
Currently under investigation,

The animals at the zoo are available for adoption, according to the Charity Animal Zoo. At their annual charity event dubbed "An Animal for All," animals are auctioned and other prizes in order to keep the zoo in business.

Those who bought animals from the event in the past, and who still support the zoo have expressed that they're surprised and doubtful of the allegations.

"I rescued my bunny in September. I named him Dave after Dave Chappelle. He's my favorite comedian," Shirley Thompson, 21 and florist shop owner. "Anyway, the workers at Charity Animal Zoo have been nothing but kind to me and my Dave. I highly doubt they could ever use my hard-earned money for selfish purposes."

Surely a place with such fine culinary standards would cost a fortune, and by no means be suitable for my peasant taste buds. I had a chance to sit down with Metro Mart's head chef, Mike (he refused to give his last name for "security" reasons), to discuss the intricate process a bona fide fried chicken chef goes through on a daily basis. Mikehas been making the popular gas station's chicken as of yesterday.

Though modest on the exterior, Mike is quite gleeful about the amount of attention Metro Mart has been getting. Before threatening to burn down the gas station for its "putrid" smell, the fiery Brit indulged in the #3 Drumstick Combo Meal, which comes with two whole drumsticks, a side of mashed potato substitute, and a cherry slushie. 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class chef could have known how much pepper to inject into this tender cut of poultry. 
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Creed Serenades Us Into Clay

Effective immediately, the University of Tampa will be banning all alcohol possession and consumption on campus. An official announcement will soon be made about this amendment to the Student Code of Conduct and thereafter all students, including those 21 and over, will be subject to room searches. If alcohol is discovered in your room after the announcement is made, you will be sent to the Office of Student Conduct and will be subject to fines, mandatory community service hours and/or counseling sessions. UT's student drinking habits have gotten out of control and as much as it may be unfortunate to hear, our school needs this new policy for the betterment of our campus life.

Students go to university to get an education, not to binge drink, but all too often students can be seen stumbling back onto campus after a late night bender and it has become a disruption to our learning environment. The new drinking policy will be fully realized next fall and will also prohibit drunkenness on campus. If you are stopped by a security guard after returning from an off campus party intoxicated, you will also be subject to punishment via the updated drinking policy. After reviewing this semester's incoming My Student Body results, an online course students are required to take before entering UT, the Office of Student Conduct realized that the drinking habits of incoming students are dangerously high. As a result, RAs will soon be prepared to perform more thorough room searches to prevent on campus drinking. "Personally, I'm glad that we're becoming a dry campus," said Gwen Fitzgerald, a botany major and RA in Vaughn. "I see so many intoxicated freshman everyday and it just makes my job harder." It's awful to see students who believe that you can't have fun without being drunk. This way of thinking can have a negative impact on how they view the world and can even lead to drinking problems in the future.

I know what you might be thinking. Is a dry campus, especially for those who are 21 and older, even legal? Yes, it most certainly is. Since UT is a private university, they reserve the right to implement policies such as this at their own discretion. And apparently they aren't the only ones: "The Princeton Review recently named 10 of the



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UT Baseball Makes the Move to the Majors

Spartans Go Pro, Yo

After defeating the Philadelphia Phillies 6-2 in an exhibition matchup last month, Major League Baseball has decided that the University of Tampa Spartans will be invited to join their ranks as the 31st franchise in major league history.


"It was definitely a surprise when we got the call from Commissioner Manfred," said Athletic Director Larry Marfise. "However, the amount of revenue that this move would create, plus the opportunity to play as a major league team, was just too Petersburg just won't let the Rays leave for some odd reason."

After the announcement that the Spartans will be making the leap to the major leagues, Vinik announced that he would hire Rays General Manager Matt Silverman to the same position with the Spartans. Furthermore, the future owner announced manager Joe Urso would serve as the club's manager after his highly successful tenure at the university, and Vinik believes that those skills will translate to the major league level.

"Joe has a lot of the skills that I saw in Joe Maddon when the Rays first hired him," said Vinik in the same press conference with Manfred. "His ability to communicate with his players is second to none, and his winning pedigree and calm demeanor "Although we have some competition across the bay with the installation of the Spartans, there is still hope for us the reach a deal for a new stadium here in the Tampa Bay area before the end of our lease at Tropicana Field," said Steinberg from his home in New York. "Even though we are continuously working on a deal to keep the team here, we have begun to look at other options. Montreal is one of those options."

Nevertheless, the Rays' presence on the other side of the bay in St. Petersburg provides an immediate rival for the Spartans for at least the next few seasons. However, there is an issue with players. The team will have an expansion draft scheduled for after the upcoming MLB season, but current Spartans will also have Major League deals with the club once they graduate from the University of Tampa. This was one condition issued by Marfise and university president Dr. Ronald L. Vaughn before selling the team to the MLB, which Commissioner Manfred happily accepted at the press conference.

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great of an opportunity to pass up."

Once the NCAA season ends for the Spartans, they will begin their transition towards the MLB. They will be renamed the Tampa Spartans, and plans for a new stadium in Channelside are already being planned, with Tampa Bay Lightning owner Jeff Vinik in talks to purchase the Spartans' rights as an MLB team. Vinik's ownership of the Lightning only serves as a plus in the eyes of Commissioner Manfred.

"I am excited for the Tampa Spartans to join Major League Baseball as our 31st team," Manfred said in a press conference yesterday, alongside prospective owner Vinik. "Jeff Vinik, the owner of the Lightning, is in talks to buy the team's rights from the University of Tampa. This will create a strong revenue stream for Major League Baseball in Tampa, as the city of St. will be a great influence for our young team."

Despite being hired by the Rays to fill former GM Andrew Friedman's shoes earlier this offseason, Silverman decided to take the Spartans' job after the overwhelming rumors that the Rays will move to Montreal following the expiration of their lease at Tropicana Field in 2022. A statement has not been issued by the Spartans' new general manager, but expect him to speak at length on the franchise's bright future in the Tampa Bay area at the team's first press conference on Sunday.

Even though it is essentially a "done deal that the Rays will move to Montreal after the 2022 season," according to CBS Sports' Jon Heyman, Rays principal owner Stuart Steinberg says there is a still some hope that the franchise will be able to stay in the Tampa Bay area.
