

Cheshire To Decide

Seniors Wishes To Be Accommodated

On Friday, April 13th, three graduating seniors, John Kropp, Mitch Weiss and Lori Long, met with President Cheshire and Provost Mike Mendelsohn to discuss the possibility of changing the graduation site from McKay Auditorium to Plant Park. According to Cheshire and Mendelsohn, some of the information printed in last week's article, "Seniors Request Change in Graduation Site," was not entirely accurate.


Mendelsohn said that he recommended that Cheshire change the graduation site from Plant Park to McKay. Their main concern was the discomfort of the participants. According to Mendelsohn, if all graduates bring no more than four guests, McKay's seating capacity will accommodate everyone. Cheshire and Mendelsohn assured graduating seniors that everything possible will be done to meet the wishes of this year's senior class.

Mitch Weiss scheduled a meeting Wednesday for graduating seniors and the ceremony site will be discussed and voted on. At that time, Cheshire will be informed of the results of this vote and will make the final decision for the graduation site accordingly.

NBC's News President To Speak At Commencement

The president of NBC news, Lester M. Crystal, will be the speaker for the April 28 commencement exercise of the University of Tampa at 5 p.m. in McKay Auditorium.

Degrees will be conferred on more than 280 undergraduate and graduate students and approximately 75 candidates for the baccalaureate degree in August will be recognized.



Taking part in the processional, which will move from Plant Hall to McKay shortly before the exercise, will be trustees, administrators, faculty, students and special guests of the University, all garbed in academic regalia.

In Crystal, the University of Tampa chose one of America's top news executives to provide the charge to new graduates. Always in the forefront of current news PI

events, Crystal is now in China negotiating for the establishment of an NBC news bureau in Peking.

According to Bill Henry, WFLA-TV's community relations director, and Joe Mannion, Channel 8's news director, Crystal will return to this country on April 25 and arrive in Tampa Friday evening before graduation. Plans are for the local NBC affiliate to interview Crystal for a Saturday News Conference showing.

News Conference is aired at 7 p.m. Saturdays on Channel 8.

A life-long broadcast journalist, Crystal started in radio and television more than 20 years ago, becoming president of NBC News on October 5, 1977. He moved to that position after only three months as executive vice president of NBC Television News.

Prior positions include that of vice president, special programming, NBC News, and executive producer of "NBC Nightly News." He also served as producer of NBC News' coverage of the 1976 national political conventions and elections.

A native of Duluth, Minn., he graudated from Northwestern University's Medill School of Journalism in 1957. He began his broadcast journalism career while in college, working as a newswriter for KDAL Radio-TV in Duluth and WCCO Radio in Minneapolis.

After graduation, he joined the staff of the CBS radio and television stations in Chicago, then held the position of news director of WFBG Radio-TV in Altoona, Pa. (1958-60) and WFIL Radio-TV in Philadelphia (1960-63) before moving to NBC News in September, 1963 as the first producer of "NBC News: Chicago Report."

Third Woman Named Citizen Of The Year

Sylvia Corral Vega, whose volunteer community service spans 48 years, was named the Tampa Civitan Club's 1978 "Citizen of the Year" Wednesday.

Honored at the annual Governor's Luncheon at the Airport Holiday Inn, Vega was introduced by Marlene Smith, former Hillsborough Community College trustee.

Smith, in announcing the selection of Vega for the honor, called her "a great citizen. A great person."

Vega said she was unaware of her selection until the luncheon. "I'm totally unprepared."

Gov. Bob Graham led the applause for Vega and during his speech commended her community service and the Civitan Club for honoring her.

Vega is the third woman voted the "Citizen of the Year," and her volunteer community work dates back to 1931.

Smith recited numerous organizations to which Vega, a native of Tampa, had served-including those involved in health, education, religion, welfare and business.

She is the widow of a Tampa lawyer, C. C. "Milo" Vega, and has two children - son Milo Vega Jr. and daughter Nootchie Smith.

Vega is the first woman elected to the University of Tampa board of trustees and has volunteered her time as a member or chairman of 25 national, state and local organizations.



Spartans Lose One, Win Another

The UT Spartans played two games with radically different results. The Spartans started off the week with a previously unscheduled game with Wesleyan College of West Virginia. Wesleyan got on the board first, scoring a single run in the top of the first inning. The Spartans came right back and scored five runs in the second and third inning combined. Wesleyan came fighting back tying up the game in the fifth inning, when they scored four runs, only two of which were earned. It stayed deadlocked until the bottom of the ninth, when, with one out, Larry Reasonover hit his second triple of the game off the center field fence. The Spartans could not put their good fortune to work for them, as they got their running plays mixed up and ran into a double play to end the inning and sent them into extra innings. Wesleyan came back and scored a run in the top of the tenth inning on two UT errors. It proved to e enough as, although they managed to fill the bases, the Spartans could not score a run to tie the game. Bill Austin picked up an unwarranted second loss in five decisions for his fine six inning four strike out relief performance for starter Harry Linn.

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The Spartans came back on Tuesday to play a Florida Memorial College team that they had beaten once before, 5-3. But on this day, the Spartans made the game look like a personal vendetta, as they collected sixteen hits and nineteen runs in a seven inning shortened ballgame. Freshman Jim Mellaci cruised to his first win as a Spartan, scattering five harmless hits and allowing only one meaningless earned run. Hitting stars abounded in this game, as the Spartans collected seven extra base hits and drawing ten walks. Andy Faza, Larry Reasonover, Rich Vollrath, Bob Kinckner and Joe Salanitri all had doubles, while Salanitri and Frank Yurchak had triples. Salanitri led the team with a pair of RBI's and also a pair of runs scored.

Ski Team Has A Discouraging Start And A Disappointing Finish

A discouraging beginning led to a disappointing end for University of Tampa ski team this year. Many skiers, old and new, came to UT in September to find that the ski team had been dropped from the athletic program as a varsity sport. This was a severe blow to the ski team because, without the financial backing of the university, it became too costly for most of the skiers to practice.

The ski team, for the first time in its nine year history, failed to qualify for the southeastern conference championships (top five schools in the conference compete) finishing a very disappointing eleventh overall. UT had more than enough powerhouse skiers this year to win the southern championships.

Discouragement and disappointment grew even more when skiers realized that UT dropped from its varsity standing a sport which is one of the fastest growing in the world (both pro and amateur), in which over 14 million Americans participate, and especially a sport which kept its school nationally recognized since its beginning here in 1970.

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
