teaching rather than administrative. In all, 21 are included in the Supported Professorship Program.

Deadline Set For Financial Aid

The Financial Aid department has set its deadline for all student aid applications. November 1st is the date which the last applications will be accepted. Mr. Paul Sawyer, the department head, said "All types of applications concerning scholarships, grants, loans and work must be received by this date."

This year a new application form will be used. The old form will no longer be accepted in the department. All students interested in financial assistance must obtain these new forms.

Mr. Sawyer and his assistants are available for any information needed concerning the department from 8-12 a.m. and from 1-4 p.m. five days a week. The department is still recovering from the over flow of registration week and hopes to be on their regular schedule very shortly.

You can find the office of Financial Aid located on the second floor of Plant Hall just above the Ballroom.

Cardinals Beat Error Prone Spartans: Record: 3 Wins - 2 Losses

What's the dirtiest word of the day in head coach Earle Bruce's office? TURNOVERS. The Spartans fumbled their way to their second straight defeat Saturday night at Tampa Stadium, handing the Louisville Cardinals a 17-14 victory, the Cardinals' third this season without a loss.

The Spartans did a lot of things right. Our defense bottled up little Howard Stevens, the 5-foot-5 Louisville running back, and contributed interceptions that led to all of Tampa's points. Bob Bissell intercepted a John Madeya pass near midfield to set up Tampa's only touchdown drive in the first quarter and Eddie Caldwell grabbed another Madeya pass returning it 32 yards for a third-quarter TD. Caldwell had another interception earlier and Tampa recovered a Madeya fumble.

Compared to Tampa, though, the Cardinals were pikers in the turnover department. Morris LaGrand, who later scored the Spartans' other touchdown, fumbled the opening kickoff and Louisville recovered on the Spartan 22. Less than a minute into the game Stevens scored the first points Tampa had given up at home with a 6 yard run.

Four other fumbles and an interception, all but one fumble coming in the fourth quarter with Tampa trying to get close enough for at least a field goal, followed. Two of the fumbles were by sophomore quarterback Freddie Solomon, who alternated with senior Buddy Carter.

Carter directed the Spartans' only touchdown drive, but Solomon was brought in when it became obvious Tampa's passing game wasn't going to work. Running behind two inexperienced tackles, Tampa's runners could only net 43 yards for the night, but its most glaring mistake gave Louisville its second touchdown and the game its most exciting play.

Stevens, who was held to 43 yards in 31 carries, far below his 5.7 yard-per-carry average, caught a Carter punt at his own 11 and raced 89 yards for a touchdown to break a 7-7 tie in the first quarter. The offense is charged with the responsibility of covering punts.

"I can't believe it," Spartan head Coach Earle Bruce said. "I can't believe our offense let our defense down like that." He slapped his hand against the locker room wall, overcome by the frustration.

"There's only one way to carry the ball in big time football and that's like this," he said, tucking an imaginary ball under his arm.
"Five fumbles. . . . I just can't believe it.
The defense played a helluva game, a great game. Aw, what can you say. Their passing didn't hurt us a bit. The only thing that hurt us was us, our offense."
