### ASSEMBLY TO VOTE ON HONOR SYSTEM.

A special assembly has been called for tonight at 8:30 to vote on a proposal for an honor system, which has been drawn up by a committ-

ee appointed for that purpose.

"I believe that an effective honor system which will materially strengthen the school and be conducive to good scholarship can be established," stated Dean Coulson when interviewed on the subject.

A copy of the proposed type of honor system approved by the committee is attached to this bulletin in the same form as it was submitted to and approved by the student council.

# ENSEMBLE TO BROADCAST MONDAY.

The Tampa Junior college ensemble will broadcast over radio station W F L A next Monday evening from 7:45 to 8 o'clock, the second of a series of thirteen broadcasts sponsored by the college. The selections to be played are: "Tampa Junior College March", "Alma Mater" and "Parade of the Wooden Soldiers."

The ensemble was started by Haydn Gunter, professor of music at the college, and is composed entirely of Tampa Junior college

ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN MEDICAL COLLEGES APPROVES OF MEDICAL PREPARATORY WORK OFFERED BY TAMPA JUNIOR COLLEG

Dean Coulson has received a letter from Fred C. Zapffe, secretary of the American Medical association, approving the fact that no so-called "Pre-Med" course is offered to Tampa Junior college students To quote Mr. Zapffe, "The term 'Pre-Medical' was coined by the liberal arts colleges, not by the medical colleges. In consequence there has developed a state of affairs which is not satisfactory as a preparation for medicine. Instead of taking good courses in the required subjects, students enroll in so-called "pre-med" courses, which are not, in many instances comparable in value to the regular which are not, in many instances, comparable in value to the regular courses."

According to Mr. Zapffe the term "hours" has been dropped in specifying medical requirements, and the term "acceptable courses" substituted.

COMMITTEE EXPECTS TO SUBMIT CONSTITUTION IMMEDIATELY AFTER THE HOLIDAYS.

Work on the constitution is progressing rapidly, according to Wofford B. Wait, chairman of the special committee which was appointed

by the student council to draw up a constitution for the student body.

"Several drafts have been completed," said Wait, "and the
committee has agreed to devote the necessary time to finish it during
the Christmas holidays."

According to Wait, the committee has attempted to keep the document very simple, making as few provisions as possible.

Members of the special committee are: Wofford Wait, chairman; Bill Hippenmeier; and Theodore Lesley.

ART DEPARTMENT HOPES TO START PRECEDENT IN COLLEGE BY DECORATING CHRISTMAS TREE TO ENTER IN CITY CONTEST.

Mr. James Banton, of the Tampa Electric Company, will discuss plans for entering a Christmas tree in the annual city contest at

the special assembly tonight.

Members of the art department believe that the placing of a lighted tree on the Municipal Hospital grounds, or at some

other prominent place in town, will prove to be one of the best advertisements possible for the college.

According to Mr. Banton, the Tampa Electric Company, in keeping with their "Brighten Up Tampa" campaign will assist the art students in decorating and lighting the tree.

"The total cost of decorating and lighting the tree from Christmas to New Year's Day will only be about \$15." said Mr. Banton. "If the student body approves of the undertaking, we will pay for it by asking for small donations."

### FOUND ON THE BULLETIN BOARD.

All college students must be out of the High School (main) Building promptly at 9:30 P.M. No student may enter the building for any purpose whatever after 9:30 P.M. without the written permission of the Dean.

All games held on school property, in which college students participate, must have present a member of the college faculty, or some person appointed with the consent of the Dean. representative has full authority to enforce good conduct; and if the High School gymnasium is used for such games, he has the authority to clear the building and lock the doors at the time limit for the game.

No student may take the final examinations at the end of the first semester who is in arrears for first semester tuition. First semester final examinations start 3:30 P.M. February 1st. Each instructor will receive a list of the students who are entitled to admission for examination in the subject scheduled.

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#### NOTICE NOTICE

A special meeting of the student body has been called by the student council and the faculty for the purpose of accepting or rejecting the following proposed article of the constitution relating to the Honor System.

The following article has been framed by the council committee.

#### ARTICLE CHEATING

Sec. 1. All students shall be required to sign the following pledge at the foot of any test or examination paper, after having completed the work of the said test or examination. "I have given or received no help in taking this test or examination." (Followed by the signature of the student).

Sec. 2. It is understood that no instructor is required in the class room during any test or examination.

Sec. 3. Any instance of cheating shall be reported to the student council for action by any two students, or any instructor.

Sec. 4. The entire student council shall act as a court for the trial of any and all person or persons accused of violating Sec. 1 of this article.

Sec. 5. The person or persons accused of cheating shall have the right to face the accusors before the student council.

STUDENT COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON CHEATING AND HONOR SYSTEMS

It is expressly understood that it is not mandatory upon any student to report cheating unless the student shall feel bound to do so for the good of the cheater and for the good of the college.

It is further understood that an article shall be embodied in the constitution providing for procedure and enforcement of this article, should this article be accepted by the student body. This second article will treat of the manner of council action, right of appeal, penalties, etc.
